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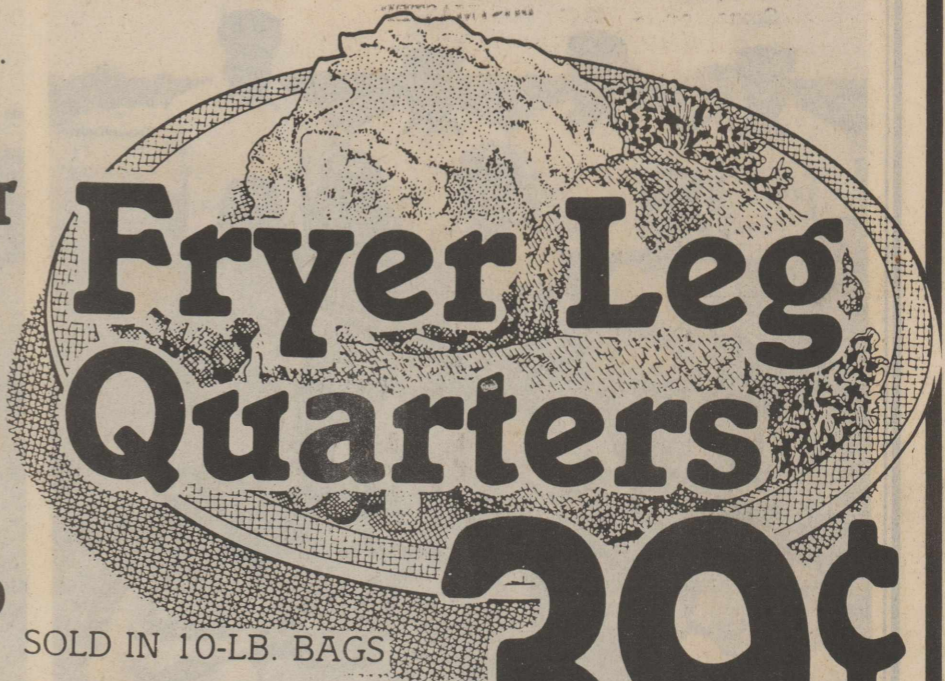
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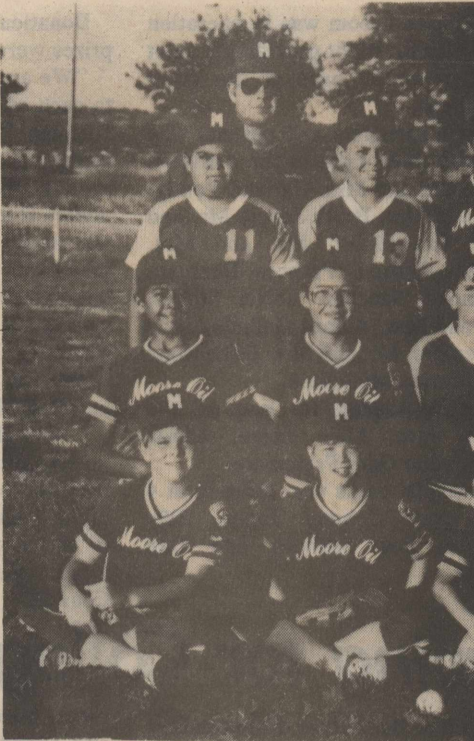

TSTA offers Paying for College guide

Economic hard times and dwindling family savings may keep many graduating Texas seniors from the college ranks this fall, but it doesn't have to, according to the Texas State Teachers Association.

TSTA says that strained family budgets, coupled with the rising costs of college tuitions at state universities, have caused enrollment to dip among middle and lower income groups. Additionally, federal aid programs for college students have also been cut during the past few years.

The associations this week announced a new guide for students and families, *Paying for College*, which outlines various assistance programs, including scholarships, grants, low-interest loans, work programs and private funding sources.

TSTA President Charles Beard said that many families are forfeiting college opportunities by assuming a student isn't needy enough or outstanding enough to qualify for assistance.

"We don't want our students'

hopes for the future compromised needlessly," Beard said. "Financial aid is harder to come by, but it hasn't disappeared."

The president said a middle-income family might meet the financial criteria if, for example, two or more children plan to attend college at the same time.

Financial need is the difference between the amount of money the family can contribute and what it actually costs for a year's tuition,

room, board, transportation, books and spending money at a specific college.

TSTA's free brochure suggests private sources, including most local TSTA associations.

"Our interest in students doesn't end with high school graduation," Beard said.

No report was available on an accident which happened Tuesday morning east of Ozona on I-10.

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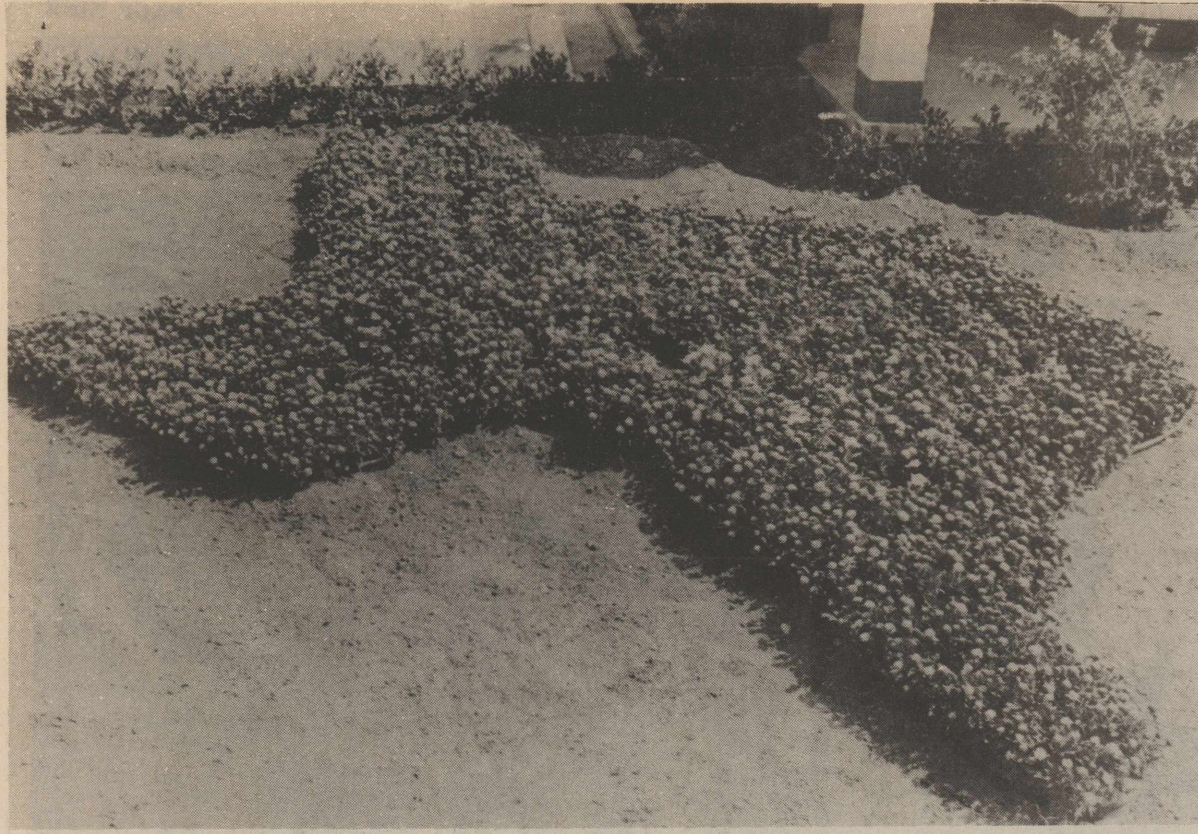

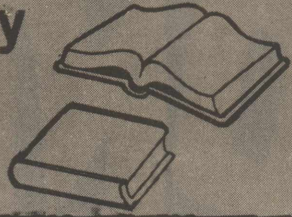

oriented work areas include farm and ranch experience such as plowing, planting, working with the ranch's BeefMaster cattle, fence building and repair. Auto mechanics and vehicle preventative maintenance are learned by working on vehicles under the guidance of a vocational director.

Continuing education is provided through scholarship funds for college or vocational schools.

The ranch can always use help in financing its day-to-day operations. The memorials program is one source of funding. Gifts of clothing, food, vehicles, equipment, even hay and livestock feed are welcomed.

The Boys Ranch Round Up is now in a rejuvenating process, Koehn says. Through the Round Up program, livestock may be donated outright to the ranch or sold by donors with proceeds going to the ranch.

"We are happy to have Mr. Long as a director of West Texas Boys Ranch," said Koehn. "This board is made up of men who are dedicated to work for the benefit of Boys Ranch."

The 40-room establishment is remembered by many visitors who lodged there on annual trips to Ozona for ropings and livestock sales. Gathering for visits in the hotel lobby was an important part of the summer events for many families, recalls one local lady.

Dear Editor:

Back in my cowboy days I saw neither rhyme nor reason in contusions, abrasions, concussions, etc. So I didn't write any verse until I looked back on it in the comparative comfort of a college classroom.

A few weeks of life in a dairy plus classes in Sul Ross I looked back on my cow and sheep boy days on various ranches of A. C. Hoover (a great and good man) with great longing. As a consequence I made up a rhyme once in a while, the very first one I sent to Jelly Trotter. He passed it on to your editor at The Stockman and he printed it but I never did get hold of a copy and don't remember but the last four lines which went as follows: But first to lay the ground work:

Kay Black, Mutt Black, Jelly and Ezra Trotter, Fletcher Freeman, Bill Bryan, myself (and Arthur McKinney as cook) were moving a herd of cattle to Barnhart via the stock

lanes. En route and in a lance there was not much to do but run horse races. I was trying to win a race on a plow horse type, Reuben Round (1600). Because he couldn't run didn't mean he couldn't pitch. He threw me off almost breaking my neck.

In any case I came to (to a certain extent) with a burning yearning for learning. (Anything would beat this). I don't recall if the poem was about this incident but the last verse intimates this: At least there were Jelly Trotter and I were at the Pearly Gates (O! Reuben threw me high enough):

"surprise surprise here come two guys
 From Crockett County thickets,
 "Come in" says Pete "And have a seat,
 You both have season tickets."

P.S. That kind of conceit was hard to beat. The Lord has extended to me

57 extra years and I'm not as confident of those season tickets as I was then.

Sometimes if you could look it up in your files (Fall of 1931) I would greatly appreciate it if you would mail me a xeroxed copy. In return, I am sending you another one dealing with the totally uncivilized way a mule dealt with me.

Last Spring Cow Hill Press operated by two ETSU profs ran off several vols of a 42-page book titled **A Pecos River Pilgrim's Poems** and sent me a few that are already gone. Next Spring Vol II will come out and I shall try to mail you one.

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

1903 Ozona newspaper found in trunk

How can the existence of a second newspaper in Ozona go unrecognized for 82 years?

Why does only a single issue of a newspaper that was published for approximately three and a half years seem to exist. Where are the others?

Recently, Mrs. Al Bailey found an old newspaper in a trunk in her Ozona home and donated it to the Crockett County Museum.

"Get yourself right! If you want to keep on the sunny side of life all the year round, read *The Texan*," boasts a prominent ad in the paper.

Entitled *The Southwest Texan*, the volume 1, number 46 issue proudly claims, "published weekly at Ozona, Texas." The date was Friday, Oct. 2, 1903, placing it in direct competition with the famous *Klecker*, now *The Ozona Stockman*.

Ironically, none of the historical accounts of Crockett County seem to recognize *The Texan's* existence. According to historical records, the only other town newspapers not tied to *The Stockman* were *The Enterprise* and, over 80 years later, *The Crockett County News*.

Among the only actual records of *The Southwest Texan* are items in the County Clerk's office that reveal the paper must have been published until at least February, 1906.

The paper was owned by D.M. West, pastor of the First Baptist Church from 1902-1904. Austin Callan is identified as the editor.

"Wedding Bells" is the lead story of the museum's copy of the paper, giving an account of the wedding of Miss Willie Ida Young and Mr. Harry J. Friend on Sept. 30, 1903. Friend was Mrs. Bailey's uncle, which explains why this particular issue was saved.

Among other major news was an election in which, Precinct 1 of Crockett County voted to prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverages. Recent rains, P.W. Sewell's accident which cost him an eye and the story of Henry Luckenbach who was killed after being hit with a baseball in Menardville also earned their share of space.

Some Ozona businesses advertising in the paper during the time were J.W. Henderson's Meat Market, Jim Bean's Central Barber Shop, West

and Smith Drug Store, Findlater's Ozona Store, G.L. Burger's General Merchandise and the Ozona Livery Stable.

One could shop for dry goods, clothing, groceries and grain at L.B. Cox's cash store, get "ice cold soda water" at Sawyer's, or get a windmill repaired by Will Stewart. Windmill oil was advertised at \$.50 a gallon at Midkiff and Caudle.

For \$8, one could travel round-trip to the San Angelo Carnival over the San Angelo-Ozona Stage Line owned by J.B. Moore. A one-way trip to San Angelo via Knickerbocker and Sherwood was \$5.

Cantu assumes duties

Hector Cantu, formerly of Ozona, has assumed the duties of psychologist at the Texas Youth Commission's statewide reception center in Brownwood. The announcement was made by Linda Steen, superintendent.

Cantu's primary responsibilities are to evaluate students through the use of interviews, observation, and psychological testing. He conducts individual counseling on referral and assists in the identification and management of special precaution cases.

A native of Ozona, he is a 1973 graduate of Ozona High School. His sister, Grace Maldonado, resides in Ozona.

Prior to joining the TYC, Cantu was a case manager and therapist at the River Crest Psychiatric Hospital in San Angelo where he was responsible for individual and group therapy, treatment plans development, and patient discharge plans.

These and many other memories can be enjoyed as *The Southwest Texan* begins a several week display on July 1 in the Crockett County Museum.

Also to be displayed are two issues of *The Ozona Stockman* from 1916.

Donated by the Fort Concho Museum, the issues were originally found in the home of architect Oscar Ruffini in San Angelo. Ruffini designed the court house and the Heritage Building.

These newspapers provide insight into life in Ozona during the early 1900's and can all be seen at the Crockett County Museum beginning July 1.

From 1983 to 1987, he was employed by the Concho Valley Center for Human Advancement in San Angelo where he served for seven months as a mental health specialist. He was then named liaison to the Big Spring State Hospital, providing therapeutic services for clients and their families during and after hospitalization. He and his wife, Becky, are parents of a son, Nicolas, who is 9 months old.

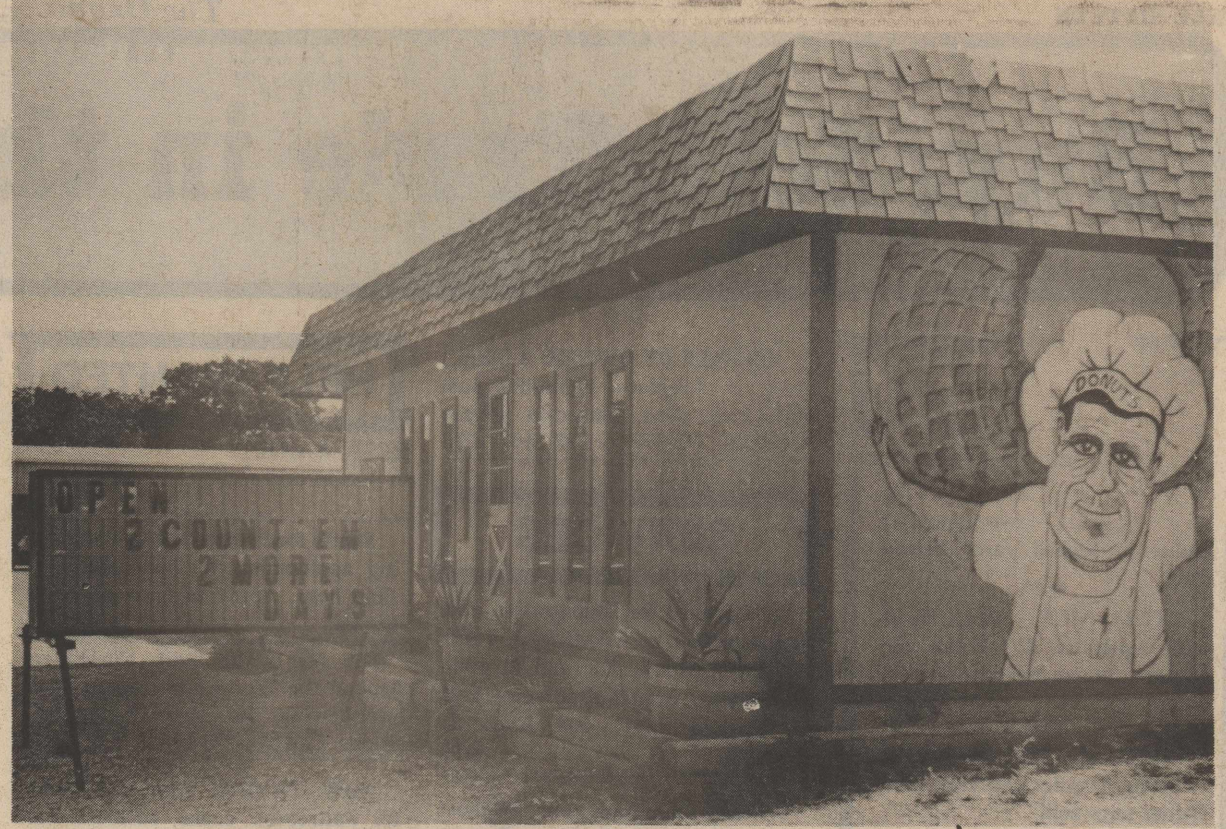
Location is 617 feet from the south and 220 feet from the west lines of 8-UV-GC&SF Survey. Contract depth is 1,500 feet.

The Clara Couch multipay field in Crockett County gained its fourth Cisco oil producer and a location east extension to that pay with completion of Beach Exploration Inc., Midland, No. 3 Noelke "A", nine miles southeast of Iraan, to pump six barrels of 42 gravity oil, plus 30 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 50,000-1.

Production was through perforations at 5,688-91 feet, which had been acidized with 250 gallons.

Drilled to 5,731 feet, where 4 1/2-inch casing was set, it is plugged back to 5,720 feet.

Location is 660 feet from the south and east lines of 32-GG-HE&WT Survey.
