The first big project of the new Center's staff will be the collection of publications, papers, maps and other material representing the accumulated knowledge of all organizations and scientists on Texas water supplies and problems. It is generally agreed by authorities in the field that more information is available on Texas water than on the water resources of any similar area in the world, but that it is scattered and hidden away in organizational files and it is at present of very little use to the state as a whole. Members of the Center's staff will visit headquarters of regional, state and national organizations, libraries, industrial concerns and others, seeking out this material and making arrangements for securing it.


