

They also know that if they cannot visit the field office for one reason or another, they can telephone or write to the office and make arrangements to meet a representative at some other point at a convenient time. However, some persons who are confined to their homes by illness or infirmities do not realize the social security field office which serves their community is prepared to meet such a situation. This service is provided in order that such persons may not lose benefits through failure to file a claims application on time. Should you be eligible for oldage and survivors insurance benefits but are physically unable to leave your home to file your application, you should get in touch with the nearest social security field office, either by mail or telephone, and explain the circumstances.
