

Bailey County Farmers Take Stand On Policies

Nearly 200 farmers crowded the district courtroom here Monday night when the annual covention of the Bailey County Farm Bureau was held and they discussed the pros and cons of propositions affecting the immediate future of Texas and U.S. Agriculture. They come up with a set of resolutions to be presented to the Farm Bureau state convention to be held in Mineral Wells in November.

After lengthy debate some resolutions were rejected, others were tabled for future action. Resolutions adopted concern

a wide variety of farm problems: Drouth Disaster Relief in Bailey training for school children and commensurate salaries for teachers; adequate electric and tele-90 to 100 per cent parity for farm support prices; Noxious Weed Control; Price Support for grain sorghums.

9. That the present Mexican National Labor Agreement is unfair to the farmer in that it fails to take into consideration services and supplies furnished by him in determining wages paid, and we should work for a more equitable agreement next year.







National cotton allotment of all states was cut to 17,-910,448 acres so as according to the U. S. D. A. to produce 10,000,000 bales next year and wipe out the surplus. We of the Farm Bureau say Mr. Benson's figures are in error, as he didn't take into consideration the cotton that would have been planted in those drouth stricken areas if not for drouth and we contend due to drouth, floods and other disasters, including people who will not plant their cotton allotment, that 17,000,000 acres allotment will not raise 10,000,000 bales of cotton. We advocate that we can plant 22,500,000 acres of cotton in the United States, and still lower the cotton surplus 2,000,000 bales. Let's lower it in two years instead of one. The increase would mean our present Texas allotment would jump from 7,304,000 acres to 8,989,600 acres, an increase of 1,635,600 acres.

Based on a yield of 200 lbs per acre, and a price of \$150 per bale, this increase would have an approximate value of \$98,136,000 to Texas cotton producers. Now listen fellows, that would mean a good sized raise for Bailey Co., as it would increase the average

Now this is where you fellows that don't belong to Farm Bureau come in. 

BE IT RESOLVED, By the Bailey County Farm Bureau, that our Rural Electrification Policy should be to provide the benefits of adequate electric and telephone service wherever feasible. That such service be provided by private corporations when such services offered are adequate, and at a cost equal to or less than that which could be provided by the REA. But when services offered by private interprise are inadequate or too costly to the consumer, such services

when feasible. That whereas, the rivers and streams of the nation are the inherent property of the people, such resources should not be turned over to private interprise resources can be developed by private interprise in a way that is compatitable with the best Sherman Sweatmon; public interests, permits should be granted. 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



The amount of water expected Forecast Is For **Continuing Low Prices For Cattle**

College Station, Oct. 23-Texas livestock producers face the coming winter with a forecast that cattle prices will remain low The U. S. Civil Service Com- compared with a year ago during

Despite this outlook, says ohn G. McHaney, assistant extension economist, reduced cattle inventories should stabilize the market during the next few years.


Priced at Texas cattle markets dropped 56 percent between April 1951 and July 1953. At midyear producers were receiving 82 percent of parity compared with 152 percent in April, 1951, the all time high. Cattle prices are today more in line with other agricultural products than they were several months ago, Mc-Haney says.

Favorable grain and roughage supplies caused the nation's producers to add about 4 million head to inventories during 1950. The following year price ceilings served as a stimulus for cattlemen to hold on to their beef animals and 5.5 million more animals were on farms by the end of 1951. That year cattle slaughter hit its lowest ebb in 10 years. Calf slaughter dropped to the lowest point in 18 years.

Record cattle numbers followed by the unprecedented drouth has been responsible for increased marketing and, thus, lower prices paid to producers.

ly, the loss would be staggering. One Agriculturist has harzarded a guess. Dr. L. M. Hutchings, of Purdue University, said, "Based on animal population figures and average values per head, animal agriculture failed to realize a potential gross income of \$2,791,000-000 in 1951 as a result of death losses alone."






