For newspaper quality it does just fine, and several weekly papers have replaced their phototypesetting equipment with the laser printer.

Two fires damage Ozona businesses

Ozona Inn of the West remained discovered was consistent with a osed this week after a Saturday cigarette smoldering in a trash can, closed this week after a Saturday morning fire which originated in the

In addition to the damage in the bar, smoke damage was extensive to the rest of the building according to Fire Marshal Steve Kenley.

Volunteer firemen were on the scene with the first unit four minutes after receiving the 3 a.m. call. Upon arrival, they found heavy smoke conditions in the lobby and were advised that the fire was in the bar.

Using a key to gain entry through the back door of the bar, John L. Henderson, Carol Hunnicutt, Della Moore and Jimmy Hokit entered the room, and with a 11/2 inch hose, had the blaze under control within a

According to Kenley, the bar area, adjoining sitting area and ceiling were burning at that time. High heat and acrid smoke filled the room.

Firemen took 11/2 hours to clear the building of smoke and ensure that the fire had not spread.

"The firemen did a heck of a job," Kenley said.

Volunteers mounted a twopronged offense, attacking and suppressing the fire and checking the upstairs living quarters for occu-

Several members of the Dewayne Bullard family reside on the second floor of the building.

The fire originated in a plastic trash container near the door between the bar and restaurant according to Kenley. The bar had closed at 12:50 a.m., and the approximately two hour period until the fire was

A faulty light fixture was the cause of a fire at Cottage Collection and Antiques, Etc. Monday afternoon. Fire Marshal Steve Kenley reported that a fire originating with a ballast transformer spread into the wooden attic space of the former Foxworth-Galbraith Building, heavily charring the 2x12 roof supports.

The fire was called in after Baggett Agency employees saw smoke coming from the roof as they left work at 5 p.m.

Firemen arrived three to four minutes later to find the building

The front door was forced, salvage covers put down to protect the merchandise, and a portion of the ceiling pulled down to expose the fire in the attic in the left rear of the showroom.

Approximately 20 gallons of water were used to extinguish the blaze. A hose was taken to the second floor where firemen discovered smoke and excessive heat.

The shops had been closed since about 2 p.m. and J. P. Pogue, who has an office in the back of the building, did not detect the fire because of its location.

The Ozona Fire Department was called out to fight two grass fires Wednesday, August 5. The first call came from the J. Cleo Thompson Ranch just north of town where approximately two acres burned. The second call came shortly thereafter from the Joe Pierce Ranch south of town. It was reported that approximately 50 acres burned.

County may raise taxes

County taxes are looking at an 11 cent per \$100 valuation increase according to County Auditor Dick Kirby. The county budget being prepared for the 1988 fiscal year has been cut by \$276,000 and \$236,000 of the cut is from funds derived from taxes. A one cent increase in valuation brings \$40,000 to the county coffers, Kirby said.

A budget hearing will be held in September, and nothing will be final until after that time.

Crockett County and the Ozona School System have eliminated their participation in the child welfare program for Ozona. The school, county and state had participated in the joint funding of a child welfare program for Crockett County. Previously, Crockett and two other counties were served by the same case worker.

Court members agreed that the county should begin attempts to locate a consultant to aid in landfill application filing. Four to six months use are left for the landfill with an inspection scheduled for December.

Wading through the applications necessary for the Department of Health is impossible without expert assistance, Judge A. O. Fields told

Gasoline bids were received from Sonora/Ozona Oil Company and House Fuel. The court awarded the bid to Sonora/Ozona.

Paying bills and debating the purchase of a high pressure washer for the Road Department took up much of the court's time. After much discussion, and two motions, commissioners decided that Eddie Moore, road supervisor, should obtain information on Bean and John Deere high pressure washers for the next court meeting.

Terri Williams was approved as a board replacement for Queta Fierro when Garland Young gave his Civic/ Youth Center report. Young also informed commissioners that the lettering for the building had come in and was in place on the front of the

Texas sheep producers were pleased to learn of the addition of lamb to Stouffer's Lean Cuisine® line of low calorie entrees. Introduced nationally in February, this is the first American lamb frozen entree to be marketed.

The new product results from a four-year development effort by the American Lamb Council with Stouffer's product managers which began with discussions and ALC taste samplings of suggested entrees. Stouffer's conducted extensive recipe, cooking and consumer tests to ensure that the final product, herbed lamb with rice, met their high standards. ALC also coordinated needed research on frozen lamb cuts with Colorado State University and worked with Stouffer's suppliers on developing cutting specifications for the product.

ALC is working with several frozen food manufacturers to encourage the use of American lamb in their frozen entree lines. New product development may take several years from concept through to market introduction, so ALC includes this type of

new product development as an ongoing part of its activities with a number of prospects.

A three-month national retail contest and lamb promotion helped maintain high awareness and enthusiasm for American lamb and helped sustain high wholesale prices. Participants included divisions of Safeway, Kroger, Albertsons, Winn Dixie, Fleming and a number of smaller regional chains.

A few examples of outstanding sales results due to retailers' extra efforts during the contest:

•Increased sales overall ranged from two percent to more than 1400 percent, but most participating retailers showed about 70 percent

•One Oklahoma retailer increased total Fresh American Lamb sales by 632 percent over the same six-week period last year. Total box packs of legs and loins increased by 232 percent, and the promotion stimulated new sales of 2,592 pounds of boneless legs and shoulders.

•A winner from Western Super-

Wildlife management important

Wildlife management is becoming more important each year since the wildlife of this area are an important economic resource to many ranchers in Crockett County.

One of the first steps in beginning a good wildlife management program is to take some type of census of the wildlife population. In regards to white-tailed deer, there are several census techniques available that will give a fairly good estimate of the number of deer and in some cases buck: doe ratio on a given area or ranch.

Three of the more commonly used census techniques are: Hahn Walking Census Survey, Spotlight Census, and Helicopter Census. Each technique has its advantages and disadvantages; however, each will yield valuable data that can be used for management recommendations.

After conducting a census on a given area or ranch, a wildlife biologist or other trained specialist can tabulate the data collected and recommend a proper harvest of deer that can be taken without causing damage to the population.

Once a harvest recommendation has been determined, accurate harvest records should be maintained. Harvest data will give trends in a population as to whether the deer herd is improving or what steps need to be taken to improve the





Plan ahead to air condition

When you buy an air conditioner, you are buying comfort. To get the most comfort for the price, you need to plan ahead.

The correct size air conditioning unit is especially important in Texas because the humidity is so high much of the year.

Remember that an air conditioner dehumidifies as it cools, and reducing humidity will improve your level of comfort. An air conditioner that is too small will not be able to keep the temperature low enough for comfort.

The mistake of thinking "bigger is better" may present another type of problem. Too large a unit will cool the area so quickly that dehumidification is insufficient

To avoid such problems, measure the size of the area to be air conditioned, the size and type of windows in the area, and the voltage and accessibility of electrical outlets. Take this information along when shopping, to help a sales person determine the physical size of a unit and its cooling capacity in BTUs that will adequately cool and dehumidify the specified area.

The cost of the unit and its installation are only part of the total cost of owning an air conditioner. Operational costs are also a large consideration.

Each unit should have a yellow and black Energy Guide displayed on it. This contains its Energy Efficiency Rating. This rating explains about how much the unit will cost to operate. The higher the rating, the more efficient the unit will be and the less it will cost to





ASCS to follow bankruptcy policy procedures

ditions together with numerous other contributing factors, many ASCS producers have decided to seek the protection afforded by the federal bankruptcy laws. Others are now pondering if they should make the same decision.

Over the past four years, ASCS has become increasingly involved in the area of bankrupty. It continues to receive much criticism for the way in which bankruptcies are handled. This letter is written to inform our producers of the procedure necessary for county offices to follow when producers become involved in bankruptcy proceedings. This procedure is national policy, which means it is directed by our Washington Office. We cannot change or deviate from the policy; we must follow it.

When a county office becomes aware an ASCS producer has filed a bankruptcy petition, all program activity involving that producer, such as issuance of program payments, loan redemptions/issuances, etc., are suspended. Washington policy directs county offices to seek legal advice from the Office of General Counsel (government attorneys) before any action is taken to disburse payments loans, etc. A copy of the bankruptcy petition must be obtained by the county ASCS Office and provided to the ASCS State Office together with all ASCS program documentation involving the bankrupt producer. Many payment decisions are made at the State ASCS level. Cases requiring preparation of legal documents on behalf of ASCS or CCC are referred to our Office of General Counsel in Temple, Texas. The automatic stay that goes into effect when a bankruptcy case is filed prevents ASCS/CCC from conducting business-as-usual with the debtor

In Chapter 11, 12, and 13 bankruptcy cases, an Authorization to participate in Federal Farm Programs, signed by the bankruptcy judge is needed before any pending program payments, if due the producer, can be issued. This Authorization also allows participation in the CCC loan program. This form is available in the local ASCS

Since ASCS may not become aware of a bankruptcy filing for many months, it is to the producer's advantage to inform the County ASCS Office when a bankruptcy petition has been filed. This will allow county offices to begin the process they are directed to complete. In this respect county offices can be of better service to the producer if they are aware a bankruptcy has been filed.

The State Office and the County Offices are inundated with telephone calls and letters from Bankrupt producers, their attorneys, financial consultants, etc., demanding certain actions to be taken on bankruptcy cases. It is difficult to process the volume of cases being submitted because so much time is being expended on satisfying questions on an individual cases by case basis. Once the required bankruptcy information is provided to the State Office by a county office, it usually takes a week to 10 days for payment advice to be received by county offices.

Thank you for taking time to read this letter. It is hoped the explanations provided will be helpful to you if you have or may become involved in filing of a bankruptcy. In spite of the recent accusations and criticisms directed toward ASCS regarding the bureaucratic handling of these cases, our goal has always been and will continue to be service to the farmer. **EDITOR'S NOTE:**




