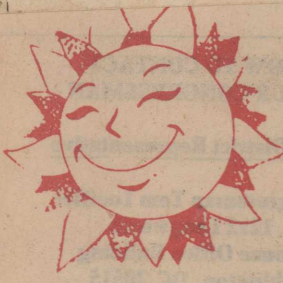

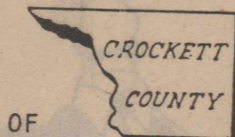

## Narc dog is familiar sight in schools

A familiar sight in the Ozona schools this year is the Contraband Dog, who works for Maximum Security Systems, named "Bo". Bo is 4 years old. He is proficient in searching for and finding all of the major drugs of abuse and alcohol. Bo is very friendly and good with children. He is registered in Austin as a Narcotic Search Animal.

Bo's partner in the drug program is his Handler Trainer, Scharlotta Smith. Scharlotta attended school with Bo in Austin for a time last summer. To enable her to work with Bo in the State of Texas, Scharlotta had to obtain her Private Investigator's License through the Company she works for, MSI.

Scharlotta and Bo work for Maximum Security Systems Inc. out of Austin, Texas. The Company was founded by Ex-FBI Agent, Dan Brainard. Brainard became interested in the drug prevention program and his main goal in finding this company is to help children. We hope, by working dogs in the school systems the young people will use our animals as an excuse not to do drugs. They can say, "I am afraid that if I use drugs the dog will find it."

Scharlotta and Bo visit the Ozona Schools once a week on an unscheduled basis. The element of surprise is always helpful. The pair do scheduled programs for the Primary and the Intermediate schools.

## Oil producer completed

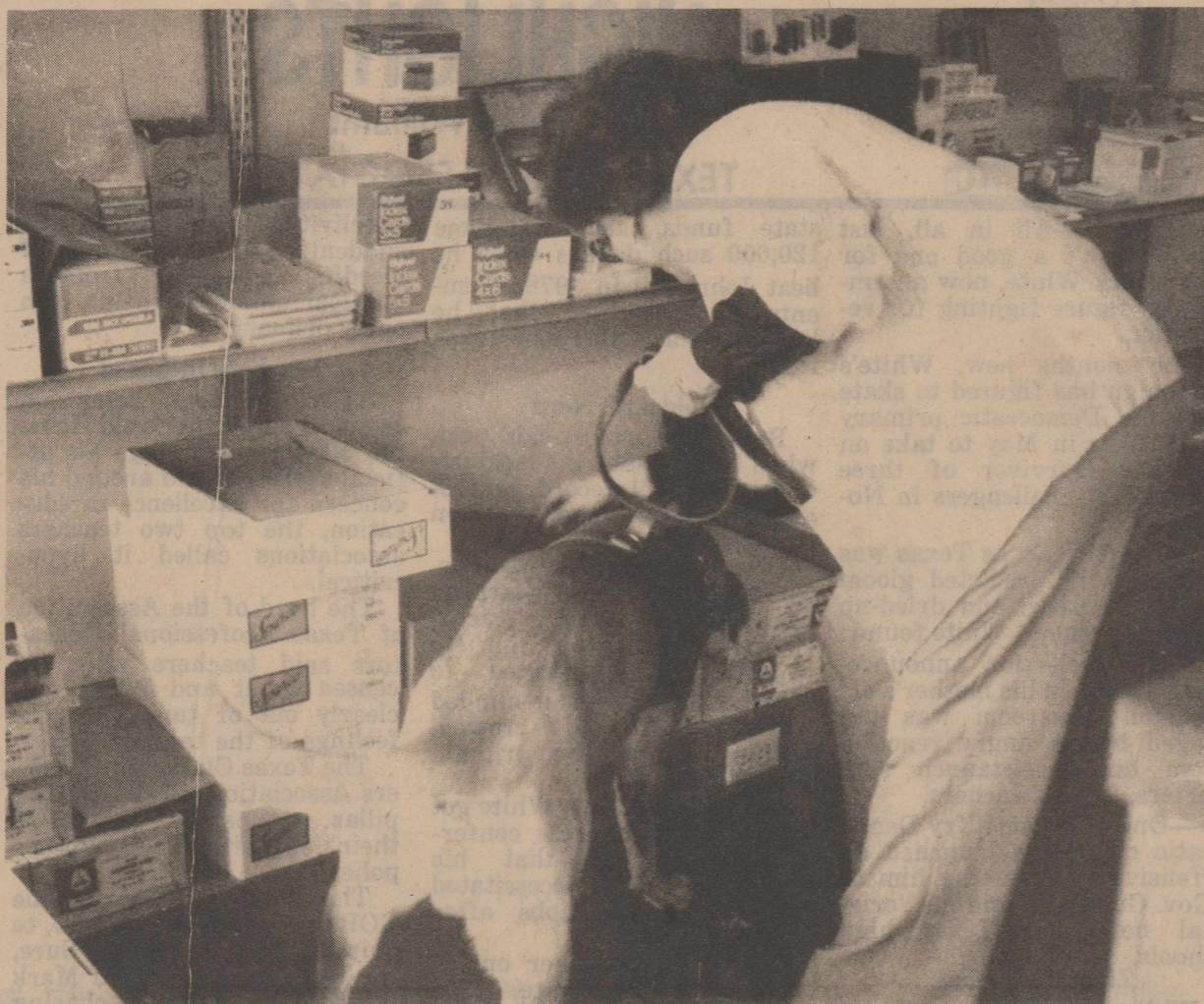
Meridian Oil Inc. (formerly Milestone Petroleum Inc.) completed its No. 15 Troy Williams as an Ellenburger oil producer in the Holt Ranch multipay field of Crockett County, 12 miles north of Ozona, for 184 barrels of 47 gravity oil, no water, with gas-oil ratio of 250-1.

Production was through perforations at 7,906-25 feet, which had been acidized with 1,000 gallons.

The following tops were picked on ground elevation at 2,547 feet: Clearfork, 2,690 feet; Spraberry, 3,890 feet; Canyon sand, 7,710 feet; Strawn lime, 7,820 feet and Ellenburger at 7,890 feet.

Drilled to 8,000 feet, where 4-inch casing was set, it is plugged back to 7,956 feet.

Location is 933 feet from the south and 73 feet from the west lines of 15-OP-GC&SF.

## Court to assist with meals and child welfare

The Crockett County Commissioners Court met Monday with all members present and spent some time discussing what effect the eroded tax base will have on the county budget in future years before agreeing to pay one-fourth the expense of a paid child welfare worker and finance the Meals on Wheels program.

The county has been informed to expect a much lower valuation for tax purposes due to declining gas and oil activity which will have a direct effect on next year's budget.

Kathy Reavis and Alleane Sutton appeared on behalf of the Meals on Wheels program. Mrs. Reavis asked the court for \$3,500 a month to fund the program which is now operating out of the Catholic Church kitchen, as of Monday. They expect to be in a building donated by Mrs. Sutton by the end of this month.

The court refused to commit itself to the monthly stipend, as there is no money in the budget to fund it, except for the \$3,500 originally earmarked to get the program started again.

Mrs. Reavis said the county could apply for a grant from the Department of Human Resources to help fund the project, and there was some discussion on what would be available from the Federal Government after the Gramm-Rudman bill goes into effect.

County Attorney Tom Cameron suggested if the county must fund the program, it should be done out of the hospital kitchen, which is underutilized at the present time.

Some discussion followed and in the afternoon session, the court voted to allow \$3,500 for two months and pick up the county's share of any grant which might be forthcoming, not to exceed \$25,000. Also, it was stipulated

that those who can pay, must pay for the meals. Several members of the school board and administrators along with school nurse Lu Ingram, came back to the court to ask that the county pick up the tab for one-fourth the budget for a full time child welfare worker. The group appeared before the court last month, but a decision was deferred due to the absence of the judge. With the exception of Commissioners DeHoyos and Castro, the court seemed reluctant to take on this responsibility. However, when it came to a vote, the proposition passed with Commissioner Stuart casting the deciding vote. The worker will be funded one-half by the State, and one-fourth by the county and by the school.

Road Department superintendent Eddie Moore gave his report and turned over 133 applications for the three job openings at the county barn. This brought some comment by the court on the state of the economy and the number of workers out of jobs due to the oil and gas decline.

Some discussion was held on the upcoming paving project, with each commissioner being allowed three miles in his precinct. Judge Fields asked that each commissioner submit details on paving at the next meeting. County roads were discussed and Moore was asked to check with the commissioner before doing work in his precinct.

Border Patrolman Bob Bolinger presented a plan for a Border Patrol Station to be placed next to the Department of Public Safety on county property. The 16 x 68 foot building would be the property of the federal government and the land would be leased by the county. The court agreed to look at available property and lease it to the government for \$1 a year with

## Distribute stock for range management

One of the prime objectives of a range management program is to distribute livestock as well as possible over an entire pasture and obtain uniform grazing of the vegetation. The problem is that livestock prefer to graze the easy more accessible areas close to water and on flatter slopes. Unless forced to do otherwise, they will continue to graze the preferred areas. Such grazing patterns unless corrected will result in portions of the pasture being overgrazed and portions being lightly grazed. The local Soil Conservation Service can offer assistance in helping ranchers obtain better livestock grazing distribution.

Several factors influence the way livestock graze a pasture. These include: water location, natural barriers, slope, prevailing wind direction, season of use and salt and mineral locations.

After the livestock distribution in a pasture is analyzed, there are several methods to consider when attempting to change the animal's grazing habits. Grazing systems have an effect by concentrating livestock into large herds and rotating the herds through

two or more pastures tends to improve grazing distribution. In large pastures where there are areas too far from water, the development of a new water supply may improve distribution. New fence construction to help control animal movement will help improve distribution. Small pastures generally improve distribution and separating rugged terrain from gentle terrain will improve use on the steeper slopes. Moving salt and mineral blocks and feeding areas away from water to the back of a pasture will cause animals to increase grazing on lightly used areas of a pasture.

Keep in mind that anything you do in a pasture will have an impact on livestock distribution. The results should be analyzed before applying any range practice to insure that it will produce a positive effect on grazing and will result in more plant and animal production. The local Soil Conservation Service working through the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District can provide technical assistance to ranchers to help them improve their livestock grazing distribution.

He was born August 16, 1924, in Ozona, the son of Thomas Albert and Mayde Kersey Bailey. He attended schools in Iraan and Rocksprings and was a graduate of Rocksprings High School. He was a veteran of World War II, serving with the U. S. Army in Seoul, South Korea.

He was active in ranching and quarter horse circles, serving on the San Angelo Quarter Horse Show Committee. He served on numerous county boards and as Crockett County Round-up Box. He was past commander of VFW Post #6109.

religious classrooms. Cost of construction is estimated at \$75,000. Elliott Barrera and Napoleon Vitela do the honors.



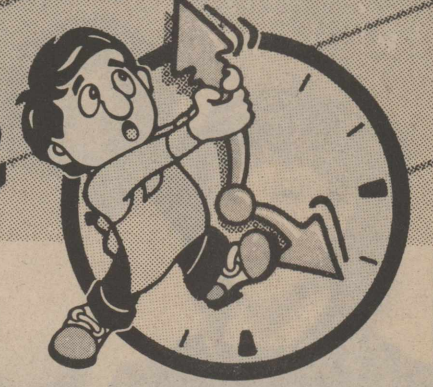

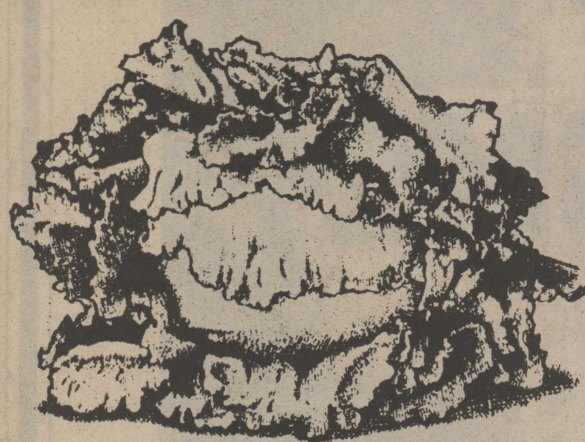

### Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Since most of this month has been cold, foggy and damp, with very little measurable moisture, we still are looking forward to some sunny days. Of course a good soaking rain would be most welcome then maybe sunshine would keep us looking forward to beautiful-spring planting days.

Something else you can do to pass the time is visit good private and botanic gardens and nurseries and see what looks best at this low ebb time. Any trees that reveal attractive twigs or bark, fruits that have remained through winter, or evergreen foliage that still looks healthy might be worthy choices for your own garden.

A guide to pruning, flowering and evergreen shrubs may be helpful. They look their best when allowed to develop in their natural shapes, but require pruning to maintain them in their best form. Dead, diseased or damaged wood should be cut out, and old wood that interferes with new growth, removed. Cut out the oldest and poorest branches all the way to the ground. Other branches may be shortened to a reasonable length to keep the plant from becoming unattractive. Shrubs can be trained to keep their natural shapes by thinning out old branches and pruning back to a bud to control the direction of growth. The new shoot will grow in the direction the bud points. Make a cut on a slant about even with the top of the bud. When removing the entire branch, make the cut flush with the stem. Spring flowering shrubs bloom on wood formed the previous year, so should be pruned after their bloom of last spring.

### Buyers Guide to Beef Roast

Have you ever passed up a good sale on beef roast because you didn't know what to do with that particular cut? Or do you leave off frozen entrees and not know that kind of beef roast to buy for that special dinner for guests?

In either case, a some elementary knowledge of retail cuts will take the mystery out of shopping for a beef roast.

A simple rule of thumb is to remember that cuts from the less-used muscles along the back of the animal--the rib and loin sections--will always be more tender than those from the active muscles such as the shoulder, flank and round.

The most tender cuts are also in greatest demand, so they will typically sell for a higher price.

Meat that carries a USDA Prime label will be the most tender, followed by USDA Choice and USDA Good grades. Some stores use their own grading system rather than USDA grades.

Here is a guide to selecting the standard cuts of beef roasts:

**RIB ROAST**-This cut is unexcelled for tenderness and flavor, ease of preparation, carving and serving. It's a favorite for company dinners and can be oven-roasted.

**RIB-EYE ROAST**- This is the meaty, bonless center of the standing rib roast. The cut has excellent flavor and is superbly tender in the higher grades. It can be oven-roasted.

**RUMP ROAST**-The rump roast is a very flavorful cut, but it's less tender than the rib and it contains a considerable amount of bone. In Choice grade, it can be oven-roasted; in choice or good grades it can be pot roasted. The rump roast is often sold boned and rolled for easier carving.

**SIRLOIN TIP ROAST**-This roast is boneless with very little waste. Despite its name, the cut is not as tender as sirloin steak. It has good flavor and is tender enough to be oven-roasted. The cut is also frequently called loin tip or round tip.

**EYE-OF-ROUND ROAST**-A lean, meaty, less-tender cut, this roast still has good flavor. It may be oven- or pot roasted.

**HEEL OF ROUND ROAST**-Heel of round is a boneless, less-tender roast from the round. This cut contains several muscles of varying tenderness. It should be pot roasted regardless of grade.

**BLADE CHUCK ROAST**-Blade chuck makes an excellent economical roast pot roast.

**SHOULDER ARM ROAST**-Shoulder arm roast contains less bone than the blade chuck, but this cut is less tender. It should be used for pot roast.

**SHOULDER CLOD**-This is a meaty cut from the outside of the chuck. It has a well-developed flavor and no bone. A fairly tender cut, it may oven-roasted or used pot roast.

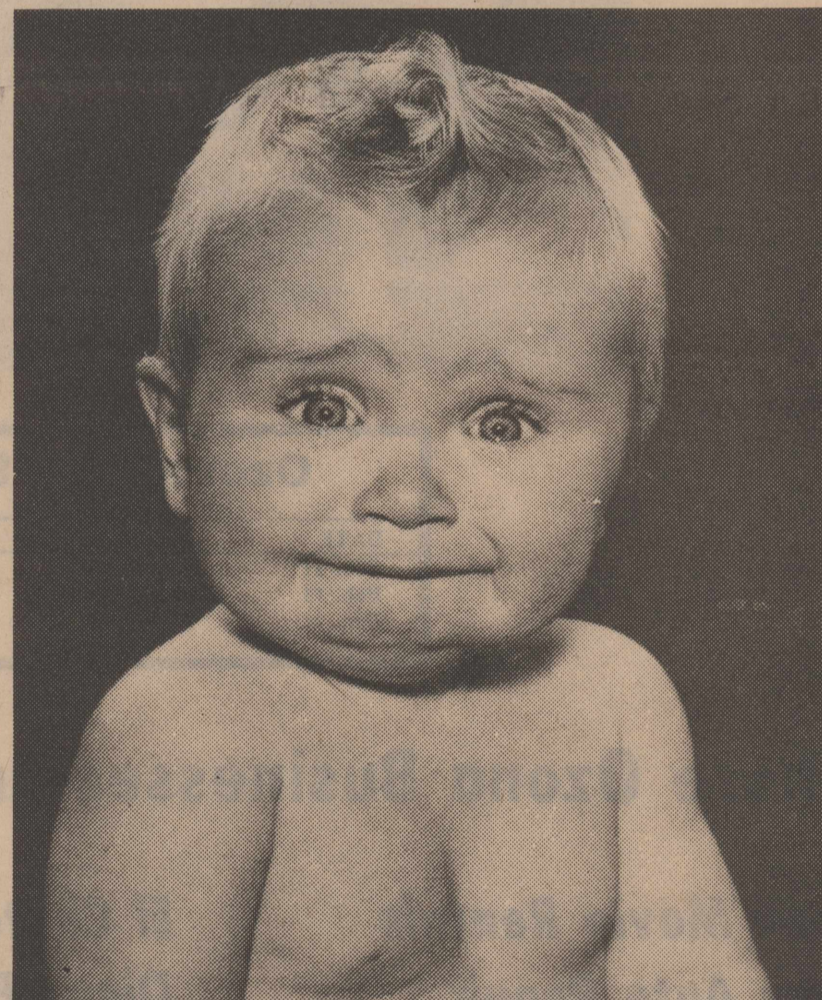



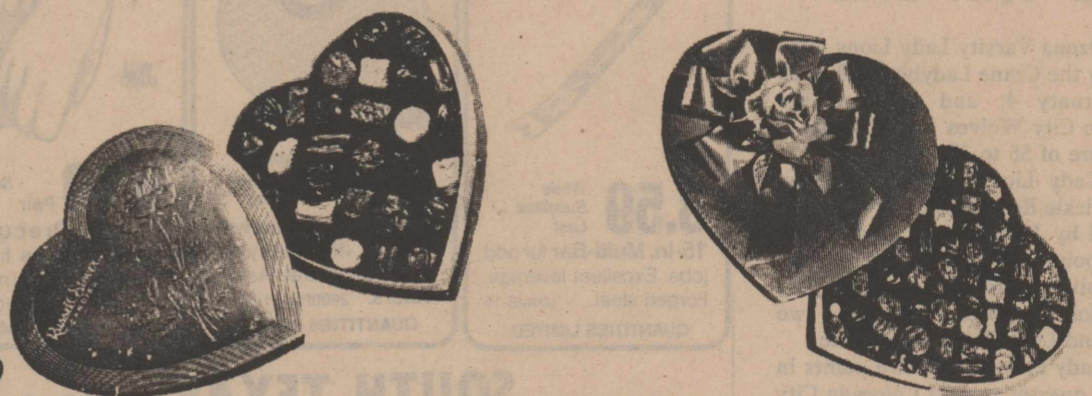

# Napoleon of the West

When President Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna was rudely awakened at gunpoint by General Sam Houston's weary men at the battle of San Jacinto, he was dressed in the finest silk nightgown, surrounded by fine china, silk sheets, silver tea urns and a silk tent. But, he seemed to have a certain respect for the men who died at the Alamo, and he was very complimentary of Houston's treatment of him when he was captured.

This "Napoleon of the West", best known for his slaughter of Texas rebels at the Alamo, is the most loved, hated and feared of any of Mexico's succession of dictators. In his autobiography, written several years ago, Santa Anna repeatedly describes his feelings of "courage" and deep patriotic ideals. He paints a picture of a brave military leader who is repeatedly called to duty by his countrymen.

Besides his numerous terms as president, he waged campaigns in California, lost his foot in a battle with the French, and at one time he conspired to work with the U. S. government.

Now, however, having been once banished, he is all but forgotten. Allowed to live out his last days in Mexico City, he is surrounded by a few friends.

He is quoted as saying, "A hundred years to come my people will not be fit for liberty. They do not know what it is, unenlightened as they are, and under the influence of the Catholic clergy, as despotism is the proper government for them, but there is no reason why it should not be a wise and virtuous one."

Observers note that if Santa Anna's own rule had been virtuous, he might have been president for many years on a continuous basis. Political cartoons show him standing on top of piles of gold, hogging all the wealth for himself.

And some people claim that vices and excesses have been his downfall. It is well-known that he has had numerous affairs with women and is addicted to opium.

Born in 1795 in Jalapa, in the mountains above Vera Cruz, of middle class parents, he started his career as a soldier at the age of 16. He served in Texas under Arrendondo as a lieutenant, where he learned the basics of brutality: no mercy for the vanquished. His ways were to sweep him in and out of power for 50 years hence.

After surviving the revolution against Emperor Iturbide against Guerro, Santa Anna learned another political trick: the rocky road to power in times of instability lies not in devotion to duty but in choosing the right side.

Santa Anna led the army which defeated the Spanish government's last attempt to regain power in Mexico. This gave him the reputation as the "hero of Tampico". In Texas, he was well-liked because of his liberal leanings.

When the cunning politician was finally made president in 1832, he retired to his home in Vera Cruz, though he says he left to quell rebellions. He let his vice-president, Gomez Farias, propose a totally liberal form of government: it restored privileges of the states, the Constitution of 1824 (similar to the U.S.), called for a reduction in power for the military and the Church, and proposed a widespread literacy program for the poor.

The elite and the church rose up against Farias's new proposals, so Santa Anna took his cue to return and take office to "save" the status quo, again winning him hero status. He dissolved the Congress and formed a totally centralized dictatorship with absolute power.

During another of his reigns in 1843-44, he claims there was "no graft," that widowers and pensioners and state employees were paid on time, and the nation's first railroad was started.

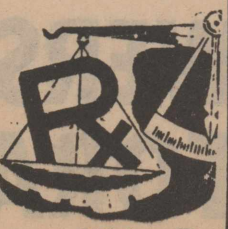
