Comissioners Court

Commissioners accepted the resignation of Judge A. O. Fields when they met Dec. 14. Fields submitted his resignation effective Dec. 31 saying that at his age and health, he does not wish to be tied

at retirement party Judge A. O. Fields has resigned from his position effective Dec. 31.

Judge Fields honored

The resignation was made official Monday at commissioners' court. Fields has served Crockett County in various capacities for 33 years.

No replacement was appointed Dec. 14, but acceptance of the resignation clears the field for candidates to file for the position subject to the March 8 Democratic Primary. Commissioners did not seem inclined to appoint a replacement

although Fields will have to serve if no one is appointed. He will no longer be on salary after Dec. 31. Court members discussed the

possibility of waiting until after the March 8 primary to make an appointment to fill the unexpired term.

Al Fields came to West Texas in the fall of 1934 as assitant manager of the C. G. Morrison Variety Store in Fort Stockton. He was transferred to Ozona in the spring of 1935 as manager of the local store.

He married Mildred Davis of Ozona in December of 1935 and the following spring was transferred back to Fort Stockton.

The Fields returned to Ozona Jan. 1, 1938. In September of 1941, Fields was appointed deputy tax-assessor by Sheriff Willis and continued in the position through the remainder of Willis' term of office. When Frank James was elected to the Sheriff's Office in 1943, Fields continued in the position until his induction into the service in 1944. Fields was stationed in the China-Burma-India sector until the end of the war and Mrs. Fields accepted the tax office position until Mr. James' term of office was over.

Upon returning from the service, Fields was employed by James Motor Company when Mr. James opened a Chrysler dealership near the draw.

He was appointed postmaster in the early 50's and stayed two years, "but having always worked in retail business, I could not get used to buying a stamp for three cents and

selling it for three cents, so I resigned," Fields said.

"Mr. James offered me my old job back, and I stayed with him until 1955 when I went to work for the Franklin and Cowan Drilling Company as bookkeeper. At the same time I started keeping books for Mr. Jack Wilkins in the Flying W Egg and Ranch business and am presently doing the same for him and hope to continue."

Fields was appointed to the position of justice of the peace in 1959, a part time position. He also worked for the Crockett County Consolidated Common School District as bookkeeper. When the J.P. position became full time, Fields resigned from the school and went fulltime with the county. He was appointed county judge in 1983.

"During all of this, I have been a deputy sheriff, Veterans Service officer, AAA range inspector, president and secretary of the Rotary Club, bookkeeper for Ozona Community Center, United Methodist Church, March of Dimes, Veterans of Foreign Wars, president of the West Texas JP Association and others forgotten as Mildred always says the only reason I would not get any place was because I was always changing jobs."

Local TEAMS scores follow state trends

Dec. 11 by the Texas Education Agency in Austin, the passing rate on the state's high school exit-level exam dropped this year, but only because the passing score was increased.

In 1986, 83 percent of the state's 11th grade students passed both the English and math portions of the Texas Education Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) test, which students must pass to become eligible to receive a high school diploma at the end of their 12th grade year.

This year, only 72 percent of the students who took the test in October

results followed the same trend. "69 percent of our students passed both sections of the October exit-level TEAMS, and we have 19 juniors who will need to retake the mathematics test and nine juniors who will need to retake the English language arts

No replacement was appointed for Fields who must serve until someone is appointed and makes bond.

A proposed contract for Dr. Robert Owensby was presented to the court by Bill Boswell, hospital administrator. Doctor coverage for Crockett County Hospital will require \$64,168 more than is budgeted for next year, Boswell told the court. A motion by Sostenes DeHoyos to augment the hospital budget died for lack of a second.

Commissioners Jerry Hill and-Chuy Castro voted for a motion to return the proposal to the hospital board to be drawn into a contract before being brought before the court. Commissioners Williams and DeHovos did not vote.

Valero on line with new gas processing plant

Crockett County has a new gas processing plant within its boundaries owned by Valero Gas Co. headquartered in San Antonio.

The 30 million cubic feet per day plant was moved here from Fort Stockton and was erected west of Ozona near the Citation plant. The facility will be handling natural gas produced by J. Cleo Thompson, Intratex, El Paso and Northern Natural Gas Co.

"We strip the liquid mix from the gas and sell it to Phillips Pipeline," said Bob Bruns. "Right now we are moving 20 million per day, but we are capable of handling 30 million."

Bruns, plant manager, and his wife Ida have a son 10-years-old and a girl who is four.

The crew includes two operators, Kelly Martin and Ross Blair. Kelly and his wife Jerri have two boys with another one due any day. Ross and his wife have a little girl.

Bruns and his family moved here from Oklahoma although they are San Angelo natives and were former residents of Sonora. They like Ozona because it is quiet and clean, said Bruns.

Marvin Veselka, the Texas Education Agency's assistnat commissioner for assessment and evaluation, said the change was anticipated when the State Board of Education in July raised the passing score on the math portion.

On last year's test, students only had to correctly answer 39 of 72 math questions. This year, it took 50 correct answers to pass. The passing score on the English portion remained at 50 this year.

"The overall test performance actually did increase during the past year, but because of the much tougher passing standards, the passing rate is down," Veselka said.

Overall, the average score on the English section remained at 785, the same as last year. The average math test increased from last year's 760 to 769 this year.

The TEAMS test, mandated by the education reforms of 1984, is given in grades one, three, five, seven, nine and 11 each year.

Intermediate School evacuated due to suspected gas leak

Students at Ozona Intermediate School were evacuated Monday afternoon while a suspected gas leak in the building was investigated by firemen.

The children were outside eight to 10 minutes in 32 degree weather until the cause of the odor filling several classrooms was found.

Volunteer firemen aetermined that the school's heating system was drawing fumes from a nearby gas well into the school.

A truck at the well was being loaded with concentrate which produced the strong fumes.

Volunteers answered a call to the Adams Ranch 30 miles south of Ozona Saturday afternoon. Approximately 60 acres west of Hwy. 163 burned after catching fire from a welding machine. A lovely custom is celebrated every year in Sweden on Dec. 13th, Santa Lucia Day. Early in the morning, the oldest daughter awakens her parents with a traditional song, hot coffee and buns. Dressed in a white gown, scarlet sash, and a crown of greens with real candles, she is followed by her brothers and sisters singing "Santa Lucia". Lucia means light, and Swedish people believe that Santa Lucia brings the Christmas season and the longer days after the winter solstice. Some of you girls and boys might like to celebrate Santa Lucia Day and surprise your parents with breakfast in bed.

Hanukkah, or the Feast of the Dedication, is a Jewish festival, falling on the 25th of the Jewish month of Kislev (November-December) and celebrated for eight days. The holiday commemorates the Jewish recapture of the Temple in Jerusalem under Judas Maccabaeus in 165 B.C. from the Syrian Greeks, who had defiled the Temple

with pagan worship. According to legends, the Jews found a cruse of consecrated oil in the Temple, only sufficient to keep the Eternal Light burning for one day. However, by a miracle, the oil lasted eight days, until a fresh supply could be obtained.

Hanukkah is called the Festival of Lights because of the tradition of lighting the candles on a menorah. The menorah is a special candle holder with nine places for candles one for each night and one for the serving candle called the shammash. Every evening one new candle is lit, until the menorah is full and glowing on the eighth night. Small gifts are exchanged each night, songs are sung, and games are played. The candles burning in the menorah remind Jews of their fight for freedom of religion. It is a very happy time for Jewish families.






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Last week's article and the following article were obtained from a book titled "The Texas Masons" published by Brazos Valley Masonic Library and Museum Assn. This week is about Bro. Thomas S. Lubbock.

THOMAS S. LUBBOCK Of Terry's Texas Rangers

Often remembered as the younger brother of Governor Francis R. Lubbock, Colonel Thomas Saltus Lubbock, a co-organizer of Terry's Texas Rangers, was the man for whom the county and city of Lubbock were named.

Born in Charleston, South Carolina, in 1817, Lubbock followed his brother Francis to New Orleans in 1835. There he became interested in the Texas Revolution and joined the New Orleans Greys, arriving in Texas in time to participate in the siege of Bexar in December 1835.

In 1841 he served as lieutenant on the Santa Fe Expedition under General Hugh McLeod, a member of Holland Lodge No. 1. When their force was captured and marched to Mexico City, he escaped from prison and made his way back to Texas in time to participate in the Somervell Expedition to the Rio Grande.

At the outbreak of the Civil War, Lubbock left his business in Houston and, with Colonel Benjamin F. Terry, organized Terry's Texas Rangers, one of the most celebrated cavalry regiments of the Confederacy. Although in failing health, Lubbock assumed command of the regiment after Terry's death at the Battle of Woodsonville, Kentucky, and commanded until his own death on January 23, 1762. Francis Lubbock was elected Governor in 1861, and later became aide-de-camp to President Jefferson Davis

Both Thomas and Francis Lubbock, as well as colonel Terry, Were members of Holland Lodge No. 1.
