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
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### Kitty's Korner By **Kitty Montgomery**



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### **TAKE NOTE ACLU**

The American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) is one of the organizations in the United States that conservatives most love to hate. And with good reason.

During the Vietnam War, while "Hanoi Jane" Fonda was peddling propaganda for the Communist North — those great civil libertarians who after the fall of Saigon protected the rights of the South Vietnamese by sending them to "reeducation" camps or driving them into the sea -- the ACLU was aiding the war effort by defending U.S. draft-dodgers and flagburners

than most, the ACLU is responsible for our Catch-22 criminal justice system - which treats victims like criminals, and robbers, muggers, and rapists as if they were the ones who had been wronged.

Add this to the ACLU's self-righteous defense of U.S. Nazis and Communists and one begins to understand why the organization's name leaves such a bad taste in so many mouths.



The answer, I think, can be found between the lines of a new report from the Center for Responsible Citizenship, an affiliate of Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge. The report deals with a concept that has all but been forgotten by contemporary society: civil responsibilities.

The problem with the ACLU is that somewhere along the way, as it pushed the Constitution past the point of license — different strokes for different folks; if it feels good, do it; and the like - it lost sight of the fact that freedom carries with it a price-tag. Namely, personal civic backers worried publicly about responsibility.

The Founding Fathers, of course, came from a different historical per- the steady barrage of GOP spective. That is why our individual rights are so clearly and properly criticism. codified in the Bill of Rights.

Unfortunately, the Founding Fathers did not consider it necessary to but not himself, and that's his spell out what they felt was given: the responsibilities of citizenship. So for two- hundred years we have moved to an increasingly literal interpretation of the Bill of Rights - while drifting further and further away from any sense of social responsibility.

The Center for Responsible Citizenship is trying to fill that void. They commissioned a team of leading scholars - headed by Dr. Mark Cannon, administrative assistant to Chief Justice Warren Burger, and Federal Appeals Court Judge Antonin Scalia, one of the country's leading jurists to draft what the center calls a "Bill of Responsibilities," a document that should be required reading for anyone who has ever worked for or with, or donated money to the ACLU.

Lesson one: we must "be fully responsible for our own actions and for the consequences of those actions. Freedom to choose carries with it the responsibility for our choices." Take note ACLU. Sure we must do what we can to see that everyone charged with a crime gets a fair trial. But we must also see that criminals pay for their actions. Letting confessed criminals off on legal technicalities, a logic pushed to absurdity by the ACLU, is a perversion of our Constitution and shouldn't be tolerated in a free society
