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School tax hike to be discussed in hearing

A public hearing to discuss a proposed school tax increase will be held Thursday, Aug. 25, at the school administration building.

The proposal comes on the heels of a drop in property wealth of \$223.85 million since 1986. Crockett County's taxable property wealth totaled \$648.03 million in 1986, dropping to \$424.18 million in 1987.

The Crockett County school district follows the trend of two thirds of the state's school districts in the loss of taxable property wealth.

In an effort to make up for the lost revenue the local school district is also following most of the state's school districts by attempting to raise the tax rate.

Under the new proposal the tax rate would increase by a nickle per \$100 of taxable value. The new rate would be 98 cents. The present rate is 93 cents.

Taxes on the average home would increase by \$22.38 which is an increase of 29.71 percent over last year. In 1987 the average homeowner paid \$75.33 in school taxes. A projection of the increased tax is that

the average homeowner would pay \$97.71 this year.

School board members have already taken sides on the issue, voting 4-3 in favor of the tax hike.

David Bean, Sandra Childress, Gary Buck Mitchell and Jeffrey Sutton have taken a stand for the proposal while Dan Pullen, Gary Vannoy and George Ybarra are against the tax increase.

State aid may off-set lost revenues from declining property values to some extent. Crockett County schools are expected to receive \$835,041 for 1988-89. This figure is an increase over 1987-88 when the local schools received \$258,300.

Neighboring school districts are faring about the same as the local district with property wealth in Reagan County falling from \$578.5 million in 1986 to \$377.9 million in 1987. Property wealth in Sutton County fell from \$548.9 million in 1986 to \$422.2 million in 1987.

Schleicher County's taxable property wealth fell from \$286.46 million in 1986 to \$198.87 million in 1987.

Thursday's tax meeting will be at 7:30 p.m.

KYXX-FM may be sold to Georgia company

Ozona's KYXX-FM radio station may soon belong to a Georgia company if a proposed deal between Radioactivity Broadcast Group of Atlanta and Foster Communications and Foster Broadcasting Group of San Angelo is approved by the government.

Top-rated San Angelo radio station, KIXY-FM as well as KAYJ-AM, and KHOS-FM and -AM in Sonora, are also included in the proposed sale. Translator stations in Junction and Big Lake will complete the five-station package.

KIXY's Top 40 format is rebroadcast on the rural stations while rock oldies are played by KAYJ for the San Angelo area.

The Federal Communications Commission must approve the sale. The approval will require at least 90

days. A RBG official expressed the hope that the approval and sale will be completed by the end of the year.

RBG officials say they have no plans for changes in either formats or personnel at the stations.

RBG currently owns one station in Kingland, GA, and is negotiating for six additional stations besides the Foster group. Three of the additional six are located in Georgia and three are in Texas. RBG was formed earlier this year for the purpose of buying radio stations to form a chain of these in medium-sized markets.

Walton Foster of San Angelo is president and chief executive officer of both Foster Communications and Foster Broadcasting Group. He will continue as a consultant for the company in San Angelo.

Registration figures released this week by school officials show that as of Friday, Aug. 19, Ozona Primary School had 194 students to register but anticipates welcoming 229 students on Sept. 1. Ozona Intermediate School reported a total of 196 students pre-registering with an expected total of 245 students. Ozona Junior High reported that 217 students had pre-registered, but they are anticipating opening their doors to 222 students. 217 students were reported to have pre-registered at Ozona High School with 244 expected on the first day of school. Although this is an overall pre-registration total of 824 students, approximately 116 more students are expected to enroll before the first day of classes.

Williams record book tops at state level

Crockett County 4-H member John Williams will enjoy a trip to Chicago this December, thanks to his award-winning 4-H record book.

John, a 16-year old, eight-year 4-H member and the son of Larry and Elaine Williams, and grandson of Troy and Estelle Williams, has been active in the "Conservation of Natural Resources" category. His participation in local, district and state-level activities, plus his outstanding work in the conservation project, netted him first place in statewide competition, plus an expense-paid trip to National 4-H Congress in Chicago. The trip is sponsored by Deere and Company of Moline, IL.

As part of his project, John organized a deer management harvest system and has been actively involved in other range and wildlife conservation practices on the family's ranch.

He has also worked with sheep, range judging, foods and clothing

projects while in 4-H. Citizenship projects and leadership activities have also played an important role in his 4-H career. In 1987, he was Crockett County's Gold Star recipient.

In his record book, Williams wrote, "I have learned that there is more to conservation of natural resources than just saving trees. My main objective in entering (this category) is to promote understanding about one of our natural resources--rangeland. Rangeland provides for range livestock production, wildlife habitats, outdoor recreation, and is the watershed for much of the water used in the United States today. The program includes range evaluation and wildlife management and improvement techniques."

Williams is a junior at Reagan County High School, and hopes to become a lawyer. He has been on the A and B honor rolls, active in sports and UIL, National Honor Society and student council.

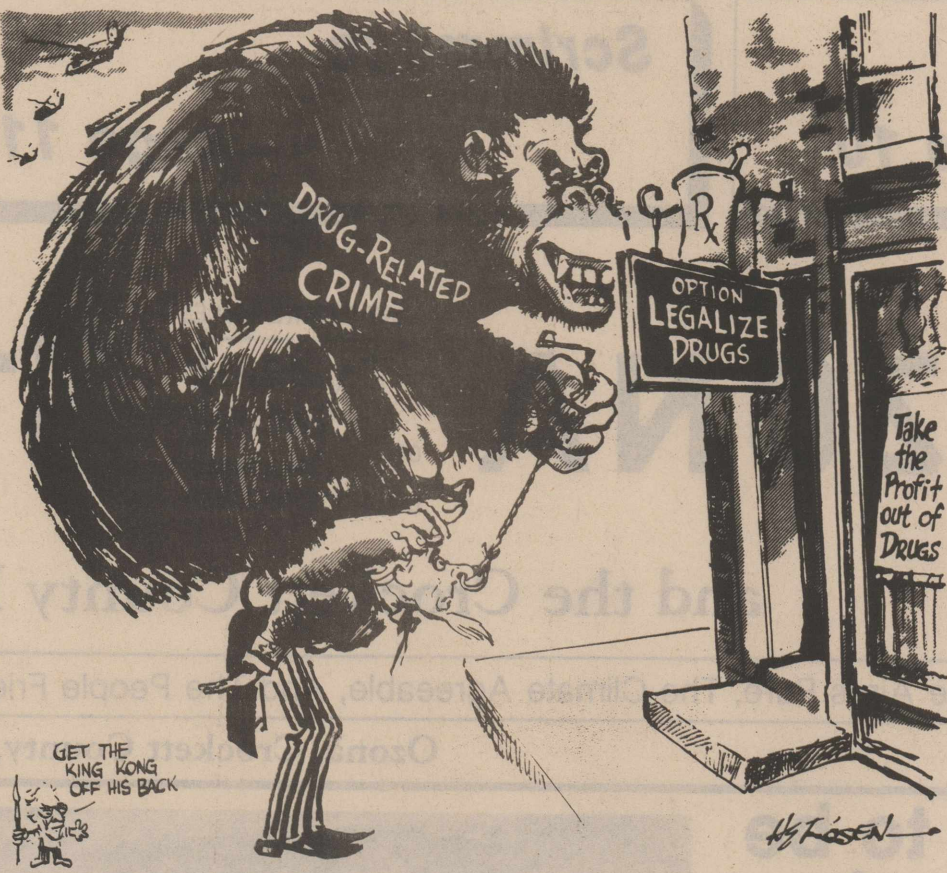

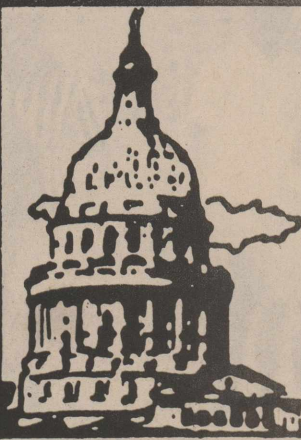

**STATE CAPITAL
HIGHLIGHTS**

AUSTIN—By Election Day, the battle for votes will be house-to-house combat in Texas, which has been crisscrossed more times this year by presidential candidates than Virginia by cavalry in the Civil War.

Certainly the political parties are launching forays into each other's territory, erasing traditional borders and staking a new political map of Texas.

One new aspect is clear by now: Texas Republicans have stolen a page from the Democrats' handbook and opened the door to minorities of a conservative philosophy.

The gambit is a natural follow-up to Texas GOP gains made in 1986 when Roy Barrera Jr., running as a Republican, narrowly missed upsetting Attorney General Jim Mattox.

Texas Democrats, with U. S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen on the ticket, are trying to recapture the white, middle-class voters who fell behind in 1980 when Texas Democrats pushed too far left.

Another aspect yet to be decided is whether the Democrats' strategy of agitating class struggle, or poor vs. rich warfare, will work this time or be proven an unsuccessful campaign tool.

Richards-Edwards Team?

The voting bloc which may have the final say is women, now the largest in numbers, and they currently poll in favor of Dukakis-Bentsen.

In Texas, women voters support Treasurer Ann Richards, who last week teamed up with Duncanville state Sen. Chet Edwards to rip GOP vice presidential candidate Dan Quayle for his wealth.

Edwards said the GOP ticket now has "a silver foot and a silver spoon," referring to Richards' famous gibe at George Bush.

Richards is expected to run for governor in 1990 and Edwards is jockeying to make the lieutenant governor's race against Comptroller Bob Bullock.

While primary candidates do not run outright in teams, sooner or later it appears that way, usually later. The sight of Richards and Edwards at the same table naturally has provoked some private comment on their possibilities in the top two slots.

Mattox, SWC, NCAA

Attorney General Mattox asked a federal appeals court to reconsider its recent decision allowing the NCAA to keep private its probes of football recruiting scandals in the Southwest Conference and elsewhere.

The athletics groups were sued by some media after refusing to disclose records, particularly the SMU "Ponygate" files which involved Gov. Bill Clements, on grounds they were not covered by the Open Records Act.

Mattox said the appeals court relied on a 1982 opinion by then-Attorney General Mark White

which Mattox overturned in 1987. Last week, members of the Texas media decided to ask a chief federal judge to confirm reports that a district judge heard secret testimony during lunchtime in the drug trial of suspended Orange County Sheriff James Wade, a violation of the public trial amendment.

Other Highlights

- A Select Committee on Education reported the only viable response to the lawsuit challenging the fairness of public school funding will cost taxpayers an extra \$1.6 billion a year.

- The state would still not be able to meet all requirements of Austin District Court Judge Harley Clark's ruling, now under appeal to the Texas Supreme Court, the panel reported.

- Records released by Sen.

Bentsen indicate he is worth between \$5 million-\$10 million, and is in good health. Bentsen drew flack from detractors when it was learned he recently resigned from several prestigious private clubs to run for vice president.

- Bentsen campaigned in Houston last week and pledged the Dukakis-Bentsen ticket to a manned space station by the year 2000, a program which would mean 1,000 jobs for Houston contractors.

- Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower and labor officials warned that the railroad industry is trying to repeal the law making railroads financially liable for rail accidents.

Hightower, often criticized by legislators for his involvement in areas outside of agriculture, said he is concerned with natural resources which are threatened by toxic rail mishaps.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97 percent five year survival rate and a 90 percent 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

THE MOBILE BREAST CANCER DETECTION UNIT WILL BE IN OZONA ON THURSDAY, SEPT. 15.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

1. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under

50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

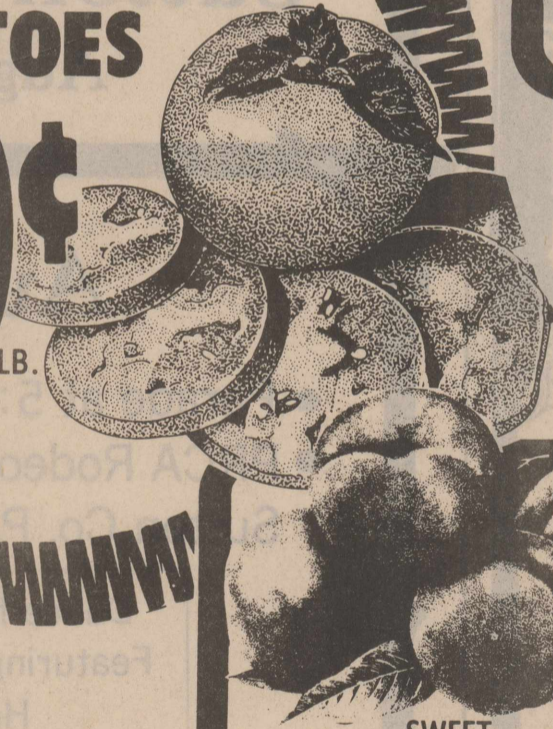

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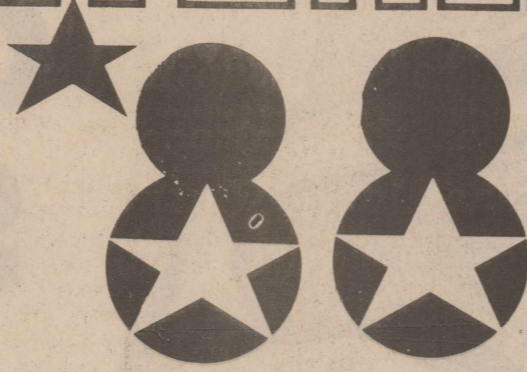

Extension Connection

by Tedra Ulmer, County Extension Agent

Fall and back-to-school always send a wave of excitement through young shoppers. As the mother of a teenager, I can attest to that fact.

I can also attest to the feeling of dread as I clutch my checkbook tightly and head for the first round of shopping, along with several million other confused moms.

There are ways to lessen the confusion, however, even without forcing your child to wear rags to school.

First, make a thorough inventory of all clothes the child already has by taking everything out of closets and drawers. Make a "discard" pile (to give to a younger brother or sister, give to charity or sell in a garage sale).

Your second pile should be articles of clothing that can be worn but need cleaning or repair. The third pile should be things that are ready to be worn, and these items should be listed on an inventory under categories like "shirts", "skirts", "socks", etc.

As items from the "repair" pile are taken care of, add them to the inventory. Be specific about colors, style and fabrics. For example, list a shirt as "pink oxford long sleeve".

Before you put the clothes away, try different combinations and see what you can mix and match. Some things can be updated simply by adding new accessories; some may need slight alterations.

Now that you're familiar with the clothes that are on hand, decide what pieces you're going to shop for. A new pair of pants in a neutral color like black, for example, may go with several other outfits. It's best to invest more money in basics that will be worn again and again, rather than "fad" items that will be out of style in a couple of months.

Speaking of style, it is sometimes best to wait a couple of weeks before making new purchases - kids like to look and dress like their friends, so it's often a good idea to wait and see what their friends are wearing. Rambo may be out and Mickey Mouse may be in!

Before you step out of the house, decide upon a realistic budget, then stick to it when you get to the stores. Limit impulse spending; however, it's probably practical to budget a few dollars for those items you hadn't thought about and just can't resist when you see them in the store.

One thing we in Ozona need to consider is the cost of buying locally versus going out of town. From local merchants you receive convenience, personalized service and often find bargains comparable to what you'll pay in a larger town. Driving also means you have to figure in your time, gas and wear on your vehicle which is added to the cost of out-of-town purchases.

Before buying, look at the quality of the garments. Are they suitable for school wear? Are they well made, or will they fall apart after a couple of weeks of hard wear? Do they require special cleaning and care?

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has a number of bulletins available on buying children's clothing and on general clothing quality. Why not stop by and pick them up before you head out to buy school clothes this fall? Our county

Extension office is located on the second floor of the courthouse annex.

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

Lions begin football season with Sanderson scrimmage

The 1988 Ozona Lions began their trek to the playoffs last Friday night when they traveled to Sanderson to take on the highly touted Sanderson Eagles of District 5-A in their first pre-season scrimmage. The Lions, spurred by surprisingly strong defense, overwhelmed the Eagles 5-0.

In the controlled scrimmage, both the varsity and the junior varsity teams were given 15-20 plays at a time both on offense and defense to see what they could do in a game situation.

The J.V. began the evening by holding Sanderson to only four first downs on their very first possession. Although the Eagles gained some valuable yardage, the aggressive play of the Ozona defense stuffed Sanderson ball carriers behind the line of scrimmage at critical times, therefore denying them several opportunities for first downs.

When Ozona took over on offense, sophomore quarterback Danny DeHoyos directed the Lions on a 70 yard scoring drive that put them on top 1-0. The touchdown came on the J.V. Lions' most effective play... the option. After a deft fake to fullback Michael Ybarra, DeHoyos veered toward the left end where he was escorted into the end zone by running back Roger Martinez. The six yard touchdown scamper gave Ozona the momentum they needed to march right back down the field another 70 yards.

This time Martinez hit pay dirt but not before he ran over and through Sanderson defenders. After the first J.V. offensive and defensive series, the Lions led 2-0.

The varsity took the field for the first time on the defensive side of the ball, and took up where they left off last fall. In their first series of 20 plays, the Lions allowed Sanderson only two first downs. Also, like their J.V. counterparts, the varsity Lions came up with several big plays, including a pass interception by senior cornerback Oscar Galindo that stymied the Eagles' attempts for first down yardage. After 20 plays, Sanderson had barely broken into red numbers in total yards gained.

On the varsity's first offensive series, Ozona used a potent rushing attack led by junior running back George Ybarra to hammer away at the Sanderson defense, leaving them battered and broken. Helped along by key passes by quarterback Chris Denman and receptions by Robby Tambunga, the Lions drove all the way to the Sanderson two yard line where Ybarra barreled over for the score, giving Ozona a 3-0 lead.

Ozona's remaining two scores came via the surprisingly strong running of fullback Daun Williams. Playing for the J.V., Williams' first TD came on a seven yard rumble which saw him carry three Sanderson players on his back. After driving back down the length of the field, Williams blasted across from five yards out for Ozona's last score.

Closing out the scrimmage were Ozona's second team varsity units. On defense, the Lions played as aggressively as the units before them. After denying them a first down, Sanderson's last gasp attempt for a score ended when Mingo Perez

came up with a pass interception. On offense, the Lions' second unit looked sharp on some plays, yet sluggish on others. After gaining a couple of first downs, their drive ended when quarterback Cope Davis lofted not one, but two deep passes into a strong headwind and was intercepted both times to end the scrimmage.

Although the Lions seemed to manhandle Sanderson, Coach Don Payne stated to his team afterward their attack which needed lots of work. However, he said that there were "...lots of bright spots seen during the scrimmage".

The Lions' next tilt before the regular season begins will be Saturday, July 27, in Fort Stockton against Van Horn. The scrimmage will start at 5:30 p.m.

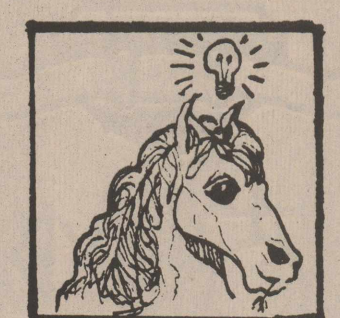
