Plane loses gear in take off at Fly-in

A potential problem ended in a minor incident Saturday at the Crockett County Fly-In when a BT-13 was attempting to take off from the Ozona Airport. The pilot appeared to lose control of the plane, and the landing gear was lost as a result.

"This was a World War II training plane," said Paul Shacklette, program chairman of the event. "It's made to do this. The fact that the landing gear came off minimizes the damage," Shacklette explained.

The plane is expected to be flown back to Abilene by the end of the

State sends county a tidy sum

State Treasurer Ann Richards has sent checks totaling \$7.8 million to Texas' 254 counties for road construction and maintenance. Crockett County coffers received \$27,033.91.

The Treasurer each year disburses money appropriated by the Legislature for the Lateral Road Program. The grants may be used by counties for the purchase of righ-of-way and for construction and maintenance of lateral roads, farm-to-market roads or state highways.

The money is allocated to each county under a formula based on the county's area, rural population and lateral road mileage, Treasurer Richards said.

Other area counties receiving funds included Sutton, \$17,362.21; Reagan, \$12,709.99; Menard, \$9,263.66; Mason, \$13,530.94; Tom Green, \$28,806.92; and Schleicher County, \$14,549.21.
