Kitty's Korner

When I was in third grade and deeply interested in Texas history, the top members of the class were treated to a trip to Austin. We were to be present for the opening of the legislative session and have an extensive tour of the Capitol.

We looked forward to the trip with great anticipation and when we were seated in the gallery we were in a state of reverence and subdued excitement. After all, never had we actually been in the presence of our lawmakers. At that time we looked at them just next to God in our idealistic little minds.

The speaker opened the session and called the roll. After that it was bedlam. No dignity, no statesmanship, just a general scurrying around on the floor. Some heated arguments which I now know as arm-twisting. When the vote came I had lost the thread of the subject matter. I remember thinking that except for the coats and ties and the elegant surroundings it was more like a zoo than what I expected from a legislative body. Apparently there has been no improvement in the last 50 years.

Being of sound mind, but unfit body, about all I've had to do is watch television the past week. It takes two hands to hold a newspaper open, so I relied on television for all news on the special session. For that matter, I relied on television for all entertainment, except when my grandchildren were visiting and it was entertaining and amazing what the older one could think of to do to the baby when nobody was looking. That's another story.

Back to special session news... the lawmakers seem as far apart as ever on balancing the state budget. I noticed they passed the local option horse racing bill, but it will not come before the people until 1987. If it's going to help the state coffers it should be on the Nov. '86 ballot. The state could be down the drain by Nov. '87. I think they O.K.'d a state lottery. I know nothing about this except its some form of gambling.

Tons of money go out of the state to New Mexico and Louisiana each year in horse racing, and now to Oklahoma, who recently voted pari-mutual betting to fatten their state coffers.

Those against this form of horse-racing claim it would take money away from families and encourage organized crime. It has been my experience that a gambler can lose his or her family grocery money in the alley in a crap game or out at a poker party just as easy as at a legal gaming event. If they are not going to take care of their families, they are just not going to, and there is plenty of evidence to support this allegation. Only recently we have hired a full-time child welfare worker and as far as I know we have no form of legal gambling in this county. The purchase of alcoholic beverages is also prohibited here, but you would certainly never know it if you went by consumption.

I am of the opinion that everything, including the setting of legislators' salaries should be left up to the people, who are called upon to fund the workings of government, local, state and federal.

Football Contest

Oilfield lay-offs drop school enrollment

Due to the failed economy caused by oil prices falling to record lows, many oilfield workers are looking elsewhere for work, forcing the Crockett County School enrollment down.

As of the end of registration Friday, the total school enrollment was 934. At the end of Fall registration last year, 970 students had registered. A loss of 36 students has been felt so far by school officials.

While 55-60 more students are expected to enroll in school on opening

day, the figures would still be short of last year's total enrollment of 1,004.

Although the figures are dropping, Ozona Junior High and Ozona Primary School have an increased number of students. Junior High gained ten students, with a total of 213 this year while Ozona Primary gained eight for an enrollment of 284.

Ozona Intermediate School suffered the greatest loss with a 48 student decrease in registration. The school registered 197 compared to last year's

245. Ozona High School suffered a small drop of 6 students, bringing its total enrollment to 240.

Superintendent Garland Davis released enrollment figures for the first day of school, Tuesday.

Pre-kindergarten had 28 enrolled. There were 76 enrolled in kindergarten, 102 in first grade and 81 in second grade for a total of 287 for the first day of school at Ozona Primary School.

Ozona Intermediate School had 76 third graders, 60 fourth grade students and 71 fifth graders making the total for the first day 207.

In Ozona Junior High School the count was 101 sixth graders, 67 seventh grade students and 68 eighth graders making the total 236.

Enrollment for the first day at Ozona High School was 265. There were 70 ninth grade students, 70 tenth graders, 69 eleventh grade students and 56 twelfth grade.

The total enrollment for the first day was 995 which was down 9 students from the 1985-86 school year.

First day enrollment last year would have seen a tremendous drop except for the pre-kindergarten enrollment, made mandatory by HB 72. First day enrollment this year is just slightly below last year's figures indicating a more stable population trend with a loss of about 4 families according to statistics.

Davee named J.P. nominee

The Crockett County Democratic Committee met Friday afternoon at 1:00 and after reading and discussing letters of three applicants, the decision was made to place the name of Christine Davee on the November ballot as Democratic nominee for Crockett County Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1.

Mrs. Davee was appointed by the Crockett County Commissioners Court to fill the unexpired term of her husband, Raymond Davee, on the event of his death. This appointment was made prior to the run-off which Davee was pitted against Jerry Lay for the nomination. The vote turned out 513 for Davee and 336 for Lay. Davee and Lay had emerged as run-off candidates in the May 5, Democratic Primary where the other opponent was David Weant. Neither Lay nor Davee garnered enough votes for an outright win, so the race was thrown into a runoff.

Davee, a retired game warden, was appointed to the post by the Crockett County Commissioners Court when long-time Judge A. O. Fields took the

job of Crockett County Judge upon the resignation of Johnny Jones in the fall of 1983. Davee served the unexpired term and won a full term on his own. He was serving his first elected term at the time of his death.

As custom dictates, his widow, Christine, was appointed to serve out his unexpired term. It has long been tradition in Crockett County for the spouse of an elected official to be appointed to fill out the term when the official dies in office.

The Democratic County Committee, as required by law, must make a selection for the Democratic nominee before the ballots are printed for the November election. This was the purpose of the Friday meeting. Had the opponent won the run-off election this would not have been necessary.

The Democratic Committee, consisting of Steve Kenley, chairman; Bobbie Fatout, Arlene Clayton and Luis Martinez, made the decision after reviewing the three applicants.

Mrs. Davee will run unopposed for the post in the general election.

Budget cut, taxes increase for school

The Crockett County School Board has approved a budget for the 1986-87 school year calling for expenditures of \$5,298,988. This is a reduction from the 1985-86 budget of \$351,420.

Revenue to support the budget is estimated to be \$4,445,628 which indicates a deficit of \$853,360. The deficit will be met through the use of prior year fund balances from the General Fund, the Debt Service Fund, and the Building Fund.

The budgeted revenue will include a five cent tax rate increase which will result in a seventy-eight cent tax rate for the school district.

With the rate increase in effect, the estimated school tax revenue to the district will be \$515,366 less than it was last year. The decrease is a result of the large value losses incurred by the decreases in oil and gas properties.

The budgeted expenditures will be dispersed as follows: 61% for payroll costs; 18% for supplies, equipment and purchased services; 12% for debt service; and 9% for capital outlay.

Function comparisons for budget dispersals show 51% of the budget to be used for instruction related services; 11% for pupil services which are classified as transportation, curricular, cafeteria, counseling and

health; 19% for administration; and 19% for plant maintenance.

The 1986-87 school year began with teacher workshops during the last week of August and the first day of student attendance of Tuesday, September 2nd.

Exotic dance party ends in shooting

Ozona is not ready for exotic dancing. This was evident Friday night when a party featuring this kind of entertainment was broken up by an irate wife with a loaded gun.

A group had rented the old G. I. Forum Hall for an evening of festivities and entertainment. Just as activities were getting underway and the dancers were giving forth with their most exotic routine, the wife of one of the party-givers entered and fired several shots from a .22 caliber pistol.

One of the dancers was hit in the fleshy part of a thigh and hospitalized, and the party was effectively halted.

Crockett County sheriff's personnel were on hand to quell any hostilities that might have arisen following the abrupt ending.

Bicycle-auto wrecks injure two local boys

Two separate auto-bicycle accidents sent two Ozona boys to the hospital with injuries Wednesday and Thursday evenings.

The first accident occurred around 6:40 p.m. Wednesday at the intersection of I-10 and Hwy. 163. A vehicle, driven by Joe Banda of San Antonio, was traveling west to east on the south I-10 service road. He proceeded across the intersection, with a green light, when the bicycle ran in front of him. Banda said he saw the bike coming but couldn't stop in time to avoid the accident, according to D.P.S. Trooper Richard Barton, investigating officer.

The bicycle, driven by Hilario Ramos, age 14, of Ozona, was traveling south to north on Hwy. 163. Ramos

was thrown into the windshield of the vehicle. He was taken to Crockett County Hospital by the local ambulance service with scalp lacerations and severe head injuries.

The second accident occurred Thursday evening, at the intersection of Hwy. 163 and 290, around 5:00 p.m. Luis Rico, 14, was riding his bike south on Hwy 163. Maribel Limon, a 15 year old unlicensed driver, was traveling north on 163. Limon made a left turn into the bike. Rico jumped from the bicycle before it hit him. He was taken to Crockett County Hospital by ambulance with a hip bruise from the fall, and was released later that afternoon. D.P.S. Trooper Richard Barton was investigating officer.

Heavy rains fall here during week

Bountiful rains fell on Crockett County last week with reports of over 7 inches in parts of the county. The heaviest rains fell Thursday but continued Friday, with the holiday weekend bringing sunshine with occasional cloudy skies.

Highway 163 south of Ozona was closed to thru traffic Thursday and part of Friday due to flooding conditions. Draws were reported running in this area.

The J. B. Miller ranch, 22 miles south, received 2 3/4" of rainfall for the week. Bob Childress' ranch 25 miles south had 7 inches and the Bill Carson ranch reported around 6 inches. The Carson ranch is located around 40 miles south. The Shannon Ranch 25 miles northwest of Ozona received a total of 5 1/2 inches. Dorothy Friend reported nearly 5" of rain on her ranch 35 miles south on Taylor Box Road with 2 inches falling Monday, Sept. 1. Rainfall registered by the Crockett

County Water Dept. for the month is 5.29 inches. Almost 3 inches of rain fell in town last week with .18 of an inch registered for Monday, August 25, .12 of an inch on the 26th, 1.12 inches fell on the 28th and Friday, August 29 there was 1.50 inches registered.

you and the LAW

PRESENTED BY THE STATE BAR OF TEXAS

Q: My father inherited 100 acres of land from his mother. He died without a will. Before he died he gave a deed for 10 acres to the three children from his second marriage. There are seven of us from his first marriage who received the rest and divided it among ourselves. We agreed to give our stepmother 10 acres and the house; however, our three half-brothers will not sign a release because they say they still have more coming to them. Do you have any suggestions?

A: My suggestion would be for you to see an attorney about having your father's estate settled through an administration of the estate. The statute of descent and distribution will control the disposition of your father's estate because he died without a will. According to the statute of descent and distribution, your father's land will pass to all of the children in equal shares. Your stepmother, however, will be entitled to a "life estate" in one-third of the land. This means that she would be entitled to live on one-third of the land for the remainder of her life, and then that one third will pass on to the children.

Q: My fiancé has a 5-year-old son from a previous marriage. How do I keep custody of him if my husband-to-be should die after we are married? Can I adopt? What is involved?

A: In order to keep custody of the child of your fiancé, you must adopt the child. To adopt the child you must either obtain consent of the natural mother (if the parent-child relationship with the natural mother has not been terminated) or file suit to adopt which includes a request for involuntary termination of the parent-child relationship (if that relationship has not been terminated). To grant involuntary termination of the parent-child relationship the court must find "improper conduct" on the part of the nonconsenting parent and that the termination would be in the best interest of the child. This is a hard thing to prove.

Since your fiancé is also a parent of the child, he must join in the petition for adoption. You should consult an attorney about the procedures involved in adopting the child or any viable alternatives.

Q: Can a husband force his wife to stay home and not use the telephone?

A: No. Not without some kind of restraining order.

Q: Must a will be probated before it becomes legal? A woman sold some land left to her by her husband but never had the will probated. He had an only child by his first wife but did not mention the child in the will. Was the sale of the property legal? Could the man who bought the property get a clear title?

A: A will must be probated before its terms are effective. An application for the probate of a will may be filed within four years of the death of the person who made the will. If more than four years have passed since the death, the applicant must show the court that he or she was not at fault for the failure to present the will for probate within four years.

If there is no necessity for administration of the estate, the court may admit the will to probate as a Muniment of Title.

The problems with title may be cured by probating the will, if possible, or by obtaining a deed from the child of the first marriage.

Q: I have not been to court yet for divorce proceedings, yet our newspaper's divorce column has me listed as being divorced. How can this be? I was not notified that I was divorced. My attorney never told me. Can a person be divorced and not be informed?

A: Yes, under certain circumstances a person may be divorced without receiving personal notice. In a divorce suit, the party against whom the divorce is filed, the respondent is entitled to be personally served with the Petition for divorce by the sheriff or constable of any county in which the Respondent is to be found. However, if the location of the Respondent is unknown, or if the Petitioner has used due diligence to make service but has been unsuccessful, notice to the Respondent by publication under Section 3.521 of the Texas Family Code is allowed.

As with other civil cases, the party against whom a default judgment has been awarded who was served notice by publication may, after filing a Petition showing good cause supported by affidavit, file a Motion for New Trial within two years after the judgment is signed.

Q: What is the maximum percentage of child support that may be assessed from a person's wages by court for arrears and current support? Is this percentage based on gross or net income?

A: The Texas Supreme Court has withdrawn the child support guidelines issued earlier this year, and there is no "maximum percentage" to be based upon either gross or net income. Child support is within the discretion of the Court. A Texas court can order either or both parents to make periodic payments or lump sum payments for the support of the child, and in determining the amount of child support, the court will consider the needs of the child, the ability of the parents to contribute to the child's support, any financial resources available for the support of the child, and any other matters it believes important.

Furthermore, it should be noted that under Section 14.43 of the Texas Family Code (effective September 1, 1985), every divorce decree signed in Texas must contain a provision whereby child support, if ordered and not paid within a period of at least 30 days, shall be automatically garnished from the wages of the obligated parent.

Q: Is there a law regarding people riding in the back of open bed pickup trucks? A boy was recently injured when the driver had to stop suddenly and the boy was thrown from the truck.

A: There are no laws in Texas which prohibit passengers from riding in the back of an open bed pickup truck. The only possible cause of action by the boy, suing, (through his parents), would be against the driver under the common law theory of negligence, alleging that the driver should have known that the child could be thrown from the pickup, and didn't use proper care to prevent the accident. Other circumstances, such as the age of the child, whether the driver had been drinking, the condition of the roadway, and so forth, would need to be evaluated to see, given all the factors, whether the driver was negligent.

Q: My wife and I took a tour to Mexico. The travel agent said our tour group would form at the airport in Mexico. It did not. There were no hotel reservations in Mexico. We did not get everything we were promised. The travel agent said later we would be compensated, but so far they have not, and they will not return my calls. What can I do?

A: You must examine very carefully your agreement with the travel agent. If the promises you claim were made are not in writing, you might have a difficult time proving that the travel agent breached the contract with you. If you do have a written agreement in which these promises are made, you have a good chance of getting a refund for any money paid to the agent for the trip. If the amount of refund you are seeking is less than \$1,000 you can sue the agent yourself in a Small Claims Court. If the agent advertises the services that you did not receive, you may have a claim under the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Act, which an attorney would best be equipped to handle.

Ozona enjoys abundant rains

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club

It seems the good showers have been coming our way and are always welcome, but we hope floods don't come.

September is one of the most important months of the year for gardeners. A few hours spent weeding, mulching, and fertilizing can bring new life to the garden. Marigolds, sage, impatiens, petunias, geraniums, and other bedding plants can be revitalized if they are attended to early in the month. Also give similar attention to warm season plants producing until frost. Too, be sure to get the fall and winter vegetable garden planted.

Early September is the last time in the growing season that an application of fertilizer will benefit warm season lawn grasses. Fertilizer applied after this time may be wasted if a killing frost or cool weather causes the grass to turn brown and go dormant. When in doubt as to how much to use, apply fertilizer at one-half the label recommendation this late in the season. After the application, water the lawn thoroughly to wash fertilizer into the zone.

A little grooming early this month can bring hybrid tea roses into a second season of beautiful bloom. Remove faded blooms to tidy up the plants and prevent seed formation, which saps plant energy. Snip off damaged or diseased parts and weak spendly wood. Cut off small branches that have no terminal bud, and remove shoots growing from the base of the plant below the graft union. Rake all litter out of the bed, apply a complete fertilizer, such as 5-10-10, at the rate of two tablespoons per bush. After lightly stirring the soil without disturbing the roots, water thoroughly to wash fertilizer into the soil. Usually our fall roses are the most perfect and

colorful, due to less wind to damage them.

Divide overcrowded clumps of oxalis, bearded iris, day lilies, daisies, and cannas. Retain only healthy outer portions of the clumps. Replant in well prepared soil. Keep watered until roots are established if there is no rain.



Children eligible for the treatment should not have reached their 18th birthday. The treatment is 100 percent free of charge, paid for by the Shriners' various fund-raising activities such as the circus, etc.

"If you know of a child that would benefit from such treatment, please contact any shriner and please attend our circus," a local Shrine spokesman said.

Advance tickets may be purchased from any Shriner for \$4 for adults. Tickets at the door will be \$5. Children, sixth grade and under will be admitted free.


etc., so, I just take what I consider to be good, and let the rest go by."

Bicycle laws and safety rules need attention

Because of the recent bicycle-automobile related accidents, all cyclists should be reminded of the Texas bicycle laws and safety rules.

These regulations include:
Obey all traffic signs and signals.
Warn other traffic when stopping or turning by giving required hand signals with the left hand. Always ride as near to the right side of the road as possible and in the same direction as motor vehicles. Be careful when passing parked vehicles or vehicles traveling in the same direction. Not more than two bicycles may be driven side by side. (It is safer to ride single file.) Do not ride double except on bicycles built for two persons. Ride only upon the bicycle's regular seat. Do not hitch to motor vehicles. Do not carry packages that will prevent keeping at least one hand on handlebars.

Always be alert for traffic from all directions. Also, watch for opening car doors and for cars pulling out into traffic.

Before leaving a driveway, alley, or when crossing a street or road "stop," look both ways, and wait for motor vehicles and pedestrians to pass.

Let pedestrians go first at street crossings and on sidewalks. Get off

the street or road and stop when you hear the sirens of emergency vehicles. Do not race with others on a public street or road. Do not play riding games in the street or roadway.

Always keep your bicycle in good condition. Every bicycle should have brakes that will skid the braked wheels on dry, level, clean pavement; when used at nighttime the bicycle must have a white light on the front which can be seen at least 500 feet, and when used at nighttime the bicycle may have a red taillight which can be seen at least 500 feet and must have a red reflector visible for 300 feet. For general safety purposes flags, reflectors, and bright clothes make the bike and driver easier to see.

In the past, I've actually had poachers, under arrest for killing deer from the highway at night, tell me that they will do it again next chance they get—that it's cheaper to pay an occasional maximum fine of \$200 now and then than to pay for a lease like law-abiding hunters do. But at the end of the '85-86 hunting season, we surprised 'em with a new law. They got (or soon will get) a letter from the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department, backed by the State Attorney General's Office, advising them they now owe for the replacement value of the wildlife that they stole from the people of the State of Texas. Now they can pay the amount specified in the letter, or they can wait to be sued by the state, and if they cause that much trouble they can expect to pay the maximum—up to \$800 in the case of a good buck deer...or \$1,000 for an endangered species...or \$10,000 for a Whooping Crane or a Bighorn Sheep. Whatayassay, Mr. Poacher, is it still cheaper?




and educational conditions for Mexican-Americans.

professionals at the USDA recommend losing only one to two pounds in a week. Dropping food intake to lose seven pounds a week threatens to disturb the dieter's nutritive balances.

To lose a pound, dieters must reduce their calorie intake by 500 calories each day for an entire week. This is 3,500 calories a week. So to lose seven pounds in a week the dieter would have to eliminate 24,500 calories from their weekly food intake.

The body needs a certain number of calories for basic metabolism. More calories are needed for work. Women usually need 1,800-2,000 calories a day and men about 2,700 depending on build and activity level.

The Rotation Diet drops calories for women to about 600 calories for the first three days, 900 calories for the next four days, then 1,200 for the next week and on the third week repeats calorie intake of week one. For men the diet contains 1,200 calories for the first three days, 1,500 calories for the next four days, and about 1,800 calories for the second week and then repeats week one.

A woman should not reduce calories below 1,200 a day unless under the regular care of a physician. Men are less vulnerable to nutrient deficiencies than women on weight control diets, since they are allowed more food, but weight loss should average only one to two pounds a week.

In general, the Rotation Diet menus for women are low in calcium, iron, some of the B Vitamins and in Vitamin A. For men, the menus are low in calcium and Vitamin A. Obtaining enough of the micro-nutrients on a low calorie diet is also a problem for both men and women.

When people go on crash diets, they may not only lose fat but protein as well and when weight is regained it is regained first as fat. Quick weight loss rarely has any permanent effect and often sends dieters into a cycle of quick weight loss and rebound weight gain when normal eating is resumed, and then even more difficulty losing when the next diet is attempted.


