"Their hugs and kisses make my day," she said of her students. There have been as many as 55 children in the program at one time. Present enrollment at the center is 25 for Kiddie Klub and 18 in Tinyville. "It takes a lot of loving, a lot of patience to work with this group," said Mrs. Valadez of the youngsters.

One on one attention for children who are in need of special help is a plus at the center. When a child is falling behind in an area, I make time to help that student, she said.

Former Ozona athlete Larry Payne was among seven Angelo State University student-athletes recognized for outstanding achievement May 1 on the university campus. The 21st annual Nathan's Jewelers ASU Rams and Rambelles All Sports Banquet was held in the Houston Harte University Center Ballroom.

Payne, men's track and field awards recipient, was honored along with Pierce Holt, football; Tim Howard, men's basketball; Debbie Hebert, women's track and field; Michelle Steele, women's basketball; and Jackie Hill, women's volleyball.

Payne, a 6-0 senior, will be participating in the NCAA Division II National Track and Field Championships in Cape Girardeau, MO May 21-23.

The physical education major is a member of the national meet qualifying 4x100 meter and 4x400 meter relay teams. He has also been a valuable point producer in the 100 and 200 meter dashes.

This is the fourth year for the 1982 graduate of Ozona High School to qualify for the nationals. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Payne.

Payne was named two time All-American last year in the 1600m and the 400m relays. Sanchez, pleased with his first six laps, said he was surprised at Patterson's outburst.

"...I knew it was over," Sanchez said. "I knew I couldn't catch him." Patterson took the race by 100 yards, clocking a new 2A record of 9:27.6. Easily in second place, Sanchez finished in a time of 9:45.2, while third place had a time of 9:57. Sanchez improved his order of

finish by one from last year's state meet where he placed third in class 3A. However, Sanchez' time proved to be off from last year's by seven seconds.

With one more year ahead, Sanchez may perhaps finish his climb to the top by winning the 3,200m run, thus ending his high school career with a 3-2-1 finish.

The weekend before the state meet, Sanchez competed in a state qualifiers' meet. There he placed second with a time of 9:58.3, edging out Mario Gonzalez of Big Spring who had a 9:59.1. Jimmy Balmer of Lubbock Coronado took first place at this event with a time of 9:47.5.



School board adopts new calendar

The Ozona School Board elected officers and approved a new 1987-88 school calendar during their regular monthly meeting on Tuesday, May 12.

Current president, Jeffrey Sutton, and vice-president, Gary Buck Mitchell, were re-elected for the 1987-88 school year, and Sandra Childress was elected secretary of the seven-member board. Mr. Sutton and Mr. Mitchell were also elected as the board's delegates to the Texas Association of School Boards-Texas Association of School Administrators Joint Annual Convention which will be held in San Antonio on September 19-21.

The 1987-88 school calendar is very similar to the present school calendar. Significant dates include: August 24-27 (teacher inservice); August 28 and August 31 (teacher planning days); September 1 (first day of school); September 7 (Labor Day holiday); November 26-29 (Thanksgiving holidays); December 19-Janury 3 (Christmas holidays); January 14 (end of the first semester); January 15 (teacher planning day); March 2-6 (spring break); April 1-3 (Easter holidays); May 22 (baccalaureate); May 26 (end of the second semester); and, May 27 (teacher planning day/ graduation). During the meeting the trustees voted to approve the consolidation of the Crockett Heights bus route and the Circle Bar Truck Corral route next year. The route consolidation will save thd district approximately \$5,000 annually. The members also voted to lease a car for driver's education and a Suburban for vocational agriculture from Buttery Motor Company instead of purchasing the two vehicles.

Broken putter breaks Hood's confidence

Ozona High School golfer Bret Hood's dream season, which included both a district and a regional championship, ended in heartbreak May 15 in Austin as bad luck and a tough course got the best of him at the UIL state golf tournament.

Hood went into the tournament with unbridled confidence. After winning Region I-AA going away with a pair of 75's, Hood felt on the top of his game. Accompanied by Coach Rip Sewell, Hood arrived in Austin Wednesday and surveyed the layout of the course he would play, Lions Municipal.

On Day 1 of the tournament, Hood began the round just as he had most of the year. After playing just three holes, he was three shots over par. Hole number four, a rather ordinary par three of 155 yards, was the site of the most unusual occurance of the season.

"I took my putter out of my bag and began testing the grain of the green," said Hood. "I had made a couple of back and forth motions when all of a sudden, the head came off!" Hood's putter, with which he had played for more than five years, was broken, and Hood's confidence broke with it.

For the next five holes, he putted with his two-iron and struggled lessly. At the turn, Hood began using a backup putter he had brought along just in case disaster struck. He continued to struggle on the greens and watched in agony as the rest of his game collapsed around him.

He turned the front-nine in 45, nine over par. On the back, he picked up four strokes, shooting 41 and posting a 15 over par 86.

"Considering the circumstances, I played all right," Hood said. "Even though I was 10 shots behind the leader, I thought I could make up some ground the second day."

On Thursday night, Sewell and Hood scoured a local pawn shop and bought a putter for use in the second round. The new putter didn't help at all. Playing most of the front nine in a rain shower made putting difficult. Hood set the tone for the day when

he made a triple-bogey eight on #2

and followed that with bogeys at #3,. #5, #7 and #9. He turned the front side in 44, eight over par.

On the back nine, Hood played the first four holes in five over par. On the last five holes of the 1987 season, Hood bore down and parred three holes in a row, only to bogey the last two for a 43. Hood's total of 87 for the last 18 holes gave him a two-day total of 173.

Gary Shoen, a senior from Hamilton, won the individual championship with a total of 149. Second ws Memphis' Darrel Cofer at 153. Cofer also finished second to Hood at the regional tournament.

Hood reflected on the 1987 season with a down-to-earth outlook. "I'm just happy I got to state," Hood said. "I'm really pleased with the way I played this year. Days like I had at state are going to happen, so I'm not going to get too upset about it."

Hood, along with teammates Will Seahorn, Copie Davis, Shane Pridemore and Jay Haire, will begin summer tour competition in Odessa June 2 in the Optimists' Junior World Championship qualifying tournament.

WTU files rate increase

West Texas Utilities Co. has filed for an increase in its retail electric rates, citing the costs of completing a new coal-fired power plant as making the move necessary.

'We have said over and over again that it would be necessary to increase rates when our Oklaunion Power Station was completed," said Stephen Williams, WTU's local manager in Ozona, adding that WTU's last rate request came almost three years ago.

The rate change being sought would add \$50,361,475 to the Company's annual retail revenue. This is a 23.9 per cent increase over the test year ending March 31, on which the case is based. The request was filed May 19 with cities in the WTU service area and with the Public owner is \$275 million, which increased the Company's total investment in facilities by 75 per cent.

"Until this cost is reflected in our rates, the Company does not have the opportunity to recover its expenses and earn a reasonable return on its investment," Williams explained.

Construction at Oklaunion started in May 1982, and the plant was completed on time and well within the original budget. Industry surveys show that Oklaunion was the most economically constructed coal-fired power plant built during the mid-1980s.

Usual procedures at the PUC indicate that a full-scale hearing of WTU's case would be held in late summer, with a final order by the





CALCIUM CRITICAL FOR TEENS

What teen is unaware of the hottest cut and color of jeans, the most outrageous recording artist, the wackiest wardrobe accessory, or whether gel or mousse sculpts best?

If only teens would pursue good nutrition with some of the same fervor. Today's teens are making important nutritional decisions that affect not only themselves but also their families. Recent surveys show that more than half of the teenage girls in the United States shop for all or part of the family's groceries each week. Three out of four teenage girls prepare meals for their families.

Despite the important role they play in determining what foods they and their families eat, teenage girls are not as well nourished as they should be. They especially are missing the mark for calcium and iron.

HOW MUCH CALCIUM IS NEEDED?

A girl may grow one inch each year between age 11 and age 18. Calcium plays an important role in the development of the skeleton, nearly half of which is formed between the ages of 10 to 20.

For girls in this age group, the Recommended Dietary Allowance (RDA) for calcium is 1200 mg. That's four to five servings daily from the milk group. One serving equals one cup of milk or buttermilk, one container of yogurt, one ounce of cheese or one cup of ice cream or ice milk. There is very little safety margin in this requirement since other factors affect how much calcium and other nutrients are actually absorbed by the body. Pregnant teens are recommended to consume an additional 400 mg. or a total of 1600 mg. calcium per day to meet the growth needs of both mother and baby.

A CALCIUM CRISIS?

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According to data from research conducted between 1976 and 1980. the median intake of calcium for girls age 12 to 17 is 692 mg. or 58 percent of the RDA of 1200 mg. One half of



other foods that are high in essential nutrients. Dieting or not, she frequently replaces milk with soda, depriving her body of an excellent source of calcium.

The skeleton can be built and enlarged only during the years of growth and development, from birth to age 20, with a small amount of bone consolidation occurring during the 20s. If calcium intake is low during adolescence, it could affect the optimal growth and enlargement of the skeleton, resulting in a smaller and weaker skeleton that may have been attained by adulthood. There currently is no reliable way to rebuild or enlarge the skeleton after the period of growth and development.

When too little calcium is consumed in the diet, the body draws calcium reserves from the bones the body's calcium bank. In addition, from about the age of 40, bone is naturally lost as part of the aging process. As old age is reached, the bones become fragile if the body has had a small bone bank from which to draw. Many women lose enough bone that the skeleton becomes susceptible to fracture by even the most simple movements. This condition is known as osteoporosis.

BECOME CALCIUM CONSCIOUS

To ensure a strong and healthy body, teens need to become calcium conscious. Calcium intake can easily be increased with dairy foods. For example, when planning meals, include calcium-rich dishes such as lasagne or macaroni and cheese. hen eating out or grocery shopping, be sure to get real dairy foods marked with the "REAL" seal - especially pizza and milkshakes. Whenever possible, drink milk with meals.

BUILDING STRONG BONES



In 1985, more than one in four Americans, or about 46.6 million, engaged in sport fishing. And if Texas fishermen are indicative of the rest of the nation, most of those did not know the laws regulating the sport while engaged in the activity. Like it or not, there are laws to be observed, and they're there to help assure all fishermen of a chance to catch a fish...this year, next year, and 20 years from now. With that kind of pressure on the resource, regulation is necessary to assure a future for the sport. The same laws apply whether you're a "fisherman", or just a camper passing the time with a cane pole on the bank of the creek, as an afterthought and incidental to another outdoor activity. All of the regulations are explained in detail in the Texas Freshwater Fishing Guide (free anyplace licenses are sold), but we'll hit the high points in this column and try to summarize the most important aspects of those laws and answer the most often asked questions before they're asked.

We'll be referring to Texas public fresh waters in general, but be aware that there are some areas (usually lakes) where special laws exist to fit that area, so read that guide or ask

about special laws before fishing a new spot.

This week, we'll cover licensing requirements for Texas residents. A resident is defined as a person with U. S. citizenship, or an alien who has officially declared his intent to become a citizen, who has resided in Texas for more than six months immediately preceeding application for a license.

There is legislation pending which would provide for exemptions; however, at the present time, a fishing license is required of all persons fishing in the public waters of the State of Texas. For all practical purposes, consider your fishin' hole public waters unless it's a private stock tank. Private land on both sides of the river doesn't necessarily make the waters private!

A Resident Fishing License costs \$8.00, or you can buy a Combination Hunting/Fishing License for \$15.00 and you'll be covered for most outdoor activity in Texas. Both licenses expire at the end of August following issuance, so if you buy your fishing license in the middle of August, you'll just get to use it for two weeks. A license bought in September will be good for almost a vear.



If you didn't already have a fishing license prior to your fishing trip in July or August, or if you know that this is the only time you'll fish this year, you can buy a \$5.00 license that's good for 14 days from issuance called a Temporary (14 day) Resident Sportfishing License.

Residents under the age of 17, or 65 or over, or the holder of a commercial fishing license, need to acquire a Special Resident Fishing License. It's free, but it's still required to fish in Texas, regardless of how you're fishing. Blind persons or certain disabled veterans are entitled to a reduced fee license for \$1.50.


A lost or destroyed fishing license can be replaced with a duplicate license for \$5.00, but it'll require you to get your old license number from the place you bought it. In many cases, it's easier to purchase another license like the one you lost, and pay the \$8.00. The law prohibits buying another hunting license to prevent anyone from getting extra deer or turkey tags, but there's no law that prevents you from buying several fishing licenses.




