HUNGRY FOR HEADLINES

Though America's liberal activists seem preoccupied with gutting foreign policy these days — the need to negotiate another arms control agreement the Soviets can violate; making the world safe for Nicaragua's Sandinistas; and promoting racial harmony in South Africa by destroying the few institutions in the country that actually have a beneficial influence - do not fret.

They also have discovered some very, very serious problems closer to home: hunger and homelessness.

To listen to them one would think the streets are teeming with millions of the unfortunate scrounging around in garbage cans for a meager scrap from some rich man's table. Calcutta USA

A Harvard-based group calling itself the Physicians Task Force on Hunger, for example, has produced a "study" claiming that 20-million Americans — nearly one out of every ten — is living on the edge of starvation. Surprised? What would you expect? After all, a "Task Force on Hunger' would have to hang up its press releases if it couldn't locate a hunger epidemic.

And, of course, there's always blame to be passed around. So not surprisingly, the Physicians Task Force on Hunger concluded that "the recent and swift return of hunger to America can be traced in substantial measure to clear and conscious policies of the federal government." And whose policies are those? President Reagan's of course.

Beginning to get the drift? The real irony in this story comes from the fact that these same politicized physicians participated in a similar study in 1977 which found that America's nutrition programs were a great success and that hunger and malnutrition weren't serious problems. Isn't it amazing that despite increased federal expenditures in those intervening years, America is suf-

fering from what the doctors now call a "national health epidemic?" There are Americans who suffer from hunger. It's a tragic fact of life. Just as there are "street people" and "shopping-bag ladies." But to put the number of hungry people at 20-million is political dishonesty at its

One look at the data presented in the Hunger in America report tells why. The physicians did not actually find 20-million people hungry. The method for arriving at that number is as follows: they took the 1983 "poverty" count of some 35 million, subtracted the 20-million food stamp recipients, and got 15-million people below the poverty line who were not receiving food stamps. These people, they arbitrarily decided, were hungry by definition. Next, they did some finagling with survey data (some of which they describe as not necessarily reliable) to estimate how many people receiving food stamps might still be experiencing hunger. And hocus-pocus, they came up with 5-million more hungry people.

In the late 1970s, two out of five poor Americans received food stamp assistance and the doctors saw no hunger crisis. Today, two of five poor Americans receive food stamps and we are in the middle of a hunger

If the Hunger in America report proved anything, it is not that we are suffering from a "national health epidemic," but that certain doctors are "hungry" for headlines.



AUSTIN—Texas lawmakers neared an accord on the state budget by giving conference committee approval to a new twist on motor vehicle inspec-

If approved by the full Legislature before adjournment at midnight, Memorial Day, inspection sticker prices will go up from \$5.25 to \$7.75, an increase of \$2.50.

But Texans who buy a new car will have to pay \$15, good for two years. This new twist is a result of lawmakers efforts to find an extra \$150 million to balance the budget by raising various state fees.

Also proposed was a \$50 increase in the cost of filing a suit in state district court. Child support cases were exempted.

Hightower Wins One

Jim Hightower has had tough going this session with budget writers cutting his outlays and limiting his staff, but last week his foes carried the battle against him too far. Hightower, perhaps riding on a sympathy backlash, finally won

one in the Legislature. When House Agriculture chairman Bob Saunders, D-LaGrange, moved to dilute Hightower's power to regulate pesticide use, particularly his protection of stoop laborers in the Rio Grande Valley, he found himself not only up against the Mexican-American Caucus, but enough handfuls of conservatives from both parties to warrant surrender.

He abandoned his proposal which was backed by chemical lobbyists and the Texas Farm Bureau, two groups which Hightower angered earlier with his new, stringent pesticide regulations.

Abortion Foes Defeated Also abandoned last week

was the attempt to pass stricter abortion regulations. Abortion foes L. B. Kubiak, D-Rockdale, and Jan McKenna. R-Arlington, tried to build their measure into other legislation renewing the Texas Department of Health, but some key lawmakers threatened to filibuster. The Speaker asked Kubiak

and the others to retreat and avoid a confrontation that could lead to a special session this summer.

State Agency Axed

The Speaker called it right, too, as House members demonstrated when Bruce Gibson, D-Cleburne, and some other antiabortion foes tried to revive the Texas Health Facilities Commission by tying it to abortion regulations.

The controversial commission regulates who can build and expand hospitals and nursing homes, but House members voted 97-49 to axe it.

Another approved bill gives the Veterans Land Board, also chaired by Mauro, the authority to make veteran loans on 5-acre tracts, much easier than the present 10-acre minimum requirement.

Urban sprawl and the decade's rising interest rates have made it difficult for veterans to find an available ten acres.

Presidential Primary

The House approved and sent to the Senate a bill moving the Texas presidential primary up two months from early May to March.

the hardy asters (michaelmas daisies). These are usually placed to the back of the border because of their height. several blue vitex trees in our city. They won't all grow tall however. Some perform well in containers and give lots of autumn color. "Snowball" is ten inches high, white flowers with yellow centers. "Audrey" is a foot 26, 27, 28, 29. high mound of lavender blue. "Romany" spreads, although it is only eight inches high with rosy flowers. It does well in a low planter box. "Napsbury" is 18 inches tall, but can

blue flowers with orange centers. If plants need repotting, this should be done earlier or in late winter. Remove plant from the container and shake the soil from the roots, then wash the roots to remove the residue. Gently pull apart the rizomes that make up the crown so that each division has a few fronds and roots. There are many attractive varieties to

Now is the time to prune azaleas and other spring flower shrubs if needed after bloom. Also climbing roses that bloom only in the spring.

Cut out all dead and old cones. A summer annual that is great for any hot, dry location is the moss rose. It is available in orange, pink, red, and white and is most effective when planted in masses of a single color. Broadcast seeds directly into the soil or set out nursery transplants 8 to 10 inches apart. Seedlings should come
