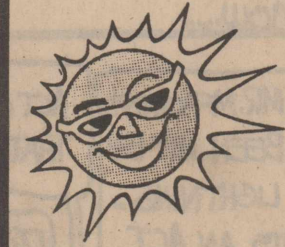

Funeral service for Joe B. Couch pend

Funeral services for Joe B. Couch were pending at Sizemore Funeral Home here at press time. Mr. Couch died at 12:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 1, in St. John's Hospital in San Angelo, where he had been in the intensive care unit since Friday.

Joseph Broome Couch was born in Sheffield, Sept. 9, 1922. Mr. Couch attended Peacock Military Academy in San Antonio, Ozona High School and New Mexico Military Institute at Roswell, N.M. He later attended Sul Ross University at Alpine. He served in the Army Air Force in World War II, after which he ranched in Terrell County, later moving to Crockett County where he lived on the ranch the remainder of his life.

Mr. Couch was active in civic affairs. He was past president of the Crockett County Historical Society and served as chairman of the State Historical Survey Committee. He served on the Crockett County Hospital Board as president. He served on the Civic Center board as chairman when the center was under construction and later after it opened. He was active in 4-H work and served several terms on the Crockett County School Board of trustees, serving as president for several terms before giving up that job a few months ago. He was a member of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church.

Survivors include his wife, Alice, of Ozona; two sons, Mike Couch of A&M and Curtis Couch of New Mexico Military Institute; two daughters, Michelle Phillips and Diana Sallings, both of San Angelo; a sister, Mickey James of San Angelo, and several nieces and nephews.

Westerman services held last week

Funeral services for Cecil Westerman, 83, were held Wednesday at 2 p.m. in Johnson's Funeral Chapel in San Angelo, with burial in Fairmount Cemetery.

Mr. Westerman died at his home in San Angelo, Tuesday, March 25.

He was born January 21, 1903, in Garden City. His early childhood was spent on a ranch outside of Big Spring. He graduated from Danforth Pharmacy School in Fort Worth in 1927, and opened his first drug store in Big Spring in 1932.

Cecil Westerman has enjoyed being a pharmacist for 59 years. He has owned and operated drug stores in Big Spring, Waco, Sonora, Eldorado, Ozona, and San Angelo.

Westerman came here in the early 1970's and opened Westerman Drug with Jimmy Lott as co-owner, at 1000 Ave. E. Some years later they moved to the present location at 916 Ave. E, enlarging the store and adding more inventory.

He was a member of the Texas Pharmaceutical Association, West Texas Pharmaceutical Association and National Association of Retail Druggists for 50 years. A member of the First United Methodist Church, he married Vera Cannon, Nov. 23, 1957, in Sonora.

Survivors include his wife of San Angelo; two daughters, Celia Vykukal of Odessa and Alice Lee of Rocksprings; one son, Robert C. Westerman Jr. of La Jolla, Calif., and three grandchildren.

Williams announces for S-H Legislature

Troy D. Williams has announced he is a candidate for the Silver Haired Legislature, an advisory group created by the last session of the legislature, composed of citizens 60 and older. This Silver Haired Legislature will meet in Austin in September to draft legislation to aid in solving problems which relate to older Texans.

Four persons will be chosen in a special election to represent the Concho Valley Regions, two of these from Tom Green County and two from the other twelve counties included in the region. These counties include Coke, Crockett, Irion, Kimble, Mason, McCulloch, Menard, Reagan, Schleicher and Sutton Counties.

In the special election to be held on Friday, May 30, 1986 only persons 60 and older will be eligible to vote or hold office, of course they must be Texas residents and registered voters.

Troy D. Williams, a native Texan was born in Panola County, near the Sabine River. He lived as a lad in Irion County (Sherwood) before moving to Ozona, in 1931. He has ranched in Crockett County for 48 years, he graduated from Ozona High School in 1934, then started college at the age of 47. He drove to San Angelo College, now Angelo State University from the ranch, 80 miles one way for 4 years, graduating with a BBA Degree in 1967. Williams attended the University of Texas School of Law, was admitted to the State Bar on December 15, 1969 and graduated in February 1970. He is still active in the practice of law, maintaining an office in Ozona.

Williams has served for many years as an Usher and Trustee at First Baptist Church, he also taught a boys [CONTINUED ON PAGE 6]

Auto chase ends in accidents

A wild chase during operation Plain-View II, here Thursday ended in two wrecked vehicles, one serious injury, and three minor injuries.

The accidents occurred after several highway patrolmen participating in Operation Plain-View II, a special traffic enforcement program, attempted to stop a stolen car during a high speed chase on I-10, which began at 4:35 p.m. Thursday just west of Ozona and came to an end about 30 miles west on the Pecos river road.

Texas Highway Patrolman Richard Barton of Ozona, gave chase after the 1982 Camaro, reported stolen by Florida officials March 18, declined to stop after Barton attempted to stop it with siren and emergency lights. The driver accelerated and the chase ensued with speeds up to 110 miles an hour.

Roadblocks were set up, but the driver of the speeding car avoided them by taking aim at officers and

even attempting to strike the rear of a patrol car driven by Trooper Cliff Babbitt.

When the driver of the stolen vehicle swerved toward Trooper Dale Burger, he fired a shotgun at a distance of about 6 feet, striking the car on the passenger side, but to no avail.

The driver of the Camaro turned off I-10 onto a dirt road, the Pecos River Road, lost control and overturned several times. Barton, who was following the stolen car lost control on a curve when visibility was restricted by heavy dust, and his patrol car rolled down a 25-foot embankment. He suffered a minor cut on his forehead and a bruised knee. A fire broke out in the vehicle's engine compartment, but Barton was able to release his safety belt and escape the wreckage. He was treated and released at Crockett County Hospital.

Screening clinic set at Primary School

The Ozona Community Center, in cooperation with the Crockett County Schools and the Education Service Center Region XV, will hold a free screening clinic on April 23 and 24, at the Ozona Primary School. The purpose of the clinic is to try to discover possible problems in the areas of vision, hearing, speech and communication, and physical development.

On Wednesday, April 23, in conjunction with the screening clinic, the Ozona Primary School will hold pre-registration for kindergarteners for the 1986-87 school year. This involves children who will be five on or before September 1, 1986. Parents are required to bring the child's birth certificate and shot records. The child cannot start school without the birth certificate to verify the child's birthday.

Also, on Wednesday, April 23, the Public Health Nurse will hold a free shot clinic at the Ozona Primary School. This will be a good opportunity to up-date the child's shot records prior to starting school in the fall.

Children who will be four on or before September 1, can be brought to the Ozona Primary School on Thursday, April 24, for their screening

process. They will be checked in all the areas the five year olds are checked.

This is a community wide project which has proven to be beneficial to the school system and the children of Ozona. It will involve approximately two hours of the parent's time and will help them see how well their child is growing. The clinic will also help the parents see what they can do to get their child ready for school.

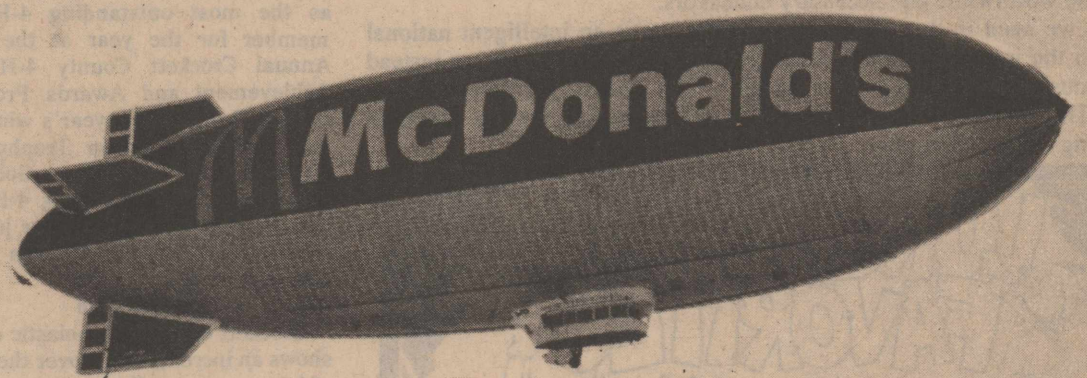
The schedule for the screening clinic will be as follows:

GUNS VERSUS BUTTER

It's an absolute disgrace the way America's news media report on the federal budget.

With a few notable exceptions—economics columnist Warren T. Brookes of *The Detroit News*, for example, who is listed in Jude Wanniski's 1986 "Media Guide" as the best in the business ("Almost every column sparkles with fresh analysis wrapped around a new insight on the budget-tax-spending-trade-money-aid stew bubbling in Washington," says the "Guide," giving Brookes a rare four-star rating)—the battle of the budget still is reported in the same simplistic terms as it was during the Vietnam era: guns versus butter.

Even an above-average reader of a better-than-average newspaper comes away with the gut feeling that the budget has just three basic components: Social Security, the great untouchable; social welfare programs, which the Reagan administration has been trimming with a dulled meat-axe; and the Trillion-Dollar-Plus Defense Buildup, which is pictured as nuclear overkill missiles, \$500 toilet seats, and gold-plated hammers.

Lost in the deliberately false imagery is the fact that the federal budget is a collection of thousands of different programs and line items: some good, some bad, very few cheap.

News professionals for years have argued that it is impossible to really discuss in any intelligent way even a representative sampling of the good and the bad in the budget. So for all practical purposes they don't even try.

Typical of the mind-set of the national journalism fraternity is the following "lead," from a recent *Washington Post* report by Paul Taylor: "The American people differ sharply with President Reagan's proposed spending priorities for fiscal 1987, with a majority favoring cuts in the Defense Department and nearly two-thirds opposing cuts in social programs..."

The story was based on a Post-ABC News survey of 1,504 voting-age adults conducted between February 6 and 12.

More instructive than the findings was the news "spin" the *Post* put on the story. Though it was apparently a wide-ranging survey, providing what Taylor later in his story calls "a grab bag of findings on a variety of issues," the *Post* focused on budget questions involving six general areas of federal activity: loans and grants to college students; Medicaid "for the poor"; Social Security; Medicare "for the elderly"; unemployment insurance; food stamps; and the military. In other words, guns versus butter.

The survey showed, to quote the *Post*, that "public support has increased for social programs and decreased for military spending" during the last five years.

Returning to my main point. From surveys and news stories such as the one cooked up by the *Post*, the American public is wrongly led to believe that the debate over the federal budget involves little more than choices between desirable social welfare programs, such as "Medicaid for the poor" and defense.

In fact, the federal budget is larded over with hundreds, perhaps thousands, of programs that fall into neither of these two categories, and hundreds of different, and sometimes overlapping programs, within the two. Subsidies. Loans. Grants. Councils and commissions that do nothing. Councils and commissions that do too much. Waste. Fat. Pork. And yes, even some worthwhile and necessary endeavors.

What we need in these times of hard choices is an intelligent national debate on the issue of federal spending. What the public is getting instead is a seriously distorted picture of reality. The *Post* is not alone by any means. The problem is everywhere. It's no public service the media is performing—it's a disservice.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—For a couple of days last week, Texas teachers looked like they were standing alone. Actually, we know now, they were just standing in the middle.

When the state's largest teacher group recently refused to endorse any candidate in the governor's race, they probably committed the one single act that will most influence the outcome of the '86 race.

Basically, they threw the gubernatorial election up for grabs, especially the Democratic primary nomination.

Texas teachers refused to endorse Gov. Mark White, the man they propelled into office four years ago, and it has caused them to take a lot of heat statewide.

But there's no denying that teachers are now positioned to make or break White, to catapult Don Crowder or Andy Briscoe into the Democratic nomination, or to forge a new bond with Texas Republicans Bill Clements, Tom Loeffler or Kent Hance.

Uncertainty Factor

Certainly not all teachers vote Democratic, but the members of the teacher groups that endorse candidates traditionally support the Democratic ticket.

Although they snubbed White and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, the Texas State Teachers Association did endorse the rest of the Democratic ticket.

And while some politicians concluded that teachers were committing political suicide by biting the hand of their only reasonable choice for governor,

the teachers themselves obviously felt the need to flex their political muscle.

With that in mind, they injected "the uncertainty factor" into the governor's race.

Door Left Open

Make no mistake, teachers left the door open to Mark White, but it's also open to Crowder and Briscoe, who are both actively seeking the teachers non-public, word-of-mouth endorsement.

And it's also open to Republicans.

White's strategy has been to ignore Crowder and Briscoe, and try to deprive them of credibility as viable candidates.

But both of the political newcomers have kept on campaigning and have closed the gap considerably on White, making inroads not only in labor, rural and minority sectors, but also in Austin.

Considering the number of votes the teachers can bring to a primary election, it's reasonable to speculate that they now, or will soon, hold the clout to force White into a primary runoff.

Free From Formality

Since they haven't formally endorsed any candidate, they're technically free to side with or oppose White in the runoff election and even the general election, or go fishing.

Practically speaking, reconciliation doesn't seem likely, since White appears bent on making political points with the parents and others who support his education reforms. He's free from formality, too.

Six months ago, it was unthinkable that White would be vulnerable to a challenger in his own party primary.

Many people still do not accept the idea, but the teachers' bold move now makes the unthinkable possible. And what they do in the next two weeks could make it a reality.

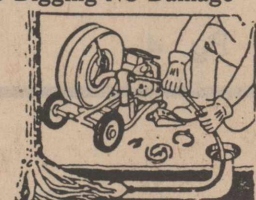

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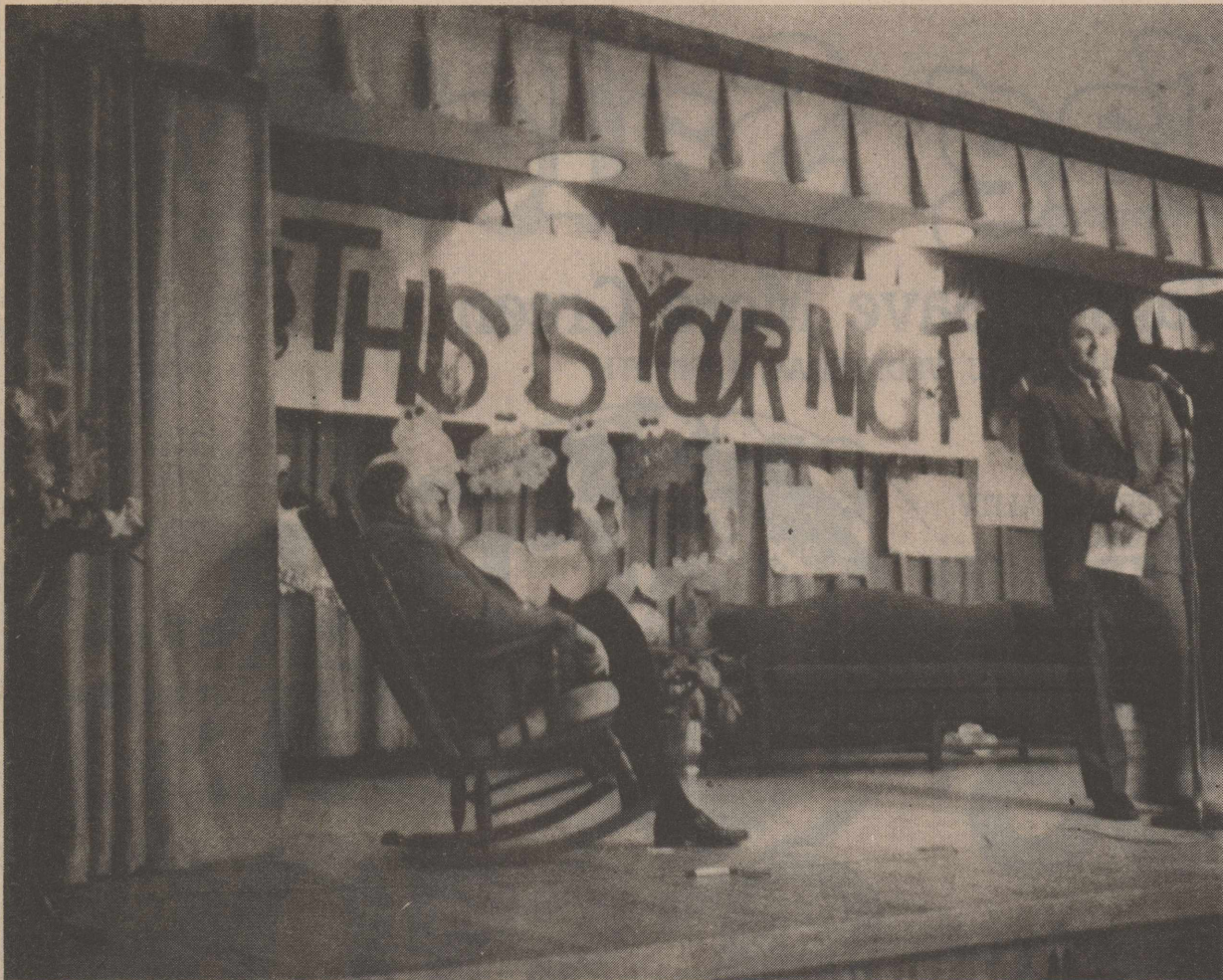

Ozona Lions place third in Ozona Relays

The Ozona Lions placed third in the Ozona Relays boys division here Thursday, while Crane came in first and Sonora was second.

Ozona's Valdo Galindo swept the sprints, winning the 200 in a record 22.69 after setting a new standard in the 100 of 10.82 in the preliminaries. He won the 100 final in 11.09.

Danny Sanchez added points for Ozona with a win in the 3200 meter run with a time of 10:21.19. He also won the 1600 meter run with a time of 4:46.94.

Ozona's Lombrano placed third in the 800-meter run with 2:07.38.

To add more points for Ozona, Harvey Fierro came in second in the 400-meter. Chuy Hernandez placed second in the 300 hurdles with a time of 41.41.70. The final points for the Lions came when the 1600 meter relay team came in third.

The track meet was held early due to the Easter holidays. The weather was near perfect for a March track meet with sunny skies and little wind.

Awards were presented after the finals under the lights at Lion Stadium. Vanessa Miller was named track sweetheart and Valdo Galindo, track beau. The Clifford Crawford award, given annually to the winner of the 800 meter run, was presented to Ricardo Sanchez of Sonora.

Lady Lions take second place in Ozona relays girls division Thursday

The Ozona Lady Lions had the best showing of this track season before a hometown crowd on Thursday, March 27. The Lady Lions scored 116 points to capture the runner-up team trophy. Sonora was first with 128 points while Reagan Co. was third with 107 points.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club
by Mrs. Bailey Post

Now that March is gone, we hope the winds are too, and that we have some refreshing showers to help green up the countryside and our yards.

Few summer garden features are more impressive than a large bed of annuals, but with schedules so busy and help scarce, not many can maintain large flower beds.

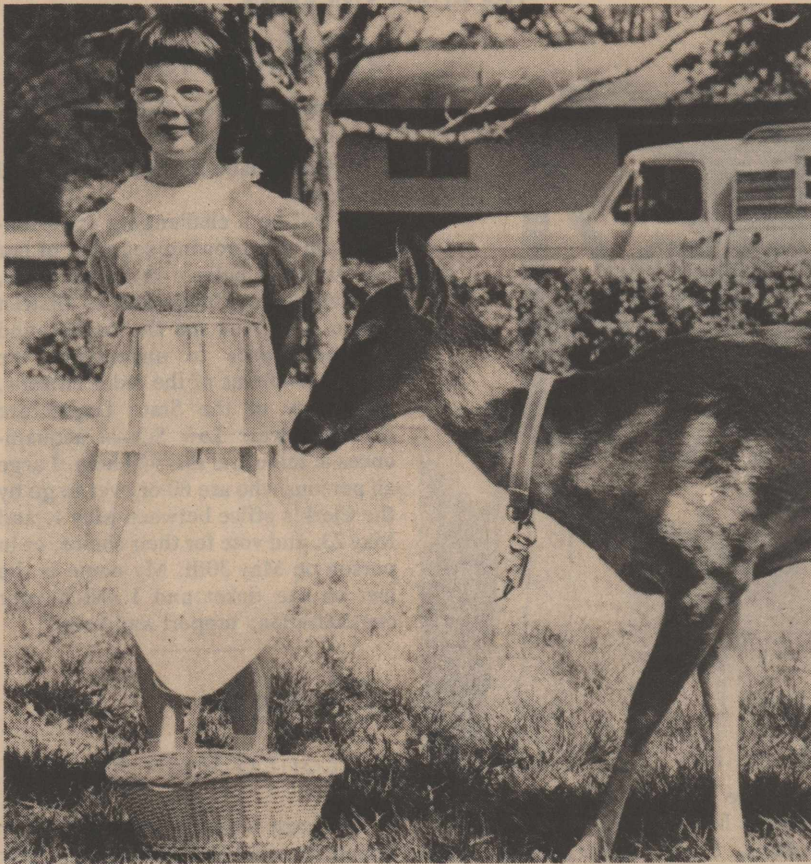
If your garden is small, you can make it colorful with containers filled with vivid annuals, graceful with trailing blossoms. Place a portable pot anywhere you want a splash of color, or move in planted pots in bloom to brighten a bed of evergreens or small shrubs. Select annuals that will sparkle in sunny groups, and will grow in relatively poor soil, such as bush or trailing moss (portulaca), red and yellow gaillardia, poppies, petunia, Verbena and periwinkle. Creeping or dwarf zinnias grow well in poor or rich soil. Fertile soil in full sun produces good pink, white and crimson dianthus, and yellow, orange and mahogany pygmy marigolds. Annual phlox in brilliant red, pink, purple, white and lavender, and pentas do well in full

sun and adapt to broken shade. Nierembergia (cup flower) is a creeping plant that produces purple, blue or white flowers in full sun or partial shade.

Choose members of the shade-loving families for spots where the sun doesn't linger too long. The sultanias are especially cheerful in such locations as well as the always brilliant colors of caladiums which last all summer. The white caladiums lend a feeling of coolness to an area for relaxing. Caladium and elephant ears may be planted anytime now, since the soil is warming up. Remember, they need water almost everyday in the summer.

Be grooming your house plants to enter the flower show April 24th for we hope to have many beautiful entries. Non members may enter, but need to have plants named and well groomed. The Girl Scouts and 4-H girls are invited to participate in Horticulture and Artistic Design Divisions so be making your plans.

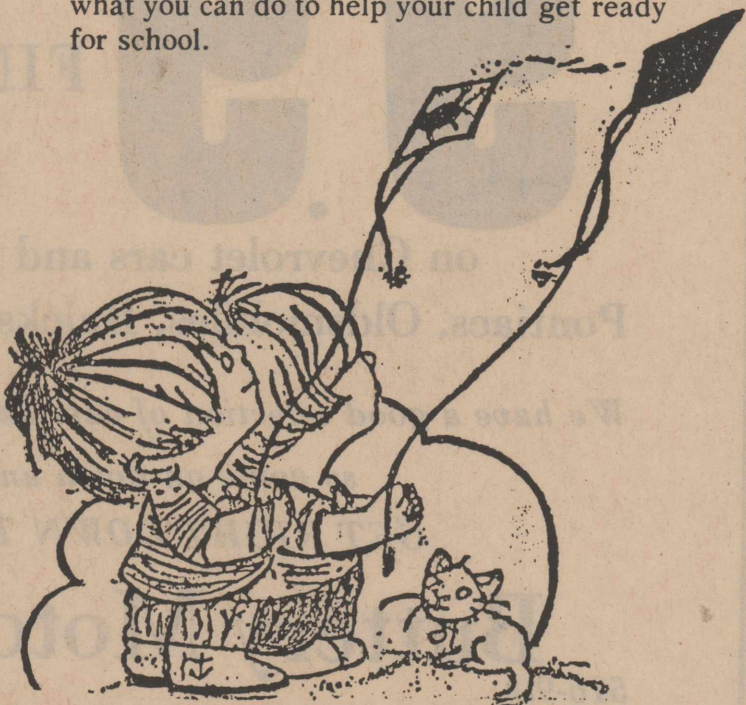

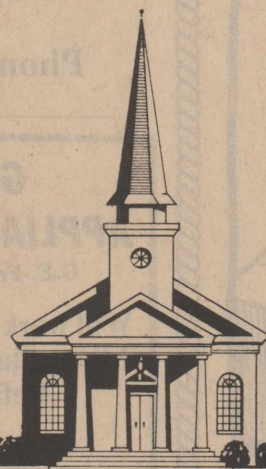

Convention frames state constitution in preparation for statehood with US

It's hard to believe almost a decade has passed since we Texans declared our independence from Mexico in 1836. Now, in this summer of 1845, after so much bloody fighting to gain our independence, the other settlers and I are about to see our status as a free Republic of Texas dissolved with a swipe of the pen and the votes of a few bureaucrats. We're going to become a state.

Most other settlers in Texas seem to favor annexation to the United States of America. They say we'll get federal military protection from Mexico and the Indians. I say we've done all right on our own in those areas. But we will get U.S. postal services; that should speed things up. Maybe this will get us out from under high tariffs; the federal government collects no taxes. And finally, we'll have a currency we can all depend upon. So, maybe it is a good deal.

But we need to think hard about this. We've tried to join the Union before, but only now do they want to have anything to do with us. The word is those northern states may try to make us abolish slavery. Sarah Chapman and 3,028 other women from Boston signed a petition against annexing Texas for just that reason. They told the U.S. legislature, "The undersigned women of Boston, Massachusetts, thoroughly aware of the sinfulness of slavery, and the consequent impolicy and disastrous tendency of its extension in our country, do most respectfully remonstrate, with all our souls, against the annexation of Texas to the United States as a slave holding territory."

A Mr. Henry Clay, a statesman from Kentucky, has also spoken out against the annexation. He thinks Texas would be more of a burden than a boon to the U.S. "If government of the U.S. were to acquire Texas," Clay said, "it would acquire along with it all the encumbrances which Texas is

under, and among them the actual or suspended war between Mexico and Texas. Of that consequence there cannot be a doubt. Annexation and war with Mexico are identical."

But I must say it looks like the annexation will go through. The Texas Congress has agreed to accept the U.S. treaty rather than that of Mexico (who took too darn long to offer anyhow, I'd say).

The Constitutional Convention has drafted a good, solid constitution. But it took time to iron out the small points. For instance, one of the convention delegates has argued to strike out the portion of the oath that requires legislators to swear they haven't fought a duel. He insists if a man can't resort to dueling to settle a tiff, he'll resort to poisoning, waylaying his enemy by the roadside or other methods rather than be "deprived of all the sacred rights which belong to every free man." But they settled that problem.

Statehood will work out to everyone's benefit. Constitutional Convention president Thomas J. Rusk summed everything up pretty well. At the beginning of the convention on

July 4, 1845, he said, "The history of the world may be searched in vain for a parallel to the present instance of two governments amalgamating themselves into one, from a pure devotion to that great principle—that man, by enlightening his intellect and cultivating those moral sentiments with which his God has impressed him, is capable of self government. We have one grand object in view; and that is to enter the great American confederacy with becoming dignity and self respect."
