### Sheriff's Report

Following is the Crockett County Sheriff's Office activity report for the week ending October 28, 1986.

#### Arrests

Oct. 20 - A 24 year old Ozona woman surrendered to Sheriff's Deputies to begin serving a 10-day sentence for DWI.  
Oct. 21 - A 22 year old Ozona man was arrested on warrants from San Angelo. He was released to Tom Green County Deputies the same day.  
Oct. 22 - Two New York men, ages 24 and 25, were arrested by Sheriff's deputies for delivery of cocaine. Bond was set at \$5000 each. Subjects were released after a San Angelo Bail Bond Company made their bonds.  
A California couple were arrested by THP. The woman was charged with DWI and the man with public intoxication. They were released on Oct. 24 after having pled guilty and paying fines.  
Oct. 24 - A 36 year old Vermont man was arrested by Sheriff's deputies on charges of sexual assault, from the State of Vermont. The man waived extradition and is in County jail awaiting arrival of Vermont authorities.  
A 48 year old Louisiana man was arrested by Sheriff's deputies on a warrant charging DWI from Frio County, Texas. He was released to Frio County officers on Oct. 26.  
A 36 year old California man, a 22 year old New York man, and a 21 year old Oregon man were arrested at the truck stop by Sheriff's deputies when they were caught trying to steal a fire extinguisher. Further investigation showed that the subjects stole 7 fire extinguishers from a motel in Fort Stockton, on Oct. 25, the subjects were arraigned and turned over to Pecos County officers for prosecution.  
Oct. 27 - A 30 year old Ozona man was arrested by Sheriff's deputies on charges of "aggravated assault-bond forfeiture." Bond was set at \$10,000. The subject was released later in the day after posting another bond.

#### Incidents

Oct. 22 - A resident on Terrace Street reported the burglary of her home. Sheriff's deputies investigated. There was no indication that any property was taken from the residence. The case is still under investigation.  
Oct. 22 - Two New York men approached an off-duty deputy at an Ozona gasoline station and offered to trade some cocaine for some marijuana, not realizing that they were

talking to a sheriff's deputy. The deputy told them that he could provide some marijuana but they would have to wait while he went after it. The Deputy then went to the Sheriff's office and notified other deputies. He took a small quantity of marijuana that was being held as evidence and returned to meet the suspects. The deputy traded the marijuana for the cocaine and then advised the suspects that they were under arrest. Sheriff's deputies arrested the two suspects and seven of their traveling companions. The suspected cocaine and the marijuana were recovered. The two men were charged with delivery of cocaine, and their friends were released after wanted checks were run on them. The two men, both from New York, were placed under \$5000 bond, each, by Judge Davee. A San Angelo bonding company made their bond and they were released.  
Oct. 23 - An oil company reported criminal mischief at their sight on Todd Field Road. Numerous insulators had been shot and other damage done. The sheriff's office is in the process of checking out several suspects.  
Oct. 27 - The sheriff's office received a report of someone spray-painting the walls of the Junior High School. The sheriff's office is checking out several suspects and the case is still under investigation. Persons who damage the public school buildings will be prosecuted by the courts.

## Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club

November is another good planting time, for the weather cools toward winter. It is also the ideal month to begin planting trees and shrubs. During the next five months, examine your landscape carefully and decide where improvements are needed. If a new yard, make your plans to include plants and trees to enhance the beauty of your new home.

If you haven't already prepared soil for planting, do so as soon as possible, then shop early for plants while selection is good. Select only healthy plants and buy them from a reputable dealer who has taken proper care of the plants prior to selling them. An unhealthy plant is no bargain at any price.

Winter is the best time to deal with drainage problems, tree or limb removal, and transplanting of evergreen shrubs.

One way to have portable color and fragrance next spring is to pot bulbs now and plunge them into the soil outside. This method eliminates the need for a special storage area, such as space in the refrigerator, for pre-cooling bulbs while they are dormant. Large flowered varieties of daffodils, narcissus, tulips and hyacinths are excellent choices for container culture. Be sure each pot has a drainage hole. Fill pots half full of dampened potting medium; then set the bulbs in either one per pot or several. Add enough soil to cover the bulbs, leaving the necks barely exposed. Top each pot, dig a hole deep enough so that half the pot is below the surface. Set the pot in the hole and mound soil up around the sides; then cover the entire pot with pine straw leaves or similar mulch. When growth begins in the spring, remove pots from the soil and set in decorative containers or among ground cover.

After planting shrubs, trees or transplanting, water all plants thoroughly as soon as they are in the ground, and mulch them for cold protection.

**Halloween Makeup Tips**

Before purchasing Halloween makeup supplies, you should be aware of the different types available and the advantages and disadvantages to each.

**Advantages**

Available in stick, cream or paint-tray form.

Offers good coverage and is easy to apply.

Can be blended together and applied on top of each other or over water-based makeup that has dried.

Effective for long period of time.

Not likely to perspire off.

**Disadvantages**

Does not dry and must be powdered to prevent rub-off.

Cannot be removed with water; cold cream or facial makeup remover is required.

**Water-Based Makeup**

**Advantages:**

Available in jar, bottle, tube, pancake form, or cream.

Easily removed with water.

**Disadvantages:**

Can be difficult to apply because it dries quickly.

May perspire off.

Effective for short periods of time.

May dry out the skin.

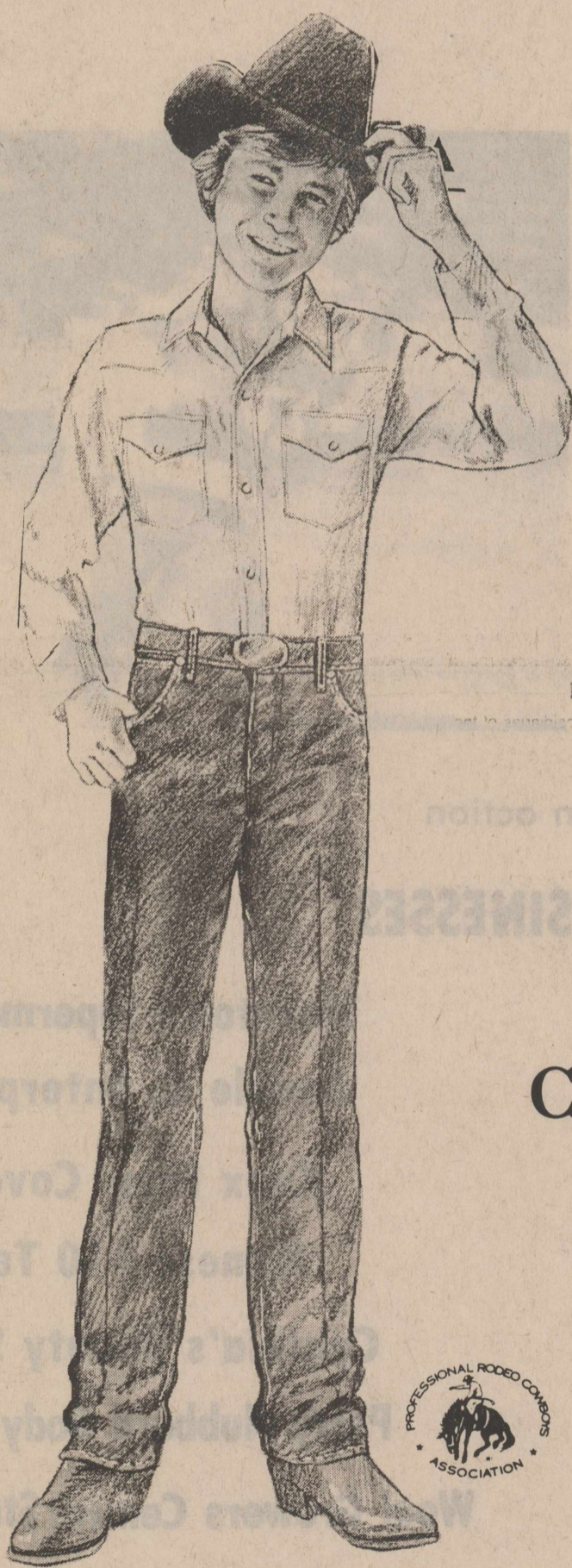

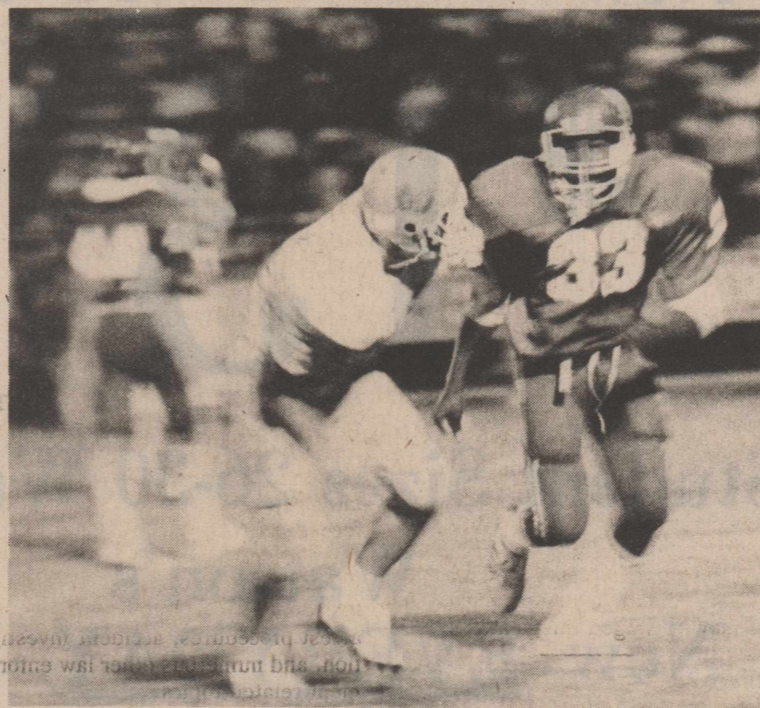

### Four wells scheduled to be drilled in county

Wolv Rutherford had three pass receptions for 18 yards, Butch Gonzales had three receptions for 33 yards, and Roger Flores had five receptions for 48 yards. Sam Hightower completed six passes for 61 yards, and Copie Davis completed five passes for 38 yards. Oscar Payne also kicked ten punts for an average of 30 yards.

The Lions' next game will be played in Rankin on Friday.

The DPS training course included instruction in traffic law, criminal law, arrest procedures, accident investigation, and numerous other law enforcement related topics.

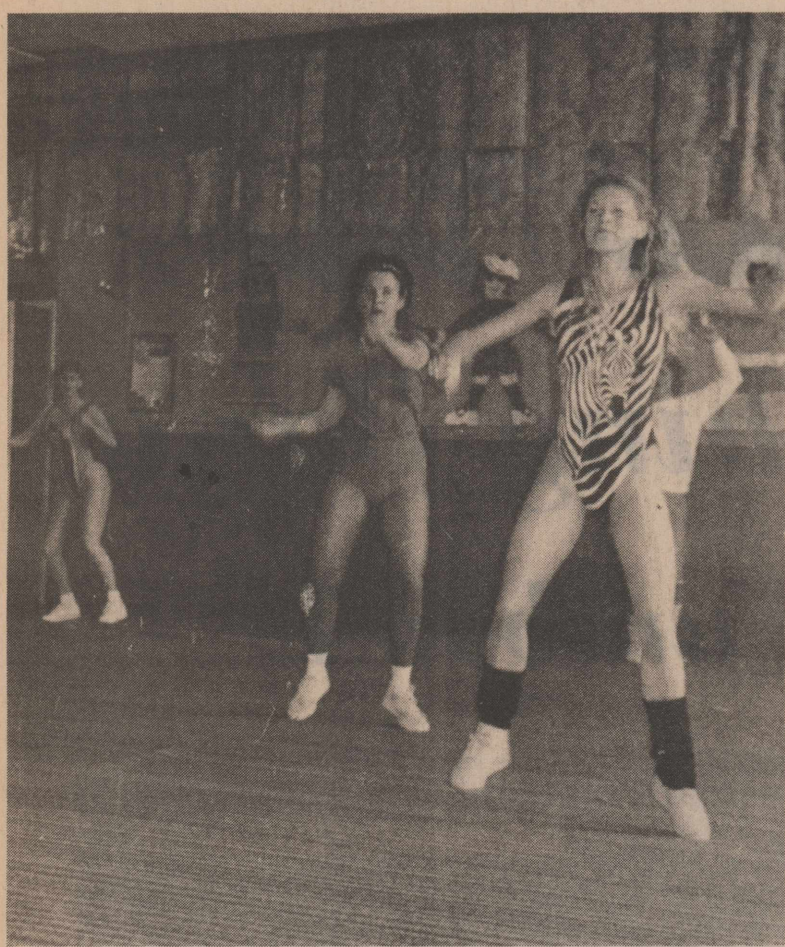

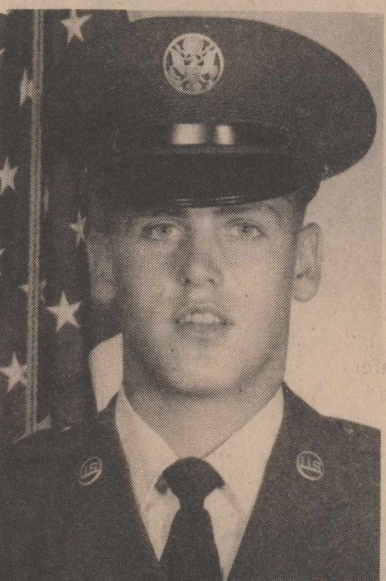

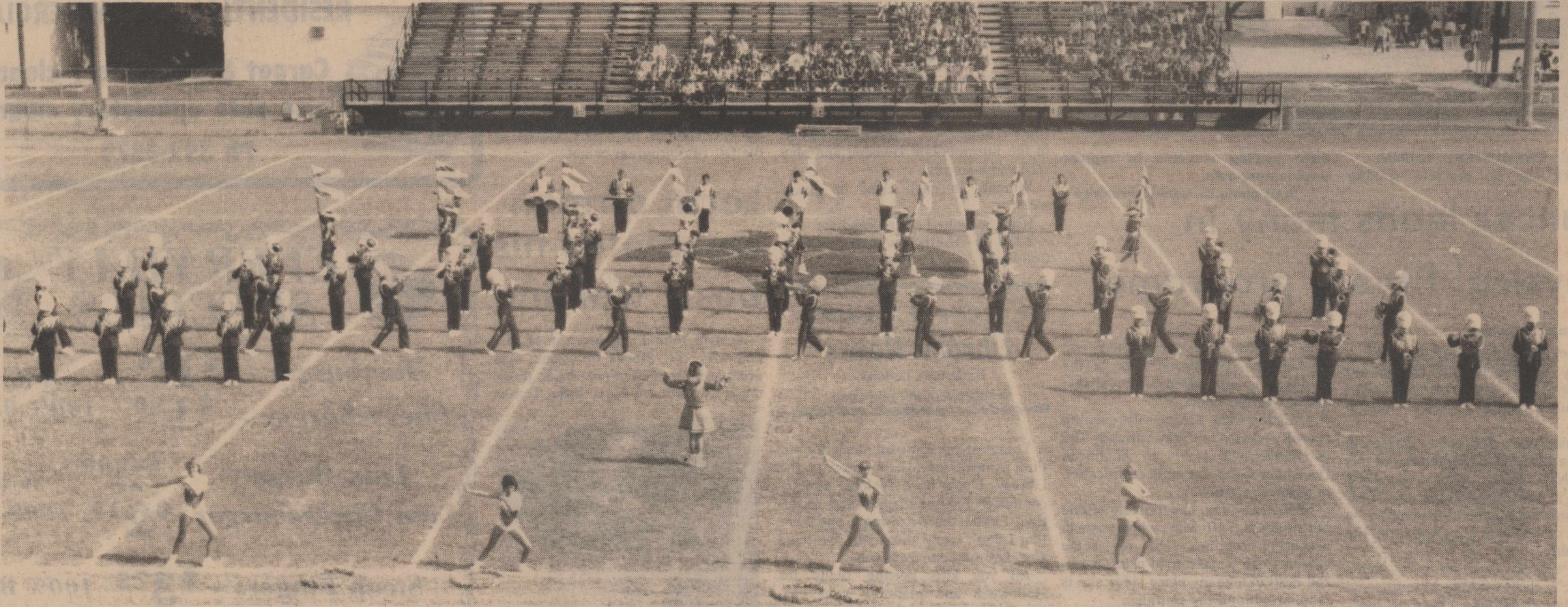
