The five goals of West Texas Boys Ranch are to teach each boy selfrespect, respect for God, respect for others, respect for work and a sense of responsibility.

The 967 acre working ranch was established in 1947 by a group of San Angelo Optimist Club members. The facility is funded by goodwill donations from West Texans with no state or federal support of any kind. The licensed child care facility has


To be placed at Boys Ranch, youngsters must be ages 6-17 at time of placement. Once an application is received, a seven member committee reviews the social and school history of the applicant to determine whether or not the ranch can provide what the child needs.

Many of the youngsters are from broken homes, says J. D. Koehn, executive administrator. Boys Ranch does not accept boys who are delinquent.

On the ranch, boys have the opportunity to participate in rodeo and saddle clubs, Scouts, 4-H, FFA and other activities.

The boys attend school in San Angelo, and there are three certified teachers on the ranch staff. Special help with homework assignments during regular evening study hall is given by 20 tutors. Remedial classes in reading and language therapy are provided by the ranch teachers to assist boys with learning disabilities. They are encouraged to participate in extra-curricular activities.

AUSTIN-The FBI is looking into about 19,000 loans made by the Veterans Land Board as part of an investigation of Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro and the General Land Office, an FBI special agent in Austin confirmed last week.

A federal grand jury subpoena for General Land Office records involving veterans land tracts was served about two weeks ago, the agent said. He refused to discuss specifics of the investigation except to say it involved possible violations of the Hobbs Act, a federal law that covers racketeering and robbery, but a section which sometimes is applied to elected officials.

The agent also would not comment on whether contributions to Mauro's campaign were being checked out, but he mentioned the Hobbs Act could cover an exchange of campaign contributions for other considerations. Several veteran land program developers have contributed to Mauro's campaign.

TSTA offers Paying for College guide

Economic hard times and dwindling family savings may keep many graduating Texas seniors from the college ranks this fall, but it doesn't have to, according to the Texas State Teachers Association.

TSTA says that strained family budgets, coupled with the rising costs of college tuitions at state universities, have caused enrollment to dip among middle and lower income groups. Additionally, federal aid programs for college students have also been cut during the past few years.

The associations this week announced a new guide for students and families, Paying for College, which outlines various assistance programs, including scholarships, grants, low-interest loans, work programs and private funding sources. TSTA President Charles Beard said that many families are forfeiting college opportunities by assuming a student isn't needy enough or outstanding enough to qualify for

hopes for the future compromised needlessly," Beard said. "Financial aid is harder to come by, but it hasn't disappeared."

The president said a middleincome family might meet the financial criteria if, for example, two or more children plan to attend college at the same time.

Financial need is the difference between the amount of money the family can contribute and what it actually costs for a year's tuition, room, board, transportation, books and spending money at a specific college.

TSTA's free brochure suggests private sources, including most local TSTA associations.

"Our interest in students doesn't end with high school graduation,' Beard said.

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

Flea control depends on methods used

Flea season is upon us, and whether fleas are adequately controlled depends on several factors, according to Dr. J.W. Stewart of Uvalde.

Stewart, an entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said without the proper control methods, homeowners are fighting a losing battle against this pest.

"The most important cure for a flea problem is prevention," Stewart said.

Pets should be watched closely and treated before high numbers of fleas occur.

Pet bedding that can easily be laundered or disposed of every few weeks or more frequently in the peak flea season should be used, he explained.

"Use a flea comb, which is especially effective for cats, in flows." he added. those

d be

"Before treating the pet or the area, read the label instructions," he

ner to the entire infested premises and add a wetting agent, if necessary, to better penetrate vegetation and carpet," the entomologist suggested.

Washing pets in soapy water will help reduce fleas, he said.

Inside the home, vacuum weekly and immediately dispose of collected materials in the vacuum bag, he emphasized.

"Treat pets at the same time insecticides are applied to inside and outside areas," he said.

Pets must be treated with products specifically for the animal to be treated, he emphasized.

"Some products used on dogs are harmful to cats," Stewart warned. Ingredients in these products vary in toxicity to the animal and the applicator and in the period of residual activity which they provide, he explained.

Rats and mice should be eliminated and the areas they frequent treated before or while they are being eliminated, Stewart added.







Farmers and ranchers in Crockett County will have an opportunity to choose one person from among candidates running for the Farmers Home Administration county committee in the June 30th election, FmHA County Supervisor, Ben T. Rucker, Jr., said recently,

Any person who has an interest in a farm or ranch in the county as owner, tenant or sharecropper is considered a farmer or rancher and is eligible to vote, Rucker said. Spouses of eligible farmers and ranchers also are considered farmers and ranchers for voting eligibility.

Ballots for the election are published in the Ozona Stockman and also are available at the FmHA county office at Box H, Eden, TX 76837. If they cannot be returned to the county office in person, ballots may be mailed in but will need to reach the county office prior to June 30.

Among other duties, county committees help determine whether an applicant is eligible for a FmHA farm or ranch loan.

Keep replacement heifers healthy

Whether buying or raising replacement heifers, health of the beef herd is vital to a successful cattle operation, said Billy Reagor, county agent with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

Heifers can usually be bought for less than they can be raised. Buying replacements, however, increase the risk of introducing disease into the herd and makes genetic progress difficult. On the other hand, raising and breeding heifers creates an extra group of cattle to be managed.

The beef producer must optimize production while preventing losses due to disease and management problems, and usually the best program is a balance between the risk of disease and the cost of protection.

It is impossible to separate a good health program from good nutritional and reproductive programs, Reagor said. So replacement heifers should be chosen for reproductive

efficiency, disease resistance and feed conversion efficiency.

County Agent's desk .

Weaning is one of the greatest stresses put on a calf, so other stressful procedures, such as vaccination and parasite control, should precede or follow weaning by at least three weeks.

A vaccination program should be handled properly so a cattleman will not lose money, said Reagor. Proper vaccination procedures are a must. This means reading the vaccine label and following instructions completely. Keep vaccines refrigerated, even during use, and keep them out of direct sunlight. Make sure vaccine combinations are compatible. Vaccinate animals at the right age and the right time of year. And do not use disinfectants such as alcohol with modified live virus vaccines.

For specific preventive medicine practices for the beef herd, Reagor recommended consulting a veterinary practitioner.

1903 Ozona newspaper found in trunk

How can the existence of a second newspaper in Ozona go unrecognized for 82 years?

Why does only a single issue of a newspaper that was published for approximately three and a half years seem to exist. Where are the others? Recently, Mrs. Al Bailey found an old newspaper in a trunk in her Ozona home and donated it to the Crockett County Museum.

"Get yourself right!! If you want to keep on the sunny side of life all the year round, read The Texan," boasts a prominent ad in the paper.

Entitled The Southwest Texan, the volume 1, number 46 issue proudly claims, "published weekly at Ozona. Texas." The date was Friday, Oct. 2, 1903, placing it in direct competition with the famous Kicker, now The Ozona Stockman.

Ironically, none of the historical accounts of Crockett County seem to recognize The Texan's existence. According to historical records, the only other town newspapers not tied to The Stockman were The Enterprise and, over 80 years later, The **Crockett County News.**

Among the only actual records of The Southwest Texan are items in the County Clerk's office that reveal the paper must have been published until at least February, 1906.

The paper was owned by D.M. West, pastor of the First Baptist Church from 1902-1904. Austin Callan is identified as the editor.

'Wedding Bells'' is the lead story of the museum's copy of the paper, giving an account of the wedding of Miss Willie Ida Young and Mr. Harry J. Friend on Sept. 30, 1903. Friend was Mrs. Bailey's uncle, which explains why this particular issue was saved.

Among other major news was an election in which. Precinct 1 of Crockett County voted to prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverages. Recent rains, P.W. Sewell's accident which cost him an eye and the story of Henry Luckenbach who was killed after being hit with a baseball in Menardville also earned their share of space.

Some Ozona businesses advertising in the paper during the time were J.W. Henderson's Meat Market, Jim Bean's Central Barber Shop, West and Smith Drug Store, Findlater's Ozona Store, G.L. Bunger's General Merchandise and the Ozona Livery Stable.

One could shop for dry goods, clothing, groceries and grain at L.B. Cox's cash store, get "ice cold soda water" at Sawyer's, or get a windmill repaired by Will Stewart. Windmill oil was advertised at \$.50 a gallon at Midkiff and Caudle.

For \$8, one could travel round-trip to the San Angelo Carnival over the San Angelo-Ozona Stage Line owned by J.B. Moore. A one-way trip to San Angelo via Knickerbocker and Sherwood was \$5.

These and many other memories can be enjoyed as The Southwest Texan begins a several week display on July 1 in the Crockett County Museum.

Also to be displayed are two issues of The Ozona Stockman from 1916. Donated by the Fort Concho Museum, the issues were originally found in the home of architect Oscar Rufinni in San Angelo. Rufinni designed the court house and the Heritage Building.

These newspapers provide insight into life in Ozona during the early 1900's and can all be seen at the Crockett County Museum beginning July 1.

A native of Ozona, he is a 1973 graduate of Ozona High School. His sister, Grace Maldonado, resides in Ozona.






