Zilla Miller celebrates 100th birthday

Ozona's oldest resident, Zilla Miller, celebrated her April 6 birthday two days early surrounded by family and friends at a luncheon held at Granny Miller Hall Saturday. The 100-year-old Miss Zilla accepted the good wishes of 168 guests gathered to pay her homage. She greeted everyone from her place at the registry table where a specially printed newspaper proclaimed "Miss Zilla hits 100; family and friends rejoice".

Several years ago, son Jake promised his mother a big barbecue if she made it to 100. About six months ago, she told him he had better get busy, she was going to make it. Sunday's big event, which included a barbecue with all the trimmings, music by the Ozona Band and a guest speaker, was hosted by her sons, Jake and his wife, Vickie, and Buster and his wife, Ethel.

Guest speaker Bill Brown of Lubbock, a former Ozona resident and close family friend, talked about the optimistic spirit of his friend. "She always has something good to say," commented Brown. "She never made life such a complex thing."

Miss Zilla has watched life become much more complex during her 100 years. Her family arrived in Ozona in a covered wagon when she was 12-years-old. Ellis W. Bennett and Hugh Ann Carroll Bennett traveled two weeks to come to the area from Chappel where he had owned a small store.

After arriving in Ozona, the Bennett family moved into a two-room house and Mr. Bennett soon opened a general store. Working in the store occupied Miss Zilla and others in the family of nine children.

A descendant, Ellis Bennett of Houston, made a much quicker, more comfortable trip last week to attend the celebration.

Miss Zilla's father later built the first telephone system in Ozona, and she was one of the operators.

Zilla Bennett and Rob Miller were married in Ozona on April 23, 1911. The couple moved to the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jones Miller, where they lived until May at the headquarters ranch. When Rob's twin brother, Roy, married Bertha Robertson, the two couples lived in a

two bedroom house at the ranch.

After two years they bought a ranch and built identical houses a short distance from each other.

The families lived like that for 25 years. Governesses were hired to teach the children. Rob and Zilla's family consisted of three children, J. B. (Buster), Eugene (Jake) and Noma. Both sons live in Ozona, and Noma died in 1984.

Zilla Miller has eight grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren who shared the special day April 4.

Congratulatory messages from President Ronald Reagan and Nancy Reagan and from Gov. and Mrs. Bill Clements were displayed alongside a silver tray heaped with gifts and messages.

A birthday cake covered in white frosting and decorated with pink spun sugar roses and green leaves held numerical candles proclaiming her 100 years.

Banquet tables were covered with gold cloths. Each place was set with a white lace doily and white napkin with gold Greek key design. Scrolls tied with gold ribbon were mementos of the occasion. The room was abloom with cut flowers and pot plants in baskets tied with gold ribbons.

First Baptist Church to mark 95th birthday

First Baptist Church of Ozona celebrates its 95th birthday Sunday, April 12, by recognizing several church members of longtime standing.

Reminiscences will be shared by these persons during the regular church dinner immediately following the morning services.

First Baptist was organized shortly after Crockett County itself was organized in 1892. Seven persons formed the first membership including Mr. and Mrs. F. M. Drake, Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Bean, Mr. and Mrs. S. T. Smith and their daughter, Alma

V. Smith.

When the membership had grown to 39, the church began a building on the site of the present high school. The building cost \$2,500 and served until 1928 when a new building program was undertaken.

The first building site was sold to the school for its expansion, and the lot where the present facilities are located was bought from the county. The present brick building was opened for services in May 1919.

Annexes were added in 1951 and 1960. Stained glass windows, organs, carillon bells, pew cushions,

carpeting and other additions have been made through the years.

More than 30 pastors have served First Baptist Church with some of these serving twice. The present pastor is Rev. Jim Gray.

First Baptist has had two ministers of the gospel ordained in the church: John Calvin Williams in 1947 and Gary Lynn Elmore in 1972.

Dedication services for the most recent addition to First Baptist's physical plant, a youth-fellowship building, will take place in May. The building was opened for use early this year.

Linda and Scotty Moore take over the helm of the Stockman

Linda and Scotty Moore took over at the helm of the Ozona Stockman after negotiations were completed late Friday afternoon. Linda will serve as the newspaper's editor, and

Scotty will be the publisher. The Moores have merged the Crockett County News, which they have operated in the Village Shopping Center for the past two years, with

The Stockman, and operations will be conducted out of the present location of The Stockman. The Moores will continue to carry a variety of office supplies. All types of

printing will also be available.

The Moores purchased the newspaper from Kitty Montgomery who has been editor and publisher of the paper for the past fifteen years, and who served as editor for several years previously to purchasing the paper, under the tutorage of long-time newspaperman Evert White.

Linda began her newspaper career in Sonora with the Devils River News in 1974, where Scotty was a logging engineer with Dresser Atlas. He became interested in the newspaper business, and in 1975, the couple purchased The Texas Mohair Weekly in Rocksprings. They still own this weekly newspaper which began in 1893 and has been published under six different names.

Scotty and Linda have two sons, Scott and Roy. Scott is a 1984 graduate of Texas Tech University in Lubbock where he is employed by KJTV. Roy is a senior student at Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos.

Mrs. Montgomery plans to travel, spend time with grandchildren and catch up on some other business interests, while getting rest from the weekly deadlines. She will still be "at home" in Ozona, and plans to assist Linda and Scotty whenever and wherever she is needed.

Border Patrol station to close May 1

The local Border Patrol station will close with the May 1 opening of a new facility in San Angelo says Patrol Agent in Charge Bob Bollier. The Sonora suboffice will also close as part of the establishment of a regional command center.

Three agents work out of the Ozona station and 12 out of Sonora. An agent will travel to the Ozona area daily.

The agency has leased a building for temporary quarters in a warehouse formerly occupied by Mitsubishi Aircraft International. A permanent facility will be built on land to be leased from the city north of the Mitsubishi building presently occupied by the Customs Service.

There will be two full-time detention officers in San Angelo and a bus will run daily to transport illegals aliens from San Angelo to Del Rio. Illegals detained by agents patrolling the Ozona area will be held in Crockett County Jail until transported.

Apprehensions are down at this time, Bollier said. The water is high near Langtry where many aliens cross, and the Immigration Act is also affecting the number of illegals crossing. Apprehensions for the current period have been 80 or 90 compared to 300 a year ago, Bollier said.

Within three years, the San Angelo command center is expected

to have a staff of 35 and a payroll of about \$1 million. The center will have jurisdiction over a 25-county area.

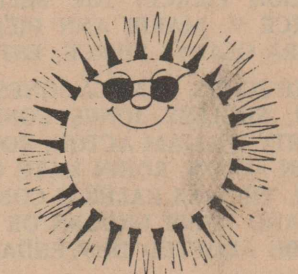

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PENNIES FOR PEACE NOT ENOUGH

The 100th Congress has its eyes on America's strategic defense program.

Since its beginnings in early 1983, the proposed Strategic Defense Initiative (SDI) has been the subject of intense debate in political circles. Liberals and their pseudo-science allies early on made up their minds that SDI couldn't work. The evidence now shows otherwise.

In fact, defense experts feel the United States could deploy a "first generation" SDI system in three to eight years, at a cost of \$25-40 billion. In just four years, we have gone from wondering whether it is possible to destroy enemy missiles to asking when we should start building the equipment to do so.

The Soviets certainly recognize the importance of SDI. The Central Intelligence Agency believes the Soviet Union has been working on its own missile-defense system for nearly two decades, at a cost of an estimated \$150 billion. Moscow has progressed so far that it may be able to deploy a nationwide anti-missile system by the 1990s. It already has begun the process.

Meanwhile, U.S. critics continue to plump for "arms control" agreements and, having lost the argument over the technical feasibility of SDI, find new excuses why the United States should slow down.

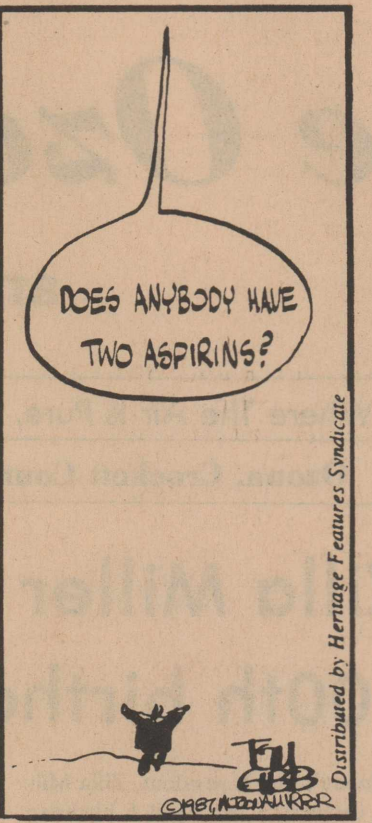
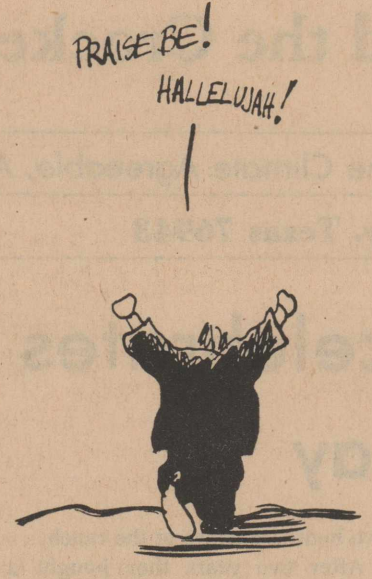
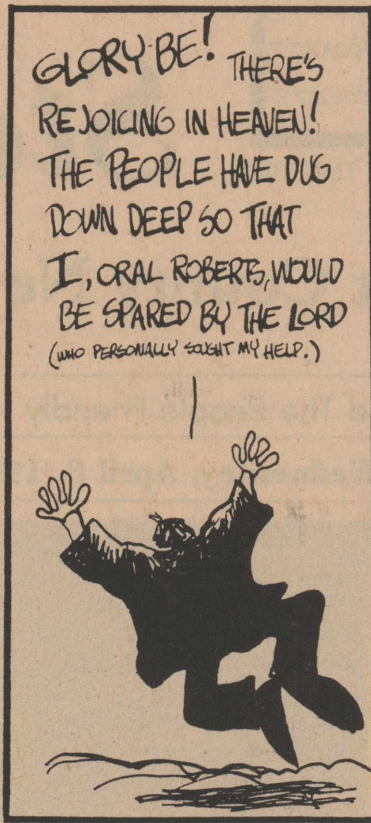
The technological breakthroughs already made in the SDI program argue for stepped-up efforts—not a retreat.

The United States in a very few years may be able to protect much of the U.S. population from long-range enemy missiles. Pentagon tests already have shown that it's possible to knock out missiles before they enter our atmosphere.

Earlier this century, the U.S. developed the hydrogen bomb—the bomb to end all wars. Now, in effect, we have the opportunity to put the genie back in the bottle.

SDI may not end all wars, but it promises to greatly reduce the threat of a nuclear holocaust. Congress should support SDI with every penny it can possibly muster in these belt-tightening times. Instead of finding excuses for slowing down the SDI program, it should find excuses for vigorously pushing ahead. To stop the effort now that success is within reach would be criminal.

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Lawmakers stymied by whether to balance the budget with cuts or taxes heard some good news and some bad news last week.

The good news came in a landmark decision from Attorney General Jim Mattox, who ruled the Legislature can carry a deficit into the next fiscal period, where it must be resolved.

The bad news came in the form of a threat from Gov. Bill Clements to bring the legislators back into special session if they do not expand his budget cutting authority.

The Mattox ruling allows the Legislature to delay taking care of an estimated \$1 billion deficit in the next fiscal period beginning September 1. Lawmakers were greatly relieved.

Comptroller Bob Bullock, who must certify that new budget, had sought the official ruling and argued the rollover violated the constitutional pay-as-you-go principle.

'Improper,' Not Illegal

Mattox said the issue was whether the Comptroller would have additional powers to force the Legislature to bring spending into balance with revenues. He doesn't, and neither does the attorney general, Mattox said.

The ruling interprets that the state can end a fiscal period with a deficit, but the next budget must include funds to erase it or stand in conflict with the Texas Constitution.

Mattox also commented that he thinks what is taking place in the Legislature with regard to the deficit is "improper."

"Now, it's the clock, not the Constitution, that those in the saddle need to watch," Bullock said.

Breathing Room

The legislative leaders breathed a sigh of relief. Many had commented that an adverse ruling would have prevented state government from functioning.

On top of that, the Legislature is grappling now with a governor who won't let them raise taxes even a little. The AG ruling allows the governor and lawmakers to concentrate on their struggle with each other.

Special Session Threat

Clements promised special sessions if lawmakers do not reform the tort laws and expand his budget cutting powers.

In response, 16 Democratic senators scoffed and signed a letter of opposition to giving the governor budget authority. Clements scoffed back.

The Senate

In other action, the Senate passed the private prisons bill, which Clements may veto. The bill allows private contractors to build and operate prisons.

Senators also approved a measure allowing tobacco smoking in public places in designated smoking areas. Bars, tobacco shops and restaurants with small capacities are exempt and can designate their places as smoking areas.

And a bill was passed requiring Texas motorists to prove they carry liability insurance before

purchasing license tags or vehicle inspections.

The House

The dramatic action occurred in the Appropriations Committee, which adjourned for the week with its chairman, Brownfield Rep. Jim Rudd, declaring it was impossible to meet state needs without exceeding Clements' budget restraints.

The committee has already approved more than \$1 billion over the governor's limit, with more spending yet to be addressed.

Rudd conceded the House panel will start over this week, but that major decisions will have to be made.

Other Highlights

• Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby endorsed Democratic presidential hopeful Gary Hart, who swung through Texas garnering support.

• Former Delaware Gov. Peter du Pont visited Dallas Republicans to woo support for his presidential bid.

• Clements blamed former SMU football coach Ron Meyer for orchestrating the illegal payment scheme to football players. He said Meyer, now in the NFL, recruited boosters to make lucrative offers to high school players.

• Texas officials who knew nothing of the negotiations were surprised about a new U.S.-Mexico agreement to allow hazardous waste shipment for disposal between the two countries.

Brownsville state Sen. Hector Uribe said it will turn Mexico into a dumping ground for the U.S., and that he was really concerned for Mexico. Other Texas border state senators, fearing a stack-up at crossing points, have joined him to require that the state receive advance notification of waste shipments. Apparently the federal rules were promulgated a year ago without notifying state officials.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club

Important chores for this month include late spring pruning, especially early blooming shrubs, lawn repair or planting, and fertilization of trees, shrubs, perennial beds as new growth appears.

There's plenty of time to plant new ground cover beds, set out bedding plants or nursery-grown annuals and perennials and finish planting warm season vegetables.

One of the most dependable annuals for flower beds or borders is the dependable annual periwinkle, (*Viola rosea*). Locate beds near patios, walkways, and other prominent places where they can be seen and enjoyed.

Plant annuals and perennials high, low and in-between for a spectacular display of color. By this varying heights, you can produce layers of colors and texture throughout the garden. Too, plant so that one group

will be in bloom at a different time. You may have space to start a massed planting that will produce colors at every level of the garden.

Start with a backdrop of high flowers and full foliage, such as day-lilies, rose mallow and foxglove. Then drift masses of profusely flowering medium-height plants like marigolds, zinnias, daisies and salvia.

In the foreground, use the loose, informal plants that seem to spill over, such as dwarf marigolds, dwarf asters, sultana, garden phlox and sweet alyssum.

For a lower growing flower bed, use African marigolds for backdrop - petunias, ageratum and sweet alyssum for the border. Begin to condition houseplants by moving outside away from the wind and in shade for a few hours at a time for four or five days.

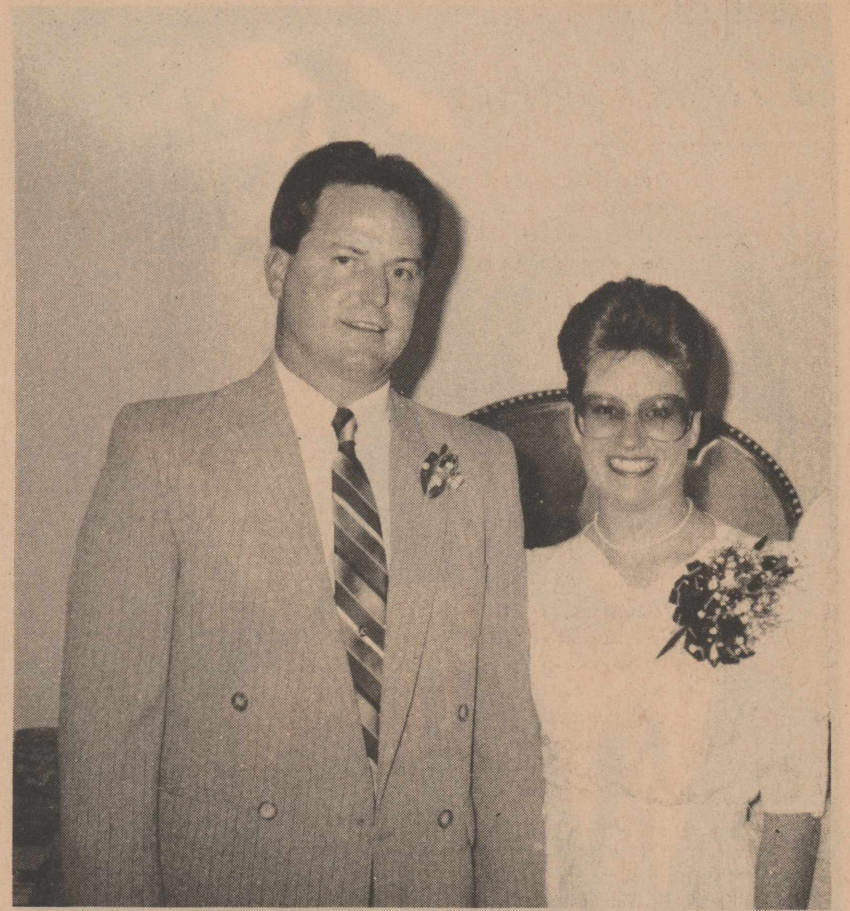

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A Question of whom to follow

Recent controversy has brought two large television ministries into the public eye. Religious news which is usually buried in Section C of most newspapers has made its way to the front page of many. This has not been much of a surprise since the secular, largely non-Christian news media seems poised to exploit any news that puts Christianity in general, and Christian leaders, in specific, in a bad light.

What has been somewhat surprising is that there seems to be a few Christian "buzzards" circling around. I am told that coyotes will chew a leg off to get out of a trap. It seems as though some Christians have viewed the current controversy as a trap and that it is better to chew a leg off than to stay in the trap.

I have heard it said before that Christians are different than other groups in that "they kill their wounded". In battles, we have medics and M.A.S.H. units to do everything possible to keep the wounded alive. But in Christendom, when a brother or sister falls in "spiritual warfare", we have a tendency to leave them on the battlefield alone and lonely to die.

Now let me say I'm not a staunch supporter of T.V. ministries. I do believe they can meet a need, but many have made them their church "at home" and that is not Biblical! This is part of our mentality of convenience. Most of our homes have every appliance known to mankind to make life more convenient. We even have "convenience" stores. Now television has made religion more convenient. Oh, sure, we still have the "local" church in which to be married and buried, but in between we have the "electronic church". My argument with T.V. ministers is that many of them have allowed people to make their "shows" their church, and in many cases even encourage this. They ignore such Biblical imperatives as "do not forsake the assembling of yourselves together as is the habit of some" and "bring all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be food in My house".

While I obviously disagree with some things, it is not my place to condemn or judge. James 4:11-12 says "Do not speak evil of one another, brethren. He who speaks evil of a brother and judges his brother, speaks evil of the law and judges the law. But if you judge the law, you are not a doer of the law but a judge. There is one Lawgiver who is able to save and destroy. Who are you to judge another?"

Who are we to judge another? Jesus' disciples came to Him upset that another group was casting out demons in Jesus' name. Jesus told them not to forbid anyone from doing things in His name - "for he who is not against us is on our side". (Mark 9:40) That is to be our test of others -

"he who is not against us is for us". In Matthew 12:30 and Luke 11:23, Jesus gives us the test we are to apply for ourselves - "he who is not with Me is against Me". Are you with Him?

I for one cannot pray like the Pharisees (Luke 18:10 ff) who prayed "God, I thank You that I am not like other men - extortioners, unjust, adulterers, or even as this tax collector". I am more like the tax collector, and I'm so thankful that my God is a forgiving God who saved a wretch like me. If you want to know what Jesus thought about the Pharisees, read Matthew, Chapter 23.

If I don't agree with what someone does, I will not join them or support them, but if they are claiming to do things in the name of Jesus, I will not condemn or judge them. I will pray for them - in fact, I have been praying for them by name. They are wounded! Perhaps the wounds are self-inflicted, but aren't all "sin wounds" self-inflicted?

I don't care what label you may wear - if you believe in Jesus, you belong with me. You are my brothers and sisters in Christ. Satan is the Adversary - he is the enemy. Don't let him trick us into fighting one another. There are lost people dying and going to hell every day while people who claim to be Christian are fighting each other. Don't follow me - don't follow them - Follow JESUS!

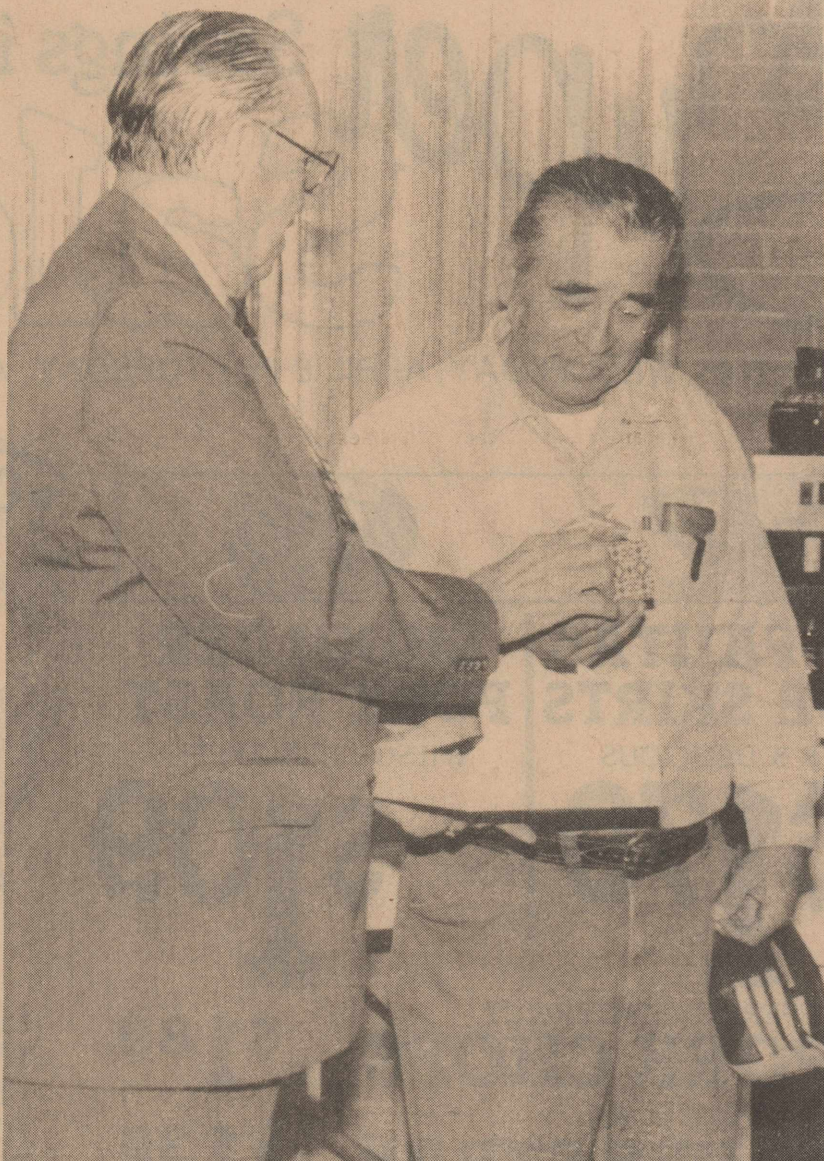

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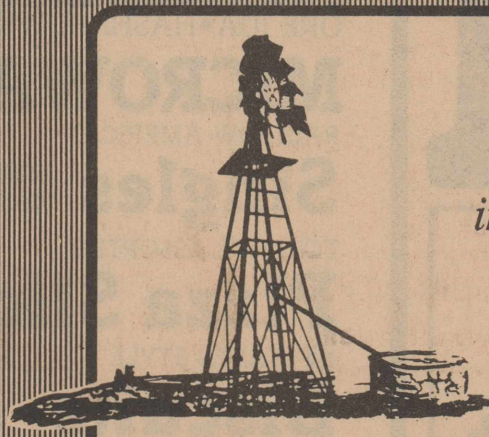

Camey, Iraan, Eldorado and Sheffield April 4 in McCamey.

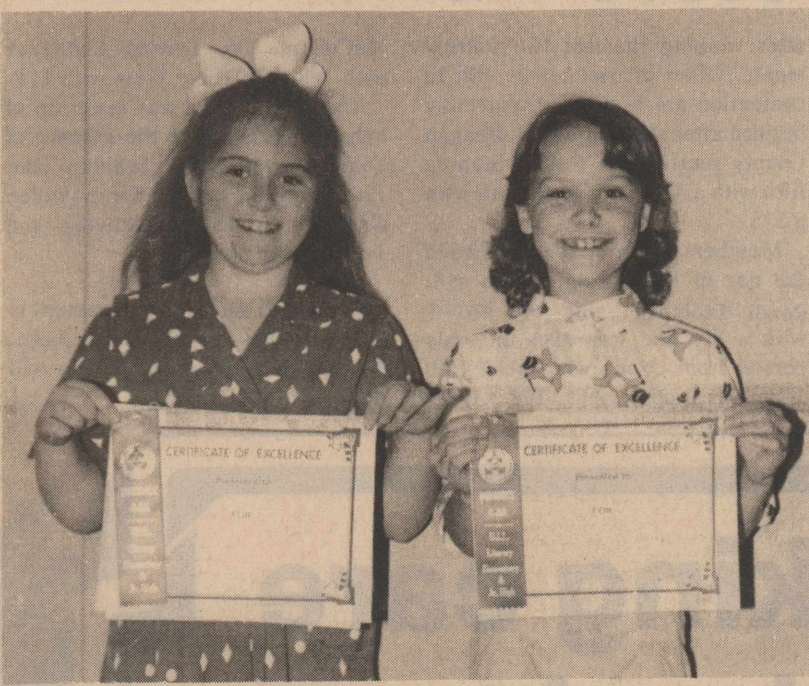

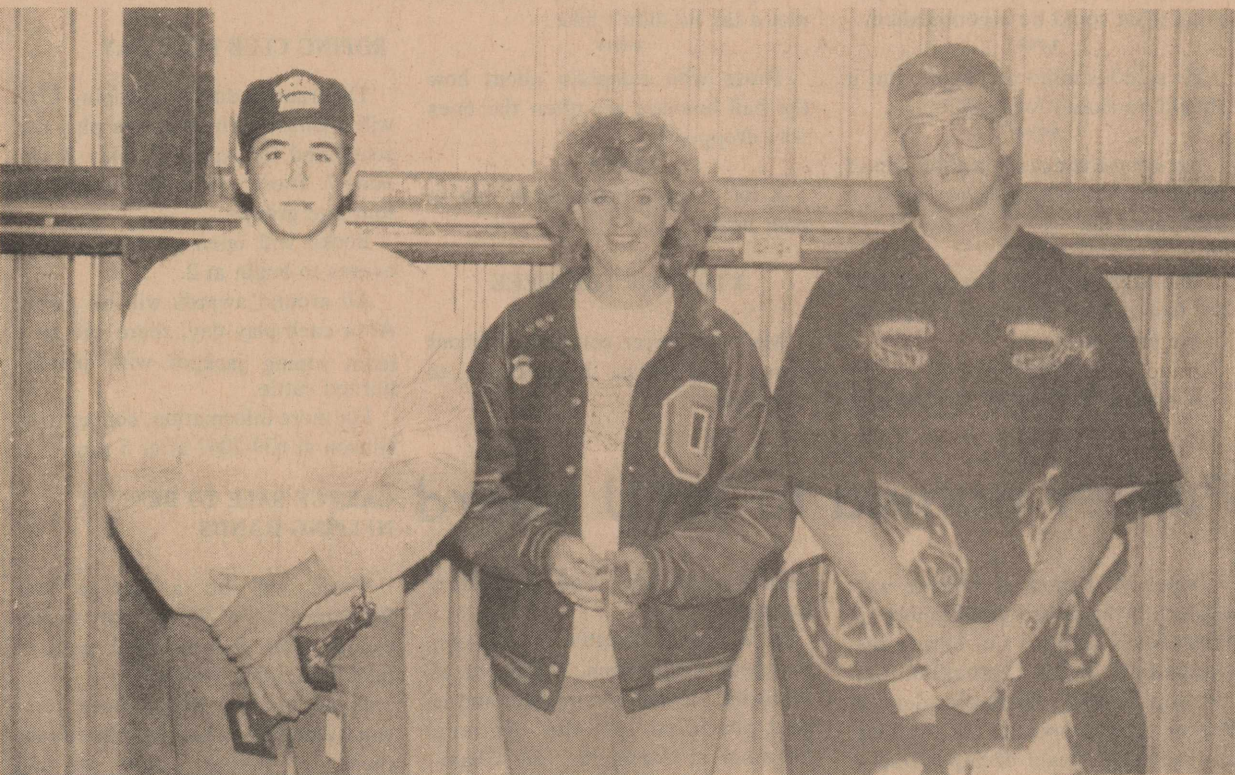
