## Awards presented at annual Chamber fete

Judge A.O. Fields was named "Citizen of the Year" at the 22nd Annual Chamber of Commerce banquet held at the Civic Center Thursday evening.

Other award recipients were Myrtle Post, "Unsung Hero" of the year; Steve Sanchez, Young Citizen, and the Ozona Woman's League for Organization of the Year.

President and emcee for the evening Dr. Steve Sessom made the presentations following the guest speaker's program on a tribute to early Texas Women. Billie Scott of Lamesa, presented the program, and with props, acted out segments of the lives of seven pioneer Texas women.

In presenting the awards, which came as a surprise to the recipients, Dr. Sessom said "The Citizen of the year is a man who wears many hats. First he is a husband, a father, a churchman, a friend to his fellowman and one of the best river cooks. He always has time and patience to lend an ear to whatever you have to say. He is a Veteran of World War II, and very active in the VFW. He was manager of the Ford Motor Company, Postmaster, auditor for Crockett County Public Schools, Justice of the Peace and now our faithful Crockett County Judge, A.O. Fields."

Judge Fields went to the banquet expecting to make some kind of speech, but was speechless as he accepted the unexpected honor.

Mrs. Post was also surprised at

being named for the Unsung Hero award although it was a well-deserved honor. Among other accomplishments, she has written "Tips for Gardeners" for *The Ozona Stockman* for the past ten years or so, and never missed one single week. She is known as "Miss Faithful" to the newspaper staff, and the staff as well as the readers take her gardening advice as the Gospel.

Dr. Sessom had this to say about Mrs. Post. "The unsung Hero is known to have many talents; such as chicken soup for the "bad cold", blueberry salad for the church dinner, divinity candy for a Christmas box for a neighbor's grandson and anything else a friend might need for a company dinner. She is a member of the Ozona United Methodist Church, is past president of the Women's Society of Christian Service and a Director of the Ozona Community Center Board, Chairman of the Alter and Grounds Committee of the Ozona Methodist Church. She served as Master Judge in the National Council of Garden Clubs and on the Crockett County Civic Committee for several years. She has also served as president of Ozona Women's Club and the Ozona Garden Club and the Myrtle Post Garden Club is her name sake."

Steve Sanchez was named Young Citizen, due to his outstanding accomplishments during his years at Ozona High School. Steve is a senior and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Benny Sanchez.

Some of his honors during his senior year include student council president, Mr. OHS, National Honor Society, secretary, varsity football captain, member of the varsity basketball team and Most Valuable Player for the Ozona tournament.

In naming the Woman's League as Outstanding Organization, Dr. Sessom pointed out the many community service projects instituted and supported by the club and its members. League president Carmen Sutton accepted the award on behalf of the club.

Dr. Sessom began the program with a welcome and introduction of guests. He recognized outgoing directors Frank White, Betty Perry and Johnny Childress, and introduced new directors J.B. Miller, Scotty Moore, Drake McKinney, Dan Pullen and Carol Hunnicutt.

Holdover directors include Sessom, Sandra Childress, Garland Davis, J.D. Brown, Fred Deaton, Bobby Aycock, Vince Huffman, Ken Harrison, Brock Jones and Jim Marks.

## Indian exhibit opens Sunday

In spite of rather messy weather, 136 persons turned out for the Sesquicentennial Indian exhibit which opened Sunday afternoon at the Crockett County Museum.

Under the leadership of Geniece Childress, this exhibit proved to quite the best thing ever done at the local museum, although at least one former exhibit won state awards.

The exhibit, entitled "Indians of Crockett County," takes the viewer back to pre-historic times. Outstanding murals by two local artists do much to enhance the exhibit. Mrs. Bill Mason painted the game the Paleo Indians hunted and shared this territory with at the time. This includes elephants, bears, buffalo and even a saber-tooth tiger among other wild game which was plentiful in that time. A case below the mural displays fossilized remains of some of the huge beasts which roamed Crockett County during that time.

The adjoining case contains hunting and cooking tools of the Indian. A mural of an Indian village of the time, painted by Dorothy Montgomery, brings the exhibit to life. A warrior returns with his kill, while the women of the village prepare for a meal against a background of thatched tepees and lush growth. The viewer finds it hard to believe this was Crockett County from 10,000 BC to 6,500 BC. An atlatl, one of the earliest weapons used by the ancient tribe, is hung from the top of the case. People of this era tend to think of the bow and arrow as the Indian weapon most commonly used, but this weapon is almost modern when compared with the atlatl and other dart-like weapons used by the early Indian hunter.

Early Indian cave art is also reproduced in one section of the exhibit. The cases are so well-lighted and realistically done, the viewer can easily find himself transported back into that period of time.

Mrs. Childress and her committee have been working on this outstanding exhibit for a year. Much detail and research to assure accuracy have gone into the project. Many of the items displayed have been donated by Crockett County people who wished to preserve the history of the area.

Mrs. Childress believes the museum is vital for the growth and cultural advancement of Crockett County. She and her faithful curator, Violene Stanton, have spent not only hours, but years keeping the museum a vital and interesting part of Ozona.

Many local people assisted in preparing the Indian exhibit, but the lion's share of credit goes to Mrs. Childress, without whose patience, prodding and research, it would not have been possible, nor so beautifully done.

Refreshments were served by members of the Woman's League, and arrowhead making was demonstrated by Rick Bachman, an archeologist in the Indian field.

The exhibit should prove invaluable to teachers of all grades. Everyone will find something to catch their interest and improve their knowledge of local history.

## Ozona schools return to UIL Class 2-A

The district realignments released Thursday by the University Interscholastic League brought sweeping changes to West Texas and a welcome change for Ozona.

Ozona will drop from Class 3A to 2A in UIL ratings. The local school system has qualified for the 2A rating for the past two years, but the last time the UIL realigned, the local system was inflated by children of oilfield and oilfield related workers. When the "bust" came shortly after realignment, the Ozona school system lost numbers of students but had no recourse except to compete with schools almost twice its size.

Ozona will compete for the next two years in District 6-2A with Reagan County, Eldorado, Forsan, Rankin and Stanton. Sports fans are especially happy with the realignments as Ozona athletes will be competing with some teams of equivalent size. Also distances to various sporting events will be considerably shorter.

## Immunization clinic is tomorrow

A free immunization clinic will be held Thursday, Feb. 6, at the Ozona Civic Center, sponsored by the Texas Department of Health.

Clinic hours are from 10 a.m. until noon and from 1 p.m. until 3 p.m.

Immunizations provided will be DPT, polio, measles, mumps and rubella, TD and Tuberculosis skin tests.

## County field gains two wells

The Weger (San Andres oil) field of Crockett County gained two producers with completion of two projects by S.P. Ventures, Midland. Both are located in 1-GC&SF, Abst. 4341, 25 miles northwest of Ozona.

The No. 1 Myers Estate was finaled to pump 17 barrels of 32 gravity oil, plus 40 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 435-1.

Production was through perforations at 2,208-340 feet, which had been acidized with 2,500 gallons and fractured with 40,000 gallons and 45,000 pounds of sand.

The following tops were picked on ground elevation of 2,552 feet: Rustler, 993 feet; Yates, 1,278 feet; Seven Rivers, 1,408 feet; Queen, 1,767 feet; and Grayburg, 2,132 feet.

Drilled to 2,500 feet (kelly bushing), where 4 1/2-inch casing was set, it was

plugged back to 2,488 feet. Location is 1,761 feet from the south and 330 feet from the east lines.

The No. 2 Myers Estate was finaled to pump 22 barrels of 32 gravity oil, plus 45 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 386-1.

Production was through perforations at 2,219-352 feet, which had been acidized with 2,500 gallons and fractured with 40,000 gallons and 45,000 pounds of sand.

The following tops were picked on ground elevation of 2,552 feet: Rustler 990 feet; Yates, 1,288 feet; Seven Rivers, 1,420 feet; Queen, 1,785 feet; and Grayburg, 2,146 feet.

Drilled to 2,500 feet (kelly bushing), where 4 1/2-inch casing was set, it was plugged back to 2,482 feet.

Location is 806 feet from the south and 330 feet from the east lines.

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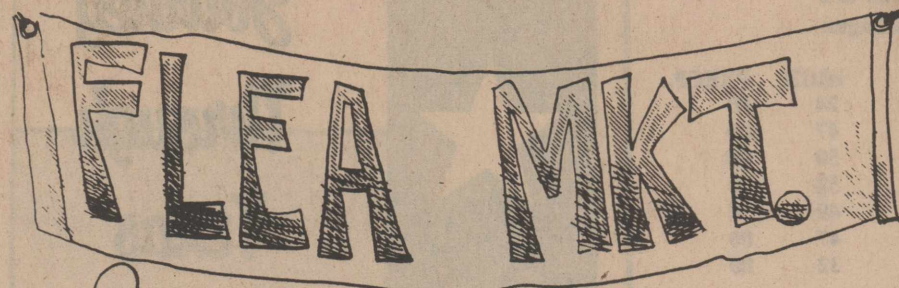
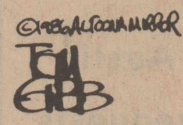

### GIVE QADDAFI HIS WISH

Libya's Hitleresque Muammar Qaddafi recently made a request President Reagan should not ignore. In a two-hour-long speech to several thousand frenzied young followers, Col. Qaddafi offered to train young Arabs in the science of "terrorism and suicide missions."

He said in the speech that the United States was powerless to do anything about Arab terrorism, because the loyal foot-soldiers of fanaticism are prepared to give their lives. "If we decide to die, then America can do nothing," he said.

This is where Col. Qaddafi is wrong. America can do plenty — and it should start immediately. It should start by giving Qaddafi notice that we will grant him his fondest wish the very next time innocent Americans are the victims of Arab terrorism anywhere in the world. We should tell him he will die. No ifs, ands, or buts about it.

We should deliver the same message to Yasser Arafat, the "moderate" murderer who started it all — and now strikes a "not me" pose every time one of his henchmen in the Middle East bombs an airport or marketplace. The PLO chairman now decries such indiscriminate killing — unless, of course, the victims are Israelis. It's still okay to blow them away in the name of Allah.

Like the cancer that it is, terrorism will only end when it is cut out of the world body.

It is no longer good enough for the president of the United States or one of his diplomatic pinstripers to say that the four or five goons who carried out the act can't be positively identified. Therefore, according to Hoyle's Rules of the Game, we can't strike back.

To hell with the rules of the game. The time has come to put Qaddafi and Arafat and all of the octogenarian ayatollahs on notice that we have a list — and they are at the top. If they are willing to die, we ought to help them.

The bureaucrats in Washington are probably correct when they say we have been unable in most cases to identify the people who actually planned or carried out various terrorist attacks. But that doesn't mean we don't know who is responsible. The smell is everywhere.

The time has come for the United States to let the warlords of the desert know that we hold them responsible. If they don't want to be held responsible, then they have to take appropriate action to put an end to the killing.

If they won't do that, we ought to grant Qaddafi and his friends their wish. They have decided to die, he says. The United States should let them all know that we will make sure it happens the very next time an American — any American — falls victim to their bloody game.

With regard to some of our spineless European allies who are complaining about the jobs that would be lost if they impose trade sanctions on Libya, Ronald Reagan should tell them the following: "Since you were unwilling to deal firmly with terrorism on your own shores you leave me with no choice but to issue a travel advisory urging American citizens not to travel on non-essential business to your country." The total loss of jobs from reduced American travel to those countries would probably be ten-times greater than the jobs that would be lost from ending trade relations with Libya.

Too much is at stake to allow this continued caterwauling. If our "allies" are afraid of losing jobs, we ought to give them reason to be really afraid.

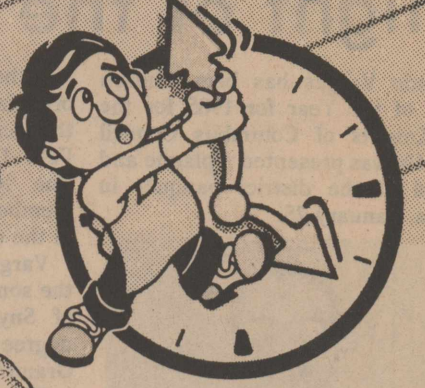

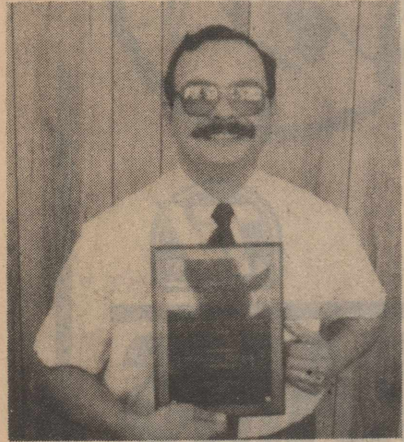

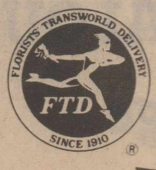

### Tips For Gardeners

From the  
Ozona Garden Club  
by Mrs. Bailey Post

February may be a great time because we get those first breaths of spring that mean gardening is really about to start. You can pick and choose the jobs that mean the most to you in preparation for gardening activity.

Now is a good time to divide ferns, also to start new hanging baskets of ivies, wondering jew, piggy back, trailing coleus and other drooping plants that you want to be heavy and full when you place them outdoors after frost is over.

Try a new idea this year. Plant a mint hanging basket. Take some plain mint or preferably curly mint (for it droops better) from the garden and start it in a moss-lined basket. Not only will the top grow into a fine mint patch, but the underground stems will grow through the moss on the bottom and sides and produce an interesting, as well as practical, basket. Apple mint makes a beautiful plant.

Complete bare-root planting and transplanting this month.

Continue planting balled and bur-

lapped and container grown plants throughout the spring. Fertilize plants, including woody ground covers, as soon as new growth becomes apparent.

Try to finish dormant pruning before new growth begins.

Begin spray program by obtaining spray guides for fruit and nut trees from your county agent. Also, aphids begin to show up on ornamentals. Control with appropriate insecticides.

Any gardener interested in beautiful low-maintenance plants will find an increasing number of native plants available at nurseries. The advantage of the natives is their ability to survive in nature, with no help from man.

If no rain, let me remind you again that your lawns, shrubs and newly planted plants need to be soaked especially when prolonged cold spells are forecast.

Plants shipped by mail-order nurseries in a dormant bare root condition may stand a better chance of recovering from shipment than plants shipped in a growing state.

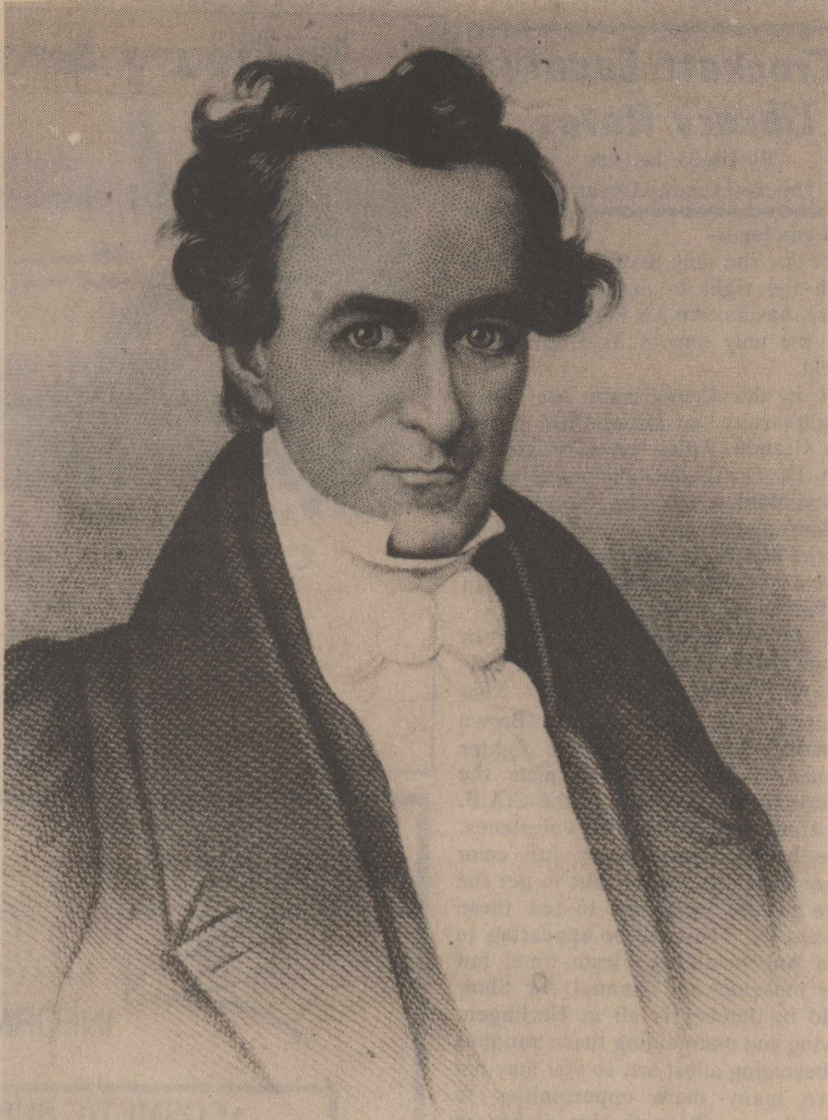

## Journey through Texas Stephen F. Austin requests statehood from Mexico

As the convention at San Felipe de Austin adjourns, Stephen F. Austin glances over the resolutions just approved on this first day of April, 1833. The list of grievances from Texas to Mexico are lengthy, but the most important document just drafted is the proposed state constitution.

Currently, Texas and Coahuila are one state in the Confederacy of Mexico, but Texans are ready for their own state and have drafted the necessary paperwork. Austin, a man of proven loyalty and common sense, has been commissioned to bring this petition and the grievances to Gomez Farias, acting president of Mexico during President Santa Anna's absence.

On April 20, Austin is ready to make the long journey, but before departing he writes Thomas Leaming, a friend and relative in Philadelphia.

"I depart from here early tomorrow for the city of Mexico on the mission to the government asking for admission of Texas into the Mexican confederation as a state separate from Coahuila," he begins. "Should it be refused, I think it will be the greatest error that the Mexican government has ever committed. Texas is now able to sustain a state government and cannot do any longer without one. A refusal will inevitably produce a violent agitation here of some kind."

"A sound policy clearly says that Texas ought to be separated," he continues. "It was only united to (Coahuila) provisionally...with the express condition or promise that so soon as Texas is in a situation to figure as a separate she should inform Congress thereof for its resolution. We are acting under shield of the LAW and with its express sanction in asking for admission into the union as a state and I have no doubt we shall succeed. We have no government now that deserves the name of one and a

refusal to give us one will be bad policy, very bad indeed."

Early in July of 1833 Austin arrives in Mexico City and is cordially received by Farias. The Mexican government, though, is in a state of turmoil. Many months pass and nothing is done with the petition.

By September, Austin still has no word, so again he meets with Farias to "urge the just and constitutional claims of Texas to become a state in the most pressing manner." The visit doesn't go well. Later he writes, "It was my misfortune to offend the high authorities of the nation-my frank and honest exposition of the truth was construed into threats."

On October 2, in an admitted moment of irritation and impatience, Austin writes to those at San Antonio de Bexar recommending "that the people organize as a state de facto without waiting any longer."

Finally, on November 5 there is a breakthrough. Santa Anna returns to Mexico and agrees to meet with Austin. He approves of some requests submitted from San Felipe: repeal of the ban on immigration, better mail service and a modification of the tariff, but he firmly refuses to separate Texas. Texas is far below the 80,000 inhabitants required for statehood, Santa Anna notes, so he firmly refuses to continue the discussion.

Stephen Austin leaves Mexico the following month, but in the Coahuilan capital of Saltillo he is suddenly arrested and escorted back to Mexico. It seems that his letter to San Antonio found its way to a government official and was sent to Farias. Enraged, he ordered the arrest.

Austin is held incommunicado, deprived of books, visits or even courtyard walks. After more than a year, on Christmas Day in 1834, he is released, but by now tensions between Texas and Mexico are critical. In a minor scuffle Texans have taken over the Alamo in San Antonio and Mexico wants it back. War seems imminent.

Response to the Fit For Life Series has been good. An orientation class was held February 4. Anyone who missed the orientation class and is interested in the 12 week course should contact the County Extension Office on or before February 7.

The Crockett Heights Extension Homemaker Club will be meeting February 11, 9:30 a.m. at Goldia Kilgore's home. Members are encouraged to bring their favorite food recipe.

How many times have you allowed an overzealous sales clerk to talk you into buying a shoe that doesn't fit? If your shoe doesn't fit properly, chances are you won't feel like wearing them while exercising.

Before buying any type of exercise shoe, take an assessment of your feet. A higher arch or one foot larger than the other are not unusual. The largest foot should be measured from the heel to longest toe. Width should be measured at the widest point of the foot. All measurements should be taken while standing.

The sole composition and flexibility of an exercise shoe refer to the stiffness of the sole. The sole should allow enough flexibility for foot motion and be constructed of materials that are tough enough to withstand shock, but soft enough to cushion. Waffle tread and ripple sole are better for dirt and grass walking or running, while transverse treads are better for street exercise.

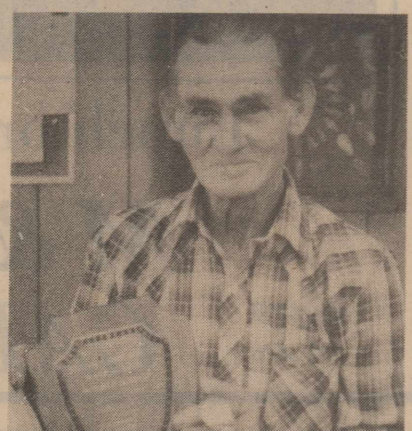
The mid-sole should be constructed of flexible material to absorb shock and allow flexibility. A good balance between flexibility and cushioning minimize risk of lower leg injuries such as shin splints and tendonitis.

The heel is one of the most important construction details of a shoe. It should be constructed of rigid material and add stability to the heel and ankle. A soft heel counter leads to rotational injuries of the lower leg, knee and hip. The heel should fit snugly.

The toe box keeps the upper shoe material away from contact with the toes. It should allow free movement of toes with little friction. A tight toe box may cause corns, black toe-nails, or cramping. The toes should not touch the end of the shoe. Three-fourth of an

inch between toes and top of shoe are recommended.

Other tips for improving your shoe shopping include: shop toward the end of the day when feet are slightly swollen; take along the socks you will be wearing; and walk or run around the store, preferable on a hard surface rather than carpet, to make sure they are comfortable in action.

**Micro-computer workshop held for ranchers**

Thirty-two participants were on hand last week for a two-day micro-computer workshop in ranch management held at the Crockett County Library and sponsored by the Texas Ag. Extension Service.

The workshop was designed to provide ranchers and agribusinessman an opportunity to learn how microcomputers are being used in ranch management.

The session got underway Tuesday afternoon with registration and an introduction by Crockett County Extension Agent Billy Reagor. A physical and financial picture of an average Crockett County ranch was used as an example, with Allan McGinty explaining the potential range improvements for the representative ranch.

Ranch planning and analysis using the microcomputer was explained by Richard Patterson and Jim McGrann, ranch management specialists from Texas A&M.

Phillips Robbins of Fort Stockton and Jeff Sutton told of their experiences in using this valuable tool in their ranching experiences. Following supper, participants had a session on hands on use of ranch management software in 4 topic areas. Hardware and Software selection issues for beginners was also discussed.

The second day's session offered participants the opportunity to select from among several programs. Programs were geared for beginners and for experienced computer users.

They will be appearing in San Angelo during Fiesta time, but the museum and Annual Air Show held in October is all in Harlingen. Flying and maintaining these antiques is becoming a lost art, so you may not have many more opportunities to actually see these fighter planes in glorious action.

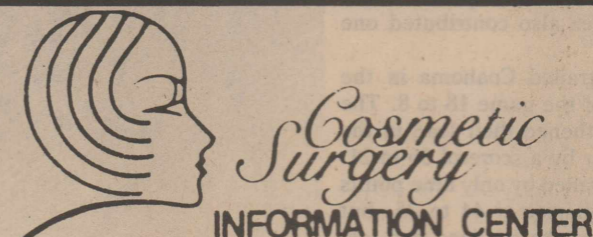

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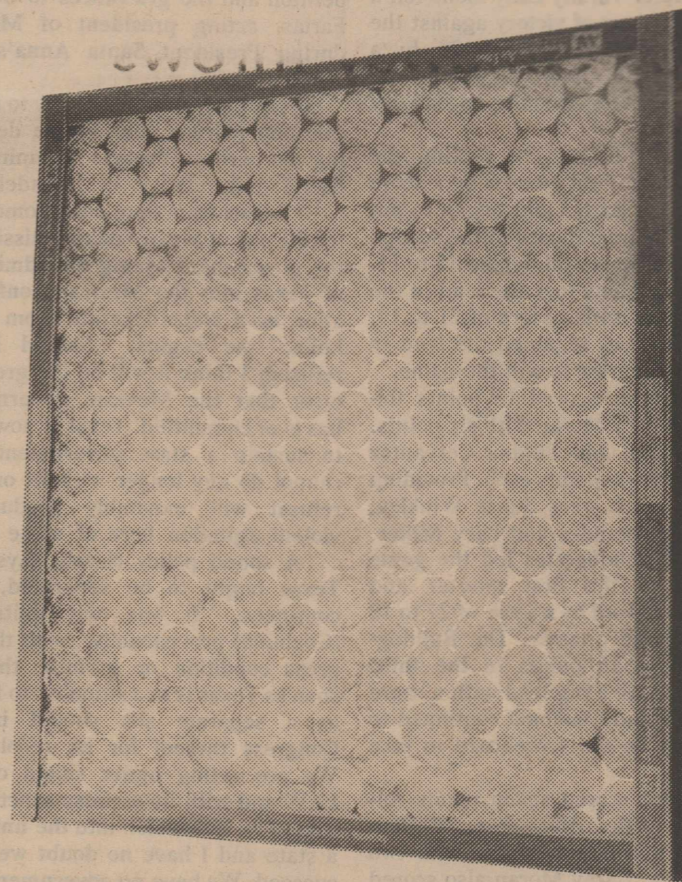

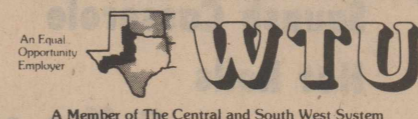

Wars organization.

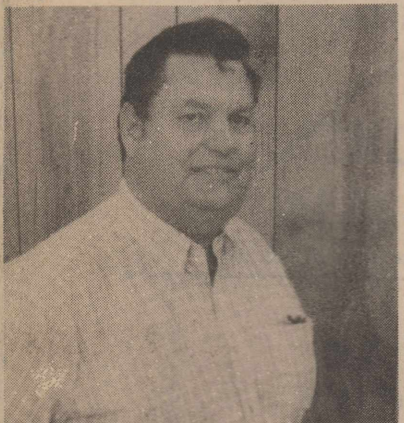
A member of the First Baptist Church, he is an active 4-H Leader, a leader for the Methodist Youth Fellowship and a supporter of the local school system.

Prior to moving to Ozona, Lay owned and operated an oilfield equipment business in Odessa.

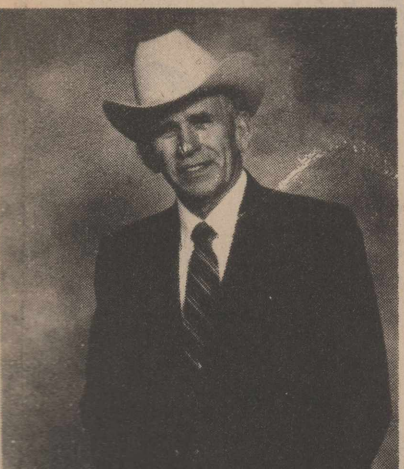
Lay's wife, Mae, is business manager for the Ozona School System, and his daughter, Stacy, is a freshman in Ozona High School.

### Turkey hunt on public land

So you want to go turkey hunting this spring, but you can't afford the high cost of a hunting lease? Well, don't use that as an excuse to go poaching up and down the highway or climbing a fence into someone else's lease, because there is an alternative. Just pick up an application for a public hunt on one of the five Texas Parks & Wildlife Department's wildlife management areas, and mail it in by 5 p.m. on Feb. 24. It'll cost a whole 22 cents for a stamp to apply, and only \$10.00 if you're drawn and show up to hunt. Can't beat that for cheap hunting. And I can assure you that TPWD won't open an area to hunting

unless there's an abundance of that type of wildlife there to hunt.

Hunting will be with shotgun or archery equipment only, and there'll be a one gobbler limit. In case you're new to spring turkey hunting, this is the time of year they're breeding, and with a little practice and a lot of luck you can call up an ole' thunderin' tom for the thrill of a lifetime (as far as hunting's concerned). Just talk to someone who's been!

You can pick up applications at the TPWD office in San Angelo at 3407 S. Chadbourne (by the State Fish Hatchery) or call the toll-free number in Austin, 1-800-792-1112. Be sure to allow enough time for your application to arrive in Austin by Feb. 24. All hunts are scheduled for selected days (to be announced) during the April 12-27 spring turkey season. If you're not drawn this time, you are credited with a preference point for future tries, greatly increasing your chance of being successful with your next application.

The following is a listing of the wildlife management areas, with the number of permits to be issued for each area: James Daughtry WMA, Live Oak and McMullen Counties, 190; Gus Engeling WMA, Anderson County, 90; Gene Howe WMA, Hemp-hill County, 80; Kerr WMA, Kerr County, 90; and Matador WMA, Cottle County, 80.

### Oil and gas completions decrease

The number of gas well completions in Texas was down by just over 16 percent in 1985, while oil well completions dropped by 11.6 percent, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Buddy Temple.

Total gas completions last year reached 4,605, down from 5,489 the previous year. Oil completions totaled 16,543 in 1985 and 18,716 in 1984.

However, the number of oil discoveries increased in 1985 to 686. In 1984, oil discoveries totaled 634. A discovery is an exploratory well that is completed in a previously untapped reservoir.

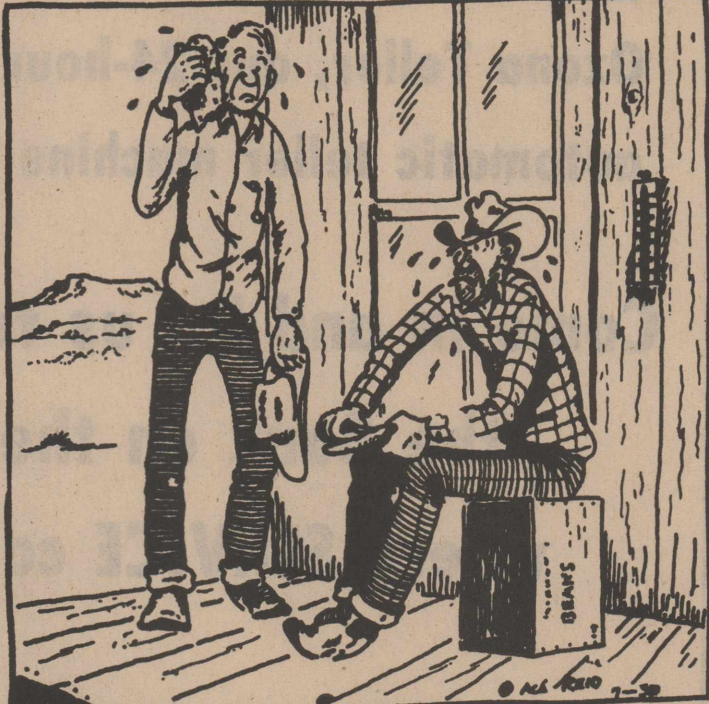
Gas discoveries decreased from 1,377 in 1984 to 1,083 in 1985.

The total number of new holes drilled for oil and gas operations amounted to 25,942 in 1985, a 9.5 percent decrease when compared to the 28,656 in 1984. This total includes wildcats (an exploratory hole drilled in an area previously unproductive of oil and gas), holes drilled in existing fields, service holes, and dry holes.

A total of 5,976 dry holes were drilled last year in Texas. In 1984 there were 6,693.

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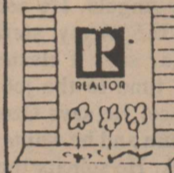
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
