

Lions claim district, bi-district honors

The Lions basketball team held off rally after rally Tuesday, Feb. 23, to win the district 6-2A title, then overcame a slump Friday to defeat Van Horn in the bi-district

With last Friday's victory, the Lions advanced to the area playoffs.

The match-up between the Lions and Stanton was a repeat of last year as the game proved tensionfilled until the last second clicked off the clock and the Lions came away with a 74-70 win.

Stanton led the way at the start, clinching a 22-20 first quarter lead; however, the Lions rallied late in the second quarter to take a 38-34 halftime lead.

In the third quarter, the Lions looked as if they might secure the after three periods, the Buffaloes threatened twice in the closing

Stanton outscored the Lions 24-17 in the last period but Scott Denman's three-point play in the waning seconds put the Lions up for good and entitled them to the district

"We played well and probably had one of our best games of the year," Coach John Curry said. "We had some down spots, but I was proud of the guys being able to hold off Stanton at the end."

Denman had a good night, tallying 23 points and pulling down 10

Will Seahorn scored 14 points. Danny Sanchez had eight assists while Oscar Galindo collected six.

On Friday, the Lions faced Van Horn for bi-district as the post-season playoffs began. From here on

The Lions started out well against Van Horn, grabbing a 19-13 first quarter lead, but Van Horn moved back in the second quarter to arrange a 33-30 halftime score.

In the third quarter, the teams played evenly, each scoring eight points. The difference arrived in the fourth quarter as the Lions amassed 22 points to Van Horn's 15, winning

"Van Horn had a good ball club and we did not play very well," Coach Curry said. "This made the game close."

Denman tallied more than half of the Lions' total score as he had 34 points. He also had nine rebounds. Seahorn grabbed eight rebounds and assisted in scores five times.

If the Lions beat Coleman Tuesday night, then they will play Friday night at the Dorothy Garrett Coliseum in Big Spring.

Baggett named outstanding 1987 conservation rancher

W. R. Baggett Jr. has been chosen as the recipient of the 1987 outstanding conservation rancher award by the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District. The award was presented to Bill at the San Angelo Area Awards Banquet at Angelo State University on Feb. 23.

Bill has spent most of his life ranching in Crockett County and realizes that resource conservation is essential to our continued existence. Bill received his indoctrination in the importance of our natural resources early in life from his father, who was one of the authors of the original Conservation Program and Plan of Work for Crockett County.

Bill, along with his son, Penn, operates a 7,595 acre ranch in Crockett County. They run primarily a cattle and sheep operation realizing that good range management practices and conservation go hand

The ranch has been under the Great Plains Conservation Program in the past with good, sound conservation practices being applied. Brush control and water development, along with well executed management practices have been applied. These improvements have not only been beneficial to his livestock operation and provide soil

erosion protection, but have also improved his wildlife habitat. Deer and turkey are the predominant wildlife species on the ranch and provide supplemental income.

Bill has been a strong influence in educating the local youth about our natural resources. He was one of the individuals instrumental in initiating a sixth grade conservation field day that is held on his ranch each year. He is also a strong supporter of the local 4-H and Girl Scout programs. He has developed an area on the ranch that is utilized each summer by the Girl Scouts for a week-long outdoor education and recreation

Bill has been a director of the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District for 20 years. He has been elected chairman of the district board of directors since 1976. He was also influential in initiating the Johnson Draw Watershed Project after the flood of 1954 devastated the town of Ozona. Two of the seven floodwater retarding structures are located on his ranch.

W. R. Baggett Jr. has demonstrated his knowledge and skill in applying the principles of range management for many years. Crockett Soil and Water Conservation district is proud to present the 1987 outstanding conservation rancher award to an individual who has been so interested and involved in the conservation of the natural resources of Crockett County.

After spending five years of my life teaching kids in high school and junior high and coaching girls' basketball on the side, plus another five just to get certified for the task qualifies me to an opinion based on experience on the subject of parent-teacher-administration-kid relationships.

Let's face the music. The teaching profession is not what it used to be by any means of measure, and the kids are the ones getting the short end of the stick.

All the teachers seem to talk and worry about now is what kind of review they are going to get from their superiors instead of what could be done with the children that need special help. The profession seems to be full of nails, frowns, indecisions and age spots. The sad part about the whole matter is that it's not their

I wonder what has happened to the yesterdays when the teacher was 'Boss" of his or her classroom, and nothing stood in the way of the

learning process between teacher and students except the everyday problems that teachers have confronted since the profession began. The days are gone when the principal and teachers presented a united front to preserve and maintain that fine line of authority established by the teacher between herself and her students. And without this feeling of working together of a common cause, the classroom becomes a total shambles.

In my opinion, House Bill 72 has been a disastrous piece of legislation. It has lowered school spirit, caused chaos, insecurity, bad judgements on the part of administrators in trying to follow their job outlines and descriptions. It has forced excellent seasoned teachers to check it in with disgust. Teachers are being spied upon, accused without being informed of their accusers and threatened with decertification without a trial. It reminds me of the Third

When I first began teaching, I was called into the office one day and coached onto the right track by the principal who had many years of teaching experience. The whole matter was handled with finess and professional courtesy with a little wisdom thrown in. I'll never forget the guy nor the lesson that he taught me. He turned out to be one of my best friends.

Thank goodness my two kids have finished school already. I know for sure that it would make my blood run cold if one of them came home reporting that he had been hauled into the office and questioned about his own teachers he is supposed to respect and remember for a lifetime as "my teacher".

Let's support the overworked, underpaid public servants called teachers who are caretakers of our children. After all, if they are not respected and allowed to teach in realms of professional courtesy, then who in Sam Hill will!

STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS By Lyndell Williams

AUSTIN-Texas voters are responding to candidates crisscrossing Texas with what some experts predict may be a record primary turnout and continued realignment of the Texas electorate.

In other action last week related to Texas government:

• Gov. Bill Clements agreed with a federal decision to postpone choosing a site for the supercollider until after the presidential

• A trio of legislators unveiled a compromise plan to install a merit system for selecting Texas judges;

• State officials reconsidered their plan to take liens against the homesteads of medicaid recipients after they die.

Texas Secretary of State Jack Rains has predicted a record turnout. He believes the Republican primary for the first time in history will draw as many voters as the Democratic primary.

First Massive Battle

For one thing, the Super Tuesday strategy has brought campaigning here early; Texas voters now know they will help decide the first massive battle of this campaign.

For another, a Texan is running and stirs the hopes of Texans troubled with a struggling economy.

A litmus for realignment, as the election unfolds, is how well Albert Gore's campaign fares in the Democratic primary, highlighted by the controversial endorsement of party chairman Bob Slagle and some 60 party financial heavy hitters.

Old, New Mind-Sets

Heading towards Election Day, the polls show Gore fourth in Texas behind Michael Dukakis, Jesse Jackson and Richard Gephardt.

Unless Gore makes some kind of fantastic finish, the exposed differences can not be overlooked between the follow-me-boys Demo-

Realignment, Conservatives

The argument about realignment begins with those rural conservatives, who at one time were the heart of the Texas Democratic

Have they had enough of the Texas Democratic Party's pellmell bolt towards urban liberalism in hard times? Will they continue to defect in droves to the Republican primary?

Or do they think the Texas Republican Party's urban conservatism is so uncaring that they will accept a diminished roll in the Democratic Party?

For your answer, see if rural counties pick a winner.

Republican Action

The Republican slate, for awhile there, had a wide range of appeal, but in the primary endgame, most candidates are conceding Texas to Vice President George Bush with his favorite son flair.

Frankly, while purists shudder

at the damage done to the Eleventh Commandment, "Speak no ill of fellow Republicans", the hammerand-tongs action has its own appeal to those who think a good political fight is a healthy byproduct of democracy.

Certainly, it has brought the Republican image out from the country club backrooms, and, some say, made it more human.

Some say the public scrappings are natural growing pains which cannot be avoided by an expanding party, one which gives candidates a lot to gain and a lot to lose.

Other Highlights

• The state welfare agency is rethinking its plan to file liens on homes of some 8,000 Medicaid recipients to recoup expenses after their deaths. The Department of Human Services board will act on the new state law next month.

• Gov. Clements applauded the "wise" decision to postpone choosing the supercollider site, while others predicted the next president will decide where to build it. Thus, the \$4.4 billion supercollider becomes a rather large political plum for the state which guesses right in the presidential sweepstakes. If it's ever built.

• In a preview of things to come, Rains and Democratic Attorney General Jim Mattox debated before the Houston-based Hispanic Political Action Committee. Both are eyeing the Governor's Mansion for 1990.



Historical Society meets

The Crockett County Historical Commission and the Crockett County Historical Society met together in the Emerald Room of Ozona National Bank Monday evening, Feb. 29, at 7 p.m. Twenty-eight members and guests heard a most interesting program given by Don P. Whited, Park Ranger at Fort Lancaster.

As part of the early movement westward, a number of forts and camps were established for the protection of travelers. Fort Lancaster was located on what was known as the Lower Road, leaving from San Antonio. The fort was in existence for only a short time, 1855 to 1861. This was at a time when there were no facilities such as we take for granted today: electricity, automobiles, roads. "But," said Mr. Whited, "people do not miss what they have never had."

Getting supplies to the fort, including wood for burning, was never an easy task. One story states that a ranchman would not let the men cut oak trees off his land. Fortunately those trees are still standing today.

The soldiers had only mules to ride horses were much too expensive to feed and care for. It seems amusing for them to try to protect their territory against the country's best mounted horsemen, the Indians.

Twenty-five foundations for permanent buildings have been identified and marked. Since becoming a part of the Texas State Park System in 1968, the policy has been to stabilize and protect what remains rather than to attempt reconstruc-

Life at Fort Lancaster was boring for the men stationed there -- a skirmish with Indians was at least a diversion. "Only one real battle was fought at Fort Lancaster," Mr. Whited said. More than a thousand Indians attacked the few soldiers. But when their chief was killed, the Indians withdrew. "Indians fought to gain what they considered glory," Mr. Whited continued, and "when their chief fell, the glory was gone."

Interesting slides were shown of the site as it appears today. Mr. Whited stressed that artifacts are important only when the exact location they were found can be identified and documented. So much of our local history disappears every day when such items are picked up, carried off with no proof of their origins at all.

Mrs. P. L. Childress, chairman of the Commission, presided, and she and Mrs. Harrell served refreshments to the group.

Recommendations, an essay and transcripts of high school grades are required, also Then a senator reviews the file. The representative is in charge of personal interviews and 10 applicants are nominated per academy.

"There is a lot of paper work. I'm still filling out papers," said Sanchez. The OHS senior was in San Antonio in December to go before the review board. He then underwent a physical at Goodfellow AFB and a physical fitness test in Abi-







The legal basis for the office of County Judge rests in Article V, Sections 15-18, of the Texas Constitution: "There shall be established in each county in this state a County Court, which shall be a court of record; and there shall be elected in each county, by the qualified voters, a County Judge, who shall be well informed in the law of the state; shall be a conservator of the peace; and shall hold office for four years, and until his successor shall be elected and qualified..."

The County Judge is the presiding officer of the Commissioners Court, which is the policy-determining body of the county. The County Judge is a voting member of the Commissioners Court although in many counties, by custom, the judge votes only in case of ties. A County Judge in Texas is usually the judge of the County Criminal Court, County Civil Court and Probate Court. If the County Judge is an attorney, he may also serve as the judge of the Juvenile Court. The County Judge is also head of civil defense and disaster relief, county welfare, and in counties under 225,000 population the judge prepares the county budget along with the County Auditor or

As an administrative official, the County Judge handles such widely varying matters spitals for the mentally ill and mentally retarded, waivers for marriage of persons under age, juvenile work permits and temporary guardianships for special purposes. 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

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


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
