Spectacular fire erupts

just at dawn last Wednesday morning at the Texaco Plant four miles south of Ozona. A 1/2-inch line broke and gas ignited from the engine. The resulting explosion and fire blew the top off the building and caused heavy damage. However, the plant was back in operation by Friday and there were no injuries.

## Court and hospital board in called meeting

At a called meeting of the Crockett County Hospital Board and the Commissioners Court Monday night in the district courtroom, the Emergency Medical Service was assured there would be no change in its service or equipment and onlookers were assured the operation of the Crockett County Care Center would remain the same, regardless of any decision made about the hospital plant. Other than that, there were no firm decisions made.

The hospital board met at 6:30 and chairman John Stokes, informed members that the meeting had been called for some input by the court on hospital operations. He said since the court did not act on the board's previous recommendation, which was to keep the hospital open and operating as is, the two entities must meet and reach some kind of decision. He said the hospital was losing staff daily, including the administrator, and Medicare was again threatening, due to three deficiencies found on a recent inspection.

A resume for the job of hospital administrator was submitted by Bill Boswell, who was hospital administrator at Brady for the past eleven years. He spoke to the board, but was not questioned about his termination from his last position, only about the operation of the hospital as a hospital authority. He, also, expressed the opinion that the federal government was out to put small hospitals out of business.

The board discussed several options. Doctor Don Carlisle discussed upcoming legislation which would require the evaluation of a physician before a patient could be even admitted or treated in an emergency room. Dr. Carlisle, who leans toward one of the Shannon-Shamrock proposals, said the community now has a choice of which direction to take. He said if we wait until the hospital fails, we will have no bargaining power. He added "I don't know if going with Shamrock is best, but we all know something has to be done."

One of the board members, Fred Deaton, said there would be no difference in the cost of the Shamrock operation and the operation as is. He was assured quality of care was more important than the cost factor. Dr. R. M. Owens expressed the opinion it would be a distinct disadvantage to the community to lose the hospital. He feels if the hospital drops Medicare many of the problems would vanish.

One board member expressed the opinion that most everyone wants the hospital to stay open as long as the county foots the bill, whether they have patients or whether they do not. Hospital board members present,

other than those mentioned were Orlando Vargas, Alleane Jones and Lloyd Winkley. They recessed briefly as members of the court arrived for the 7 p.m. meeting.

Judge A. O. Fields called the meeting to order with commissioners, Jack Williams, Chuy Castro and B. W. Stuart present, along with county attorney Tom Cameron and county auditor Dick Kirby, who was summoned from the audience. Judge Fields asked Stokes to take over. Stokes asked for the court's backing in whatever endeavor the board chose. He expressed the opinion that the situation had to get off dead center, and make some kind of move which would prove beneficial to the community as far as medical care is concerned. He told the court much of what was discussed in the previous board meeting. He added the board decided against going with Shamrock because they felt it was cost prohibitive and would cause loss of jobs. He also expressed the board's opinion that another doctor would be the solution. However, he added that so far there had been no luck in that area.

Judge Fields said there was no simple solution to the hospital problem. "We have a hospital and it is usable, but still nobody uses it." The question is "Why?"

He asked County Auditor Kirby to come up and discuss the monetary problem. Kirby said for the first eleven months of this year, the hospital had gone in the red to the tune of \$414,000 with an average of perhaps one patient per day. The care center for the same period is \$250,000 in the deficit column. There have been up to two weeks the hospital has had even one patient, yet the full staff is retained to satisfy Medicare requirements. On the other hand, the care center is used and there is no question of making any adjustments in that area.

Judge Fields pointed out the county's population is not growing. He estimated that at present there are at least 600 families fewer than during the peak period of the early 80's.

The court made clear to those present that money is not the primary concern. If people would use the hospital, there would be no quarrel about keeping the hospital open. Several options were discussed, one of which is a proposal from St. John's Hospital in San Angelo. However, it was pointed out that facility has no emergency room nor O.B. facilities, so it seems unlikely there will be any move in that direction.

Tom Cameron assured those present that saving money or losing money was not the problem. He said the commissioners would spend the money and gladly if the community

would use the hospital.

After commending Don Hopkins and getting his input, the court asked for any discussion from the audience.

Some discussion was held on the formation of a hospital district. Beth Boyd brought up this solution. Both the court and the board agreed that a district would relieve them of the responsibility. Mrs. Boyd asked if county taxes would be lowered if a hospital district were formed. She was assured this would be the case. Most of those who have researched a hospital district seem to think it is a

"passing the buck" tactic and would not solve the hospital problem. Also, something must be done before a district could be pushed through the legislature and approved by the voters.

All options were discussed with the idea of closing the hospital being the last option. However, when asked how many would use the hospital here if they became ill, only one of the around 20 persons present said they would. Although nothing was really accomplished, the meeting was dismissed with a better understanding of the situation.

## Water legislation discussed at meeting

Drew Durham, Sterling County Consulting Attorney, discussed the newly passed water legislation and possible effects on Crockett County, Thursday, November 21 in Ozona. Some 45 ranchers and interested persons attended. Drew specifically discussed underground and subsurface water conservation issues.

Following a period of questions and answers, the group decided to hold another water conservation meeting in January. Glasscock and Sutton County representatives will be present with Drew to discuss the pros and cons of developing water conservation districts. Glasscock and Sutton County recently formed water conservation districts during the last legislative session.

The water conservation meeting was sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the local Program Building Committee.

## Hopkins resigns as hospital head

Don Hopkins has resigned his post as administrator of Crockett County Hospital effective Dec. 17. He has accepted a position with a management organization in Stamford, and will be working with the Stamford Memorial Hospital.

Hopkins came here from Junction in July of 1983. Since he has been here he has kept the hospital running despite the odds. The patient days have dropped dramatically and the cost of running the facility has risen accordingly. The loss of families due to the decline in the oil economy and the ever stringent demands of Medicare compliance has created a "doomsday" situation for the hospital as it is presently serving. Hopkins felt the uncertain future of the hospital indicated a need for him to seek employment elsewhere.

Hopkins, his wife, Nelda, and daughter, McKenzie, leave Ozona

with reluctance. They love the town, the school system and the people.

Hopkins expressed concern for the hospital here. He feels under-utilization is the main reason for failure. However, he readily admits the overall economy and rate increases in private hospitalization insurance have left many families uninsured and unable to afford hospital care. That, along with the crackdown on eligibility in Medicare has created a gigantic problem for all small rural hospitals, especially in West Texas. However, Hopkins wishes the hospital well, and points out a loss of \$650,000 a year in salaries, should the hospital close, would have a drastic effect on the Ozona economy.

He will leave for his new position Dec. 17. His wife, Nelda, who is employed by Dr. Owensby, and daughter, a fourth-grader, will join him in Stamford in January.

## Annual pecan show scheduled soon

The Annual Crockett County Pecan Show will be held December 9 and 10 at the Chamber of Commerce. Food and pecan winners will be displayed December 10 at the Ozona National Bank. Awards and drawings will be at 5:00 p.m. at the bank.

Pecan entries will be processed Monday, December 9, 6:00 p.m., at the Chamber of Commerce. Judging will be held Tuesday for pecans and baked goods. A sale of food entries will be conducted between 1 and 6 p.m.

Entrants should place 45 pecans of the same variety in a bag labeled with name. One entry per variety is allowed. The nuts should be large, uniform, clean, and free from insect damage. Pecans must be exhibited in their natural state, but free from shucks, trash, and artificial alterations. Entries should be submitted to the County Extension Office or Chamber of Commerce by December 9, 6:00 p.m. First place winners in each class will advance to the Regional Pecan Show in Big Spring.

Food entries must contain pecans, which may be purchased or home grown. Food categories include cakes, pies, candy, cookies, breads, and miscellaneous. The entire recipe must accompany the food entry or in case of cookies, 3 dozen. Age divisions are adult, age 13-19, and 12 and under. Recipes must accompany each entry. There is no limit to the number of entries. Food entries should be taken to Chamber of Commerce between

7:30-10:00 a.m., December 10. Drawings for all first place entries will be held at the bank. All other items will be sold, unless otherwise stated, to cover show expenses.

Plaques will be given for Champion Shelling, in-shell, and native pecans. Rosettes for Champion and Reserve Champion of show pecans and baked goods will be presented. Ribbons will be presented in all pecan and baked goods categories.

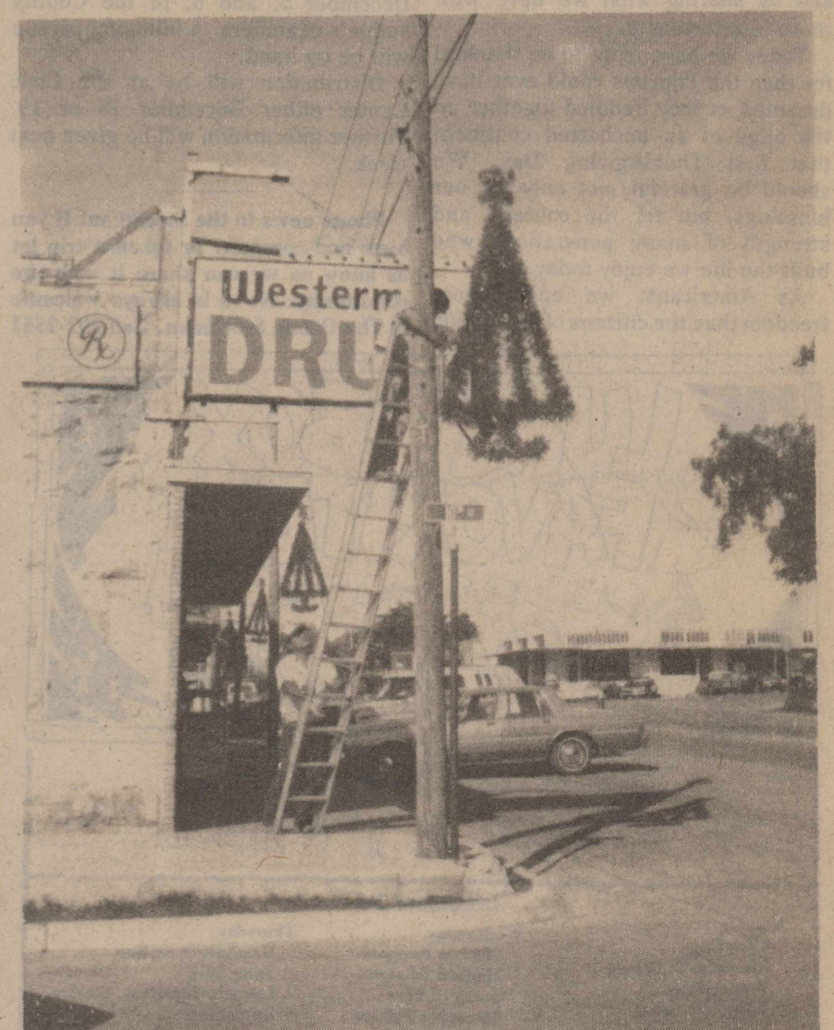

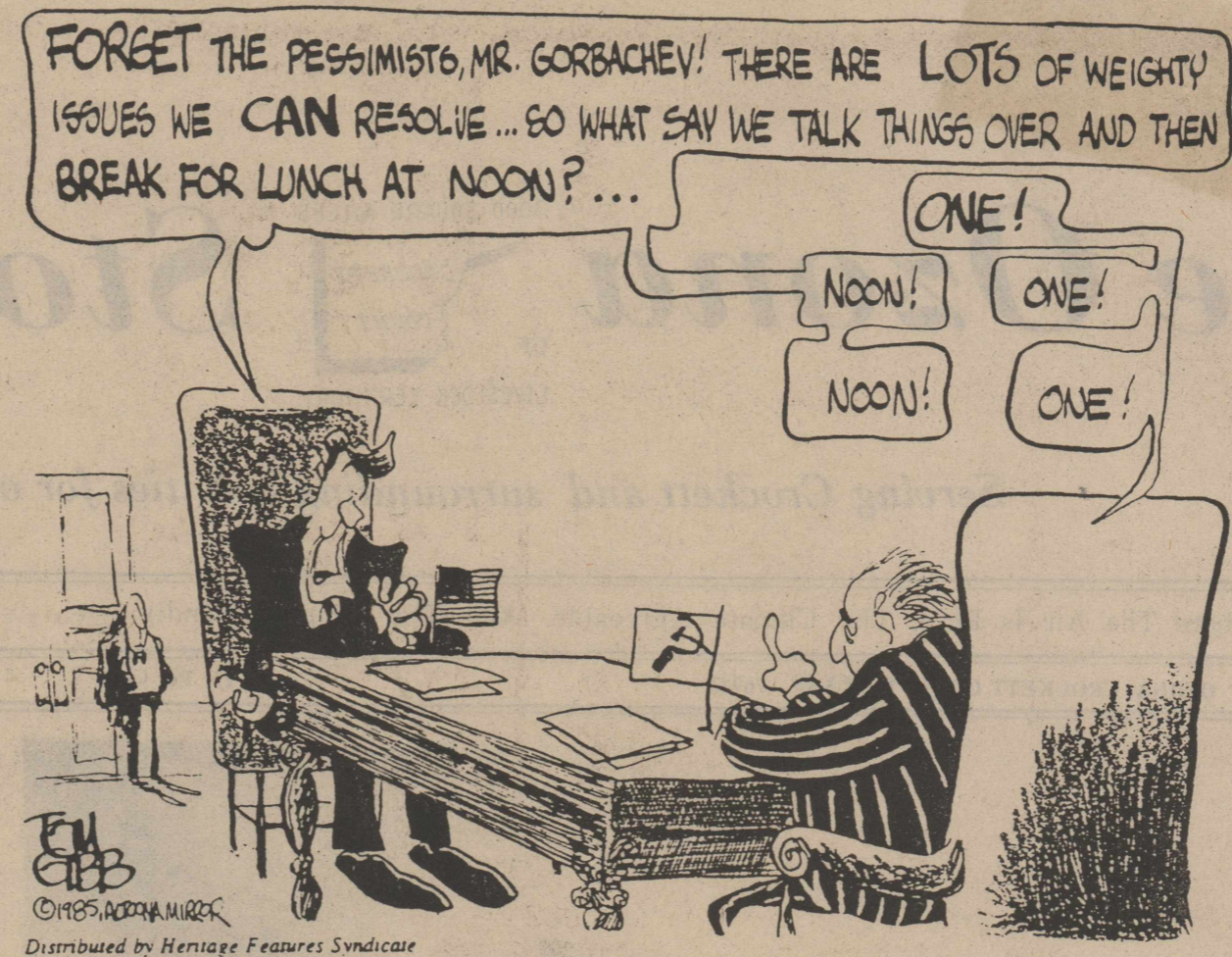

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## STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—State government has its own rhythm: a time to govern and a time to campaign, even though some would say a good politician campaigns all the time.

There was a lot of political jockeying going on last week and no matter the origin, the man in the middle of it all was Gov. Mark White.

Unfortunately for the governor, he seemed to be catching heat from all directions: the Republican party, the courtroom, the schools, the coaches, the consumers, even the Democratic Party.

One thing going his way was a planned trip to San Francisco for a fund-raiser reception. His second out-of-state trip for campaign funds has folks murmuring once again of his ambitions to be the Democrats' vice presidential nominee in 1988.

After all, the Democrats may need a Texas homeboy on the ticket to carry the Lone Star State, and White has already been to New York to raise campaign funds.

The way political elbows were jostling last week, you might wonder if he left just to get out of the line of fire. Some of the highlights which involved White as a target, directly or indirectly, included:

—Two GOP candidates, Kent Hance and Tom Loeffler, both demanded that White fire his appointee to the Public Utility Commission, who recently acknowledged using state funds and staff to finish his Ph.D. dissertation. White said he won't do it and told Dennis Thomas to "hang in there."

—Directors of the 10,000-member Texas High School Coaches Association announced they will meet soon to consider whether they will launch a campaign against White for his

unrelenting stance on the controversial "no-pass, no-play" reform. White's answer was to insist he won't back off an inch and to declare he has no sympathy for "crying and whining" coaches.

—A legal challenge to soften "no-pass, no-play" continued last week in Houston where a class action lawsuit went to trial. Political forecasters say if the suit to change the reform prevails, White's chances for re-election go down the tubes with the reform.

—With that possibility obviously in mind, Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox told reporters he will run for re-election, but wouldn't rule out the possibility he might challenge White for the Governor's Mansion. White's response to the challenge: "Come ahead."

—A Texas Consumers Union director criticized White for failing to reappoint a member of the State Board of Morticians. Grady Baskin, Jr. said he wasn't renamed because he refused to promise the governor's appointments secretary he would support White's re-election. The secretary, Dwane Holman, said that's not what happened at all, but consumer advocate Carol Barger, also present, sided with Baskin. Baskin won the Consumer Union's support last year when he made an undercover probe of funeral homes and found 23 of 24 breaking state price disclosure laws. Baskin was unsuccessful in trying to get the board to take action.

Mattox, for his part, last week indicated he would forego making a legal ruling on whether an announced candidate, state Sen. Buster Brown, R-Lake Jackson, could legally run against him. The courts could best decide that issue, he said.

Brown's eligibility is questioned because the Texas Constitution prevents a legislator from running for another office if he voted that office a salary increase. Brown has said he won't accept the higher salary if he's elected.

Mattox also announced last week he has hired former U.S. Rep. Jack Hightower, who served in Congress with Mattox, as first assistant attorney general. He replaces Tom Green, who resigned to run the Mattox campaign.

The appointment kills speculation that Hightower would try to take back the seat he lost in 1984 to the GOP.

Last week the head of the Texas Republican Party surprised his folks by saying he was out, and his counterpart with Texas Democrats did the same by saying he was in.

George Strake, the chairman credited with rebuilding a Texas Republican Party shattered in '82, said "it's my time to go and let somebody else do it." He will not run for re-election next year, and gave no clue hinting he will run for a state office.

Two days later, Texas Democratic Party chairman Bob Slagle told his state committee he will run for a fourth term.


November 26, 1985

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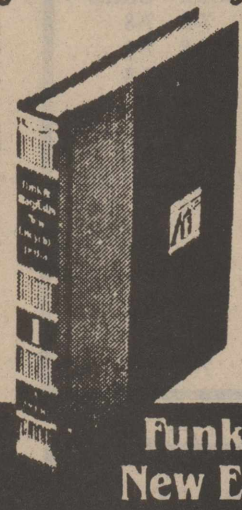
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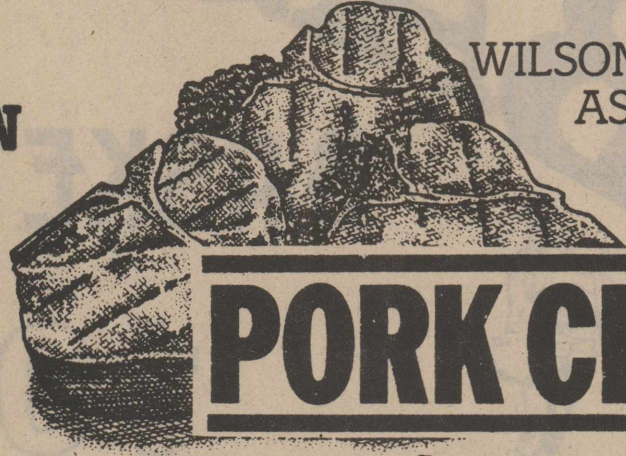

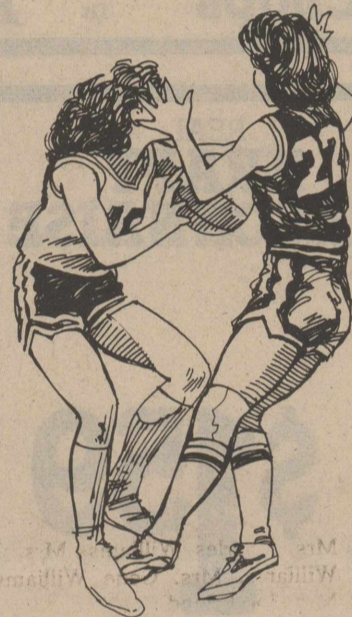

Fort Concho National Historic Landmark in San Angelo will be transformed into a dazzling holiday wonderland during "Christmas at Old Fort Concho" celebrations December 6, 7, 8.

Highlights of the festival include shopping, ethnic foods, heritage chapel services, historic recreations by infantry, cavalry, cowboy, and Indian groups, and presentation of a colorful heritage pageant featuring 150 costumed actors, singers, and dancers.

The celebration, Fort Concho's largest public affair, attracted 40,000 visitors last year. Proceeds from the event go to the education, preservation, and special programs of Fort Concho, the best-preserved Indian Wars fort in the nation. Admission to the grounds is \$1 for adults with children under 12 free.

Visitors will find the fort's 21 historic buildings and 20 acres aglow from the flickering candles of 4,000 luminarias, with each building decorated in a special motif—"A Victorian Christmas" or "An Early Texas Christmas," for example. Inside, more than 100 merchants and artisans will sell specially selected items, some of which are offered only at this event.

The grounds will be alive with strolling mariachis, children's choirs, ethnic dancers, a living nativity scene, las pasadas, as well as specialty items for sale by roving vendors. Religious heritage services will be held several times each day in the fort chapel. Food and beverages will be served on grounds, including the "Arc Light Saloon," which celebrates San Angelo's Wild West beginnings.

4. To air-condition: In the summer and heat in the winter--strategically placed evergreen trees around the home will cut the cost for cooling and heating depending on the time of the year.

5. To provide food for people, birds and animals: Why not plant the Texas pecan for nuts? A peach tree will give

you double pleasure with blooms as well as shade and fruit.

6. To create beauty for you, your family and friends.

To give pleasure to every living thing now and for generations to come. The beautiful trees in Ozona make it a place to be remembered.

Why plant shrubs? 1. As a natural screen. 2. For a sound barrier. 3. To deter pollutants. 4. For beauty with versatility.

Why plant flowers-to give beauty in decorating home, church or exhibiting in a Flower Show.

Why plant energy gardens? To produce foods helping the budget and providing more vitamins.

Why plant dwarf trees, shrubs and plants? To conserve space.

Recipients of the Gold Star Award must have demonstrated outstanding leadership development and successfully completed projects related to agriculture, home economics, or personal development.

**Crockett County Oil News-----**

A discovery and a confirmer were finalized and a project was staked in Crockett County.

Canyon oil production was opened in the Howards Creek multipay field of Crockett County with reclassification of Exxon Corp., Midland, No. 1 Henderson Trust "N", former Canyon gas producer in the field, approximately 4 1/2 miles southeast of Canyon and Pennsylvanian gas production in the field and 13 miles southwest of Ozona, for 29 barrels of 51.8 gravity oil, plus four barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 14,209-1.

Production was through perforations at 6,491-555 feet, which had been acidized with 11,000 gallons and fractured with 18,018 gallons and 118,000 pounds of sand.

Information on the original completion was not available. Location is 660 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the west lines of 24-M-CC&SF.

The Block 51 (Strawn gas) field of Crockett County gained its fourth producer and a 3/8-mile east and slightly north extension with completion of Pogo Producing Co., Midland, No. 1 University 12 "E", 22 miles northwest of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 600,000 cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 13,573-1. Gravity of the condensate is 66.2-1.

Production was through perforations at 8,622-725 feet, which had been acidized with 4,000 gallons.

Also scheduled as a 9,100-foot wildcat, it was drilled to 8,970 feet, where 5 1/2-inch casing was set, and is plugged back to 8,927 feet.

Location is 467 feet from the north and 1,667 feet from the east lines of

12-51-ULS. Chevron U.S.A. Inc., (formerly Gulf Oil Corp.) Midland, completed its No. E T.D. Williams, et al, as an Ellenburger oil producer in the Holt Ranch multipay field of Crockett County, eight miles north of Ozona, to pump 122 barrels of 41.7 gravity oil, plus 96 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 525-1.

Production was through perforations at 7,898-904 feet, which had been acidized with 2,000 gallons.

Drilled to 7,908, where 5 1/2-inch casing was set, it is plugged back to 7,906 feet.

Location is 2,392 feet from the south and 2,600 feet from the east lines of 14-OP-GC&SF.

DJS Energy Corp., Sonora, will drill the No. 4 Ladd Henderson as a 1/2-mile south and very slightly east outpost to the two-well DJS (upper Canyon sand gas) field of Crockett County, 20 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 660 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the east lines of 13-SL-T&StL. Contract depth is 7,200 feet.

Two wildcats were scheduled in

Crockett County. Schrimsher Exploration Ltd., Odessa, has filed application to drill the No. 1 Shannon Estate "35", an 8,900-foot prospector in Crockett County, one location southeast of 8,370-foot production in the three-well Escondido, South (lower Strawn oil) field, 1/2-mile east and very slightly south of 8,560-foot Fusselman oil production and 1 1/8 miles southeast of 7,734-foot Strawn oil production in the Escondido field and 14 miles northeast of Iraan.

**75 million cases of influenza are expected this winter**

An estimated 75 million episodes of influenza are on the way this winter, according to the American Lung Association of Texas--the Christmas Seal People. The fevers, chills, aches, and lingering exhaustion will strike during what has come to be known as the flu season, which stretches from October to March. For those who are most endangered by the flu, the Lung Association's advice is simple and emphatic: get vaccinated as soon as possible.

Flu can be literally life-threatening for individuals in high-risk categories: those over 65; people with chronic lung diseases such as asthma, emphysema, tuberculosis, or chronic bronchitis; and people with heart disease, anemia, diabetes or other chronic illnesses.

The American Lung Association of Texas advises those at high-risk and those in "essential service" jobs

(hospital personnel, fire fighters, and police officers) to get a flu shot each year. The vaccine prevents flu in about 75 percent of those receiving it. For the rest, it reduces the severity of the seige.

If flu vaccine is not available or is advised against by a physician, there is an alternative--the oral medication amantadine. During an influenza outbreak, amantadine can be prescribed to prevent flu or reduce its effects in unvaccinated individuals at high risk and in those vaccinated within the preceding two weeks (before the vaccine has taken effect). Effective even within the first 48 hours after symptoms, appear, amantadine causes only mild reactions in most people.

If the *Farmer's Almanac* is right, this winter will be an unusually hard one. Make it easier by protecting yourself against the flu.

### EXTENSION OFFICE NEWS

Turkey is one of the most popular meats for the holidays. Turkey meat is naturally low in fats, is easier to digest than other protein sources, and quick to prepare.

Cooks can lower the calories in holiday meals by: substituting broth for oil in sauteing; cutting down on amounts of fat called for in recipes; seasoning with fresh herbs and lots of fresh vegetables instead of relying on butter or hard cheeses for flavor.

Turkey can be substituted for traditional red meats very successfully. Turkey is a very delicate meat and should be cooked just until done. White meat is done when the thickest portion turns from pink to light in color. For larger cuts, meat thermometers should register 170° in breast meat or 175-180° in dark meat. Meat thermometers should be placed in the thickest part of meat, not touching bone. For bone-in parts, juices should run clear when meat is pierced in the deepest part.

Preheating pans, broiler, or any heat source before adding turkey is necessary to insure rapid cooking and preventing weepage of natural juices. A small amount of fat or margarine may be added to lend richness to very lean turkey meat.

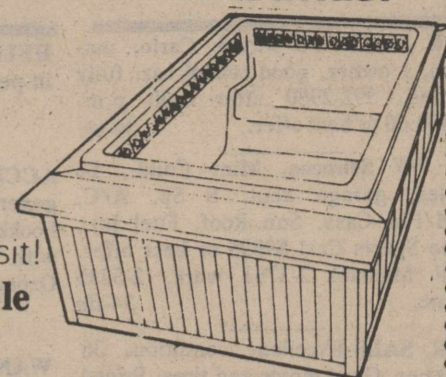
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## Ozona to close for Thanksgiving

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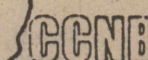

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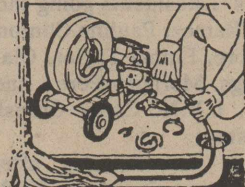
