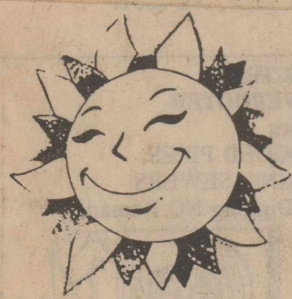

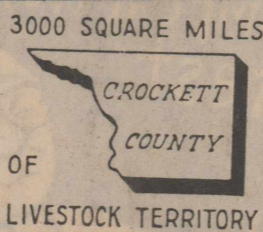

T. J. Bailey services held here Friday

Funeral services for T. J. Bailey, 84, were held Friday at 3 p.m. at First Baptist Church. Burial followed in Cedar Hill Cemetery.

Mr. Bailey died Wed. March 5, in Shannon West Texas Memorial Hospital in San Angelo.

He was born March 22, 1901, in Harkeyville. He married Jewel Roach June 25, 1929, in Eldorado. They moved to Ozona from Abilene in 1944. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Ozona.

Mr. Bailey was an avid competitor in all sports. He attended Hardin Simmons University where he excelled in football and baseball. He was offered a professional baseball contract in 1928, but declined in favor of remaining in West Texas. He formed a company softball team after joining West Texas Utilities in 1926. The team won the State Softball championship. He was also an avid golfer, winning many tournament championships throughout West Texas. He retired from WTU in 1966. At the time of his death he was engaged in ranching in Schleicher County, where he and his wife had restored an historic ranch house.

When not spending time in their home in Ozona, or the Bailey Barn near Eldorado, the couple traveled extensively throughout the world. His hobby was bridge.

Survivors include his wife, Jewel, of Eldorado and Ozona; one daughter, Martha Bailey Henderson of San Antonio; one son, Joe Allen Bailey of Houston; one brother, Marshall Bailey of Abilene, and three grand children.

The family requests memorials be sent to the Robin Jones Memorial Scholarship Fund.

Controversy sparks commissioners meet.

The Crockett County Commissioners Court met Monday in regular session. The meeting was routine with the exception of some controversy over one commissioner giving some county property away, and the County tax-assessor-collector informing the court this coming season will be one of the worst ever faced due to the erosion of the tax base. Also, Judge A. O. Fields reported he had been informed there would be no federal grant for the Meals on Wheels program.

Precinct 3 Commissioner Jack Williams brought up the matter of Commissioner Stuart giving some crushed rock, which belonged to the county, for use at the Ozona Country Club. B. W. Stuart was out of town at the time a club member went to the county barn and took 23 loads of crushed rock from the yard, according to him, with Stuart's permission.

The rock, used for paving, was given to the county by the University of Texas and was hauled to the county yard by county trucks and employees. When the controversy arose it was determined that such action was illegal. This was determined after consultation with the judge, the county and district attorneys. However, before the district attorney's investigator arrived to look into the matter, officers of the club had replaced the rock, and no charges were filed.

Stuart contended he acted in good faith, and that if he had been in town there would have been no problem. Williams continued to insist that the action was unseemly for a county official and he felt the court should be run strictly according to the law.

Williams went on to remind the court that almost every entity in the state is cutting down, but Crockett County is expanding. Oil and gas, the county's primary tax base, is down, yet, the county continues to buy equipment and hire extra help, he said. He also mentioned unequal expenditures in the four precincts. He said if the county spends a hundred thousand dollars in one precinct, it should spend equal amounts in the other precincts in all fairness.

Williams and Stuart exchanged some words before the judge asked to get on with the meeting.

Some discussion was held on the new addition to the cemetery. Instead of lots, only plots will be sold, and these will be held to one plot per person or two side by side when purchased by husband and wife.

Summer help was discussed and the court voted to pay no overtime to summer help. Members also decided to select the part time help from the some 100 applications already on hand.

Commissioner Castro moved and Commissioner DeHoyos seconded, to raise salaries of the two men moved from the parks department to the road department. The motion carried.

Garland Young, Civic Center director, gave his report. He asked the court to consider a new candy machine for the youth center. The machine presently in use will only charge 36 cents per item and cannot be re-worked.

Bill Boswell, acting hospital administrator, gave the hospital report. He asked permission to purchase new telephone equipment which would save the county around \$70 per month, and a new blood machine for the lab. Both purchases were approved. New hospital board members were appointed to replace three whose terms have expired. Retiring directors are Sandy Stokes, Lloyd Winkley and Orlando Vargas.

Hagelstein services in Ft. Stockton

Funeral services for Ele Chris Hagelstein, 83, of Fort Stockton, were held Monday, March 3, at 11 a.m. in First United Methodist Church in Fort Stockton, with burial in East Hill Cemetery there.

Mr. Hagelstein died Saturday, March 1, in Fort Stockton, following an illness. He was born in San Angelo, June 21, 1902, the son of Chris Hagelstein and Mary Baggett Hagelstein. He married Mary Childress, December 27, 1933, in Ozona.

He was a lifelong rancher in the West Texas area. The Hagelsteins lived in Ozona until moving to Fort Stockton 12 years ago. He was a director of the Fort Stockton Federal Land Bank and a member of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association.

Survivors include his wife of Fort Stockton; one son, Chris Hagelstein, Jr., of Fort Stockton; one brother, Jack Hagelstein of Hobbs, N.M., two grandsons, and a granddaughter.

District authorized to issue bonds

The Crockett County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 received permission from the Texas Water Commission last week to issue and sell \$830,000 in bonds for the new wastewater treatment system, which has been planned for at least the past ten years.

Although permits from the State Water Commission and the Environmental Protection Agency have been issued for the new plant, and the site has been secured, litigation from a party downstream from the site of the new plant has held up construction for almost a year and is still on appeal.

Plans for a new treatment plant were made even before the state condemned the present plant last year and placed in on the worst list of plants to discharge sewage waters early this year.

Voters approved the issuance of the bonds in an election last year to finance construction of a larger wastewater treatment facility, lift station and force main to replace its present facility.

According to information issued by the Harte-Hanks Austin Bureau, a commission staff report said a tax of 23 cents per \$100 valuation should be adequate to retire the debt. Information from the attorney for the district indicated Monday the debt would be retired by rate increases as well as the property tax. The district takes in the town, Crockett Heights, north to Perry Motors and south as far as the cemetery.

The general consensus of opinion is the district does not have enough tax base to retire the debt by taxes alone. According to a commission report, the population of Ozona and the district is 3,700 and is expected to reach 5,040

County Hwy. improvement

About 160 miles of highways in an eleven-county area of West Texas will be improved under a contract approved in February by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

The contract was awarded to Strain Bros., Inc., at their low bid of \$1,587,358.28.

The work will consist of applying a protective seal coat to roadways in Concho, Crockett, Kimble, Kinney, Reagan, Real, Runnels, Schleicher, Sutton, Tom Green and Val Verde counties. In Crockett County, the work will be done on 17.3 miles of Texas Hwy 137 from Hwy 163 to 190.

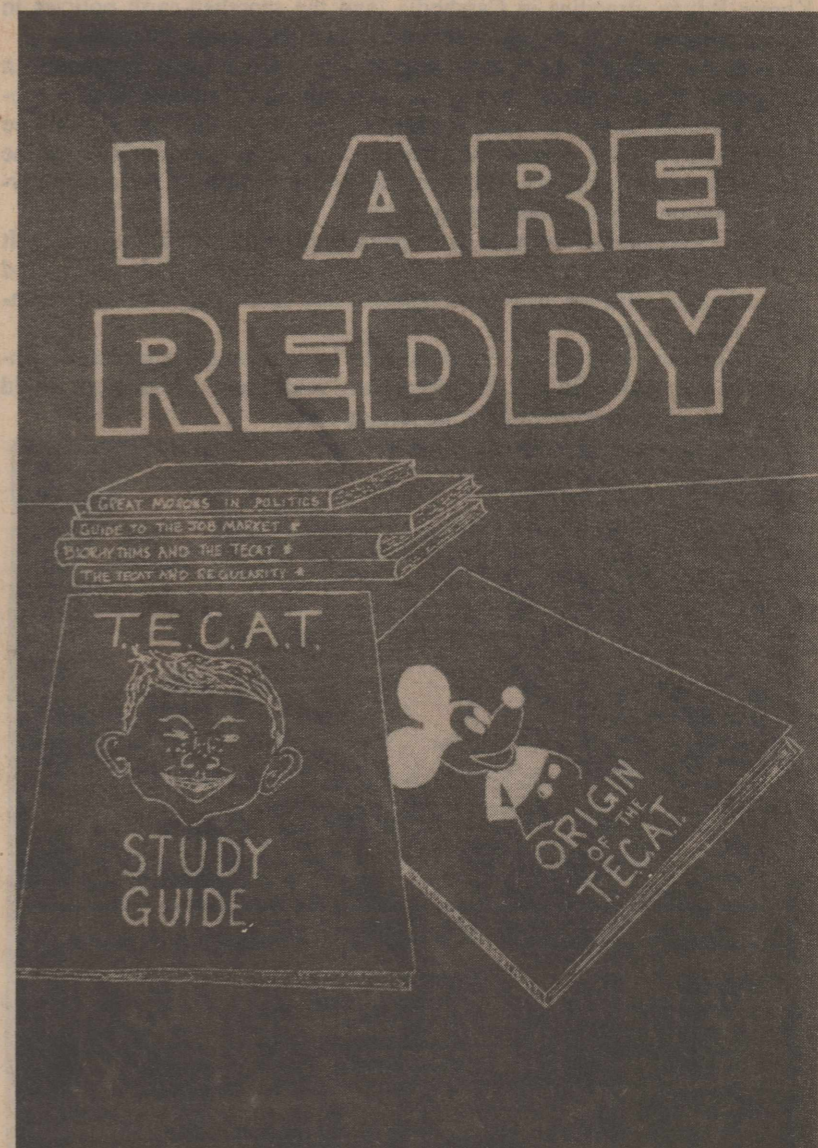
Gene Hirschfeldt, public affairs officer for the highway department in San Angelo, said that seal coating is a method of protecting and improving the surface of highways that provides good preventive maintenance.

The seal coat process consists of spreading a layer of liquid asphalt on the roadway surface, followed by a coating of fine rock chips which sink into the asphalt. The operation seals the surface to retard the formation of potholes, and provides smoother, safer traffic lanes for motorists.

Dan Gower of San Angelo is the highway department engineer who will supervise the work.

ANOTHER HOLOCAUST

Although we said "never again" after World War II, reports indicate that another holocaust is taking place—this time in Ethiopia.

Under the Ethiopian government's year-old "relocation" program, more than 100,000 Ethiopians are believed to have perished. They weren't gassed or exterminated in ovens. The methods were more devious than that. But the results have been the same.

In a recent letter to *The Times* of London, Julian Amery, a British member of Parliament, wrote: "Of human rights violations in Ethiopia the most infamous is the resettlement programme whereby Soviet aircraft are forcibly moving thousands of Eritreans and Tigreans to inhospitable regions."

According to eyewitness accounts, Ethiopian villagers are being rounded up by the country's military, often without warning, and being held in collection camps until they can be transported to official "resettlement" areas. Harvested crops are being destroyed and livestock abandoned. Tens of thousands of the refugees, already weakened by famine and war, have died.

To make matters worse, say officials of *Medicins Sans Frontiers*, a voluntary French relief agency, Western aid efforts may now be hastening the death march. The French humanitarian organization was expelled from Ethiopia, according to Julian Amery, for predicting that 400,000 deaths would result from this program.

In addition to grain and other foods the West has been providing the Ethiopian government heavy trucks to move the food into famine areas. The trucks are not being used to transport the food. And the food is not being used to feed the hungry. Instead, the trucks are being used in the politically motivated relocation program. And the grain is often left to rot in ports or taken from famine areas and sent to camps in southern Ethiopia.

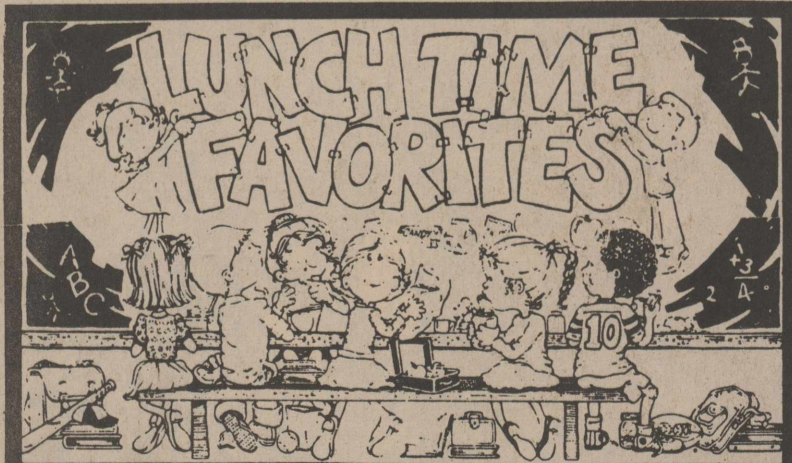
The Ethiopian government claims that the massive plan to move more than 300,000 families from northern Ethiopia to the southwestern part of the country is the best way to help the people in famine-stricken areas. In reality, the program has nothing to do with fighting hunger—it's simply the Ethiopian regime's strategy for depopulating the northern areas, which are dominated by anti-Communist rebels.

Sadly, the world community's silence is reminiscent of the initial reaction to other twentieth-century genocides—the Nazi mass murders, the Khmer Rouge atrocities in Cambodia, and the scorched-earth policies in Soviet-occupied Afghanistan, where death and destruction continues.

And the United Nations isn't helping a bit. While many humanitarian organizations have refused to participate in the so-called resettlement program, the U.N.'s World Food Program and the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) defend the program and have even denied—in the face of gruesome evidence to the contrary—that thousands have died during the compulsory resettlement operations.

The Ethiopian government isn't helping people, it is killing them. It is killing them because they have been labeled enemies of the state. And it is doing so with the help of equipment and funds supplied by international aid agencies.

At the very least, relief efforts should be temporarily suspended. Unless steps are taken to end the genocidal "relocation" program, it could end up claiming more lives than the famine itself.

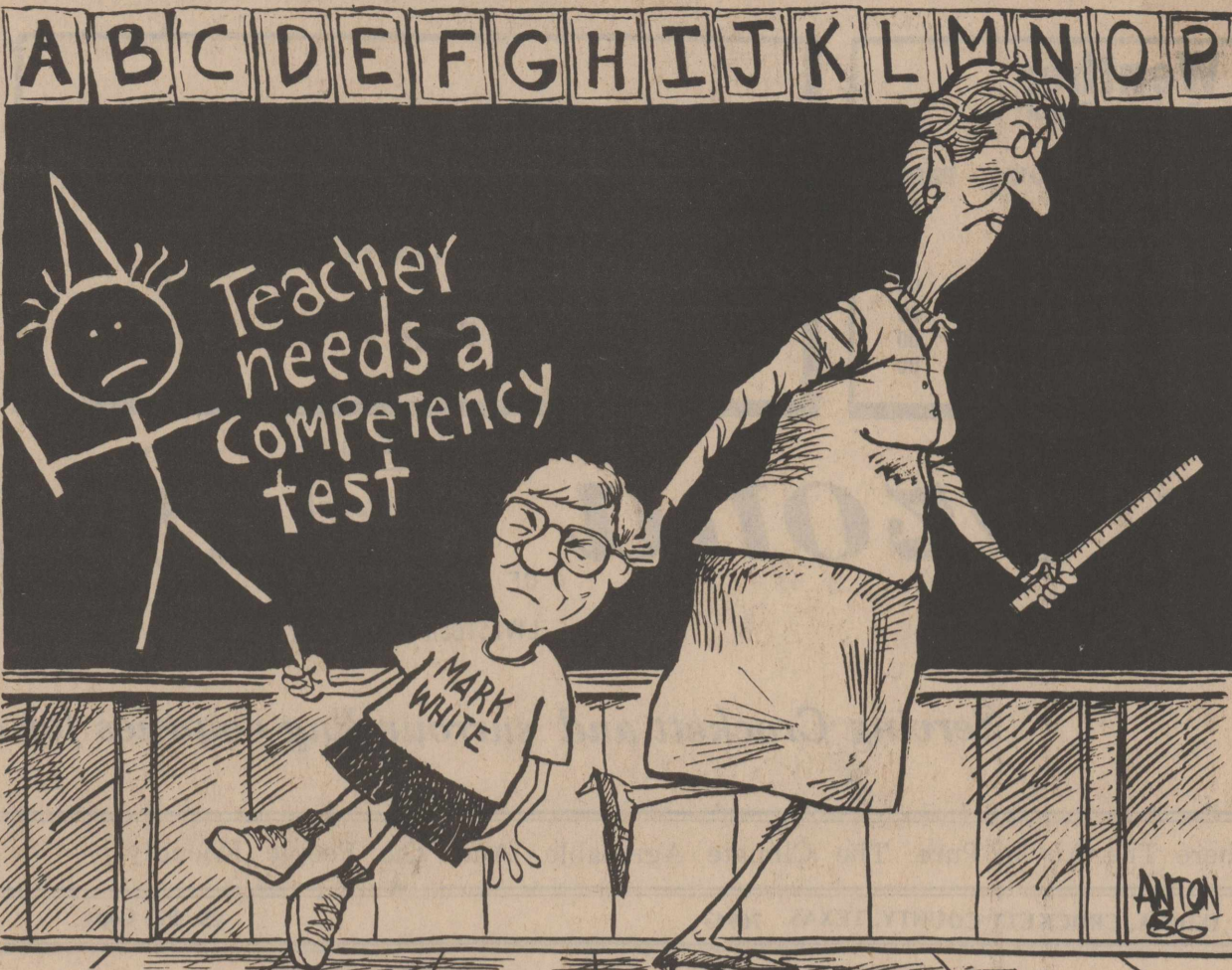

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—The Governor's race is heating up, especially in the Democratic primary, and a fire of unknown determination damaged part of the Texas Supreme Court Building last week, but the heat slacked off the budget crisis for the first time in weeks.

Funds from two sources were moved closer to help state government make up a projected \$1.3 billion shortfall.

The U.S. House of Representatives passed legislation to split oil and gas revenues by the feds and coastal states, with about \$424 million in offshore oil dollars marked for Texas immediately. The Senate is expected to concur.

And Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox said Texas may be able to use almost \$157 million in refunds from Exxon Corp. collected last week for pricing violations.

Meanwhile, the Texas House cut 19 percent and the Texas Senate 13 percent from their budgets, totalling \$11 million in savings.

Briscoe and White

The governor's debate that wasn't going to be... is now on. Governor Mark White made it official at his press conference, but not the way he would have liked.

His chief Democratic primary opponent, Andrew Briscoe, went to the Capitol press conference and reporters quietened down to let him personally ask the question, "When are you going to debate, Mr. White?"

An angry, tight-lipped White told Briscoe he would show up at the League of Women Voters televised debate.

Runoff Ahead?

Since White declined the debate invitation a few weeks ago, both Briscoe and Don Crowder have been accusing White of ducking, and Democratic Party insiders say the gap is apparently closing between them and White. A runoff is in range.

Briscoe, sparked by fire-brand grassroots organizer Kent Olson, is thought by most to be gaining support. Crowder wages an even heavier campaign war.

Last week he accused party chairman Bob Slagle of showing favoritism to White, which Slagle denied.

Crowder also accused White of under-handed tactics: hiring a law firm to "snoop around" in Crowder's business and making other political threats to keep him out of the campaign.

GOP Race Heating

The Republican race is heating, too, and no one really believes that the "speak no evil of fellow Republicans" pact is still intact.

Kent Hance is running television ads criticizing both his opponents, but stops short of naming them. He implies that Tom Loeffler is too inexperienced and Bill Clements is too old.

Hance last week also said publicly for the first time that he endorsed liberal Democrat Lloyd Doggett in '84 because of party pressure, which was why he switched to the Republican party.

House Investigation

A Texas House committee investigating claims that Texas Supreme Court Justice C. L. Ray gave favored treatment to a San Antonio attorney may subpoena Ray to testify.

Ray was reported as saying he sent word he would sign statements in exchange for not being subpoenaed.

The committee chairman, San Antonio Rep. Frank Tejeda, aims at keeping the hearing public. Tejeda is involved in a state Senate race with Rep. Tommy Adkisson.

Teacher Testing

A state district judge last week refused to halt the teacher literacy test expected to go ahead as planned this week.

More than 200,000 Texas teachers are expected to take the test, and a good many of them are angry at the idea. The Texas Education Agency estimates about 10,000 will fail the basic skills exam.

Capitol watchers are wondering whether angry teachers, who carried White to the Governor's Mansion in '82, will defect to either Briscoe or Crowder and force White into a primary runoff or defeat Briscoe and Crowder have been getting lots of cheers wherever and whenever teachers meet this days.

Short Takes

The Railroad Commission voted Jim Nugent as chairman, replacing retiring Buddy Temple at the gavel. Temple's aide, Clark Jobe, was appointed as the third member.

The new Goddess of Liberty statue is scheduled to be placed on top of the Capitol at the end of May. Delays in casting the replica of the old, deteriorating statue and brisk March winds have caused Capitol architects to wait until then.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club
by Mrs. Bailey Post

A welcome sight in Ozona these past weeks are the graceful branches of the fruit and red bud trees in flower. Now we hope the fruit will not be killed by a late freeze. Divide crowded shasta daisies now for a good show under most growing conditions in our area. Usually two-year-old clumps become so crowded they need dividing. When separated one clump may yield about 20 new plants. Each should contain some feeder rootlets and foliage which is an attractive dark green. They perform especially well in perennial borders, and also make long lasting cut flowers. Depending on the variety, flowers may have one or more rows of petals and range in size from 2 to 6 inches across. I have been asked what to do with your Christmas poinsettia that is beginning to lose its leaves. Cut the plant back to 3 or 4 inches, remove it from the pot, and plant outside in an open spot as soon as danger of frost is over. Water and feed frequently to encourage new growth. As new growth begins, pinch periodically to

keep the plant dense. Let it stay out until the first of October and be sure the plant gets at least 12 hours of darkness each night for about 8 weeks. What do you do with gift mums? They can be pruned, watered, separated, and planted outdoors, but better results can be obtained by rooting cuttings. Remove faded flowers. Take 3 to 4 inch cuttings of the upper part of each stem, discarding the bottom portion. Remove leaves from bottom of each cutting and dip end in rooting hormone. Stick cutting in damp sand in a plastic bag. Seal bag to keep the humidity high. Roots should develop in about two weeks. Either plant them outdoors or pot them in containers for use as portable color. Feed the plants every 2 to 4 weeks with a liquid fertilizer, and water regularly to keep them growing well. Discontinue feeding only when color begins to show in the flowerbuds in the fall. Control insects, weeds and diseases in the garden. Aphids will be showing up on plants, especially iris.


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

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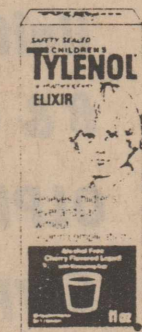

Hospital board has busy, varied agenda

The Crockett County Hospital Board met in regular session March 6, 1986.

Members present were Fred Deaton, Lloyd Winkley, Sandy Stokes, Maria DeLaRosa, and Alleane Jones.

Others attending were Jacquie King, Bill Boswell, Elvira Caldwell, Dr. Owensby, Dr. Carlisle, Lee Carlisle, Annette Munoz, Doug Meador, John L. Henderson and Burl Myers.

The meeting was called to order by President Sandy Stokes. The minutes from the previous meeting were read. There were no additions or corrections and the minutes were approved as read.

In old business, it was reported that the incubator that Don Hopkins had asked about purchasing could not be sold unless it was advertised and bids accepted. It was decided not to sell the incubator.

Mr. Boswell reported that he had checked with the State Health Department concerning the physicals for kitchen employees. There is no set exam required. Mr. Boswell, Dr. Owensby and Dr. Carlisle will meet and set up a standard examination.

Mr. Boswell reported that the installation of a new telephone system would be a substantial savings to the hospital. After a discussion, Fred Deaton made a motion to recommend to the Commissioners that a new telephone system be purchased. Lloyd Winkley seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Mr. Boswell recommended to the Board that the hospital purchase a QBC for the lab. This piece of equipment will do an automatic blood count and in much less time than the old method. After a discussion, a motion was made by Lloyd Winkley to recommend to the Commissioners that the QBC be purchased. Fred Deaton seconded the motion. The motion carried.

In new business, the financial statements for the Hospital and Care Center were given by Bill Boswell. Total cash deposits were \$28,210.14 and total cash disbursements were \$71,276.84, total patient days were 18 and percentage of occupancy was .03 percent. Total cash deposits for the Care Center were \$35,790.94 and total cash disbursements were \$50,105.05.

The bills for the Hospital and Care Center were read. A motion was made by Lloyd Winkley and seconded by Fred Deaton to pay the bills. Motion carried.

Mr. Boswell presented a sick leave policy for employees to the Board. After a discussion a motion was made by Fred Deaton and seconded by Lloyd Winkley to adopt this policy. Motion carried.

A proposal for the creation of a

Multi-Disciplinary Safety Committee was presented to the Board. A discussion was held. Lloyd Winkley made a motion to approve the formation of the Multi-Disciplinary Safety Committee. Maria DeLaRosa seconded the motion. The motion carried.

A copy of the new transfer policy was presented to the Board. A discussion was held. Alleane Jones made a motion to adopt this policy. A second to the motion was made by Fred Deaton. The motion carried.

Mr. Boswell presented the Board with a copy of the state licensure requirements, the development of a major and minor disaster plan, and some proposals for changes in the hospital by-laws. A discussion was held concerning these items. No action was taken.

It was reported that the Child Welfare had inquired about using some office space in the hospital. After a discussion, a motion was made by Fred Deaton and seconded by Lloyd Winkley to offer the space to them if they wanted to use it. The motion carried.

Elvira Caldwell reported that a new fire alarm system is needed for the Care Center. Bids have already been put out.

John L. Henderson and Doug Meador gave the EMT report. Salaries and transfer fees were discussed in detail. It was decided the only salaried position would be that of the Ambulance Coordinator a salary of \$300.00 per month, and raise the out of town transfer fee to \$40 per run. Maria DeLaRosa seconded the motion. The motion carried.

A motion was made by Alleane Jones and seconded by Fred Deaton to recommend to the Commissioners that there be a fund of \$200 per month to be put into a general fund for the Crockett County EMS Organization, and that there be a quarterly report made to the Hospital Board. The motion carried.

The Board went into executive session.

The Board returned to general session.

A motion was made by Sandy Stokes and seconded by Fred Deaton to extend Bill Boswell's term indefinitely until a permanent solution can be reached. The motion carried. The meeting adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

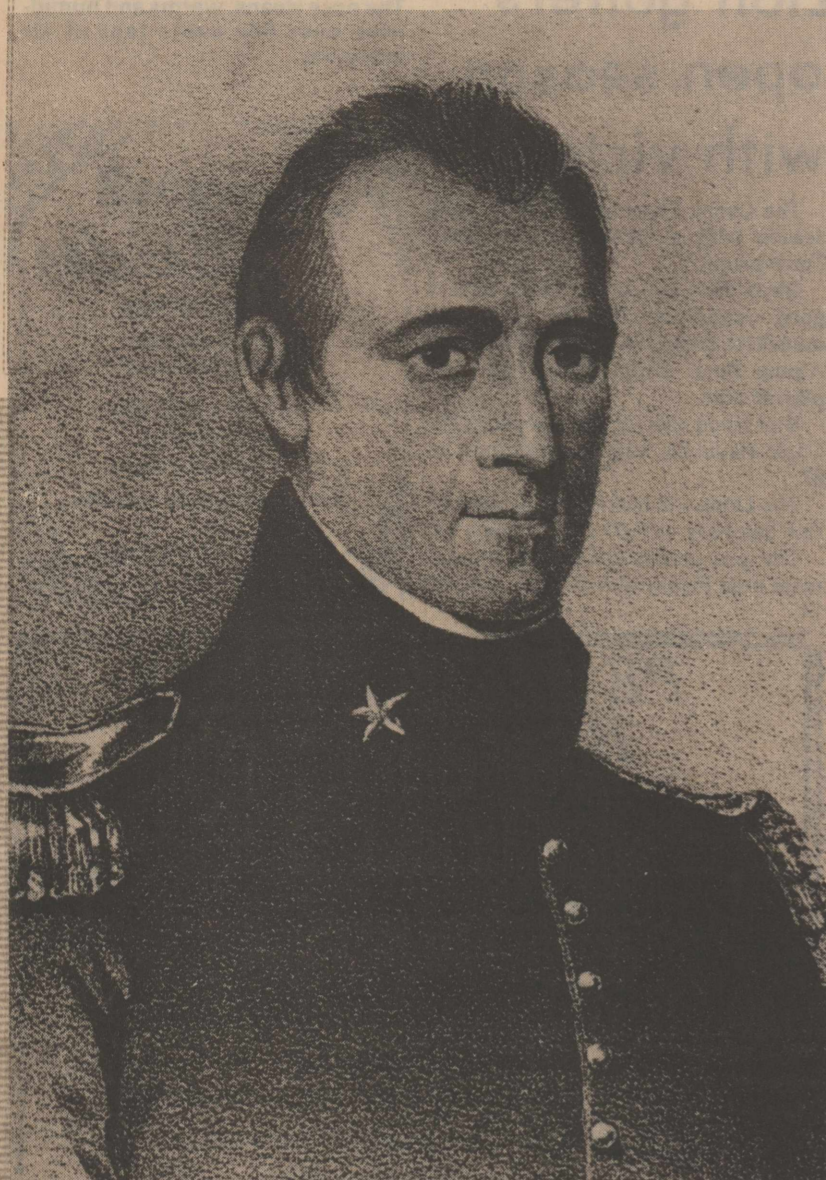

SAM HOUSTON-He's a man with an interesting, if somewhat checkered past, but Sam Houston's heroics at San Jacinto make him the resounding Journey through Texas--

Sam Houston elected President of Republic of Tex.

Many people in this crowd have tears in their eyes. That was quite a moment just now as the hero of the battle of San Jacinto, General Sam Houston, presented his sword. "I have worn it with some humble pretensions in defense of my country," he said with deep emotion, "and should the danger of my country again call for my services, I expect to resume it and respond to that call, if needful, with my blood and life."

Today, October 22, 1836, with that salute, the finale of his inaugural address, General Houston begins his two-year term as the first president of the Republic of Texas here in the capital city of Columbia. He has only recently returned from New Orleans where he had been recovering from serious wounds suffered at San Jacinto (the crucial victory in our long war for independence from Mexico). The General has been elected by an overwhelming majority of 5,119 votes out of 6,640 votes cast.

The people here listening to this address feel much like the soldiers at San Jacinto did just six months ago, when, after their victory, the wounded General pulled from his pocket an ear of partially chewed corn--his only food for the last four days. He instructed his men to divide the kernels amongst themselves to take back to their lands to be planted. One who was there reports that the General exhorted them to be as fine farmers as they had been soldiers. There is no doubt that Houston is a leader of men--a quality sorely needed in this new, wild, fractious frontier republic.

Even before he came to Texas, Houston had a life most men would envy. As a young man he ran away to live with the Cherokee Indians, preferring the freedom of the red man to a farmer's lot. Adopted by a chief and named Sam Co-lon-neh, meaning the Raven, he learned the language and folklore of the Indians. Indeed, some people grumble that Houston's sym-

pathies lie too much with the Indians, as he spent many years before coming here championing their causes as their representative to Washington.

But Houston's most valuable friendship has been that with President Andrew Jackson, who was his commanding general in the War of 1812. He got himself elected to Congress from Tennessee, and then became the state's governor in 1827 because of his loyalty to Old Hickory.

But, as with many a great man, it's woman-trouble that early defeated Houston. His young wife left him only a few months after marriage and the resultant scandal forced him to resign as governor. He went back to the Indians, but his personal fortunes suck lower and lower until even the Cherokees made fun of Houston: gossip said they gave him a new Indian name meaning "Old Drunk".

But instead of being down and out, Houston headed here to Texas, arriving just four years ago. Some say he came to help secure this land for Jackson and the United States. Indeed, his reputation preceded him to Texas and because of this and his friendship with Jackson, he became a leader in the fight for independence, emerging as the natural one to lead Texas' army and win our freedom from Mexico.

The Republic has no economy, no banks, no money--just a group of 40,000 optimistic settlers--mostly farmers--in this huge, wild land. But we're hopeful, if nothing else. As the General-now-President said today: "As yet our course is onward. We are only in the outset of the campaign of liberty. Futurity has locked up the destiny which awaits our people."

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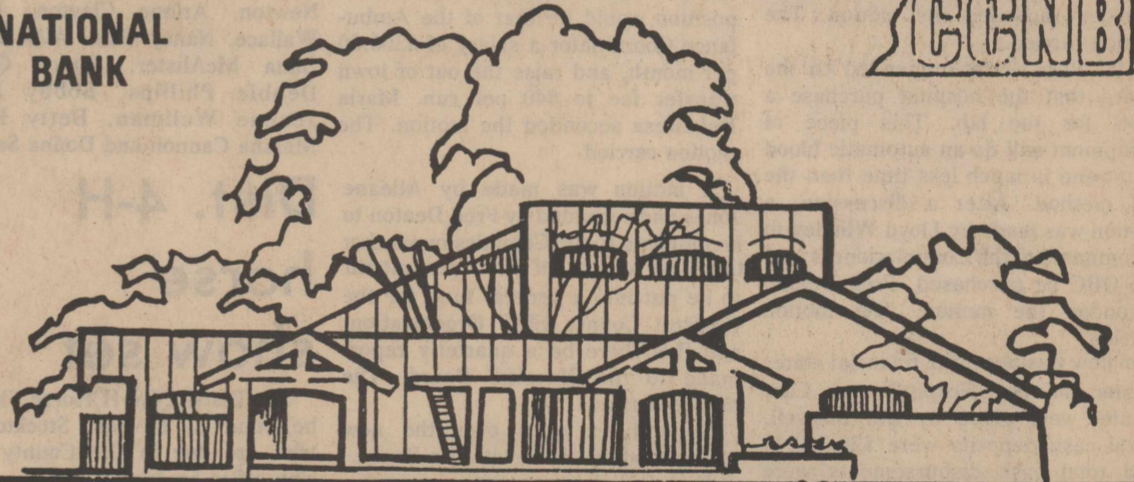
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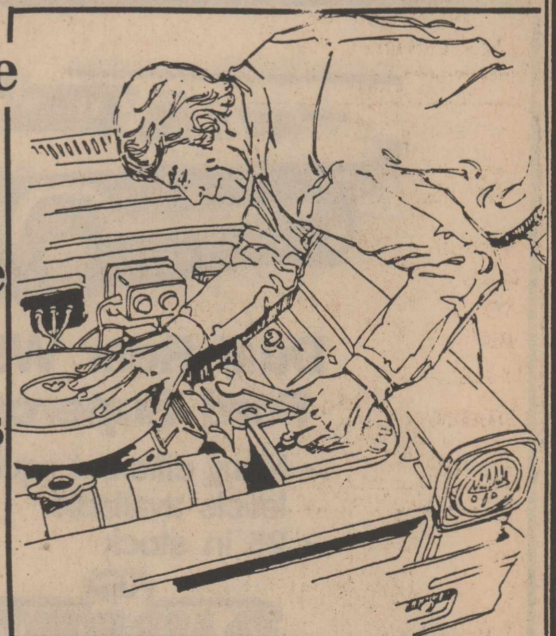
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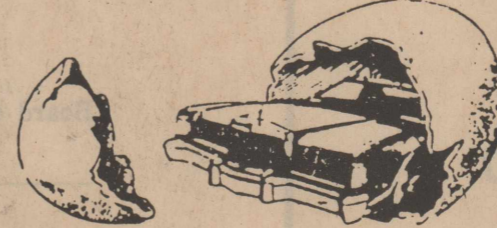

The Better Business Bureau has received numerous complaints against the IHS Department of Unclaimed Funds and Benefits Company which is distributing the letters. The company is a division of the Suarez Corporation located at 4626 Cleveland Avenue North, Canton, Ohio.

Although the letters appear to be offering the consumer a chance to claim money and benefits in his or her name, what is actually being offered is a chance to purchase "Unclaimed Funds, Merchandise, and Benefits Documentation." This document proceeds to show the recipient how to determine if he or she is owed any "unclaimed funds or benefits." The consumer must make separate application for the unclaimed funds or benefits. The company does not guarantee that you are eligible for those funds, only that you will get "the opportunity to...determine...eligibility to such money, merchandise, or benefits." IHS Department of Unclaimed Funds is not holding unclaimed funds for an individual, nor does it know if anyone in particular is entitled to any unclaimed money.
