Gilbert dumps plentiful rainfall over county

Crockett County residents waited with baited breaths for Hurricane Gilbert Friday, hoping for a little rain in the spin-off. They were not disappointed with six plus inches of rain falling on most of the county over a two-day period.

The welcome precipitation began early Saturday and fell off and on -- mostly on -- until Sunday evening.

The Crockett County Water District office reported 6.15 inches in their rain gauge for the two-day total.

Although the run-off closed roads, no pavement was reported lost according to Pat Aiguier of the Crockett County Road Department. The road department had its work cut out, however, with sweeping gravel off roads.

A mudslide on U.S. Hwy. 190 32 miles west of Ozona partially blocked the highway Sunday. State Hwy. 163 closed at 11 p.m. Saturday and was still closed on the Val Verde County portion Monday morning.

Hwy. 1973 closed Sunday to be reopened about 10 a.m. Monday.

Throughout the county rainfall varied from about 3.5 inches up to 7 inches.

Buddy Moore reported 3.5 inches at the ranch 25 miles southeast of Ozona.

Joe Pierce IV said the Pierce ranches 30 miles south of Ozona had received 5 or 6 inches.

Janie Chandler reported 5 inches on the Smith Ranch 25 miles south of town.

Forty miles southwest of Ozona on Howard Draw, Mrs. Bud Cox re-

ported 4 inches.

Peggy McMullan recorded 3.7 inches on the Mrs. Floyd McMullan Ranch 10 miles east of Iraan.

Suzy Black reported 3.7 to 5.4 inches on the Bill Black Ranch 27 miles northwest of Ozona.

The Boyd Baker Ranch 20 miles north of Ozona recorded about 7 inches.

"We didn't have any wind or anything; it just fell," Frances Baker said.

Bill T. Williams reported 6 inches 11 miles north of town.

J. B. Parker recorded 4 to 5.5 inches west of Ozona and 6 inches at Rancho Bonito 7 miles north of town.

Johnny Jones reported 4.2 inches of rain east of Ozona.

Tornado warnings and watches made county residents worry that they might receive more than the precipitation, but those fears were ungrounded as no tornado sightings were reported in the county.

DPS officers Bob Falkner and Benny English of the Texas Department of Public Safety were on a

standby status expecting to be called to the coast to participate in a command center. They were not called to do so, however.

At least one Ozonan experienced something of the brunt of the hurricane. Terry Wells, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Boots Goll, is in Jamaica where he has a role in a re-make of the movie "Lord of the Flies".

Terry and the rest of his movie cast were taken to the mountains before the storm hit the island. Their lodgings were some of the few not destroyed by the hurricane. The hotel where Terry's mother, Betty, and Ann Trull had stayed during a recent visit was destroyed.

Mrs. Goll had planned to return to Jamaica last weekend and stay until the filming is completed in November.

The American consul in Jamaica affirmed that the 25 boys in the movie cast are safe. The movie's producer radioed from shipboard and had a secretary notify the boys' parents.

School board discusses ineligible bus riders

Crockett County school board members discussed ineligible bus riders and school admissions in regular session Tuesday, Sept. 13.

An ineligible bus rider is a student who does not live two or more miles from school. Ozona schools have 13-15 ineligible bus riders this year, according to Ozona Superintendent Garland Davis.

"We've been giving them the privilege of riding as long as it does not create overcrowding on the bus," Davis said. "But, it's getting to the point of reaching the capacity of the bus."

Most of the ineligible bus riders live at Crockett Apartments on state Hwy. 163 south. The apartments are only a mile and a half from the schools.

The board delayed action until the October meeting so the matter may be studied further.

School admission rules were also discussed by the board. The school district can deny admission to students who are not living with their parents or legal guardians. Only four or five students would be affected at the present time.

"We do not want to create overcrowding in the classroom," Davis said. "If it becomes a burden for the school district we would have to impose more stringent restrictions on this."

Davis emphasized that the school district does not want to create a precedent in allowing student not living with parents or guardians to attend the Ozona schools. No action was taken regarding school admissions.

The board approved authorization for the superintendent to request bids for a freezer for the school cafeteria.

In other action Gary Vannoy was chosen as the schools' representative to the Crockett County Citizens' Juvenile Advisory Board.

Several additions were made to the substitute teacher list. These were Lily Velasquez, Diana Miller, Judy Farris, Karen Sparks, Sylvia DeHoyos, Jane Richardson, and Mary Nations.

The dropping school enrollment was discussed. On the last day of the first full week 925 were enrolled. At the same time last year 971 were enrolled although the average membership rose to 991 during the year.

"The smaller school districts are losing," Davis said. "The larger districts are growing."

In response to a board member's query, Davis reported on the coaches' reactions to board action relating to a drug/alcohol use policy.

"They were in good frame of mind," Davis said. "We did not pass anything new that we had been working on. One other change I asked them to make was for a committee of head coaches instead of the administrative committee."

The administrative committee to which Davis referred consists of the superintendent, assistant superintendent, athletic director, junior high principal and high school principal.

After discussion relating to the effects of the present drug/alcohol rules now in place, the board adjourned without further action.

The asbestos removal project mandated by the state will be discussed in the Oct. 6 meeting.

Lion defense dominates

Lions victorious over Iraan

Scoring 21 points in the first half against Iraan, the Ozona Lions eventually held off a last quarter Brave rally securing their second win of the year.

The Lions clearly dominated in the first two quarters, tallying 147 offensive yards while allowing Iraan only 61. The crucial play, though, came in the final seconds of the game when Ozona's defense forced a safety on the Braves, giving the Lions two points and a 23-13 lead.

Ozona seemed headed for a score on the opening possession as they successfully moved the ball upfield, starting on their own 14 and inching as close as Iraan's 30 where they sputtered and halted. At least for the moment.

Iraan had little luck getting their offense going and found themselves punting after only three plays. The pressure of Lalo Rodriguez and Lee Galan proved too much for the Brave punter who sent the ball straight up...and down --one yard past the scrimmage line.

In their quest for the game's first touchdown, the Lions faced 3-and-12. George Ybarra came through with a ten-yard run, and on 4-and-2, quarterback Chris Denman kept the ball for a three yard rush.

Two plays later, Harvey Dominguez bulled three yards through the Iraan defense and gave the Lions a 6-0 lead. Ruben Borrego added the extra point by splitting the uprights.

The Braves received the ensuing kickoff and, on the next play from scrimmage, fumbled the ball into the hands of Lion Isaac Leal.

With only 27 yards to the end zone, Ozona looked in good position to add another touchdown to their side of the scoreboard. Denman went to the air three times, two landing incompleting and the last being intercepted.

Still, three plays later, Iraan went to punt again, this time doing somewhat better--five yards better to

be exact. Ozona luckily fielded the ball without accidentally touching it, then having Iraan recover.

A play turned sour left Denman holding a hot potato with several Braves in pursuit. He tried to find room to his left, instead found a convincing wall, then back-tracked to his right and sprinted for the end zone, finally knocked out of bounds just inches from the goal line.

A penalty put the Lions five yards back but Ybarra replied with runs of four and one yard, the latter putting him in the end zone and the Lions, following the extra point, ahead 14-0.

Iraan showed their brightest spark in the opening half when they cruised 72 yards in two minutes for their first touchdown and cut the Lions lead in half.

A miscued kickoff positioned Ozona on the Braves' 49 yard line. From there, they spent most of the remaining second quarter to set up Dominguez' two-yard touchdown plunge.

Iraan turned around and put the ball to the air where Ybarra intercepted and returned it to within six yards of another score. However, the officials ruled a Lion had clipped during the return and placed the Lions back on Iraan's 28.

Borrego, having already booted three successful extra points, attempted a field goal with three seconds remaining but could not find the uprights.

The second half opened with Iraan still stuck on their side of the field. Though the Braves' punting improved, the Lions had little trouble penetrating their opponent's territory.

The Lions ate up half of the third quarter and opened the fourth quarter with a pass play to Robby Tambunga who, after having the ball bounce and dance just beyond his grasp, made a dazzling catch.

This play apparently positioned Ozona inside the Braves' ten yard marker, but officials again pointed a finger at the Lions, this time for offensive pass interference which is a five-yard plus loss of down penalty.

Lions to serve pancakes Friday

It's flapjack dinner time again. The Ozona Lions Club will host their annual pancake supper on Friday, Sept. 23, just before the homecoming game. They will begin flipping flapjacks at 5:30 p.m. in the Civic Center next to the football stadium and serving until 7:30 p.m. Plates featuring golden brown pancakes and all the trimmings are \$3.00. Those wanting to take plates home can do so for just 25¢ extra.

Funds raised at the dinner will be used for Lions Club projects such as the local eye glass fund. It is a fund that provides examinations and glasses for some Ozona students anonymously. The Club also sponsors Boy Scout, and Cub scout programs. The Lions Club is a community service organization and is proud to return most of the money it raises back into worthwhile local concerns.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 8, 1988

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. The Texas

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following:

The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

AUSTIN—The per capita loss in rural fires in Texas is 50 percent higher than in urban fires, Bruce Miles, director of the Texas Forest Service, told 90 persons attending the three-day Governor's conference on Rural/Suburban Fire Protection in Austin early this month.

Purpose of the conference was to outline problems of homes built in areas near vegetation which has a high fire danger, especially in times of drought. **\$5 Million Blaze**

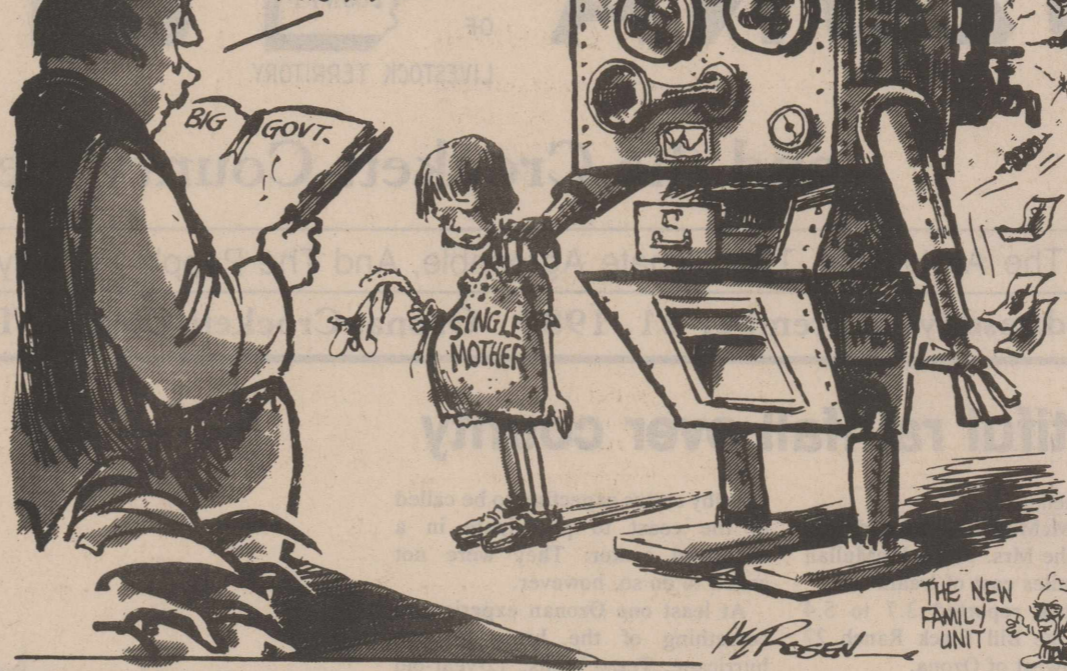
One impetus for the conference was a blaze in March that destroyed 300,000 acres of range land in Shackelford and adjoining counties in West Texas. It was the largest wildfire in modern Texas history and threatened several Texas communities. Losses to agriculture, oil field equipment and the cost of extinguishing the fire totaled more than \$5 million.

In the Texas Hill Country, in the Pineywoods of East Texas, in once open rangelands all across Texas, families are building homes in tranquil rural settings and commuting to jobs in the cities.

The problem with this latest chapter in realizing "The American Dream" is that many of these new homes and subdivisions are causing problems, primarily ignoring the dangers posed by fire.

Persons attending the conference agreed that homeowners must become involved in community fire protection and prevention pro-

grams. Insurance companies must offer incentives to homeowners who practice fire prevention and incentives must be available to rural fire departments for proper equipment and training.

Firefighters Lauded

Shackelford County judge Marie Smith, praised the efforts of firefighters from as far away as Fort Worth when the blaze roared over pasture lands near Albany.

She echoed the problems of many rural fire departments, whose equipment can't cope with the pressure of massive fires. "When the fire was over, we did not have a fire truck that would run," Smith said.

Ernest Reesing, a professor at Sul Ross University, Alpine, and a past president of the Firemen's and Fire Marshall's Association of Texas, said the job of protecting these new rural homeowners has shifted from paid to volunteer fire departments.

"Volunteer firemen protect most of this state," Reesing said. "There are 1,400 communities in the state with no fire protection at all."

Goals Established

Conference participants established a number of goals to be reached by 1995. They included:

- Promotion of broad-based support for statewide building, fire and development standards.
- Provide fire protection with reasonable response time by properly funded, trained and equipped personnel.
- Create a state agency to coordinate and to provide fire service leadership.
- Provide funding for training and equipment to all fire departments based on need; have orga-

nized rural fire departments in all communities in need of fire protection; and set limits of liability for rural departments.

Cisneros Stepping Down

San Antonio Mayor Henry Cisneros announced last week he will not seek re-election, a decision which sets him up for more financially lucrative offers or another run for public office.

Cisneros, a media darling, is often mentioned as gubernatorial or even vice presidential timber.

Elected in 1981, Cisneros, the first Hispanic to be elected mayor of a metropolitan city, said "enough is enough," adding he wanted to spend more time on personal projects and be with his children.

Other Highlights

• Gov. Clements, commenting on speculation that Texas is one of the top two sites for the supercollider, said he believed it and that Texas could cinch the project by helping George Bush win the White House.

• A survey two years ago that listed Texas 47th among states in treatment of the mentally ill has boosted the state this year to 31st.

• A Texas group backing English as the official U.S. language released a list of 51 candidates who support the amendment, including Randy Pennington, Talmadge Heflin, John Culberson, Keith Valigura and John Willy in the Texas House, state Sen. Brad Wright, congressmen Bill Archer, Jack Fields and Tom DeLay, and GOP U.S. Senate nominee Beau Boulter.

• Texas ranks 49th among states in per-person outstanding debt in 1987, bettered only by Kansas.

Dr. Pete Jacoby will show his mesquite control plots (fall applications '86 and '87) on Ladd Linthicum and Bob Bissett ranches.

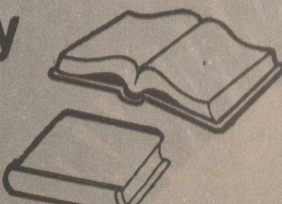
At noon the group will return to the range station to eat a rib eye steak meal provided by Dow Chemical Co.

orange and yellow hues are evidence of natural coloring agents which are masked in spring and summer by the chlorophyll. The fiery red colors of New England maples are the result of yet another winter twist: warm fall days produce an abundance of sugar in the leaves which is then trapped by chilly fall nights. As more and more sugar accumulates, the leaves turn brighter and brighter red, until eventually they fall off. We don't have many maples in Texas, but you can see much the same change in local trees, such as red oaks, nandinas and sumacs.

Did you know? Many birds undergo a complete change of plumage in the fall. Mallard ducks lose their brilliant copper and green; the Scarlet Tanager turns an olive drab; and the English Sparrow's strong black bib is covered up with grey. The reason probably has to do with the lesser role of mating in the fall and the need to blend in with a sparser, grayer environment.

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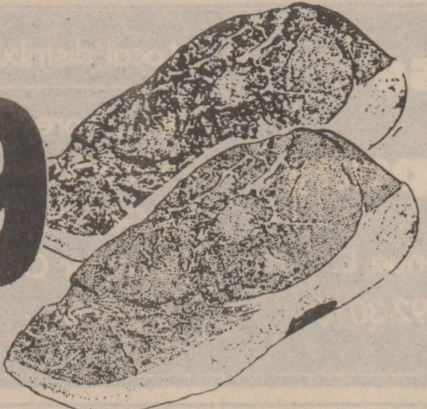


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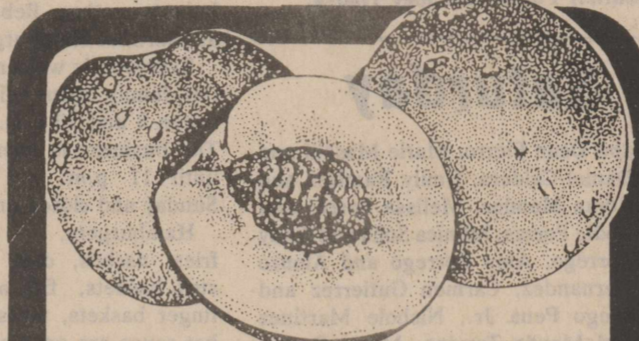

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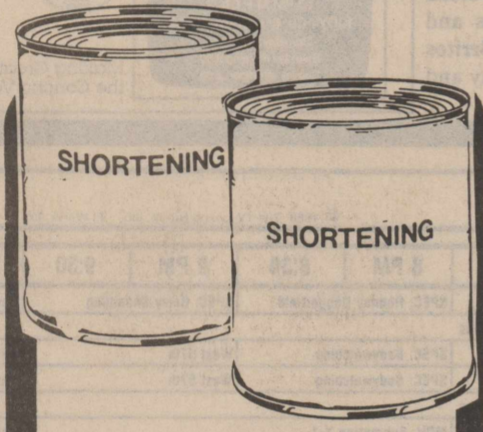

Extension Connection

"Forging ahead" might be our watchword around the Crockett County Extension Office this week. Actually, sometimes we can't tell if we're forging ahead or backward!

Mostly, our forging concerns 4-H. Getting clubs started, organizing foods and sheep projects and all the million and one details that come up this time of year make September a wild month. Some of you parents and leaders may feel like you're on a runaway rollercoaster - but ain't it fun?

Fun, for those of you who aren't yet involved in 4-H, is working with your own kids or someone else's, and seeing them grow and develop a sense of responsibility, leadership skills and knowledge.

If you're not involved with your kids in their 4-H activities, everyone misses out. All youngsters need guidance, and the best place for it to come from is from their own parents.

If you're not comfortable teaching project lessons or leading project groups, there are still a thousand other ways you can help - providing transportation, helping your own child with his or her project, helping with decorations and much more.

Parents are always welcome to attend 4-H meetings and project activities with their children, so consider this your personal invitation to be there!

Monday, Sept. 26, at 6:40 p.m., the Ozona Junior High 4-H Club will meet at the junior high cafeteria for their first meeting of the year. All young people in grades six through eight are urged to attend, along with their parents.

This first meeting will be very important - officers will be elected and the club will plan for its part in the upcoming highway clean-up, awards supper and Halloween carnival. Adult club managers for the group are Gary and Nancy Vannoy and Elizabeth Upham.

All 4-H members who signed up for food projects need to mark Saturday, Oct. 1, on their calendars in bright red - because that's the date for our "4-H Foods Festival" workshop.

The workshop will provide all 4-H'ers in foods a chance to learn the same material relating to the basic food groups, food and fitness, menu planning and nutrition. It will be held from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the

Civic Center, and there will be a \$1 charge per person to help cover the cost of supplies.

4-H'ers will enjoy a pizza party at lunch, then travel out to clean up our stretch of highway as part of their community service activities.

During the workshop, 4-H'ers will be assigned to adult leaders to complete preparations for the county food show; if you can't be there, let us know if you want to be in the food show and we'll make arrangements for project lessons.

Also, 4-H'ers who have been in a foods and nutrition project for more than two years and have been to district competition may teach a short lesson (two minutes or less) or assist as a teen leader. Contact the County Extension Office to sign up for one of these spots.

Speaking of highway clean-up projects, all 4-H members and their parents are asked to attend the Oct. 1 clean-up, starting at 1 p.m. Our stretch of highway starts right at the junction of Highway 163 North and Highway 137, and continues up Highway 137 (road to Big Lake) for two miles.

The clean-up will be a kick-off for National 4-H Week, provide a community service activity for all 4-H'ers and will be lots of fun, so come on down! (A reminder - the more of us there are, the less time it takes to do the job!) Be sure and wear sturdy shoes and jeans, for your own safety - no shorts and sandals!

Since National 4-H Week starts Oct. 2 and runs through Oct. 8, the county awards program is scheduled for Tuesday, Oct. 4, at 6:30 p.m. in the Civic Center. All 4-H members, parents and leaders are invited - as well as those of you who help us so much through the year with our 4-H program here in Crockett County.

We'll enjoy a covered-dish dinner at the event - watch this column for details.

8th grade Cubs fall to Colts

The Ozona 8th Grade Cubs began the 1988 season Sept. 15 against the perennially tough Sonora Colts. Helped along by a strong running game and a tough defense, the Colts took their home opener 16-0.

Sonora struck first in the second quarter on a 75-yard scoring drive taking seven plays. The drive was capped off by a 17-yard touchdown run that followed runs of 14, 19 and 16 yards.

The Cubs, although they were able to gain a few yards every series, had trouble holding on to the ball. Thus, they could never sustain a drive. After two third quarter fumbles,

Sonora scored a second time on an interception return for a touchdown. Both two-point conversions were successful, and through three quarters, Sonora had an 18-0 lead.

During most of the game, the Cubs relied heavily on running backs Joe Hernandez, Leroy Martinez and Raul Rico. Of Ozona's 85 total yards, this trio combined for 80 of them. Hernandez carried the ball six times for 11 yards and caught one pass for 8 yards. Rico had three carries for 20 yards, and Martinez hauled the ball three times for 41 yards.

Leading the Cubs on tackles was Joe Hernandez, who blitzed the Colts for 10 tackles. Behind him was Alonzo Hernandez with five, Mike Kenison with five, and Manny Munoz with four.

J.V. Lions, Sonora end in tie

The Ozona J.V. Lions took the field against archrival Sonora Sept. 15 trying to wrap up a sweep of this year's 1-10 championship.

After the varsity Lions' thrilling 23-19 season debut victory over the Broncos, the J.V. was ready to put the lid on their Sutton County foes for good. However, lackluster offense coupled with stingy defense on both ends of the field were the main factors contributing to a stale 0-0 tie.

In the opening quarter, the Lions only ran seven offensive plays before handing the ball over to Sonora, who controlled it for almost six minutes. Although Ozona was able to manage a first down, they never crossed their own 38 yard line.

The Broncos were able to roll up a total of 46 offensive yards during the first quarter, but could never sustain a drive. Although they outgained Ozona by 40 yards, they only garnered one more first down.

In the second quarter, Ozona was shut down to the point of recession. After 10 offensive plays in the

period, the Lions had traveled six yards backwards, giving them a first half grand total of 11 yards on 17 plays -- which is roughly two feet per play.

Defensively, the Lions gave up a respectable total of 72 yards on 23 plays and only three first downs, but because of the stagnant offense, the defense looked like it was being run over.

In the third quarter, freshman tailback Marcos Quiroz woke up. Alas, so did the Ozona offense. In the second half, Quiroz carried the mail 11 times for an astounding 82 yards. This is especially impressive considering that the entire team total for the game was only 75 yards. However, he wasn't enough to spark the Lions across the goal line, and Ozona's only offensive claim to fame was three second half first downs.

Sonora's offensive production went down, however slightly, in the second half. The Broncos amassed 70 yards on 23 plays and racked up three more first downs for a total of six for the game.

Although the score was 0-0, the Broncos outgained the Lions 172 to 75 in total yards and 6-4 on first

downs.

Leading the Lions offensively was Quiroz, who gained 82 yards on 18 carries. No other Ozona player broke into positive yardage. Quarterback Danny De Hoyos, who played the game with a badly bruised chest, completed one pass out of 10 attempts for 11 yards and was sacked twice. The receiver of his sole completion was freshman Pep Talamantez.

Defensively, sophomore Albert Talamantez battered the Broncos for 11 tackles and recovered two fumbles. Jimmy Williams, who caused one of those fumbles, also had eight tackles. De Hoyos followed with six tackles, while Daun Williams had five.

The J.V. play of the day occurred when George Quiroz struck the Sonora quarterback, the ball popped loose, and Marcos Quiroz caught the ball and returned it for a TD. However, it was called back on a penalty.

Due to a shortage of Junction players, this week's J.V. game between the Lions and Junction has been cancelled.

Chipman suffers injury in accident

Steve Chipman remained in critical condition in Shannon Hospital Tuesday with injuries received in a Friday night accident in Ozona.

Chipman was struck in the back of the head by a stereo speaker when the van in which he was riding slid off the roadway and into a dirt embankment west of Ozona Intermediate School.

Doctors give little hope for the 21-year-old Chipman. If he lives, doctors do not expect him to regain consciousness, said Refugio Chipman, father of the injured man.

The 10:40 p.m. accident occurred when a 1976 Chevrolet Suburban driven by Blas Perez, 16, failed to make a curve, said DPS Sgt. Glen Redmon.

Perez and Tommy Chipman, 21, were slightly injured in the accident. Two other passengers were not hurt.


