



#### Fannin and troops executed in worst military atrocity

JOURNEY THROUGH TEXAS

Goliad, Texas, March 27, 1836--In one of the worst cases of military atrocity in history, Colonel James W. Fannin, Jr. and more than 200 of his Texas forces were executed outside this small town today by regulars of delayed his retreat, awaiting the the Mexican Army under the command of General Jose Urrea.

According to eyewitnesses, including a group of surgeons serving with the Texas forces, early this morning the Texans were split into three divisions. The surgeons were spared this fate, they were told, because they did not bear arms against Mexico when captured. Barnard and his fellow doctors were separated from the Texas forces early this morning under the ruse of caring for the Mexican Army's wounded. The surgeon says they were in an officer's tent when they heard the first shots and turned to watch the massacre.

Fannin, wounded at Coleta Creek, did not march out of town with his troops but was executed by firing squad in the Goliad town square. His last request, according to sources in the Mexican Army, was to deliver his

gold pocket watch to his wife. The actual number of Texas forces killed at Goliad is estimated at 220, nearly all the troops under Fannin's command. Bernard believes that figure is accurate as "only a few could have escaped." Fannin's troops represented one of the largest fighting contingents within the loosely-organized Texas Army. The Goliad massacre, as the Texans are already calling this tragedy, and the fall of the Alamo in San Antonio on March 6, represent two demoralizing setbacks


"White Oil" Appeal

The controversial "white oil" lawsuit, which threatens to undo the economy of several Panhandle towns, finally reached the 3rd Court of Appeals last week.

At stake is the ownership of some \$25 billion in oil and gas reserves in the Panhandle Field, about eight counties.

At issue is whether operators can use refrigeration units to chill gas vapors and use the extra liquid, or "white oil," to meet the Railroad Commission's test for an oil well. and, in speech after speech, blasted the governor for rais-ing taxes, utility rates and

In checking the mail the other day I received a letter from the Ozona Public School Systems. The letter was to inform me that my kindergarten daughter has been absent too much and that she is getting too far behind the rest of her class and there's a possibility of retaining her back. The letter went on to say if she's sick anymore I'd have to furnish them with a written excuse from her doctor and it was signed by her principal.

I'll have you know this letter upset me very much. First of all my little girl has bronchial asthma, she's had it since birth. She's been in and out of hospitals since she was born up until the last 2 years. Since then we recognize the symptoms and treat her at home with antibiotics and croup medicine. A cold with her can turn into bronchial pneumonia overnight.

I've talked to her teacher and find she's at the top of her class in performance.

My husband and I work hard and do our best to see that our children are healthy and attend school regular. We have enough trouble paying for medicine and doctor bills without taking chances of having our little girl hospitalized.

I understand that the government is intertwined in our school systems and if a child has 5 unexcused absents they can be failed.

What I don't understand is how the overnment can come in and tell us what's excusable and what's not. A primary school child cannot do as he or she wants to do, they do what their parents tell them. As parents we can't afford to spend \$30 everytime our children holler they have a stomach ache or sore throat. It seems to me the government has enough to keep them busy without worrying about who has the flu and who doesn't. I feel if the government and schools want and need written doctor excuses someone should make arrangements to pick up

I'm concerned about what's happening to our school systems! This used to be a free country where a child could afford to be sick without breaking any rules.





#### Crockett field gains another producer

The University 31 multipay field of Crockett County gained another Strawn detrital gas producer with completion of J. Cleo Thompson, Dallas, No. 2 Henderson 8-10, 15 miles southwest of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 5,400,000 cubic feet of gas daily, with gas-liquid ratio of 874,713-1. Gravity of the condensate was 52.2 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 8,511-668 feet, which had been acidized with 12,000 gallons.

The following tops were picked on ground elevation of 2,203 feet: San Andres, 990 feet; upper Canyon, 6,088 feet; Strawn, 8,507 feet; Devonian, 8,704 feet; and Simpson, 9,010 feet. Drilled to 9,075 feet and plugged back to 9,071 feet, 41/2-inch casing was

set at 8,958 feet. It is located 990 feet from the north and 1,090 feet from the east lines of 8-SL-T&StL Survey.



This is not just a story--it is history. In 1829, George Wilson, in Pennsylvania was sentenced to be hanged by a United States Court for robbing the mails and for murder. President this was refused, and Wilson insistthe special game played for a Snow ed that it was not a pardon unless he never before raised, and the President called upon the Supreme Court to

Chief Justice John Marshall gave the following decision: "A pardon is a George Wilson--choose life! paper, the value of which depends upon its acceptance by the person implicated. It is hardly to be supposed that one under sentence of death would refuse to accept a pardon, but if it is refused, it is no pardon. George Wilson must be hanged!" And he was hanged.

This story, though documented, seems hardly believable. If he was guilty of murder, I don't know why President Jackson would pardon him. But since he did, why didn't George Wilson accept it? No one would be that stupid! Or would they?

Every day men and women are refusing the pardon offered by God. The Bible says we are all guilty. We may not have committed murder but 'all have sinned and come short of the glory of God" and "the wages of sin is death." Even though we deserve to die for our rebellion (that's what sin is). Jesus died in our place and a sassassas and received the "wages" for our sin; and He offers to us "the gift of eternal life through Christ Jesus our Lord."

This "gift," God's pardon must be accepted. It is offered to all but it must "whosoever calls upon the name of the Lord shall be saved." How do we "call upon the name of the Lord?" Some people are trusting in their own good works, but the Bible says we are saved through faith and that faith is a gift of God, not of works. Some people are trusting in their Church membership, but nowhere in the Bible does it tell us that the Church can save us. Some people are trusting in a Godly mother, or father, or grandmother, or aunt, but nowhere in the Bible does it tell us that anyone else can accept the gift of eternal life for us. When I approach the gates of heaven, God is not going to be interested that I was a "Baptist" or anything else. He will only be concerned with my relationship to His "only begotten Son." You see, the Bible says "if you confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus and believe in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead, you will be saved. "You will be saved!"






