The farmer who has suffered crop losses because of drouth, floods, insects or other natural causes is eligible for a Production Disaster loan if he is unable to obtain operating funds elsewhere. If the farmer is a sufferer from the effects of insufficient income and excessive operating costs he is eligible for an Economic Disaster loan if unable to get needed credit from local sources.

Production Disaster loans were first made in Texas in 1949, following the disastrous freeze in the Rio Grande Valley and the tropical hurricane which swept the rice area in October of that year. Later, the loan authority was extended to the entire state because of drouth, insect infestation, and adverse weather conditions

Funds of this type already advanced to ranchers total \$7,800,-000, he said. Ranchers, in addition to borrowing for operating expenses, may obtain funds to restock their ranches and replace herds depleted by effects of the drouth.

Dairymen who need to replace animals to build up dairy herds to normal may obtain funds for such purposes, he said.

Special Livestock loans provide emergency credit at 5 per cent to ranch operators who are unable temporarily to obtain from recognized lenders the credit needed to continue their operations and have reasonable prospects of working out their difficulties.


Economic Disaster Loans Available Serious Questions Face Cotton Growers


He suggests that specific questions which each grower will want to answer for himself are: Will my prospective income be greater from the alloted acreage or from an unlimited acreage and whatever the market will income in future years in the light of current and prospective large surplus supplies of cotton? What would be my decision if I could decide for all the eotton

growers in the country? Chairman Schuster emphasizes that he cannot and will not indicate how cotton growers should vote, but he emphatically urges all growers to vote in the referendum. In his opinion, the decision will have far-reaching effects and the question deserves the serious study and the careful considered vote of all who grow cotton.

The referendum will be held between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on December 18 at the following polling places:

Community "A". (All producers residing north of the Sand Hills). Bailey County ASC Office (formally PMA), Muleshoe.

Community"B". (All producers residing south of the Sand Hills and west of the Morton Highway. Three Way School House. Community "C". (All producers residing south of the Sand Hills and east of the Morton Highway, Bula School House.
