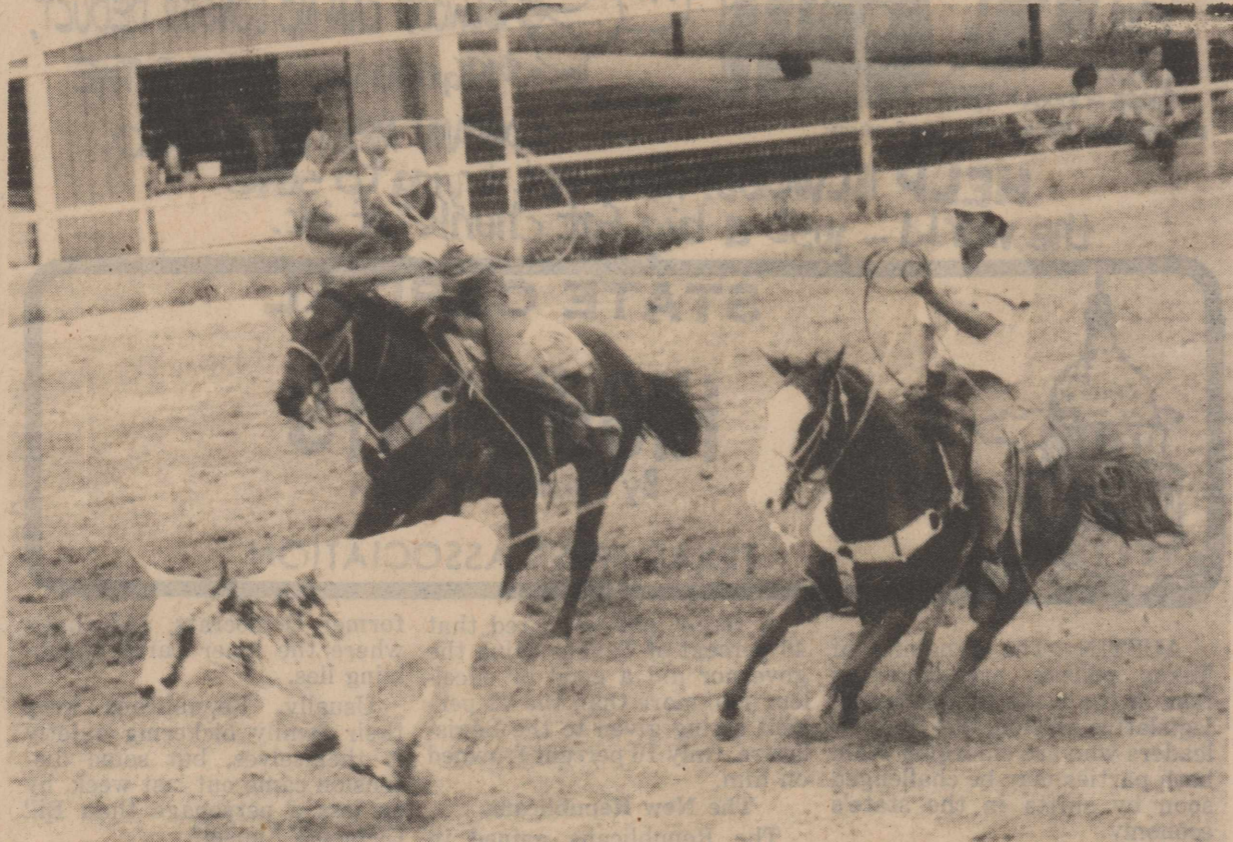
### Les Hale wins team roping championship

Les Hale, representing Sul Ross University, was champion team roper in the Southwest Region of the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association for 1984-85 and will advance to the College Nationals Finals Rodeo in Bozeman, Montana, June 17-22. He earned this title by winning the most points in team roping event in rodeos held at various colleges in the region during the 84-85 year.

The College National Finals, held annually in Bozeman, is a week long event where college students from all over the U.S. compete for titles, prize money, and various other prizes. The United States is divided into 12 regions.

To be eligible, a student must maintain a passing grade point and carry 12 hours to participate in college rodeo activities. The goal of the College Rodeo Association is to help prepare young men and women for their roles in modern society through challenges, responsibilities and friendships of rodeo competition.

The sport of college rodeo originated at Sul Ross University. It has won the national title nine times. The Sul Ross men's and women's teams both won the region team competition this year and will also be trying for another title. Other local cowboys are Will M. Black and Terry Crawford, they will also participate as team roping partners for other team members.

## Court ponders fate of Crockett Co. Hospital

The Crockett County Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday and much of the meeting was taken up with discussion on a rural medical care program which has been proposed by trustees of Shannon Hospital.

John Stokes, president of the hospital board, explained some of the financial problems created by changes in Medicare. He said he was not meeting with the court to make any recommendations, but asked the court for some guidelines in solving the financial problem. To continue with the present system would be a financial disaster and the board has come to the end of the line trying to stay within the budget.

The proposal would allow Shannon to lease and operate the hospital. Local physicians would become employees and work at the hospital in 12-hour shifts. Personnel would be cut to accommodate an emergency facility. Patients would be treated here and transferred if hospital care was necessary. Cost of the operation is estimated to be about one-third the present cost.

Dr. R. M. Owensby presented a proposal of his own to the court. He feels the problem is new government Medicare regulations with which the local facility must comply. The new rules severely limit the number of hospital admissions and payment from Medicare is nil compared with the cost of care. He suggests the hospital withdraw from the Medicare program and reduce beds to 3 or 4 to stabilize emergencies, keep the emergency room, lab, EKG, and X-ray and the ambulance service. Dr. Owensby feels with Medicare regulations by-passed, money will be saved, personnel needs can be determined and the hospital would still be under local control, along with giving patients a choice of doctors.

Dr. Don Carlisle, on the other hand, feels acceptance of the proposal would be the best solution to the problem. Having recently returned from a Rural Health Conference, he presented the court with the findings which did indeed make the future of the small hospital look bleak. Noting that the practice of medicine and the delivery of health care services has changed more in the past 18 months than in the past 18 years, he feels the traditional methods of handling problems are no longer valid.

Dr. Carlisle said acceptance of the proposal had been difficult for him on a personal basis, in that he will no longer be able to work in the comforts of his own clinic. Also, he will be forced to dispose of large amounts of medical equipment and find jobs for his employees. He doesn't look forward to a twelve-hour work day followed by twelve hours on call and limited working time will reduce income. However, he said in spite of these problems, he feels the proposal should be accepted. He is convinced that better medical care would

result with the change. After attending to other matters, the court went into executive session to discuss the proposal, but no action was taken.

Kathy Reavis came before the court to ask about the status of land for the senior citizen center. She was given the go-ahead to have plans drawn up for the center to be located near the DPS building.

The problem of paving roads and alleys in the Chandlerdale West addition was brought to the attention of the court. County Attorney Tom Cameron gave the opinion the county was not obligated to build roads, etc. even though they had accepted the plot. However, the county has always done so.

The property lies in Commissioner Castro's precinct and it was suggested he could use his annual paving allotment in that area. However, he indicated he had already made his commitments for paving. After some discussion, the court voted to make a road for an entrance into the addition.

The 911 emergency number was discussed. Judge Fields informed the court the installation cost would be \$225.50 and the monthly charge \$72.50. The national emergency number would ring the Sheriff's Department if installed here. It was discussed, but no action was taken.

Other reports were given before the court went into executive session to discuss the hospital proposal.

### Hospital board meets in regular monthly session

The Crockett County Hospital Board met in regular session June 6. Members present were Sandy Stokes, Maria DeLaRosa, Orlando Vargas, Lloyd Winkley and Alleane Jones. Guests present were Dr. R.M. Owensby, Al Fields, Don Hopkins, Elvira Caldwell, Al Everett, Jacquie King, Dottie Tuttle, Ramona Turnley and Dub O'Bryant.

The financial report was given by Don Hopkins for the hospital and care center. Total cash deposits were \$61,334.83 and total cash disbursements were \$95,142.11 for the hospital. Percentage of occupancy was 26%. Total cash deposits were \$31,414.34 and the total cash disbursements were \$54,902.52 for the care center.

There were no bad debts. The bills for the hospital were presented by Dottie Tuttle and the bills for the care center were presented by Elvira Caldwell. A motion was made and carried to approve paying of the bills.

The board approved the purchase of a new air conditioning unit for the hospital.

### Ozona to hold largest Masters Track Meet in state

The largest Masters Track Meet in Texas will be held in Ozona at Lions Stadium July 13, 1985 beginning at 2:30 p.m. with the field events and the running events to begin at approximately 5:00 p.m. The largest and best quality of master athletes are expected to be in Ozona exceeding the 200 mark, surpassing all other participation marks in Texas by 50 to 100.

Athletes who have already made commitments include Dr. Charles Beaudry from Edinburg who holds 12 world and American Master records, or Fred White with 5 American Master

records from Dallas, Wendall Palmer from Pampa with 3 American records, and J. A. Alexander from McCamey with three world and one American record. Those invited but as of now haven't made a verbal commitment are Thane Baker from Dallas, a 1952 and 1956 gold, silver and bronze olympic medalist and holds 11 world and American records in the 100 yard, 100 meter and 200 meter dash. Hector Cisneros from Austin who holds a world record in the decathlon, John Hartfield from Houston who hold 2

Mr. Al Everett representing St. John's Hospital presented a proposal to the board for rural health care. There was a discussion of this plan by the board. No action was taken and no recommendations were made.

Ramona Turnley gave the nurse's report. She had lost two LVNs but had hired a new LVN and RN. Dub O'Bryant gave the ambulance report. He said there were five people in Special Skills Class at this time. The next EMT meeting would be Monday night at 7:00.

Don Hopkins, administrator, voiced the opinion that he feels the Shannon proposal is not suited to the best interests of Crockett County Hospital. All sources of revenue would become assets of Shannon Hospital leaving a very limited source of income for Crockett County Hospital.

### New teachers hired by board

The School Board of Trustees, meeting in regular session Friday, June 7, announced additional hirings.

Miss Rhonda Yarborough has been hired as the new head girls basketball-track coach in Ozona High School. Miss Yarborough is a 1975 graduate of Howard Payne University in Brownwood and has been Goldthwaite's head girls basketball and track coach for the past ten years. While at Goldthwaite, she compiled a 276-49 varsity basketball record, a 122-38 junior varsity basketball record, and a 288-37 junior high record. She has been a staff member of the Lady Longhorn Basketball Camp, Texas Woman's University Pioneer Basketball Camp, and has attended the T.W.U. Track and Field Olympic Training Camp for four years. Miss Yarborough taught English I, II, III, and speech at Goldthwaite, and has coached UIL Informative and Persuasive Speaking, sponsored the school yearbook, directed the junior and senior plays, and helped organize the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. She will teach health and physical education in Ozona High School.

Brant Myers, a 1984 graduate of Angelo State University, was hired to teach physical science and coach football and track in Ozona High School. He is presently teaching in

Snyder and will move to Ozona in July.

Eric Wharton, a 1983 graduate of Abilene Christian University was hired as assistant band director. He is presently the high school band director in Santa Anna.

The Board members discussed recent bids for two fifteen passenger school buses and one large 59 passenger bus. After considering the bids on the smaller buses, they decided to reject all bids and rebid two twenty-one passenger buses. Bolin Equipment's bid for the fifty-nine passenger bus was accepted.

The trustees also voted to renew Maximum Security Systems' contract with the district to provide school drug prevention programs. Begun last year in Ozona schools, the program uses trained dogs to detect the presence of illicit drugs. It was not designed as a search and seizure technique. Instead the dogs are used in demonstrations, assembly programs, and educational activities closely related to a specific effort to attack the problems of narcotics in the community.

The members approved proposed paraprofessional and auxiliary personnel salary schedules, as well as Board policies. Due to high cost projections, the trustees voted to reject all proposals for constructing a junior high band facility at Ozona Middle School.

### Funeral services held Sunday for Arthur Byrd Phillips

Funeral services for Arthur Byrd Phillips, 83, were held Sunday at 2 p.m. in Ozona United Methodist Church with burial following in Cedar Hill Cemetery.

Mr. Phillips died at 10:15 a.m. Friday in Angelo Community Hospital.

He was born Dec. 9, 1901 in Crockett County, the son of Samuel Byrd and Lela Phillips. He attended Ozona public schools and Texas Christian University. A rancher, he was a lifetime resident of Ozona. He was a

Methodist, a 60-year Mason and a member of the Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. Since 1922 he operated the ranch on which he was born.

Survivors include his wife, Bernice Collins Phillips of Ozona; a son, Arthur Byrd Phillips Jr. of Ozona; two daughters, Mrs. A. T. Carleton of Midland and Diane Phillips of Greeley, Colo.; one brother, Hillery M. Phillips; two sisters, Mrs. Clay Adams and Mrs. Lela Nussbaumer, all of Ozona, one grandson and three granddaughters.

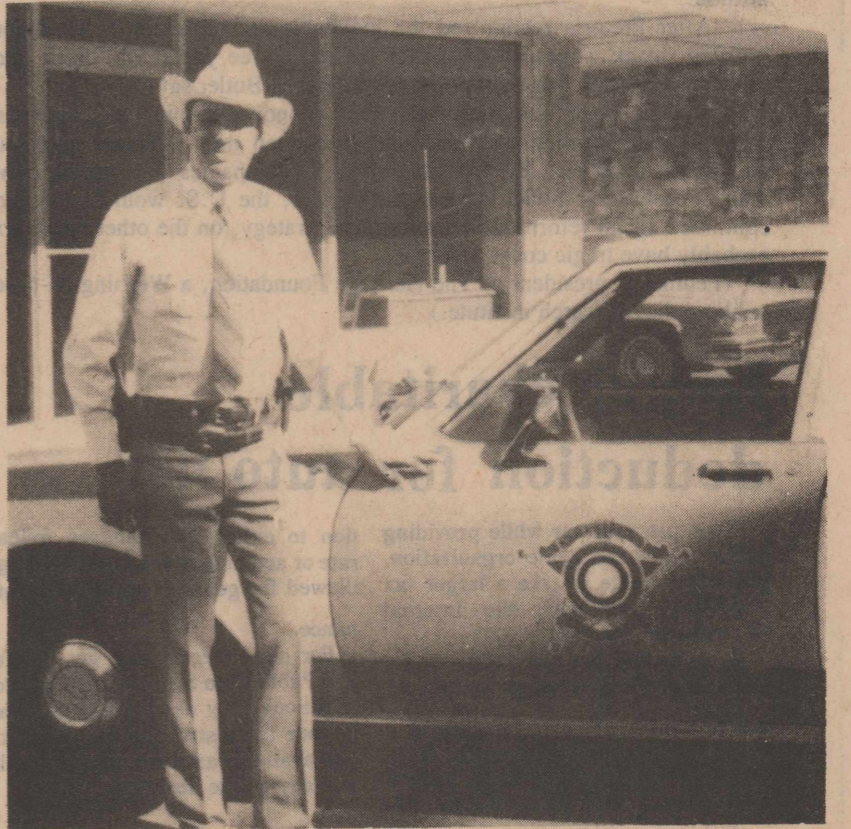
### New chief deputy hired for Crockett County

## NEW ANTI-APARTHEID STRATEGY

I don't know of any American who defends South Africa's discriminatory racial policies. Being for or against apartheid, however, has never been an issue. What is an issue is how the United States can best speed along apartheid's disappearance. Not only has this become the subject of bitter and occasionally irrational controversy, but it has resulted in some very fuzzy thinking that could actually harm the people we are trying to help.

U.S. protests against apartheid, which began in earnest last fall, have gone beyond the pretty-people-holding-placards stage. Recently, one group of demonstrators occupied the downtown Washington, D.C. offices of a U.S. investment firm which sells South African gold Kruggerands. The message was simple: buying and selling South African gold coins is immoral.

Other protestors helped liven up the spring on many college campuses, leading the weekly news magazines to declare the 1960s back in style.

Public displays of outrage, of course, are always conveniently in style. But marches and sit-ins don't lead to clear-headed thinking and sound policy proposals. And in the case of South Africa, we could actually end up doing more harm than good.

The policy prescription currently in vogue is known as "disinvestment." Put simply, this is shorthand for U.S. companies and investors doing no more business in South Africa until the country cleans up its act. But it's a wrong-headed policy. In fact, it is 180-degrees the reverse of what we should really be doing, according to those who have looked carefully at the problem.

Economist Stuart Butler, for example, argues that more investment by U.S. firms in South Africa would achieve quicker results. "The reason is clear," the British-educated economist says. "American corporations have become the greatest engine for social change that South Africa has ever seen. In a sense, they are the great equalizer."

Dr. Butler, who recently returned from a lengthy fact-finding trip to the racially troubled African nation, said that "disinvestment" — having U.S. companies pull out of South Africa — would actually retard progress. "It probably would cause Pretoria to become more stubborn. And even if disinvestment did begin to bite, it simply would slow the workplace reforms pioneered by the progressive American companies in South Africa and weaken black unions, while strengthening the position of reactionary white workers."

More than 300 U.S. companies currently have subsidiaries in South Africa, including IBM, Ford, General Motors, Mobil, and Xerox. The \$2 billion in American assets in the country represent 20 percent of total direct foreign investment, Butler notes.

And all this U.S. investment is having an impact.

"As the economy has grown, shortages of white labor have allowed blacks to force themselves into occupations once reserved for whites," Dr. Butler explains. Black trade unionism also has grown rapidly with the expanding economy, with membership now standing at nearly half-a-million.

"After Pretoria recognized the inevitable and legalized black unions in 1979, black wages doubled over the next three years, and black trade unionists began to flex their political muscles," Butler says.

The U.S. must recognize that strong economic growth, not disinvestment, will undermine apartheid and strengthen non-Afrikaner economic and political power. By encouraging U.S. companies to expand, rather than curtail, their South African enterprises, the U.S. would be fueling continued social reform. A disinvestment strategy, on the other hand, will probably have tragic consequences.

## Larger charitable deduction for auto use

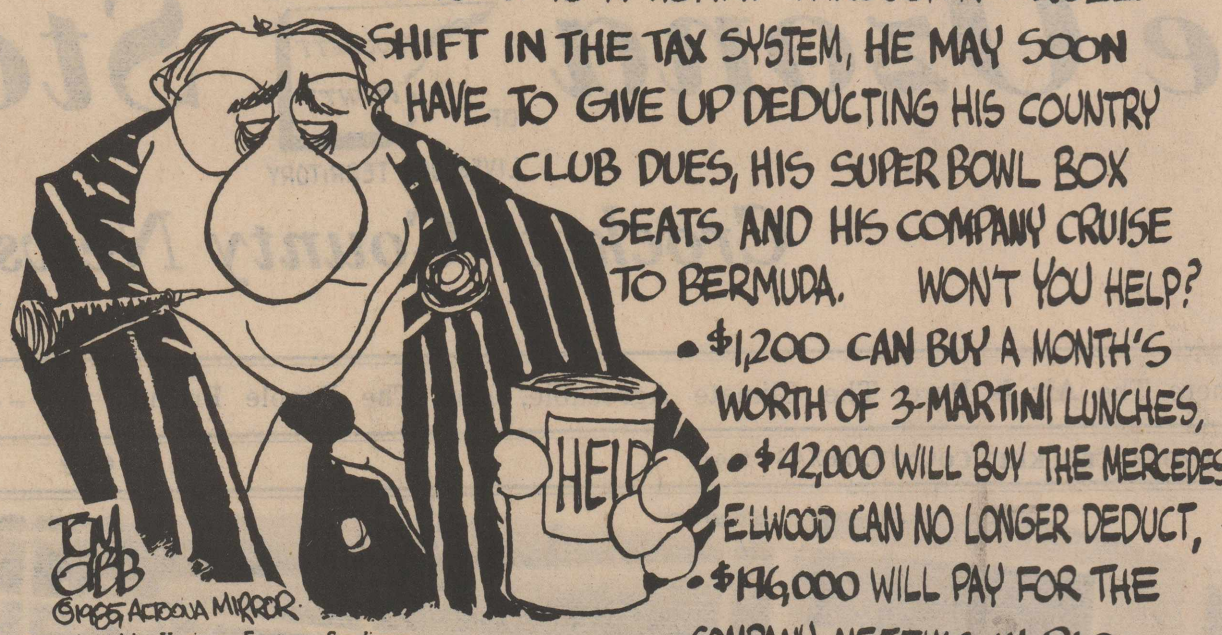
If you use your car while providing services to a charitable organization, you will be able to take a larger tax deduction next year, the Internal Revenue Service said.

A deduction is now allowed for either the actual out-of-pocket expenses or 9 cents per mile. Beginning in 1985, the standard mileage rate will be increased to 12 cents per mile. Parking and tolls are also deductible in addition

to either the standard mileage rate or actual expenses, but nothing is allowed for general repair or maintenance.

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**STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS**

AUSTIN—The dynamics of Texas politics are changing fast in the wake of the recent legislative session, but the new leaders who are emerging from both parties may be challenged soon by shifts in the state's economy.

Several lawmakers earned gold stars for the business-like way they cut \$1.2 billion from the state budget without raising taxes, but everyone, Democrat and Republican alike, is well aware that a major tax increase looms in the near future.

The Lone Star State's government has no projected surplus. None whatsoever. Thus, if oil prices drop any at all, the Legislature could have to come back into special session to raise taxes to fund basic government. By its Constitution, Texas cannot operate on a deficit.

And so the new heroes, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, House Speaker Gib Lewis, budget chairmen Sen. Grant Jones and Rep. Jim Rudd, may be basking in short-lived public gratitude.

### The New Democrats

The budget-cutting feat was a real boost for Democrats, particularly conservatives, who disapproved the Republican line that Democrats cannot be trusted to manage tax dollars.

The conservatives even earned the gratitude of some liberals for increasing their party's respectability in the wake of the '84 defeats. Yet they could lose it all if the money crunch comes and they fail to repeat their blue-ribbon fiscal performance.

Granted, they had the help of the Republicans who serve in the Legislature. The budget cutting was a bipartisan effort that saw most lawmakers place the good of the state above the good of their political parties.

But since the leadership was composed of Democrats, one unlikely event has occurred: conservative and liberal Democrats have, for the most part, called a truce to their perpetual war.

### White: Up Or Down?

One exception to that cozy little scenario is Gov. Mark White, who caught criticism from some fellow Democrats in the waning hours of the session. They said White didn't exercise enough leadership, but his supporters, pointing to the new indigent care package he rammed through in the three-day special session, say that he did.

A recent poll indicated that 46 percent of Texans think the governor did a good or excellent job, more than the 41 percent rating given to the Legislature. Only 16 percent frowned on him.

### The New Republicans

The Republicans gained in stature, too, and show many signs of emerging from minority party status. Besides the clout they wielded in the Texas House under the leadership of Gerald Geistweidt, R-Mason, Ed Emmett, R-Houston, and Tom Craddick, R-Midland, they now have the beginnings of a healthy party fracas themselves.

It's most obvious in the jockeying for the GOP gubernatorial nomination. Former Democrat Kent Hance of Lubbock switched parties only to find himself challenged by U.S. Rep. Tom Loeffler, also of West Texas, and a whole host of other potentials.

Some of the big names that loom out at you are former Gov. Bill Clements, former Democratic Speaker Bill Clayton, Dallas Cowboys coach Tom Landry, and Amarillo oilman T. Boone Pickens.

### Clements Jumps Gramm

Now that Republicans stand to make a good run for the Governor's Mansion, some long-time party loyalists are not so keen at handing the nomination to new converts,

former Democrats, and that's where the inner party squabbling lies.

Usually, Republicans keep their family bickering quietly to themselves, but some disension came out last week, by no less a personage than Bill Clements himself.

Clements accused U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm of dividing and polarizing the GOP by endorsing Kent Hance for governor. Both are former Democrats, and the endorsement has come early, before the other GOP candidates have even announced for the race.

### Gramm's Recruit

Gramm personally recruited Hance for the Republican Party, but Clements told an oil producer's group that Gramm showed bad judgment. "An endorsement by a senior person like myself or Gramm is divisive and causes polarization. . . . The wounds and scars it would cause would not be helpful."

"It's more a Democratic way of acting. Maybe Senator Gramm has not gotten used to being a Republican," Clements said.

In comparison with recent post-Legislature years, the jockeying for position is coming much, much earlier. And the early signs indicate that 1986 could be a year that departs from political tradition for both parties in many ways.

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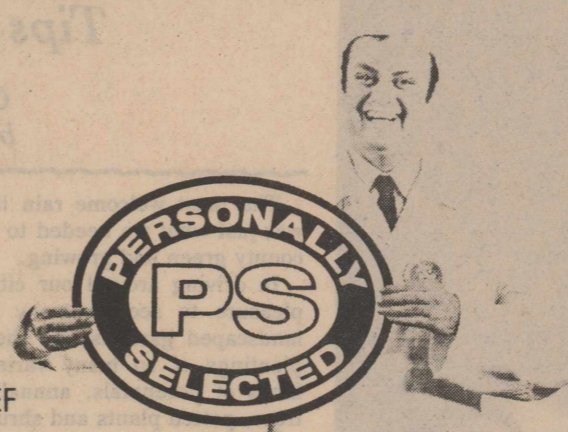

## Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

The most welcome rain last week was just what we needed to keep our county green and growing.

In driving around our city it is a pleasure to see so many beautiful landscaped gardens and the colorful plantings of so many varieties and kinds of perennials, annuals, bulbs, trees, potted plants and shrubs. With a little extra care most any plant you really want will grow in Ozona, except perhaps the most exotic ones.

Vegetables planted in pots are very popular too, and you can watch them grow right on your patio.

Now is the time to make notes of the varieties of roses you may want to odd your planting. Many will bloom all summer in yards and at the nurseries. Floribundas are better adapted to hot weather conditions than the hybrid teas. They provide colorful garden displays and make good cut flowers. To conserve growth energy, always snip off flower clusters as soon as they fade. Give plenty of water during dry spells and feed every six to eight weeks with a complete fertilizer. Some good varieties include Summer Snow (white), Betty Prior (pink), Europeana (red), Little Darling (yellow blend), and the 1975 All American Floribunda Rose Parade. Also there may be some newer ones every year.

Control powdery mildew crepe myrtle as soon as symptoms appear. This fungus looks like a heavy sifting of flour covering leaves, shoots, and flowerbuds. Spray with benomyl or

funginex according to label directions, thoroughly coating new growth and flowerbuds. Repeated applications maybe necessary throughout the growing season. Removing old blossoms just below the flower head will prolong the blooming period. During the last week of the month, broadcast 1 cup of 5-10-10 fertilizer beneath the canopy of each plant and water well.

Cannas seem to thrive without any special care. But if you prune them, they will bloom even more profusely throughout the summer. When the blossoms fade, use a sharp pair of clippers and remove the old flowering stalk just above the first set of leaves; a new stalk will rise from below the cut. Fertilize every six weeks.

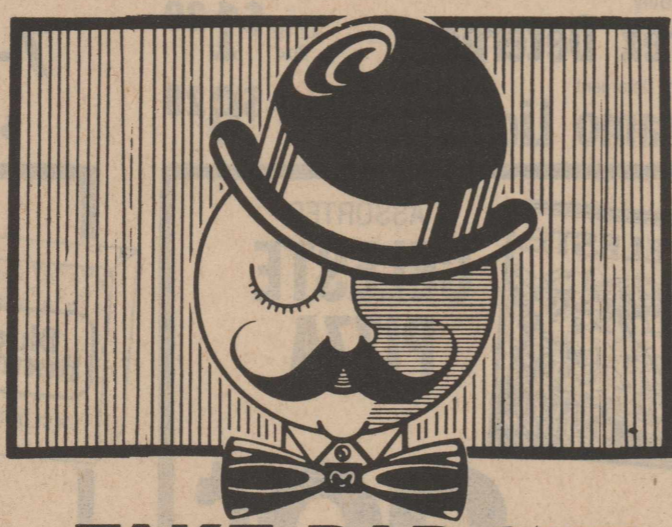

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# Texas Department of Public Safety has 50th anniversary

The Texas Department of Public Safety is commemorating its 50th Anniversary this year. The theme of the observance, "50 Years for Texas", refers to the creation of the Department by the Texas Legislature on August 10, 1935.

The Texas Department of Public Safety was formed with a complement of 147 Highway Patrol officers and 36 Texas Rangers. In response to the everchanging needs of the state, the DPS through the years has acquired a large number of additional responsibilities including licensing of drivers; maintenance of driver, criminal, and traffic accident records; communications; investigation of motor vehicle thefts and illegal narcotic offenses; crime laboratory services; and coordination of disaster relief efforts. The Department's current authorized

strength consists of over 2,600 officers with a non-commissioned support staff exceeding 2,300.

The Midland Regional Headquarters was established in September of 1957 and was housed for a short time at the Police Department. The Midland office moved out of the Police Department into their own building at 3701 North Big Spring Street in February of 1958. In July of 1974 the regional office was moved to its present location at 2405 South Loop 250 West.

The first Regional Commander for the Midland Region was Wilson E. "Pat" Speir. Major Speir was promoted through the ranks to Colonel and retired from that position in 1980. The second Regional Commander was Leo Gossett who has since been promoted to Assistant Director and is stationed in Austin.

The Regional Commander that followed Gossett was E. K. Browning who retired in 1977 and was replaced by Ira W. Dees. Major Dees is Commander of the Region Four area. The largest land mass covering 49 counties and yet the least populated. This Region covers the area west to El Paso, east to Ranger, north to O'Donnell and south to Eagle Pass. There are 287 commissioned personnel under his command with 129 support personnel in Region Four.

The West Texas Masters will have 14 age divisions ranging from 16 years and younger to 75 plus. There will be only three women's divisions. First, second and third place medals will be given in each age division in each event. There will be 7 field events and 10 running events.

In addition to all the out-of-town athletes, there are many local people who will participate and star in many events. Danny Sewell of Ozona holds over all records in the West Texas Masters in the 110 meter hurdles, triple jump, long jump, and the pole vault. Several other local people hold age division records here also.

Again there will be no charge for spectators and a concession stand will be open all day with the sale of food, drinks and West Texas Master "T" Shirts and Caps. For a good day of entertainment in the way of track and field, come to the state's largest Masters Track Meet in Ozona, July 13.

### Dr. Sessom to offer new service

Dr. Steve Sessom expanded the scope of his general practice by offering orthodontic (tooth straightening) services in November and he is encouraged by the response of his patients.

Sessom, whose practice is located at 1104 Ave I, specializes in a relatively new "straight-wire" orthodontic technique. The new procedure features a somewhat different approach to the application of the braces and also a tendency to leave more teeth intact, more teeth intact.

His motivation for entry into orthodontics was not any great dissatisfaction with conventional orthodontics because the traditional technique is a tried and true method for straightening teeth. These new orthodontic techniques will provide more stable results for the patient by maintaining all the teeth (except perhaps the wisdom teeth) together in the proper bite. Unlike conventional orthodontic, the straight-wire technique ordinarily doesn't require removal of any teeth if used early enough. In addition to the difference in the application of the braces and the philosophy of leaving intact all permanent teeth, the straight-wire method also utilizes so called functional orthodontic appliances.

These appliances have gained in popularity in the past few years by their ability to correct skeletal growth problems at an early age.

The new tooth straightening technique is not confined to children. Nationwide statistics show that 20 percent of orthodontic cases are adults. Nice-looking faces as well as straight teeth that fit correctly are important and there is no age limit on that.

## Texas Crime Stoppers name two men to most wanted list

Police say brothers George Duran Trejo and Servando Trejo Duran, Jr., have wandered the same path through most of their life.

They lived together in Baytown, Texas, worked at the same type of jobs, and even might have killed together.

Now they are linked together once again. The pair, wanted on warrants charging them with the December, 1984, murder of Eusebio Gomez, have been added to the Texas Most Wanted list. Rewards of up to \$1,000 each are being offered for information leading to the capture of the two fugitives.

Detectives with the Baytown Police Department say that around 2:10 a.m. on December 15, 1984, Trejo and Duran got into an argument with Gomez around Harbor and Market Streets. A witness told investigators that Duran stabbed Gomez in the heart, while Trejo hit the victim on the head with a baseball bat.

An autopsy report indicated that either the stab wound or the blow to the head would have been sufficient to cause Gomez' death.

On January 24, 1985, the brothers were indicted on murder charges by the Harris County Grand Jury.

Servando Trejo Duran, Jr., is 23 years old, 6-0, 195 pounds, with black hair and brown eyes. When last seen by authorities, he was wearing a thick mustache. He has a tattoo with the name "Marie" on his right shoulder. Authorities say Duran sometimes uses the first name "Jimmy".

George Duran Trejo is 17 years old, 5-3, 210 pounds, with black hair and brown eyes.

Detectives say that although Duran and Trejo are brothers, one uses his father's last name and the other uses his mother's maiden name.

The pair usually find work in the construction industry, primarily as laborers.

Investigators believe the brothers might have fled to Mexico and could be residing in a border town, just out of reach of American authorities.

Anyone with information about the location of Duran and Trejo is asked to call the Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council toll-free at 1-800-252-8477 or their local Crime Stoppers program.

In all cases, callers do not have to reveal their identities.

Texas Most Wanted is a cooperative program between the Department of Public Safety and Texas Crime Stoppers.

## EXTENSION OFFICE NEWS

Too many people think the secret to keeping cool on a hot summer day is simply to wear as few clothes as possible, in styles that are as skimpy as society will allow. But have you ever come home with sunburned knees and shoulders after watching a ball game, sat on a hot leather car seat in shorts, or felt inappropriately dressed for a business meeting on a hot summer day?

There's a better way to tackle hot weather dressing. If there wasn't, why would the Arabs continue to wear the same loose, flowing garments they have worn for centuries? After all, there's no place hotter than the desert.

Keeping cool when the temperature is soaring is no easy task. But the right combination of style, color and fabric will help do the trick. The goal is to keep cool while keeping protected from the sun.

Look for styles that clothe the body without clinging or binding, such as oversized shirts, culottes, full skirts or chemise dresses. These away-from-the-body silhouettes have their own built-in air conditioning. Sewn in the right fabric, a loose-fitting, woven T-top with a capped sleeve will be much cooler than a body hugging, sleeveless knit T-shirt.


Armholes should be cut wide and full. Look for patterns with extended shoulders, cap sleeves, deep-set sleeves, any style that covers the shoulders, while giving the arms room to "breathe."

Avoid close-fitting necklines. They only make you hot and claustrophobic. Open collar shirts, V-necks, boat necks, sweetheart necklines, any style that exposes the collar bone is a good choice.

The coolest dress shape is one that falls straight from the shoulders with no elasticized casing or waistline seam. In fact, one trick for staying cool on hot and sticky days is to keep the waistline area as free and clear as possible. A plastic or vinyl belt only increases perspiration. A leather belt might breathe a little better but heat and humidity generated by the body can cause the leather's dye to bleed all over the garment. The best solution, if you must wear a belt, is to make a self-fabric belt. Although it might not be your first choice to accessorize that particular garment, when the temperature soars, you'll have a cooler option. Open-weave straw belts or those made of cotton webbing are also more comfortable possibilities.

Drawstring waistlines are cooler than elasticized ones, because they can be loosened up as the humidity rises. Wide-legged, full-cut shorts are fine if you know that you'll be in a place where there's lots of shade. If not, stick to culottes or full skirts. They allow the few cool breezes that might be around to circulate. They also protect knees and thighs from painful sunburn.

### Firms are charging for free services

Responding to numerous inquiries, Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo, said today that several firms are operating in the San Angelo area soliciting people through direct mail and advertisements in various publications. These firms are selling services which are provided at no charge by every Social Security office.

These firms are generally involved with two different services, Upp said. The most common is the company which obtains local marriage records and then mails new brides an offer to change their name in Social Security records for a \$10 fee. This service can be obtained without charge at any Social Security office. In addition, the bride has to do everything for the company she would have to do if she contacted Social Security in the first place.

For a bride to change her name in Social Security records, she needs the original or certified copy of her marriage certificate showing both her new and old names. The bride can contact the San Angelo Social Security Office simply by calling 949-4608 to start the process.

The other service being sold is to obtain a copy of a person's record of earnings covered by Social Security or providing an estimate of future Social Security benefits. These, too, can be obtained through any Social Security office without any charge.

To get a statement of earnings covered by Social Security, all a person has to do is get Form SSA-7004PC, available free at any Social Security office, complete it, and mail it. In return, he or she will receive an extract of his or her Social Security record.

People younger than 60 can get a benefit estimate by making the request on the form. People 60 or older can get an immediate benefit estimate at any Social Security office. There is no charge for these services, Upp said.

Midland will experience a sudden temporary growth in population of some 4,500 come June. The reason? Midland is one of 59 cities in the United States selected to host conventions of Jehovah's Witnesses during the summer of 1985.

A total of 112 "Integrity Keepers" district conventions of the group will be held in the 59 cities selected. Stanley Weigel spokesman at their world headquarters in New York City, said the events are expected to attract over 1,100,000 delegates in all.

Frank R. Garig, convention manager for Midland, commented on the convention theme, "Integrity Keepers". "There has been a gradual diluting of strict Bible laws and principles for many years so that now many people do not know what to believe," he said.

"For example, the Bible says God hates a divorcing, but divorce rates have never been higher. It says flee from fornication but the world is fleeing toward fornication. God's law stated that those causing an abortion must forfeit their life for the life of the aborted child. Crimes such as robbery, murder and rape are all in violation of God's commandments," Garig stated. "So those claiming to be Christians must rightly ask themselves if they are keeping integrity to God's stated will and commandments," he concluded.

The convention is scheduled for the Chaparral Center on June 20-23.

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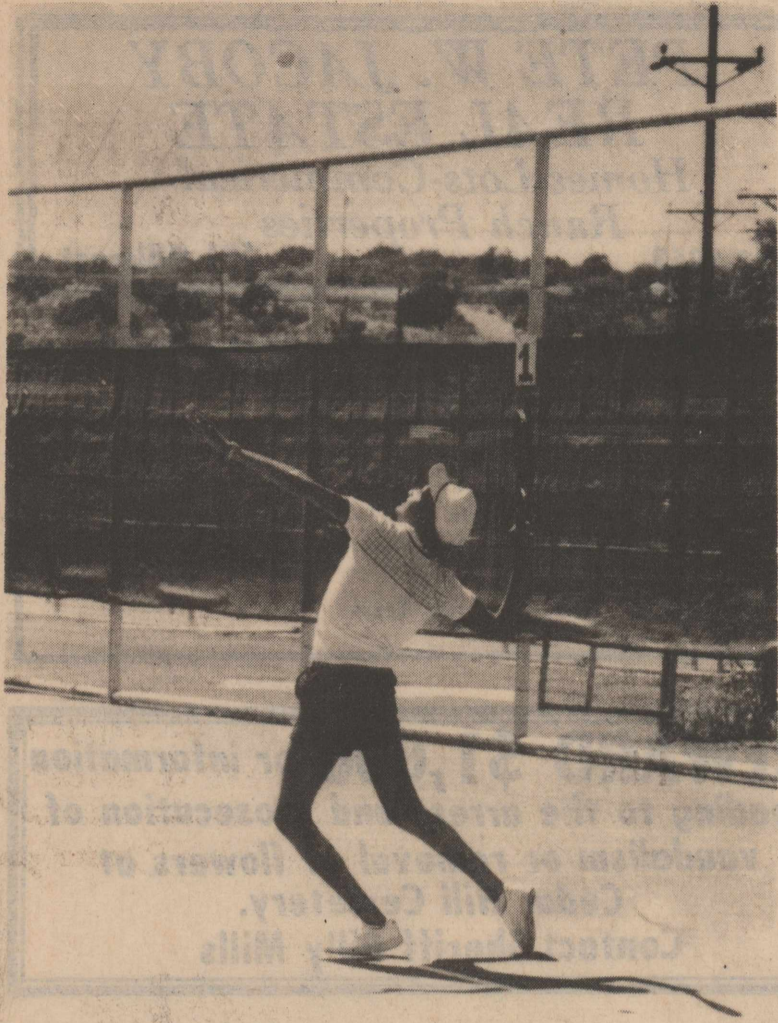

SCS technical assistance is available through 201 locally run soil and water conservation districts. The SCS has achieved an international reputation in the field of soil and water conservation over the past 50 years.

What has been accomplished in 50 years is the result of Federal and State agencies and local groups working together to solve the nation's soil and water problems along with the leadership and investments of farmers and ranchers. These accomplishments also needed the support of conservation districts and professional organizations and the dedication of people from all walks of life who feel a sincere sense of stewardship for the land.

Everyone in the United States has benefited from the protection of soil productivity and a cleaner environment, and as we observe 50 years of soil conservation it's time for renewed commitment as it's the next 50 years that matter.


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
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
