## Board reviews TEAMS results

Members of the Ozona School Board, meeting in regular session on Tuesday, May 10, approved a new school calendar for next year. The new calendar is very similar to the present school calendar, and significant dates include: August 24, 25, 26, and 28 (teacher inservice); August 28-29 (teacher planning-days); September 1 (first day of school); September 5 (Labor Day); November 24-27 (Thanksgiving holidays); December 22-January 1 (Christmas holidays); January 13 (end of first semester); January 16 (teacher planning day); March 1 (This day will be the first bad weather make-up day if it is needed, otherwise, it will become the first day of Spring Break); March 2-5 (holiday); March 27 (This day will be the second bad weather make-up day if it is needed; otherwise, it will become a holiday after Easter.); May 21 (baccalaureate) May 25 (last day of school and end of the second semester); and, May 26 (teacher planning day/graduation).

Mr. Brad White, Mr. Mark White, and Mr. Stan Walker appeared separately before the Board to present proposals for the administration of a "cafeteria plan" for the district's employees. Brad White, the first presenter, explained that a "cafeteria plan" is a written plan under which all participants are employees, and the participants may choose to pay certain after-tax expenses with pre-tax dollars, thereby increasing their take home pay. The cafeteria plan must qualify under Section 125 of the Internal Revenue Code. After discussing the three proposals, the trustees voted to approve Brad White's proposal from National Plan Administrators.

Assistant Superintendent Ted Cotton gave the members a report on the 1988 Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) tests which were administered to students in grades three, five, seven,

and nine in February, and he compared these results to TEAMS results from 1986 and 1987. Mr. Cotton reported that 90% of the students in the third grade passed the mathematic section of TEAMS (95% in 1986 and 89% in 1987), 85% passed reading (91% in 1986 and 1987), and 62% (78% in 1986 and 70% in 1987) passed the total writing section of TEAMS. The total writing section of TEAMS consists of multiple choice questions on English grammar, as well as a written composition.

In the fifth grade, 94% of the students passed mathematics (82% in 1986 and 80% in 1987), 93% passed reading (91% in 1986 and 90% in 1987), and 91% passed writing (67% in 1986 and 66% in 1987). In the seventh grade, 98% of the students passed mathematics (79% in 1986 and 80% in 1987), 93% passed reading (82% in 1986 and 70% in 1987), and 79% (72% in 1986 and 55% in 1987) passed writing.

86% of Ozona's ninth grade students passed mathematics (79% in 1986 and 92% in 1987), 85% passed reading (87% in 1986 and 74% in 1987), and 61% passed writing (74% in 1986 and 76% in 1987).

Mr. Cotton also gave a report on the October Exit-Level TEAMS tests which all eleventh grade students have to pass before becoming eligible to receive their high school diploma at the end of their senior year. He said that 70% of Ozona's juniors passed the mathematics section of TEAMS during the first administration of the test last fall, and these results were compared to 86% mastery of TEAMS at the same time in 1986 and 93% mastery in 1987. "The reason for the lower passing percentage this year is because the State Board of Education increased the passing standards

## Sanchez caps career with gold-medal

Eleven times his opponent tried to pass him and eleven times senior Danny Sanchez responded by keeping the lead, eventually crossing the finish line for the final time in his high school career and claiming the

gold medal for the 2A state mile run.

"I led all the way," Sanchez said of his performance. "It was reverse psychology; he (his opponent, Roger Hoelscher of Rosebud Lott) had led the whole time in the two-mile."

Sanchez, making his third appearance at the state meet, qualified in both the two-mile and mile runs, a first for him.

"I wanted to go in both events since it was my last year," he said.

Previously, Sanchez had qualified for state in the two-mile, placing third at regional in the mile, just short of the 1-2 places needed to go on.

His sophomore year, Sanchez placed third in the two-mile, then improved on that by one spot his junior year when he finished second.

All he needed was a first place to finish the 3-2-1 climb, but Hoelscher had different ideas.

"I stayed with him till the end of the fifth lap, and he pulled out a little way," Sanchez said. "He continued to extend his lead and ended up beating me by 95 yards."

Sanchez finished the race in nine minutes, 39.6 seconds. Hoelscher set a new 2A record with a time of 9:25.9; he also set Sanchez off.

"It (the two-mile results) made me mad," Sanchez said. "I got fired up and went out to win the mile."

"It was a two-man race," Coach Pete Maldonado said. "It was the best tactical race I have seen where experience paid off."

"We had misjudged Hoelscher's endurance in the two-mile, but in this race, it came down to speed."

Which Sanchez has lots of. As a crowd of 40,000 looked on, Sanchez led while Hoelscher attempted 11 times to take the front position, most of those tries coming in the final lap before Sanchez turned on his kick and clocked a personal best of 4:52.2.

"It was the perfect climax to an excellent high school career," Coach Maldonado said.

Now with several medals under his belt (he also won the state cross country meet in the fall), Sanchez looks toward the future.

"I don't exactly know yet which college to pick," he said. Arkansas, University of Texas at Arlington and Angelo State have all expressed interest in Sanchez and his abilities.

For the moment though, Sanchez continues to bask in the rewards of his performances throughout his high school career.

"It's one of the best I could have hoped for," he said.

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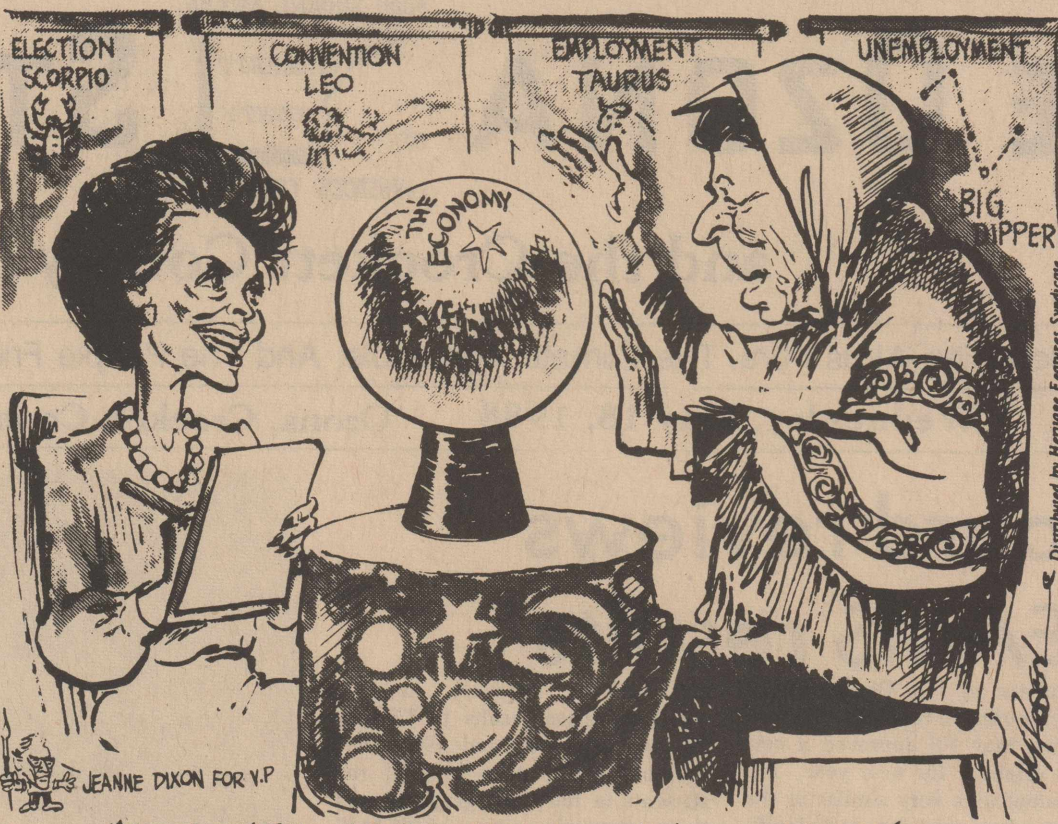
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**STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS**

**AUSTIN**—In an otherwise quiet week, several controversial court decisions came down recently which will impact the Texas lifestyle, including:

- The Texas Supreme Court ruled unconstitutional the cap on medical malpractice damages set by the Legislature during the tort reform session.
- The high court also backed Attorney General Jim Mattox's claims that he can continue to represent both sides in certain telephone rate cases before the Public Utility Commission, and
- A Harris County judge said it's unconstitutional to use an intoxilyzer machine to determine whether a motorist is drunk.

Meanwhile, the bizarre news of the week came when police arrested a former Libertarian Party congressional candidate for allegedly trying to contract the murder of San Antonio Mayor Henry Cisneros and other possible targets, including Comptroller Bob Bullock, a candidate for lieutenant governor.

**Murder Plot Foiled**  
The murder-for-hire plan was foiled after IRS agents tipped off the local district attorney, who planted an undercover policeman as the hit man.

The act was apparently planned to draw national media attention to the suspect's grievances against the tax system. When Bullock went out of town, the target was switched.

The Libertarian Party said the suspect, Parker Abell, was disassociated with them in 1985.

**Malpractice Cap Struck**  
In the malpractice law case, justices voted 7-2 for the argument that the cap on damages violates a state constitution provision guaranteeing citizens the right to seek legal remedies for injuries.

The majority opinion criticized the Legislature's effort to limit damages "in a speculative experiment to determine whether insurance rates will decrease."

But one dissenter, Justice Raul Gonzalez, said the court majority was improperly trying to replace the Legislature.

A spokesman for physicians said their problem of obtaining affordable malpractice insurance will worsen.

bitter clash. The high court overturned a previous ruling which held Mattox was in conflict of interest if he represented both a state agency and the PUC when they were opposed.

The case arose from a suit filed against Mattox by PUC members, and the two sides exchanged choice words in news reports.

**Unified Primaries Urged**  
The Texas Secretary of State's office last week asked a panel of lawmakers to consider using same locations to hold primary elections, but the chairwoman of the House Elections Committee expressed doubts it would be wise.

Holding elections in the same building, but in different rooms for each political party, would save millions in state election aid, according to Secretary of State Jack Rains.

Rep. Ernestine Glossbrenner, D-Alice, said voters might feel intimidated if they have to ask for the ballot of a particular party.

**Mark White Returns**  
Some observers say he's launching his comeback bid for the governor's mansion, but for whatever reason, former Gov. Mark White spoke out last week against old nemesis Gov. Bill Clements' plan to legalize the current school funding formula with a constitutional amendment.

White defeated Clements in '82,

but was trounced in an '86 return match. His supporters say he will make one more bid for a second term in '90, joining the list of possibles that includes Mattox, Treasurer Ann Richards and Land Commissioner Garry Mauro.

**Other Highlights**  
• State Rep. Dan Morales, D-San Antonio, predicts that an unexpected \$1 billion revenue shortfall will prompt tax reform in 1989. Morales is a member of the Select Committee on Tax Equity, which will make recommendations to the Legislature late this year.

• Texas Republicans are searching for a replacement for state party chairman George Strake, who will give up his gavel at the state convention in Houston next month.

One announced candidate is former Dallas county chairman Fred Meyer, and some are speculating that former Houston State Sen. Mike Richards may decide to make the race.

• Supreme Court Chief Justice Tom Phillips, a Republican, received the endorsement of former Dallas DA Henry Wade, who won his own elections as a Democrat.

• Businessman Al Hughes of Austin, resigned from the State Board of Pardons and Paroles last week amid praise from his colleagues for his work during an era marked by court-ordered prison reforms.

for mastery of math in 1988. Now, students have to correctly answer 50 of 72 multiple-choice questions to pass each subject area (math and English language arts)", Cotton said. In English language arts, 87% or the eleventh grade students passed the state test, and this percentage was compared to test results in 1986 (90% mastery) and 1987 (83% mastery).

Cotton went on to say that those students who did not pass both sections of the October Exit-Level TEAMS were given another opportunity to pass the exam on May 3 and May 4, and the district should receive their test results before school is out. Juniors who fail to pass one or both sections of the test this year will have two additional opportunities to retake the failed section(s) next year.

During the meeting, Crockett County Judge Kathryn Mayfield administered the Oath of Office to Board members Gary Buck Mitchell and David Bean, and Jeffrey Sutton (Board President), Gary Buck Mitchell (Board Vice-President), and Sandra Childress (Board Secretary) were re-elected as officers for next year.

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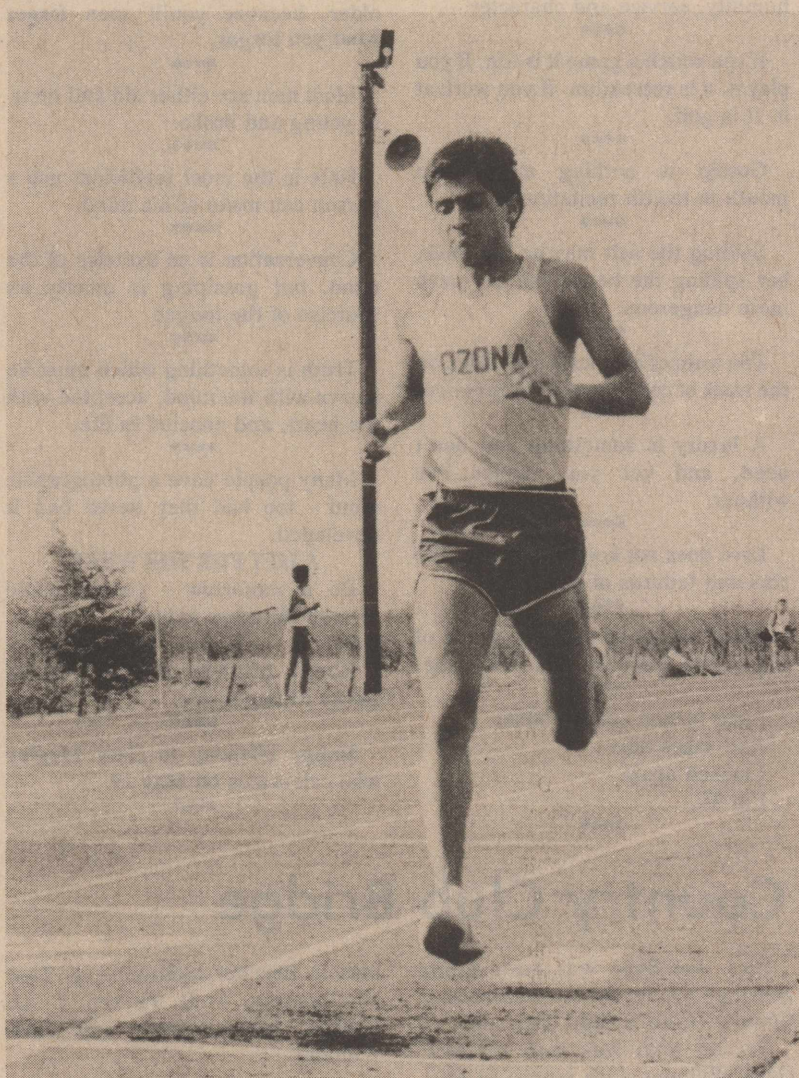
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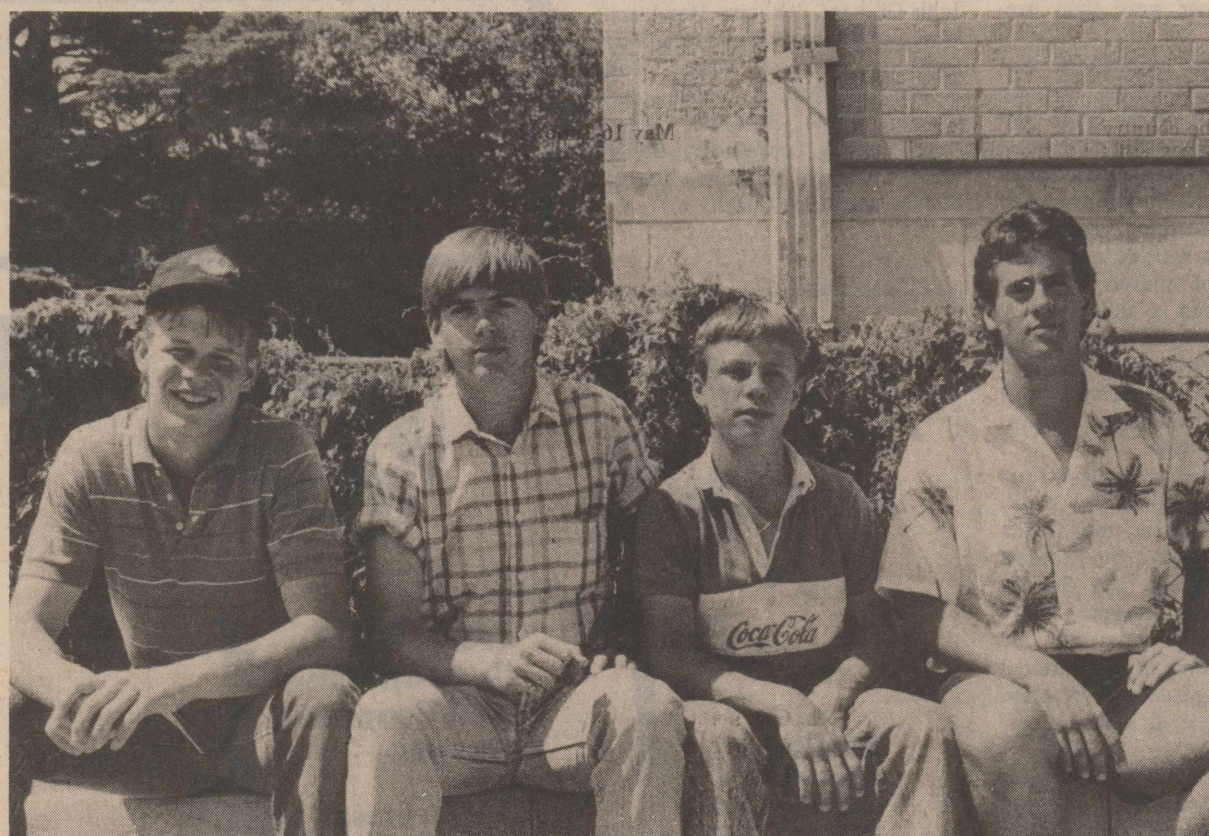

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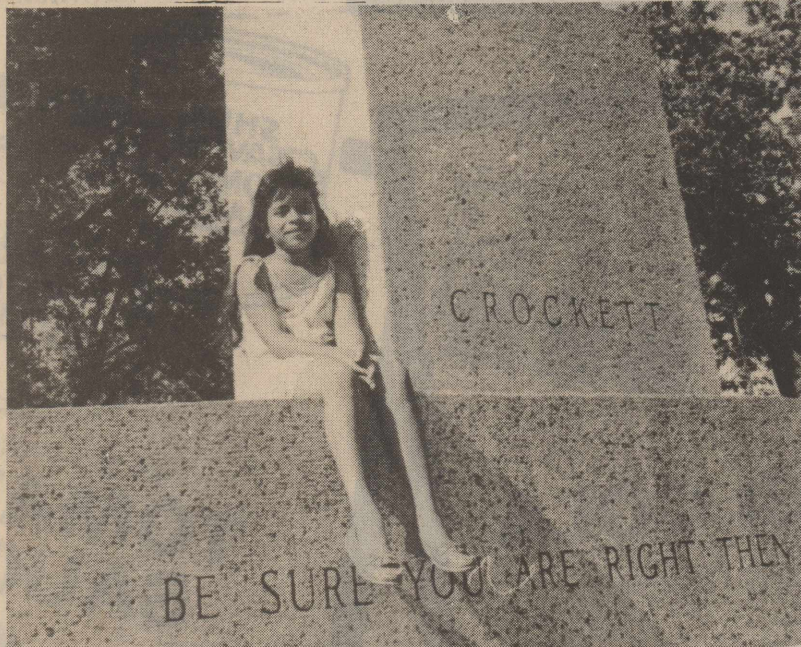

### Amanda Noah becomes naturalized citizen

Amanda Noah, 6-year-old daughter of Evelyn and Jimmy Noah of Ozona, looks like an All-American girl. Last week she was photographed with school chums who earned T-shirts in Jump Rope for Heart and danced in the annual spring recital of Ronda's School of Dance. Monday night Amanda, a member of the Daisy Scout Troop, participated in an awards ceremony and became a Brownie Scout.

And on May 10, Amanda became a naturalized U.S. citizen.

Amanda's story began in Brazil Sept. 1, 1981. She was six days old when she was left at a Baptist missionary hospital in Fortaleza de Ituxi.

Mrs. Noah, who was in the country as part of a church group visiting the missionary, heard about the baby. The Noahs had been married 17 years when Amanda came into their lives, but it was to be May of 1982 before they were able to bring her home to Ozona.

Brazilian regulations and U.S. regulations resulted in several trips from Texas to Fortaleza before the adoption was final Feb. 9 and the child had a passport. The Noahs had to complete a battery of tests for the adoption, including home studies.

Jimmy Noah estimated that he had driven 2,500 miles from Ozona to the Dallas and San Antonio Immigration and Naturalization Service offices taking care of the paperwork necessary to allow baby Amanda to be brought into the country.

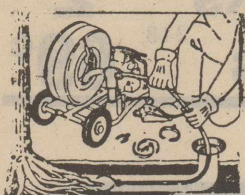
At that time, an INS official in San Antonio told the family there would be a five year waiting period before the child could become a naturalized citizen. At the end of the five year period, the Noahs learned that Amanda could have actually been naturalized right away as an infant.

The process took a bit longer after the five year wait, however. A packet of papers was filled out, copies of the birth certificate and adoption papers were provided to the INS. Eight months later came a hearing in San Antonio. The next day, April 8, 1987, the papers had to be presented in the San Angelo office. And that was that.

## Golfers place sixth at state tourney

The Ozona Lion golf team had its dream season ended in a nightmare last week in Austin as, by a numbing turn of events, they shot rounds of 347-347 on the Lion Municipal Golf Course and finished sixth in the field of eight at the state tournament.

The disappointing conclusion to the 1988 season was simply a culmination of events that began five days before the team left for Austin when the services of freshman Jay Haire were eliminated from the team. Now, the Lions were left with only four players. However, this wasn't the worst of their troubles.

On Monday, May 11, the four remaining players learned that their coach and mentor, Rip Sewell, would also stay behind to care for his wife who was to undergo knee surgery the following day.

After regrouping and analyzing the situation, the Lions, along with Coach Jim Green who deserves the utmost praise and recognition for filling in for Coach Sewell and doing an outstanding job in the process, set out for the state championship.

On Wednesday, the four Lion players, Bret Hood, Will Weahorn, Copie Davis and Shane Pridemore, toured the Lion Municipal layout during their practice round. It was a

proper omen for things to come. They were rained out after 16 holes, and Seahorn's score of 116 was Ozona's best score.

In the first round of the tournament, things were decidedly better than the practice round...but not by much.

Davis recovered from three double bogeys and a 44 on the front nine to shoot 40 on the back and post the Lions' best score of the day, an 84.

Hood, who played at state in 1987, also shot 44 on the front but shot 42 on the back for an 86.

Seahorn shot a disappointing 46 on the front nine but came back with a 41 on the back to card an 87.

Pridemore came in with one of his best rounds of the year, a 48-42, for a 90 to seal the Lions' score.

Ozona's 347 put them into a tie for fifth with Cooper. China Springs, the AA defending champion, took the lead with a 318, while Weimar kept it close at 325. In third was Edgewood with a 333. Behind them were Ozona and Cooper with Stanton, Liberty Hill and Franklin lurking behind.

On Day Two, the Lions neither gained ground nor lost it. Seahorn fired an 82, Davis another 84, Hood and 87, and Pridemore a 94 for an identical 347. His consistent play wasn't good enough to overcome anyone, and he slipped back into sixth, 10 shots behind Stanton.

At the top of the scoreboard, Edgewood took the runner-up trophy.

In individual play, China Springs' Terry Nightingale fired rounds of 79-71 to take the state championship, while Mark Cates of Edgewood came in second with rounds of 79-74. In a play-off for third, China Springs' Glen Land won on the second playoff hole over Stanton's Greg Avery. Both players shot 156 as Land had rounds of 75-81 and Avery shot 78-78.

Ozona's lowest scorer was Davis who fired rounds of 84-84 to finish 15th. Seahorn was also in the top 20 with rounds of 87-82. Hood finished his high school career with rounds of 86-87 and Pridemore carded rounds of 90-94.

## Accidents

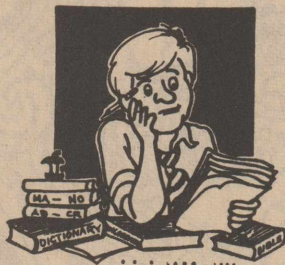
