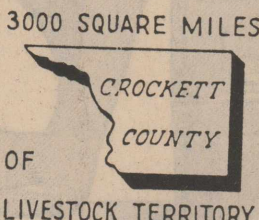

## Kitty's Korner

There is a vast difference between good doers and do gooders. The first group sets out to do good things for little or no recognition and no pay, the second group falls into the category of those trying to right the world when there is little or nothing wrong. They never stop to weigh the consequences of their actions and seldom bother to get to the bottom of any situation. A lot of social workers, who are paid to perform their services, fall into this category. Everybody is against child abuse and molestation, and with every good intention, they often jump feet first into any suggestion that this might have occurred. I think this might have been the case so recently in the news about two ASU coeds who were indicted by a grand jury for sexual abuse of a child. As it turned out, those in charge rushed headlong into getting these charges before a grand jury on the word of a five-year-old youngster. Apparently they convinced a District Attorney with their zeal and he took it to a grand jury without much investigation.

The result was all charges dropped and expunged from the record, but in spite of all this, two young women have had their lives wrecked and this is a cloud which will hang over them for years to come.

It makes one wonder how many lives have been ruined because of false charges of this sort. This is a horrible miscarriage of justice. Recently an entire staff at a pre-school in California was charged with this sort of thing. Now charges have been dropped against all but the owner of the school and her son. A program on "60 Minutes" a few weeks ago cast doubt that even these two are guilty. Guilty or not, their lives have been ruined.

This is something which needs to be brought to the attention of society. I've seen numerous talk shows with women who claimed sexual harassment on the job. I've been more than curious about this also. Most of them do not look like the type a man would ruin his career and give up his family for. I'm sure some of these charges are true, but there is a lot of doubt about a lot of them. I've worked with men for forty years, and in my younger days I was not a bad looking woman. I can't say I haven't had a few passes made at me through the years, but I can truthfully say I have never been sexually harrassed at the work place.

I just think we have some misplaced priorities and we need to give the accused an opportunity to defend themselves before we brand them for life. After all, we read an accused murderer his rights before he is arrested.

This has weighed on my mind since the two college girls were indicted. I think parents should be very careful about taking the word of a child with a vivid imagination and I also think they should be careful about how they question children.

I have a little granddaughter who has a wild imagination. When she told me she was a big, black bear last night, I had no problem with that. Also when she told me she was out fishing and was covered with spiders and had to go to the hospital, I enjoyed the narrative. However, when out of a clear blue sky, she told me her mother and father "fight all the time," I was a little concerned. The more I questioned her, the more she enlarged on the story, until it sounded like Jim and Debbie slugged it out night after night. I just had to speak to the children about this and her mother was the first one I encountered. She laughed and said "surely you didn't believe that, I can't believe you would even consider the possibility." I felt better, but I wondered what her Sunday school teacher or the baby sitter would think.

I believe social workers and welfare workers and others who come up against these accusations should be very well informed before taking action in any case of this sort.

For the first time in five years the Ozona High School track team won a first place in the Eldorado meet last weekend, giving some indication that the winning basketball season gave some inspiration to the sports to follow. Total points for the team was 112.

Coach Pete Maldonado said everyone on the team put forth their finest performances, and he was proud of the results.

Oscar Payne placed fourth in the high jump with a leap of 5'10" and team mate Micheal Sanchez placed seventh. Payne also added points in the pole vault, placing third with 11'6".

Valdo Galindo got a second place in the long jump with 20'10". He really strutted his stuff in the running events, getting a first place in the 100 meter dash and in the 200 meter dash, times were 11.02 and 22.32 respectively.

Scott Denman placed seventh in both the shot and the discus to add points overall.

Sanny Sanchez was also a standout, placing first in the 3200 meter run with 10.18 and first in the 400 meter dash with 52.76.

Jose Gutierrez and Luis Rico placed seventh and eighth in the 3200 meter run.

Pon Seahorn, banker and rancher, with two children in the public schools is a candidate for the board. Dr. Gary Vannoy, local veterinarian, also with two children in school here, is also a candidate. Penn Baggett, local rancher, also with a child in school has filed for a place on the board. Ralph Moore, Church of Christ minister, with one child in school, is another of the candidates. Jimmy Ortiz, an Ozona native and with several relatives in the school system, is another of the candidates. Jesse Fierro, owner of a local tire repair shop, is also a candidate.

## Ozona trail ride to Barnhart to be held June 6 and 7

It's trail ride time in Ozona, again. This year's ride will be held on June 6th and 7th and will travel the Drover's Lane from Ozona to Barnhart, just like last year's event. An over-night camp will be made on Saturday, June 6th, just like last year, on the William's ranch at Midway Lane.

The Ozona Lion's Club will cook up another fine bar-b-que and plans are being made for a fine evening's entertainment. The trail ride is supported by the Ozona Chamber of Commerce and will continue to be a family-oriented activity. The ride will organize at the Ozona Rodeo Grounds on the morning of Saturday, June 6th

and will pull out at approximately 8:00 a.m. Riders, under the age of 17, must be accompanied by a parent, or responsible adult.

One of the problems encountered on last year's ride, was that some horses and riders had trouble keeping up the pace. All riders are encouraged to have horses properly shod and exercised prior to the ride. And, it wouldn't hurt to make sure your own riding muscles are in good shape.

The Trail Ride Committee will meet, again, on Tuesday, March 24th, at 7:00 p.m., at the Ozona Chamber of Commerce. All persons interested in helping plan the trail ride are invited to attend.

## Teachers rehired in school board meet

The Crockett County School Board of Trustees met in regular monthly session Monday evening at 6:30 and approved the rehiring of all teachers in the Primary, Intermediate, Junior High and High Schools. Board members voted unanimously on all teachers, according to Assistant Superintendent Ted Cotton.

In other business relating to faculty, Coach Jim Green was rehired to teach math in High school and will have some coaching duties. Green resigned as head football coach in last month's meeting.

The resignation of Debbie Porter, Junior High social studies teacher and coach, was accepted by the board.

Approved as substitute teachers for the year were David McCarley and Pamela Bergman. Ms. Bergman, who recently returned from an overseas teaching assignment, does not live in Ozona, but asked that her name be placed on the list in case there was an absence of a teacher in her field of

teaching.

The board also approved the textbook committee's report on nineteen different subjects. Members of the textbook committee are Darolyn Webster, Barbara Wallace, Shirley Kirby, Darla Jones, Joyce Maness, Bettye Hoover, Jackie Shacklette, Fred Jones, Frank Reavis, John Curry, Louise Taliaferro, Mark Duncan, Rip Sewell, Ted Cotton and Garland Davis.

In other business, the board approved the revised discipline plan. House Bill 72 required schools to adopt a uniform discipline management plan. House Bill 13, passed at a later date, made some new rules and threw out some rules which were in effect. The student code of conduct was revised as required and passed by the board.

Several policies in regard to making up assignments and tests after absences were discussed and a new policy was approved.

## Free Screening Clinic scheduled for April 1

The Ozona Community Center, in cooperation with the Crockett County Schools, will hold a free screening clinic on April 1 and 2, 1987 at the Ozona Primary School. The purpose of the clinic is to try to discover possible problems in the areas of vision, hearing, speech and communication, and physical development.

On Wednesday, April 1, in conjunction with the screening clinic, the Ozona Primary School will hold pre-registration for Kindergarteners for the 1987-1988 school year. This involves children who will be five on or before September 1, 1987. Parents are required to bring the child's birth certificate and shot records. The child cannot start school without the birth certificate to verify the child's birthday.

Children who will be four on or before September 1, 1987, can be

brought to the Ozona Primary School on Thursday, April 2, for their screening process. They will be checked in all the areas the five year olds are checked.

This is a community wide project which has proven to be beneficial to the school system and the children of Ozona. It will involve approximately two hours of the parent's time and will help the parents to see what they can do to get their child ready for school.

## Three players to all district

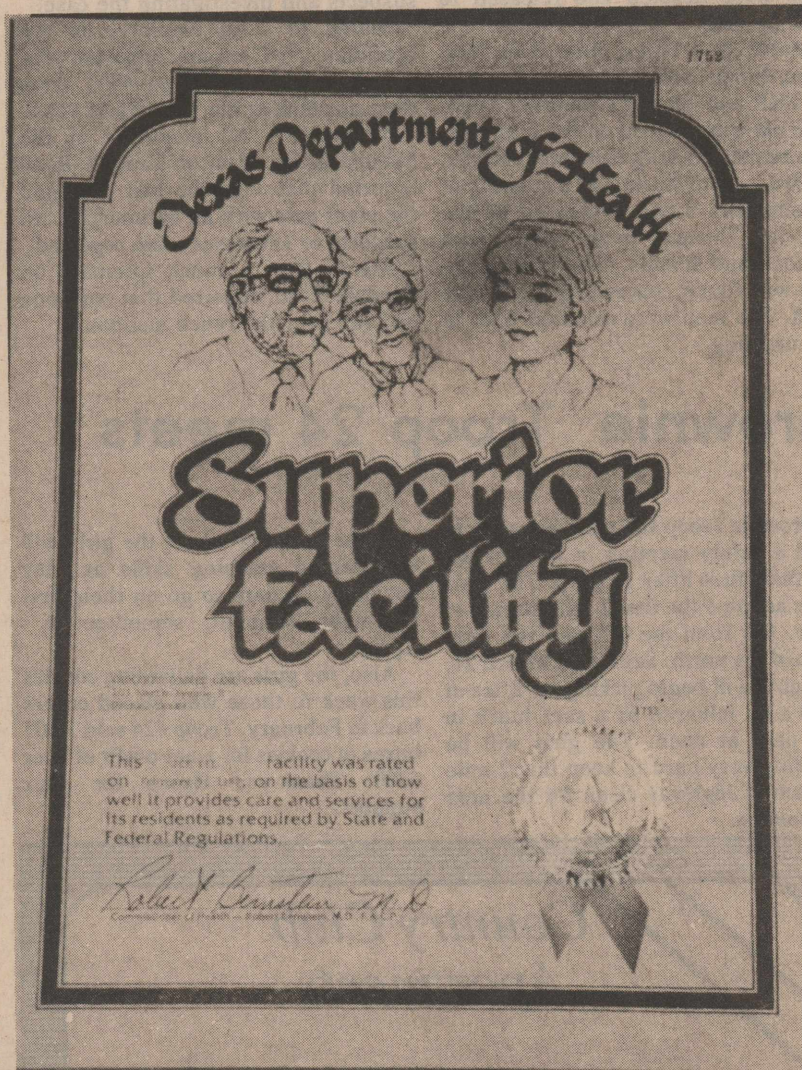
Three Ozona basketball players made the all-district team when coaches and officials got together last week to make their choices.

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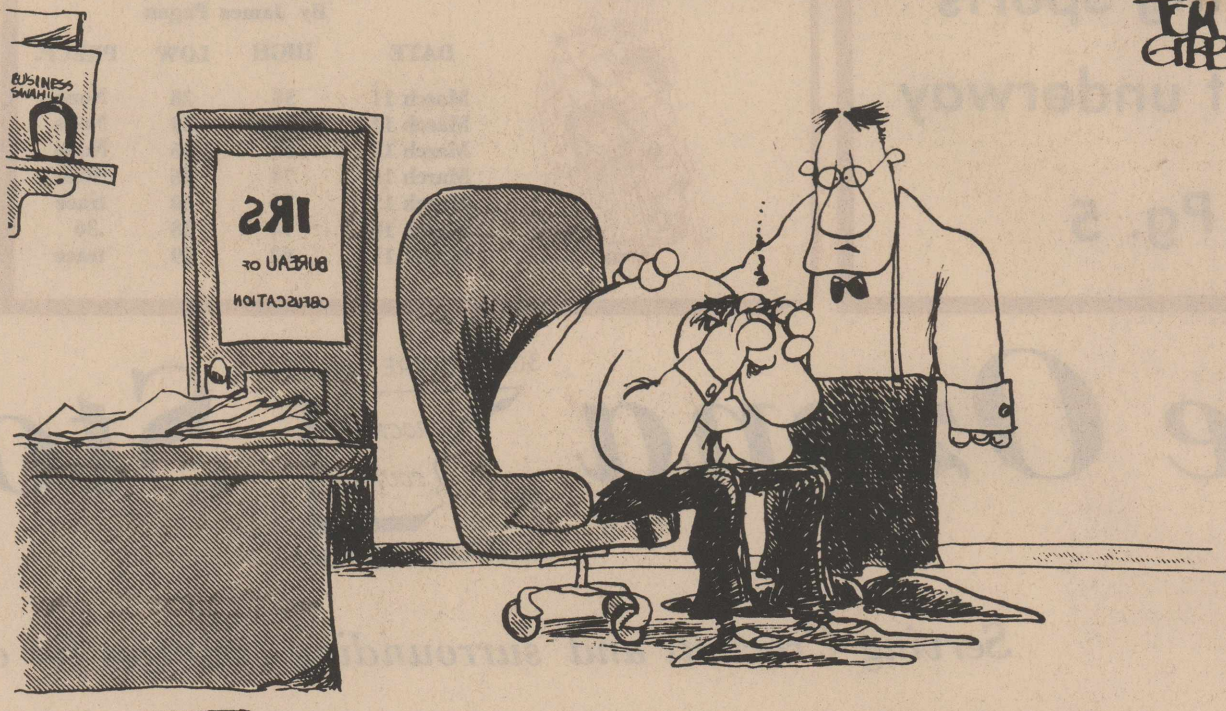

## STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—His credibility falling statewide, Gov. Bill Clements apologized last week for his part in the SMU football scandal and promised to name others with inside knowledge.

Meanwhile, state government lost its top bond rating when Moody's Investments of New York dropped Texas from AAA to AA.

The two events probably will tilt the Legislature to raise taxes again this session. Even though it will be difficult to override Clements' veto, his popularity sag and Moody's action has many lawmakers believing it can be done.

The day after Moody's action, the House unanimously passed a bill creating a special tax committee which could produce a tax bill this session.

Comptroller Bob Bullock will automatically be on the 13-member panel, with others to be appointed by the governor, lieutenant governor and speaker.

25 years. Standard and Poors dropped its bond rating for Texas last spring.

Clements disputed a Moody's comment that his opposition to more taxes added to the company's loss of confidence in the Texas economy. He remains opposed to new taxes.

But Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby called on Clements and others to abandon their campaign rhetoric, face the future and enact a tax bill.

Others predicted the new rating will cost taxpayers millions of dollars in higher interest charges on state and local general obligation bonds.

### Private Prisons

The House put up little opposition in approving a bill allowing the state to contract with private companies to build and operate prisons.

An amendment giving the governor power to review contracts was defeated, but sponsors are expecting his signature after easy Senate passage.

Lawmakers said the bill would allow private contractors to build new prisons faster than a tax bill dedicated to prison construction.

Federal Judge William Wayne Justice toured the prison system last week but didn't say if he will back off his contempt order which threatens to fine the state for ignoring court ordered reforms.

### Other Legislation

The Senate approved a bill cracking down on college hazing and passed a bill outlawing drinking alcohol while driving. Police will have to see the driver drinking the beverage before charges can be filed.

Three bills were filed calling for annual sessions of the Legislature to allow state government to react to economic changes.

Another bill was introduced requiring state and local governments to give preference first to Texas-made products, then American-made, over foreign-made products.

Confidence Lost  
The loss of bond status was seen by many state officials as a warning to Texas to put its economy back in order.

The perceived loss of confidence comes from the Legislature's struggle to choose either budget cuts or a tax hike to resolve a hefty deficit, all amidst a faltering economy.

March 15 - An employee of the Suburban Gas Plant on Pandale Road reported that someone had damaged the plant gate with an automobile. No suspects or witnesses were reported.

## A View of the World Through The Word

### THE VOICE OF MY PRAYER

The Psalmist called all who fear God to come hear what He had done for man's soul. Read Psalm 66:16-20 for some insight and inspiration concerning prayer. God was "extolled" as the Psalmist cried out, and the Creator gave heed to "the voice of my prayer."

Prayer and praise fit together like a hand and glove. Prayer should be uttered praising God for His countless blessings, and not used toward selfish ends. Prayer calls for a disciplined life. It's not an easy thing to give yourself to the concern of honoring God.

The Scriptures point one toward the potentials of prayer, but the Word also cautions about the perversions of prayer. When one analyzes these, and studies the example of Christ in prayer, he is better prepared to grow in this area.

There is unlimited potential in prayer. Jesus demonstrated this principle when He said, "Ask, and it shall be given you; Seek, and you shall find; Knock, and it shall be opened to you" (Mt.7:7). The Father, in the name of Christ, delights to give many blessings to His children.

James wrote, "Draw near to God and He will draw near to you" (James 4:8). The one who "draws near" to God must approach through Christ, the Better Way (Heb.7:19). Coming to Him in an attitude of thanksgiving, obedience, and praise - one is thrilled to know that he has access to all spiritual blessings (Eph.1:3).

The potential of blessings found in Christ is good news. The Christian casts all his care upon Christ (1 Pet.5:7), and, in return, he receives God care. What one receives from God, he must freely share with others.

The funny thing about prayer and its blessings is that it must be secretive (Mt.6:5-6).

There are many perversions of prayer. Many view God as a genie in a bottle. He is only summoned when they have a need or desire. When man gets into one of the many "tight-spots," he calls for God and expects some kind of magic to deliver him. What a gross misunderstanding of prayer.

Prayer is also used as a consciousness-soother. To some prayer is no more than a simplistic ritual relegated to the status of an insurance policy, and "cashed-in" on their own interests. But prayer is a moment of thanksgiving to the Father. We must not abuse it.

The pain of Calvary was endured by the balm of Gethsemane. Christ "offered up both prayers and supplications with loud crying and tears to the One able to save Him from death, and He was heard because of His piety" (Heb. 5:7).

May the voice of our prayers be uttered to the Father in the name of Christ. Someone said that man never stands so tall as he does when he bends his knee to pray. Let today, and everyday, be a knee-bending day.

## Extension Office News

Peers assume a more central role in the lives of teenagers than any other age group. In a sense, the heavy involvement with friends is a mechanism - like candy for a former smoker - for helping the young person make the transition from dependent child to an independent adult.

Most parents would say, "Of course I want my child to be independent." But they don't carry those words out with actions.

The more independent thought and behavior going on in a family, the more diverse the problems and more difficult the answers. So it's a natural tendency for parents to want to minimize problems through control of children's behavior. Yet in order for a teen to gain independence, parental control must decrease.

Once parents realize they must reduce their control, then they can address the issue of peer pressure. The influence of the peer group seems to be at its peak between ages 12 and 14 and gradually declines thereafter.

Parents can help their teenagers by adopting a friendly and loving attitude

not only toward their own adolescent but toward their teenagers' friends as well. Encourage them to "hang out" at your house when you are home. Stay in the background but be kind and friendly when approached. Don't be reluctant to make and maintain house rules, just don't nag about them.

Parents and adolescents should agree on the important moral issues and then give permission for individual decision making. Is it immoral for a 15-year-old boy to have a perm'd tail of hair? Then why worry about it. He likes it and so do his peers.

Parents of teenagers may do best to save their words and worry for the really important things. Keep communication open and direct. Be non-judgmental of your teen's personality and attitudes, but speak out about your personal beliefs.

Make family outings as appealing to your teen as possible, but accept that fact that to the adolescent, friends are more fun than family. This attitude is an important part of the adolescent's life passage and will decrease with time.

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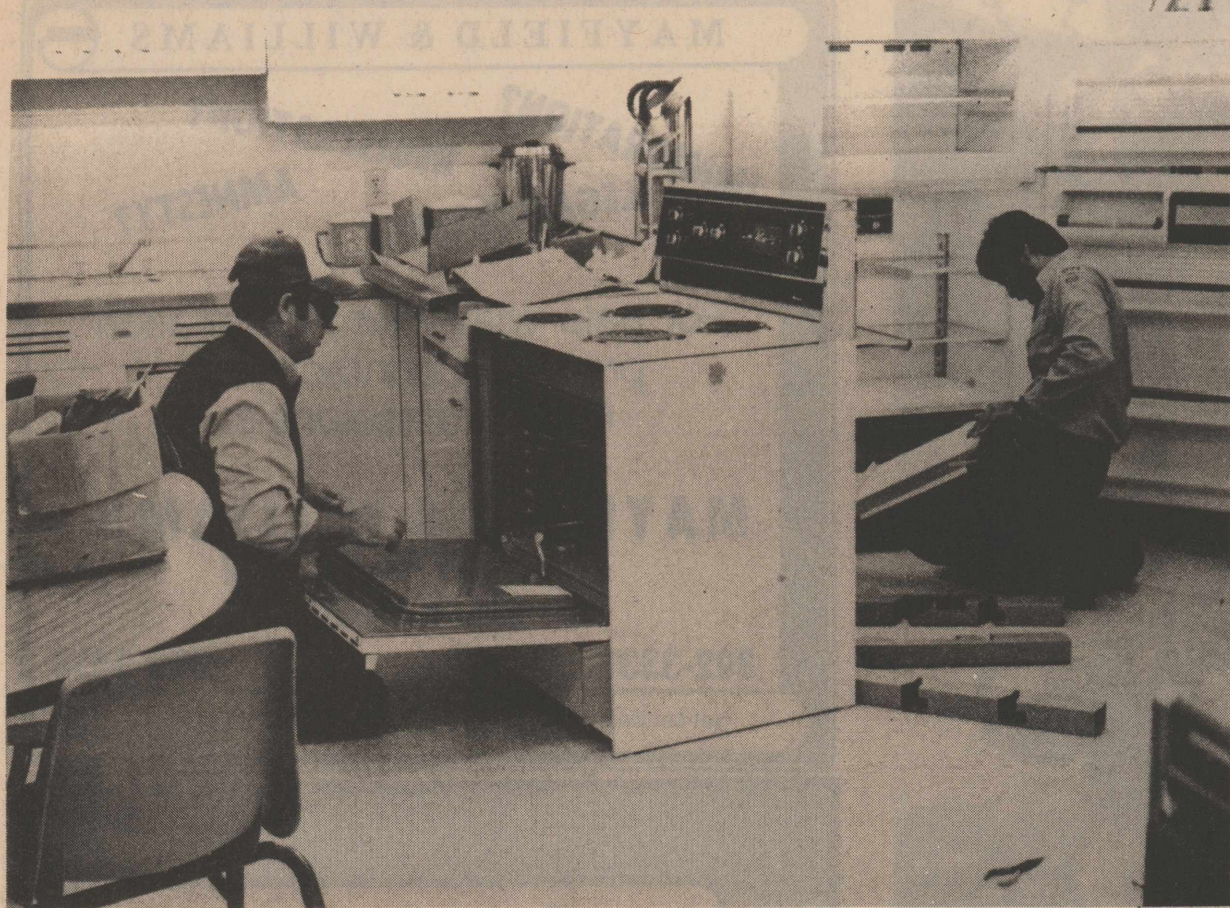

## Letter to the Editor

Dear Kitty,

I noticed that the hospital reported they made a net profit of almost \$6,000 on physicians charges during February. I also noticed that the total cash deposits for February were \$36,202.74 with disbursements of \$78,544.70 to keep the hospital running. That adds up to \$42,341.96 in losses for February or approximately \$40,000 to \$50,000 a month above receipts to keep the hospital open.

I strongly applaud the use of Dr. Bass and the residents who cover for Dr. Owensby on Wednesday and the weekends, they will always do a good job regardless of whether we have a hospital district or if the hospital is run by the county.

As a taxpayer I am aware that in effect we are giving away free hospital care. I say this because regardless of the doctors' charges the percent of collection of these charges is never given. When I worked at the hospital my collection rate was 25 to 35 percent.

If the doctors bring in a profit, it is not enough to cover the losses of the hospital as a whole.

I would like to point out as a physician, if I felt that there was at least some hope for the hospital's survival I would not have left, but attempted to improve the services offered there. If it is such an excellent place to practice, young doctors would be competing to come here and we all know that is not the case, in fact a guaranteed income has not kept some here.

The hard fact is that the Federal Government wants small hospitals and rural hospitals closed. The benefits to small hospitals from Medicare may be as little as half of those given to the larger hospitals. I doubt that anyone feels that small hospitals will survive except as satellites for the larger metropolitan or urban hospitals.

I have tried to avoid getting involved in the hospital dispute believing if you don't approve of the way something is being done you either get out or change it. I got out because I

didn't think it was an appropriate place to work.

At this point I can speak freely as a taxpayer. I want to point out a fact that is rarely mentioned. Opinions on the hospital are usually expressed by those whose jobs depend on it staying open. You do not have an impartial reporter giving the people the facts about the hospital. The administrator's job is to keep the hospital open and preserve his job in spite of the large losses the hospital sustains each month. I have no quarrel with Mr. Boswell, he is doing a fine job of keeping the hospital open. If he fails, the hospital closes and he loses his job.

Nor can I blame anyone for wanting a hospital district, this is their privilege. I do believe very strongly that a hospital such as you have known in the past will never be again.

I am sure most of you noticed the article in the Standard Times relative to the Cardiac treatment and rehabilitation program that Shannon will have in conjunction with St. John's Hospital. This has been made possible entirely by the work of the cardiologist's at St. John's and Shannon Hospitals. These doctors have overcome major problems to provide a facility in San Angelo that ten years ago was available only in major teaching facilities. Does it seem reasonable with outstanding physician availability and excellent equipment that people will spend money for local care?

The commissioners court has never refused proper requests from the hospital board. They have run the county well and will continue to allocate the money the hospital wants, need, and asks for. They can see all the county's needs. If we continue to fragment responsibility to school districts, water districts and hospital districts we will end up like the Federal Government. Do you want every member of your family to be able to write a check on your account? You pay your taxes and they are spent by designated persons. Fortunately

ours are primarily spent by the commissioner's court. I am opposed to giving others, i.e., a hospital board, freedom to spend my tax money on a hospital that neither I nor the majority of the county uses.

I do believe that the use of outstanding physicians such as Dr. Bass should be continued and is no way dependant on whether this facility remains open as an emergency room, hospital, hospital district or as county managed.
