Arts & Crafts Guild to hold Christmas Fair

The Crockett County Arts & Crafts Guild is sponsoring its Second Annual Christmas Fair Saturday, November 9, from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The fair will be held in the County 4-H Show Barn at the Rodeo Grounds. This is a family-oriented event which will provide Ozona residents and out-of-town visitors with an opportunity to view the many talents of local artists and craftsmen, enjoy some good food and do some very special Christmas shopping.

There will be over forty participants involved in the fair this year.

Some of the many different arts & crafts offered for sale include ceramics, needlework, oil and watercolor paintings, Christmas decorations and woodcraft.

In addition to arts & crafts booths, there will be a food booth offering barbeque and hot dogs. A refreshment booth sponsored by Ozona Girl Scouts will have both hot and cold drinks available. Many baked goods and homemade candies will also be available at individual booths.

Several community service booths are tentatively planned. Door prizes

will be given away periodically throughout the day. Door prizes are donated by the participating artists and craftsmen. Winners will be announced over the public address system and can pick up their prize any time during the day.

Crockett County Arts & Crafts Guild is a civic organization formed to promote arts & crafts in Crockett County. Membership has steadily grown since the Guild was started in August of 1984. The annual Christmas Fair is the Guild's major community-wide fund raising activity for the year. Guild proceeds from the fair are put back into the local community by way of donations.

A sample of the many arts & crafts exhibited this year include woodcrafts, magnets, handcrafted jewelry, plaster craft, ceramics, metal art, wooden clocks and planters, stained glass, toys, yarn crafts, pottery, cross-stitch, baby apparel, western and landscape oil paintings, pillows, wreaths, country crafts, watercolors, and wildlife photography.

Saturday promises to be a festive day and everyone is welcome to attend. The Guild members have been busy this week in preparation for the fair. Eliminating the dust problem incurred last year is a project all of the exhibitors are working on. There will be plenty of parking available and there is no admission fee charged to the public.

In-town Hiway littering is prohibited

A representative of the State Highway Department has asked the Stockman to remind residents the "Littering prohibited, \$15-\$400 fine, State Law" signs seen outside the city limits apply to highways which run through town as well.

Residents who pile leaves and tree limbs off their curbs and in these highways are breaking the law and are liable for fines up to \$400. In Ozona this takes in Hwy 163 as well as Hwy 290.

The department also suggests that leaves be bagged and tree limbs be placed at the curb above the highway right-of-way, for pick-up by local workers. This will also do away with blowing leaves which must be raked again.

Cooperation in this endeavor will be appreciated and help the looks of the town for the upcoming Sesquicentennial year.

Collect pecans now for show

Ozonans are reminded to begin collecting entries for the annual Crockett County Pecan Show which will be held Dec. 9-10 at the Chamber of Commerce office. Food and pecan winners will be displayed Dec. 10 at Ozona National Bank, and the awards presentation and drawing will be held at 5 that afternoon at the bank.

County Agent Billy Reagor says this year's pecan crop is maturing early and the harvest is plentiful. He suggests entrants pick the earlier nuts. Generally the earlier the nuts mature and crack out of the shuck, the better the specimens. They tend to be better than the later maturing nuts. The agent suggests nuts for the show be collected early, dried and stored in a refrigerator or cool place.

Entries will be processed Monday Dec. 9, at 6 p.m. and will be judged the next day. Food entries should be taken to the chamber office between the hours of 7:30 and 10 a.m. Dec. 10. Food entries will be judged the same day between 10 and 12 noon. A sale on

food entries will be conducted between 1 and 6 p.m.

In the pecan division, plaques will be given for Champion shelling, in-shell and native pecan. Rosettes for Grand Champion and Reserve Champion of the show will be presented and ribbons in each class. Last year, Bob Childress showed the grand champion and Fred Freeman took reserve champion honors. Jo Nel Stokes got the champion native plaque.

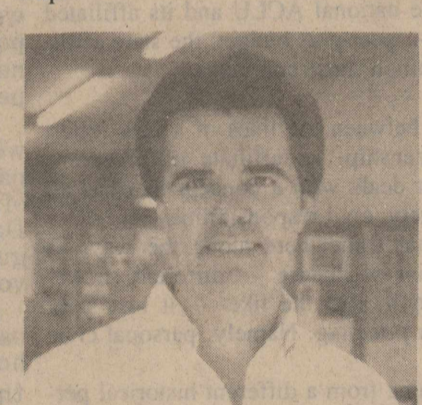
Entrants should place 45 pecans of the same variety in a bag labeled with name attached. One entry per variety will be allowed. The nuts should be large, uniform, clean and free from insect damage. Pecans must be exhibited in their natural state, but be free from shucks and trash and have no artificial alterations. Entries should be turned into the County Extension office or the chamber office by Monday, Dec. 9 before 6 p.m.

4-H Food Show coming up Saturday

The Annual Crockett County 4-H Food Show will be held Saturday, November 9, at the Civic Center. A schedule of activities for the morning include: 8:30-9:00-set-up food entries; 9:00-11:00-judging; 11:00-11:30-public viewing; 11:30-presentation of awards and tasting tea. The public is invited to attend the awards presentation and tasting tea.

Prior to the 4-H Food Show, 4-Hers must complete a project record, menu, and recipe form. Project records and menus are judged prior to the food show, while food and judge's interviews are held the day of the show. The various percentages of competition include: project record (10%), menu (20%), and knowledge of nutrition/food entry (70%).

There are three age divisions this year: intermediate, junior high, and high school. 4-Hers may enter one of four categories: snacks and desserts, breads and cereal, main dish, and

fruits and vegetables.

Chairmen of this year's 4-H Food Show are Nancy Vannoy and Carmen Sutton. The following 4-H leaders have worked with some 85 4-Hers throughout their food projects: Lou Haire, Sadie Davidson, Becky Herrington, Kathy Mayfield, Debbie Phillips, Maria DeHoyos, Sylvia DeHoyos, Barbara Dominguez, Trebie West, Sharman West, Cynthia Flores, Martha Sanchez, Evelyn Keith, Donna Snyder, Debbie Arrott, Cathy Carson, Julie Carson, Summer Shacklette, Mary Lou Hayes, Ramona Turnley, Randi Thompson, Nancy Vannoy, Cindy White, Marilyn Chalmers, Janie Chandler, Nelda Hopkins, Juanita Delgado, and Betty Martin. 4-Hers may participate in a foods and nutrition project and choose not to enter the food show.

Local businesses have donated awards and supplies for the 4-H food show.

Commodities to be made available here

Government commodities will be available for eligible Ozona citizens for the first time beginning this month. They will be available through Helping Hands for the Elderly and will be distributed from the Civic Center.

Volunteers are needed for the project. Jim Chilton of Lubbock, will conduct an instructional seminar Nov. 7, from 1 to 5 p.m. at the Chamber of Commerce office. Volunteers will be instructed on screening of applicants and distribution of commodities. All interested persons are urged to attend this meeting.

So far Beth Boyd, Kathy Reavis and Margaret Porras make up the work force. The commodities will be distributed monthly. Applicants will be screened as the program begins, then annually as the program continues. Screening dates for the initial distribution will be Nov. 13, 14 and 15.

Food will be picked up in San Angelo, Nov. 22 and distributed Nov. 23. The first distribution will include milk, cornmeal, flour, honey, rice, butter and cheese.

lican ticket. After lunch at Charlie's, he was escorted around town by Lockie Sue Bissett and his Midland manager, Leanne Knighten.

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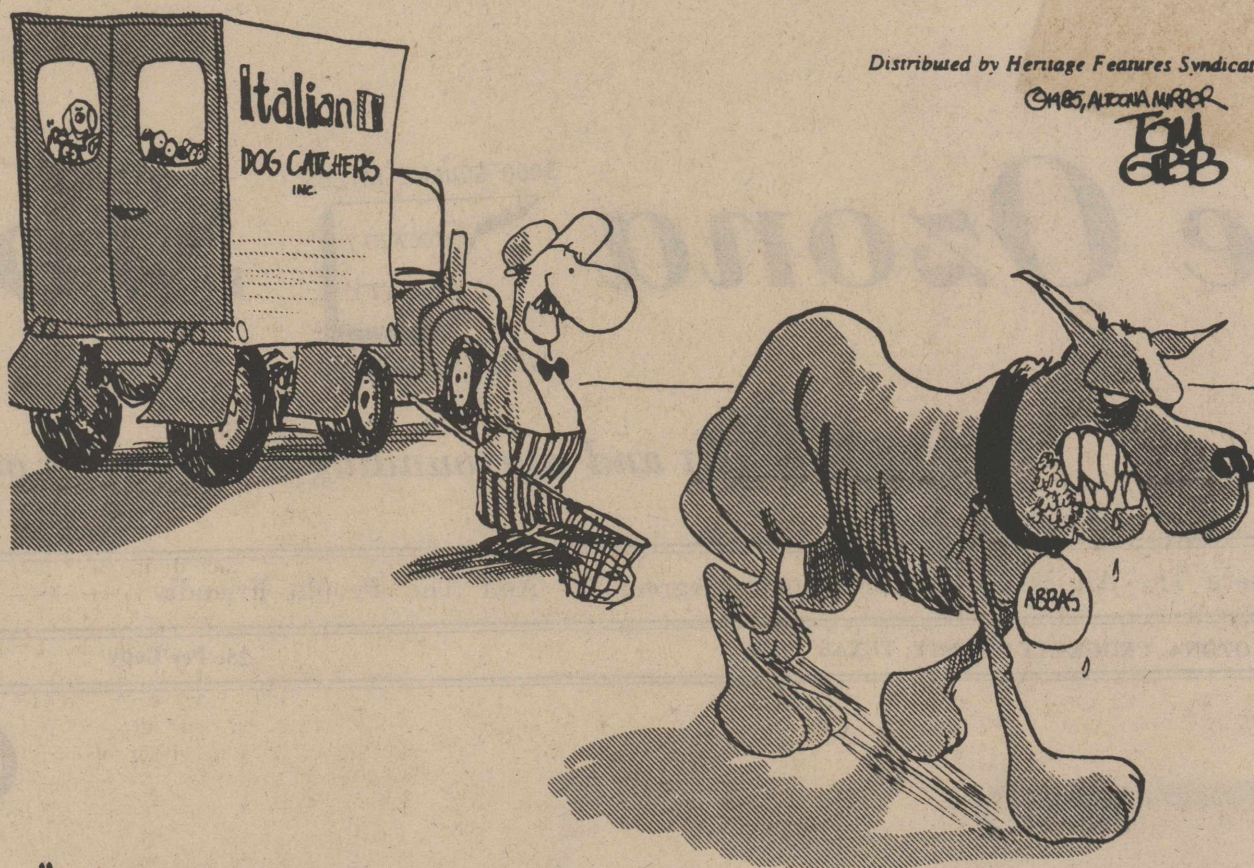
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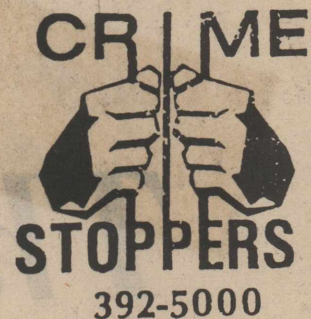

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Both Texas political parties got a bit of quiet, delivering KO punches, not avoiding them, and both he and Loeffler belittle Hance's GOP credentials.

Both Hance and Clements were present last week when Hurst state Rep. Charles Evans announced his switch to the Republican party. Evans, a 13-year legislator and powerful close friend of Speaker Gib Lewis, said he wasn't recruited by the GOP, but switched out of personal conviction.

Seguin state Sen. John Traeger announced his retirement and threw his support to Laredo state Rep. Billy Hall, a fellow Democrat. Traeger preferred Hall, who is more conservative than state party vice chairman Dr. Judith Zaffirini, also of Laredo.

Former state Rep. Clay Smothers pleaded guilty last week to a reduced charge of assault on a child in a plea bargain pact. Smothers, who was fined \$1,000 and sentenced to three days in jail, was associated with a now-defunct youth training school.

Former state Rep. Roy English of Mansfield also switched to the GOP last week, and said he has talked with local Republican officials about running for Tarrant County judge.

Governor White appointed former state Democratic Party chairman Calvin Guest to the Public Safety Commission

after Sen. Peyton McKnight became mired by two racial jokes he told at his own charity roast fundraiser. McKnight insisted his use of a racial slur was made in the context of the roast, but a local letterwriting campaign axed his nomination.

White also named Jo Campbell to the controversial Public Utility Commission vacancy last week. The press has frequently jibed White for appointing former Baylor classmates, particularly old roommates, to state posts. In humorous one upmanship, White told reporters at the announcement that while she did graduate from Baylor, Campbell had never been one of his roommates.

State Board of Insurance Chairman Lyndon L. Olson Jr. will be a participating faculty member in the United Nations seminar on reinsurance supervision November 11-15 in Manila.

Senator Phil Gramm announced plans to open an El Paso office. He presently has offices in Houston, Harlingen and Dallas.

Common Cause of Texas has named Sen. Chet Edwards, D-Duncanville, its 1985 Legislator of the Year.

United Parcel Service moved closer to intrastate service last week when the Texas Railroad Commission approved, 2-1, a new rule to allow UPS to operate between points within Texas.

TAKE NOTE ACLU

The American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) is one of the organizations in the United States that conservatives most love to hate. And with good reason.

During the Vietnam War, while "Hanoi Jane" Fonda was peddling propaganda for the Communist North — those great civil libertarians who after the fall of Saigon protected the rights of the South Vietnamese by sending them to "reeducation" camps or driving them into the sea — the ACLU was aiding the war effort by defending U.S. draft-dodgers and flag-burners.

Today, its war on America can be seen in the crime statistics. More than most, the ACLU is responsible for our Catch-22 criminal justice system — which treats victims like criminals, and robbers, muggers, and rapists as if they were the ones who had been wronged.

Add this to the ACLU's self-righteous defense of U.S. Nazis and Communists and one begins to understand why the organization's name leaves such a bad taste in so many mouths.

Much has been written, of course, about the ACLU's shortcomings. And certainly the story is not over. The national ACLU and its affiliated foundation perk along on a \$10-million-a-year-plus budget; the state affiliates amass more, and the assault on common sense continues.

The answer, I think, can be found between the lines of a new report from the Center for Responsible Citizenship, an affiliate of Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge. The report deals with a concept that has all but been forgotten by contemporary society: civil responsibilities.

The problem with the ACLU is that somewhere along the way, as it pushed the Constitution past the point of license — different strokes for different folks; if it feels good, do it; and the like — it lost sight of the fact that freedom carries with it a price-tag. Namely, personal civic responsibility.

The Founding Fathers, of course, came from a different historical perspective. That is why our individual rights are so clearly and properly codified in the Bill of Rights.

Unfortunately, the Founding Fathers did not consider it necessary to spell out what they felt was given: the responsibilities of citizenship. So for two-hundred years we have moved to an increasingly literal interpretation of the Bill of Rights — while drifting further and further away from any sense of social responsibility.

The Center for Responsible Citizenship is trying to fill that void. They commissioned a team of leading scholars — headed by Dr. Mark Cannon, administrative assistant to Chief Justice Warren Burger, and Federal Appeals Court Judge Antonin Scalia, one of the country's leading jurists — to draft what the center calls a "Bill of Responsibilities," a document that should be required reading for anyone who has ever worked for or with, or donated money to the ACLU.

Lesson one: we must "be fully responsible for our own actions and for the consequences of those actions. Freedom to choose carries with it the responsibility for our choices." Take note ACLU. Sure we must do what we can to see that everyone charged with a crime gets a fair trial. But we must also see that criminals pay for their actions. Letting confessed criminals off on legal technicalities, a logic pushed to absurdity by the ACLU, is a perversion of our Constitution and shouldn't be tolerated in a free society.

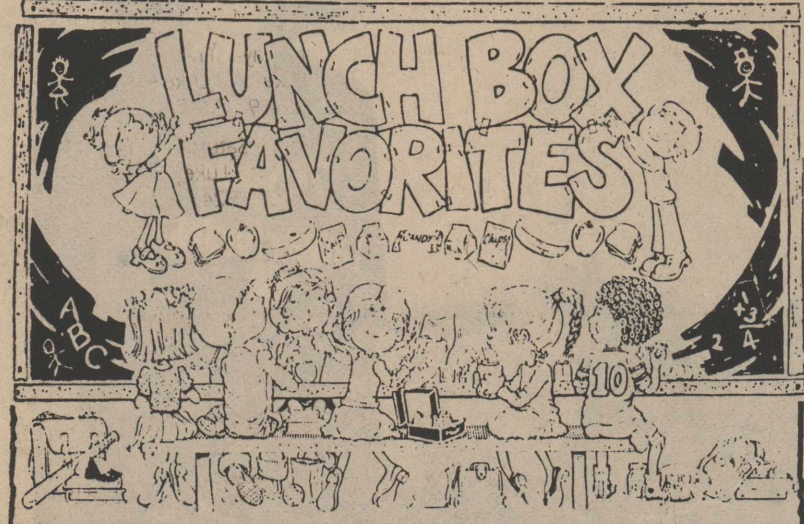

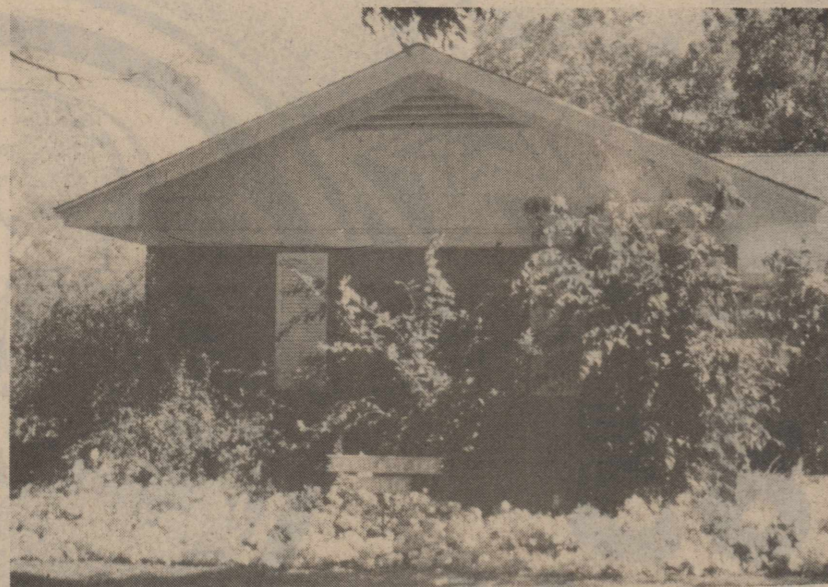

Tips For Gardeners

These beautiful fall days should give everyone a chance to prepare for protection of plants that will need to be moved inside or mulched to prevent the soil from freezing so deeply. If much is used in flower beds, remove all dead annuals, and cut off tops of perennials close to the ground. For roses, remove all dead and diseased leaves before adding mulch.

After the first killing frost, cut back dahlias to 3 inches of the ground. Let plants remain in the ground for about a week, then dig roots, wash and dry in the shade. Keep tuberous roots from freezing and drying out by starting in peat moss or vermiculite. Some prefer to leave dahlia roots in the ground, but they should be protected with soil or mulch.

Here are several ways to increase the much-needed humidity around house plants during winter-mist with lukewarm water, place a tray of water beneath or near the plants, or group plants so their combined transpiration raises the humidity. Humidifiers work well and can benefit you as well as the plants. Regardless of which method you select, it is important to keep plants away from heat vents and

appliances producing hot air. Colorful amaryllis add holiday cheer to the home and also make great gifts. Plant bulbs now to have blooms for Christmas. Select a container about 2 inches wider than the bulb. Place a 1/2 inch layer of gravel in the bottom of the container and fill the rest of the way with potting soil.

Set the bulb so that the top third is above the soil. Pack soil firmly around the bulb, then water well. Don't water again until growth begins. Give them at least four hours of bright light each day. Once it starts to bloom, move the plant to a warm area with direct light. Dig and store caladium bulbs before they are killed by freezing temperatures. Leave the foliage in tact and check for rotting and disease. Keeping only those bulbs that are healthy. Air-dry for several days in a shaded location, then remove foliage and dust the bulbs with captan to prevent mold from forming. Pack the bulbs in dry peat so they are not touching. Place in a cool, dry, freeze-proof area until next spring, then replant them. Now is the time to observe colorful shrubs and trees that you may want to add to your new and growing plants.

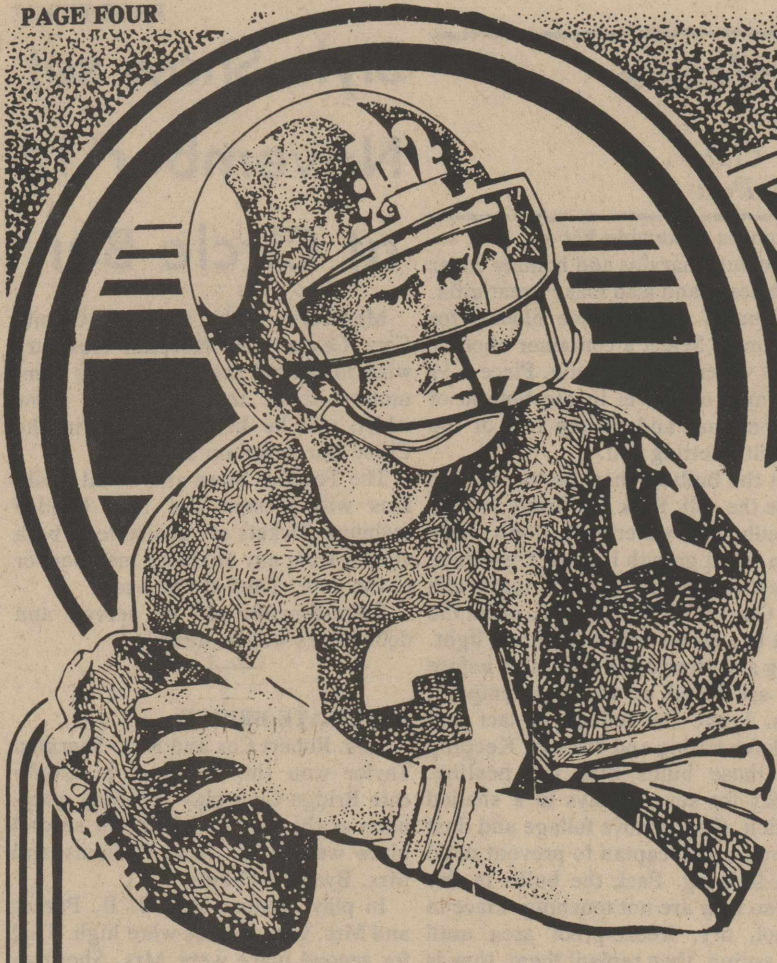

Off premises advertising signs must be registered

Mr. D. R. Watson, District Engineer of the San Angelo District of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, announced today that the owner of each off-premise advertising sign which was erected before September 1, 1985 along a road outside an incorporated city or town in Texas is required by recent legislation to register the sign by December 30, 1985 or remove the sign. The new law is known as House Bill 1330 and refers to an off-premise sign as a sign which advertises a service or product not principally sold on the premises where the sign is located. Mr. Watson stated that forms are available in the San Angelo District office for use in registering a sign and that a form would be sent upon request. He also said that a \$25 nonrefundable fee is

required with the filing of the registration application.

Mr. Watson pointed out that there are only two exceptions to the State registration requirement. If the sign was allowed under the Highway Beautification provisions of the Texas Litter Abatement Act or if the sign is in the extraterritorial jurisdiction of a city or town which is controlling signs in such extraterritorial jurisdiction, the sign does not have to be registered with the State.

In enacting House Bill 1330, the Legislature also authorized the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation to regulate on-premise and off-premise signs which are erected after September 1, 1985. A permit for each such sign is now required. Permit application forms are available in the San Angelo District

Office Mr. Watson said.

The San Angelo District Office is located at Loop 306 and Knickerbocker Road and the telephone number is (915) 944-1501.

Lions post win over Coahoma

The Ozona Lions put another mark in their victory column last Friday night as they came from behind two different times to defeat the Coahoma Bulldogs by a score of 18-12. The weather dampened the crowd and the turf but it could not dampen the determination of the Lions. The loyal fans who did see the game saw more than just a Lion victory. They saw a group of young men who refused to give up even though their hopes of post season play are over and quitting would be easier than facing adversity. This Ozona Lion football team shows character, determination, dedication and sportsmanship, the qualities that are found in winners, even those whose records are 2-7.

Ozoma started the game by receiving the opening kickoff and returning it to their own 46. Quarterback Sam Hightower came out in the shotgun formation and soon found that the wet ball was going to be difficult to pass. After four downs Ozona punted the ball to the Bulldogs who started their first possession. The Dogs drove 68 yards to score on Ozoma as senior Gary Vaughn ran the ball in from the one yard line. Thus the Lions trailed 0-6 after a missed PAT with 6:13 left in the third quarter. The Lions were not behind for long as Coahoma made its first mistake of the night. They kicked the ball into the hands of junior running back James Sanchez who has been slowed by two ankle injuries all year. He made up for lost time by breaking tackles and running 80 yards to even the game up at 6-6, and killing any momentum the Bulldogs might have started. The first quarter saw each team with one more possession but neither side was able to score.

The second quarter paid no dividends for Ozoma as they were plagued by fumbles, penalties, and an interception. The same thing held true for Coahoma also as they lost the handle on a wet football and committed untimely penalties. It looked as if the second quarter would remain scoreless until a questionable interference call put Coahoma in scoring position with seconds left in the half. Dale Hodnett hit Scott Earnest for a 17 yard touchdown pass that gave the Dogs a 6-12 halftime lead.

The Lions came out the second half with fire in their eyes. They elected to receive the ball but were unable to handle an onside kick that injured junior Donald Gutierrez and gave the Bulldogs the ball. Not only did the Lions lose Gutierrez for the second half but also quarterback Sam Hightower who suffered an arm injury. The second half had just started and nothing was going in the Lions favor, so it was time to throw in the towel. Maybe so but nobody told Ozona. Harvey Fierro came into the game as the third string quarterback and sparked a Lion comeback. Not in the third quarter but in the final quarter when it was "do or die."

With just 56 seconds expired in the

fourth quarter Fierro turned the game around for Ozoma as he scrambled 57 yards for a Lion touchdown. Just as quickly as the first time, Ozoma had scored again and evened up the score. The PAT one again failed and with eleven minutes left in the game the score stood just as it had 36 minutes earlier, tied.

Coahoma received the ball inside their own twenty and started a hopeful scoring drive. Five plays later they fumbled the ball away and Ozoma recovered. Two plays later Ozoma returned the favor and the Dogs were on the prowl again. They chose to test the Lion's secondary on a third and long situation that proved to be another mistake for the Bulldogs. Junior Roger Flores made a spectacular interception that killed the drive and set Ozoma up for the kill. Fierro began to march the Lion offense down the field combining running and passing attacks and six plays later hit Jamie Castellanos on a nine yard pass that wound up in the endzone and worth six more points and a Lion victory. The Ozoma defense then met the challenge and held off the Dogs final charge and Ozoma grabbed its second victory of the season.

The Lions piled up 242 yards in total offense, 160 of which came on the

ground and 82 of which came in the air. Coahoma gained 252 total yards with 130 on the ground and 122 in the air. Harvey Fierro was the top ground gainer for the Lions as he worked his way for 98 yards on 11 carries. Chuy Hernandez was next with 31 yards followed by David Adams and Butch Gonzales who had 25 and 20 yards respectively. Each team committed three turnovers in the horrible weather, which was very few.

Ozoma winds up the 85 season with the possibility of beating rival Sonora and finishing 3-7 on the season and 2-3 in district. Give your support and encouragement to this fine football team and unique group of young men. Lets help them end 85 on a winning note.

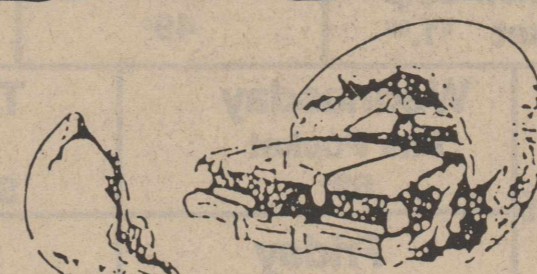

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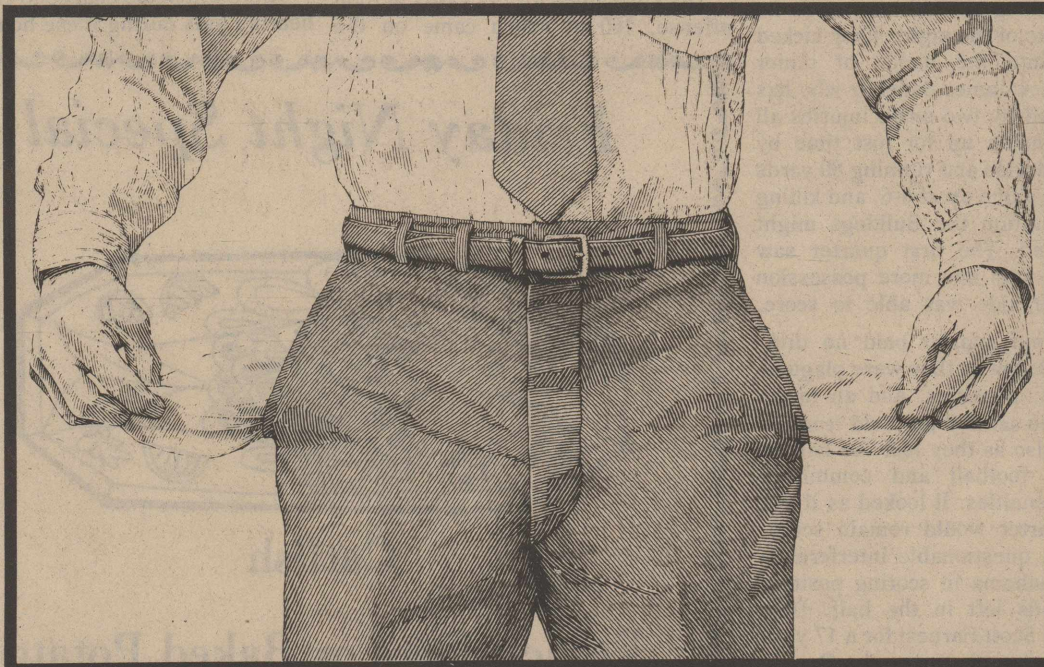

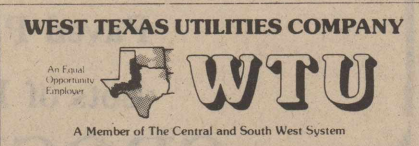

Sheriff's report for week

The Crockett County Sheriff's Department made four arrests last week. Ronald C. Clark, 30, was arrested Tuesday, October 29, and charged with public intoxication. He was fined \$50 and released Wednesday. Peter A. Hunt, 18, was arrested Tuesday and charged with auto theft and probation revocation. He was released Wednesday on a personal recognition bond.

Wednesday, Pete Galindo Guerra Jr., 21, was arrested for driving without a license. He was released Thursday after paying a \$35 fine.

Marilyn Covert Clark, 26, was arrested Friday, and charged with public intoxication. She was released after paying a \$50 fine November 2.

Three juveniles were referred to county juvenile authorities in con-

nection with the recovery of three bicycles stolen in the latter part of September. Hearings are expected to be scheduled in juvenile court for the three.

Augustus Ignacius Craig was arrested in Tucson, Arizona last week on Crockett County warrants for felony possession of marijuana, possession of cocaine, and bond forfeiture on both counts. The warrants resulted from an arrest by Crockett County Highway Patrol officers November 4, 1983. It is unknown at this time if Craig will waive extradition and be brought back to Ozona voluntarily. If he does not, a governor's warrant of extradition will be obtained and Crockett County Sheriff's deputies will go to Arizona and bring him back to Ozona.

West Texas Utilities rates to decrease for winter months

The price of electricity for residential and commercial customers of West Texas Utilities Co. will decrease slightly in November as the company's winter rates go into effect.

Beginning with November billings, base rates will be reduced by 3/4-cent per kilowatt-hour. Residential base rates will drop from 3.97 per kilowatt-hour to 3.22, while commercial base rates will drop from 4.18 to 3.43 cents per kWh.

Result of the base rate decrease and slight adjustment in the fuel cost factor will be an 8.2 percent reduction in costs for residential customers. For example, a customer using 1,000

kilowatt-hours will be charged \$6.56 less than for the same amount under the summer rates.

The summer-winter rate differential for the two classes of customers was established by the Public Utility Commission of Texas during negotiations in WTU's rate case during the fall of 1984. Seasonal rate differentials have been used by many companies for many years. The main reason is that the cost of providing service is higher during the peak usage season, or summer months when air-conditioners are in use.

Winter rates will be in effect from November 1 through April 1986.

additional earnings, Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo, said recently.

Social Security automatically refigures the benefit after the additional earnings are credited to the person's record.

"These people are also eligible for a special credit that can mean a larger benefit for them," Upp said. "This credit adds 3 percent a year--or 1/4 of 1 percent for each month the person does not get benefits because he or she worked after 65. This additional credit also increases the payments made to widows and widowers."

"For workers who become 65 in 1990, the delayed retirement credit will gradually increase until it reaches 8 percent", Upp said.

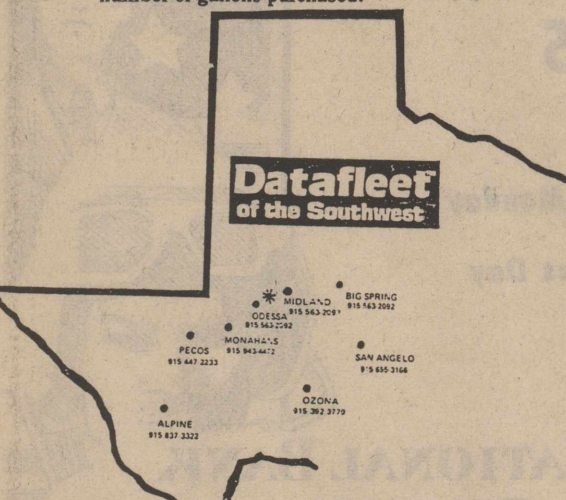

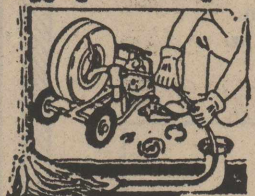
