

The Texas Blue Law, which was repeal striken from the state's law books Sept. 1, has a varied and uphilldownhill history.

The controversial law was made during the Civil War. In 1863 the The ruling applied to Dallas only. states' lawmakers passed the first legislation restricting activity on Sundays. The first Blue Law banned all labor on Sunday and hunting within one-half mile of any church.

It was gradually amended through the years to allow some labor and

In 1961, the modern Blue Law was born. Texas lawmakers identified 42

The Texas Legislature closed the loophole in 1967. A person could purchase beer on Sunday, but not a baby bottle.

In 1977 the Texas Supreme Court rejected claims that the Blue Law was unconstitutional because it was being enforced in a discriminatory manner. In 1979 the legislature considered repeal, but decided against it. In 1981, that body shunned calls for Blue Law

In 1981, State District Judge Dee Brown Walker of Dallas struck down the Blue Law, declaring it obsolete, unenforceable and unconstitutional.

In 1982, the state of Massachusetts struck down its Blue Law, the oldest in the nation at 352 years. However, in 1983 the Texas Legislature again nixed the repeal effort.

Rulings were overturned and upheld throughout 1984, but in October of 1984, a poll released by Texas A&M showed Texans favored repeal by

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WHAT'S GOOD FOR SMALL BUSINESS IS GOOD FOR AMERICA

The corner drugstore, the farm equipment dealer, or the local trucking firm are businesses that mean a lot to our communities, because they serve local needs and employ local people. But they're also important to the rest of America, because small businesses are the backbone of our economy.

Fourteen million small businesses in America employ nearly half the nation's work force, and generate 38 percent of our gross national product. When small businesses grow, they create most of the new jobs in this country, and smaller firms also produce many of the new ideas that help to revitalize our economy

President Reagan's recent annual report to Congress on the state of small business in America shows the role of small business in putting people to work, pioneering new areas of research and development and keeping the economy growing.

From March 1984 to March 1985, employment in industries dominated by small firms grew twice as fast as employment in large business-dominated industries, for example. An estimated two million of the three million new jobs generated in the past year were generated by small firms. In the West South Central region dominated by Texas, employment in small firms grew by 34.6 percent over the past six years, greater than any other area but

If the national economy is to continue growing steadily, a strong factor in that growth will be the number of new businesses created each year. Last year, a record 634,991 new businesses sprang up, and the vast majority of these were small businesses. In the fastest growing areas of our economy - services, trade and transportation - small businesses were responsible for a great deal of that growth.

Small businesses have even begun revitalizing our nation's older industries that some economists view as "sunset" areas of our economy. For example, from 1976 to 1982, small manufacturing firms with fewer than 100 employees represented less than 20% of employment in manufacturing, but they produced 81.4% of the new jobs in manufacturing.

Innovation is critical to economic success. Small businesses trail large businesses slightly in the number of overall innovations, but they provide more innovations per million employees than large firms. That shows that smaller firms generate more new ideas for the same labor investment than larger companies. In small business, you run lean or you don't survive.

When you consider the factors that have conspired against small business in the past - regulatory intrusion by government, tax rates that bordered on the confiscatory, and double-digit interest rates — it is amazing that so many have survived. As the President's report illustrates, small business has not only survived, it is thriving, because our nation's entrepreneurial spirit is so resilient and because President Reagan has initiated policies to restore a national economic climate in which enterprise and initiative are rewarded.

As your representative in Congress, I have supported regulatory reform, lower taxes and responsible fiscal policies, because I want small business to continue chalking up its excellent record of new jobs, new business and

It doesn't take a Ph.D. in economics to understand that those three factors are a pretty good signpost to economic health. Small business is not only the backbone of our economy, it is our future. If we keep it healthy, we will keep our economy healthy.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN-Last week, as school doors prepared to open for the fall term, Texas seemed to be coming out on the short end of the stick in several ways: too few teachers, too many pupils, and too little fi-nancial aid.

Public school students will be facing some of the most farreaching reforms in Texas education this fall, a phase that includes smaller class sizes, new programs for younger students, tougher graduation requirements, and higher standards. And, of course, no passno play.

They are also facing a teacher shortage, considered by many Texas educators to be a by-product of the new reforms.

Teachers will also face tougher standards in the form of a competency test, a controversial test that teachers bitterly opposed at the Legis-

But it's the other measures that are forcing school districts to hire thousands of new teachers.

Years To Come?

The lack of "new hires" is causing Texas educators to fear a shortage of teachers this fall, and school districts are scrambling to fill their slots, even recruiting across the country.

Also, the increase in the number of Texas kids who will need an education, is also increasing the need for more

Some have dubbed it the "baby boomlet," and it means the teacher shortage will probably be a problem for years to

The Baylor University education dean predicted the shortage will last into the "mid 1990s, at least."

No Pass, No Teach

The ranks of incoming teachers is decreasing. In the past year, universities and colleges have screened their students

football players. • NUMERICAL GRADES: Students must be graded with a number, not a letter.

• MORE MATH: School sophomores will have to take an additional year of math to graduate.

STATE AID: Poorer school districts will receive more state aid, at the expense of many suburban districts which will probably raise taxes.

CLASS • SMALLER SIZES: The maximum size is 22 students for first and second grade classes.

• TESTING: High school juniors will be given an exit exam to graduate. Teachers and administrators must pass a basic literacy test by June to keep their jobs.

• PASSING AVERAGE: Students must have a 70 average to pass to a higher grade. The practice of promoting students on basis of age is meant to be eliminated.

DISCIPLINE: Officials have broader authority to crack down on discipline problems, particularly drugs or weapons in schools. School districts must open guidance centers to cope with problem

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

Tips For Gardeners

It seems too early for fall to be here, looked very dry. Many trees are but it seems time marches on so fast, dropping leaves like it is Fall. This is the season to start planting bluebonnets especially. This will ensure a higher germination rate if you plan to plant them. September is a good time to take Use drippers, drop by drop irricuttings from broad-leaved trees and gation system uses 90% less water shrubs-both evergreen and deciduous. Cut sections 3 to 6 inches long, leaving about ½ inch of stem below a leaf for azaleas, does more harm than node. Strip off all the leaves except the top 2 or 3. Dip the base of each cutting into a rooting hormone. Stick the faster. Let your hose trinkle slowly cuttings into a moist mixture of equal around trees. Or use a soaker hose. parts of sphagnum peat moss and perlite. Place them in a greenhouse or cold frame, or cover container with man. clear plastic. Place in bright, indirect light. Working Women As more and more women joined the job force during the 60's and 70's many people predicted the downfall of the American family. In reality, hundreds of research studies of working mothers and their families show little impact from outside employment.

In general, a mother's full-time employment does not harm a child. Studies show virtually no difference in school achievement and social adjustment between children of working mothers and those of non-working mothers. Even during the often-troubled teenage years, a mother's employment alone seems to have little impact on youth.

There are some job related factors which can impact the working woman and her family. Six are listed:

The quality of substitute care for young children. It's difficult for a mother to find satisfaction in her job if she's worried about the care of her children.

The supervision of older children. Working mothers may be concerned about older children's after school activities especially if it is spent alone.

The mother's attitude toward her work. If she doesn't like her job, that attitude will show and affect family attitudes toward her working outside

The attitude of her husband and her children toward the job. If they feel 'cheated'' because they don't have enough time with mother, that can cause problems.

Job demands. A woman who has a very demanding job may have less energy for family support activities-especially if she receives little or no support from family members.

Incidents and accidents over holiday weekend

Incidents and accidents occurring over the Labor Day weekend kept Ozona Volunteer Firemen and Crockett County law enforcement officials busy from Thursday night through Monday afternoon.

Robert Stone, a truck driver, was transferred from Crockett County Hospital Thursday night to Shannon West Texas Memorial Hospital in San Angelo following a small explosion when he took the lid off a gas tank. The incident took place at Circle Bar Truck Corral. Witnesses at the scene said that diesel vapors shot up into the air as high as the trailer of the truck and Stone was in a position to receive the full impact of the vapor pressure when it was released.

According to Steve Kenley, local fire marshal, Stone was taken to San Angelo because he was wheezing as a result of the inhalation of the fumes.

Friday morning a truck fire occurred 11 miles east of Iraan on Highway 190. Rusty Coleman of Hondo, driver of the truck, abandoned the vehicle after its motor quit and overheated. He hitchhiked into Iraan in search of a wrecker. After Coleman left the scene, the truck caught fire and exploded completely destroying the tractor. Through the efforts of the Iraan Fire Department, the trailer and the load was saved. Coleman was transporting two U.S. Army vehicles, a blazer and a two and one-half ton truck.

The Ozona Volunteer Fire Department also answered the call but the blaze was extinguished before local firemen arrived.

Saturday morning at 2:57 the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department, the numbers 1004 Crockett County Sheriff's Department, and two local D.P.S. officers Truck Corral after another truck driver noticed what appeared to be smoke coming from the rear of his truck. The truck was loaded with approximately 56 drums of toxic chemicals. One drum of ammonia hydroxide had begun to emit fumes, causing the smoking appearance. Ammonia hydroxide cannot be carried in closed containers due to the humidity.

While firemen were unloading the drums it was discovered that one drum containing nitric acid was actually leaking. The chemical was neutralized and the drum plugged. During this process, firemen had to wear all of their protective equipment because of danger of inhalation of toxic

After the truck was reloaded, there were no further problems and the driver proceeded to his destination in El Paso.

According to Fire Marshal Kenley, at least one-third of the Ozona Volunteer Firemen have up to or more than 100 hours of hazardous material training and are continually training in

Saturday morning two persons were transported to Crockett County Hospital by ambulance following a traffic accident on Interstate 10.

Trophenia Pelt was driving a jeep when it apparently rolled over at Mile Marker 350 located 15 miles west of Ozona. Dawn Chitty was a passenger in the Jeep. The accident occurred at approximately 5:30 a.m. and was investigated by D.P.S. Trooper Neil Lovorn who reported Monday that the injured parties were still in Crockett County Hospital.

Firemen answered a call Tuesday at 12:21 p.m. to the Vaughn Ranch. A spokesman for the fire department stated that it was a grass fire covering six and one-half acres. It took firemen a little over an hour to extinguish the


