

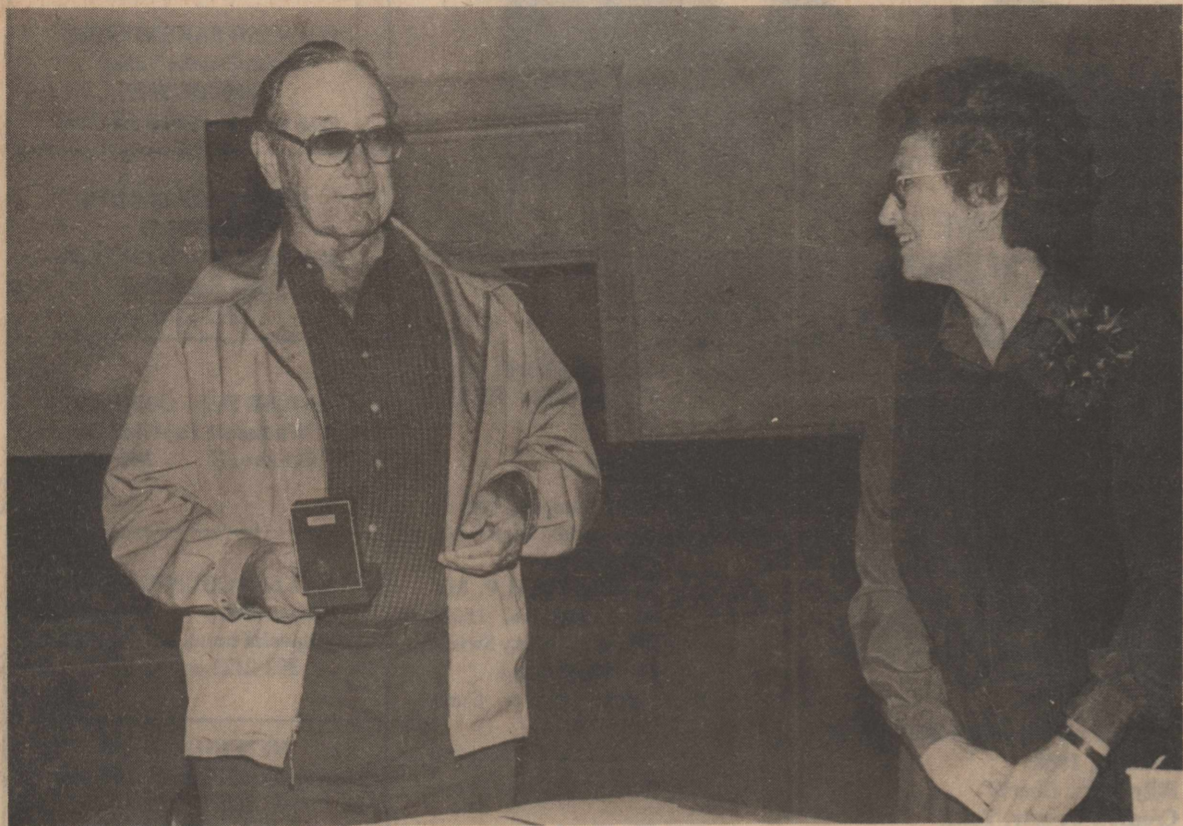

Court approves water district organization

Appointment of a committee to work toward forming a water district in the county was approved when commissioners met Monday. P. L. Childress III presented information on the plan for a district to include that part of the county not under Crockett County Consolidated Water District #1.

"If we go ahead and put one in place, we can control our own water," Childress said of the district.

The water district which serves Ozona and the Soil and Water Conservation District are both supporting the proposed district, Childress said.

Such a district would be funded by an ad valorem tax levied on the area it serves. One and one-half to two cents per \$100 valuation should generate the money needed to get the district in place, Childress said. The tax rate would have to be approved by eligible voters in the district.

Commissioners approved a committee consisting of Nat Read and Wade Richardson, Pct. 1; Pleas Childress III and Larry Williams, Pct. II; George Bunger and Dennis Clark, Pct. III; Jeffrey Sutton and Gary Mitchell, Pct. IV; and Johnny Jones, member-at-large.

The committee will hold a public meeting Monday, Dec. 19, at 7 p.m. in the Emerald Room at Ozona National Bank.

Court members also approved a resolution supporting the district. Approval by the State Legislature will be necessary before a district can be formed.

Commissioners voted two-two and tabled renewal of a contract for Dr. Robert Owensby. The contract is exactly like the one he has been working under according to Bill Boswell. The contract had been approved by the hospital board last week.

Voting for renewal were Jesus Castro and Sostenes DeHoyos. Voting against were Janet Hill and Jack Williams who presided in the absence of Judge Kathryn Mayfield.

Dr. Owensby appeared later in the morning and told the court that he

had generated an average of 3.75 times his contract for the hospital during the eight months the contract has been in force. He cited a monthly average of \$16,750 as opposed to his \$5,000 per month contract figure.

The contract for Dr. Marcus Sims has 14 more months before expiration.

Commissioners voted unanimously to advertise for bids for moving and installing the x-ray machine which has been donated to the hospital by Angelo Community Hospital.

A bill for consultant services from former assistant hospital administrator Jacquie King was approved for payment by the court and instruction given to terminate the contract. Mrs. King had been called upon once since moving from Ozona.

County attorney-elect Orlando DeHoyos was present to discuss his written requests for office space and personnel with the court. DeHoyos wants the same office space his predecessor had - "nothing more, nothing less," he said. He is protesting occupation of those offices by the county agents. Permission for the move should have been through the commissioners court as a whole rather than the county judge's office, DeHoyos said.

DeHoyos also asked for a full-time secretary and full-time investigator to be paid by the county. He was not agreeable to sharing a secretary with the Probation Office, stating that he expects to be a full-time county attorney with need for a full-time secretary.

Williams pointed out that salaries and benefits for two additional full-time employees would add about \$30,000 to the budget for the county attorney's office.

After much discussion by court members and DeHoyos, commissioners Williams and Hill voted for tabling the matter until after DeHoyos takes office in January. Commissioners DeHoyos and Castro voted against tabling.

Also tabled was consideration of whether or not DeHoyos would be allowed to have his private practice of law in the courthouse buildings. A statute allows county or district attorneys to operate private practices within county property with the court's permission.

Reports were heard from Pat Aiguier of the Road Department, Onecimo Ortiz, parks supervisor; Garland Young, Civic Center di-

Hunter loses way to camp

A Lake Jackson man was the object of a search on the Sudduth Ranch Saturday night after he failed to return to his hunting camp at dark. Last seen at 3 p.m., the man was reported missing about 9 p.m.

"We gave it up about 1:30 a.m.. It was so dark you couldn't see," said Fire Chief Dorris Haire. Fourteen volunteers had walked the pasture with handlights attempting to find the missing 69-year-old man.

The lost hunter found his way back to camp about 3:15 a.m., said Chief Deputy Jim Wilson.

Members of the Sheriff's Department and volunteer firemen had been joined in the search by Game Warden Rod Chalmers and THP troopers.

Fatality due to ice

Icy weather took the blame for a fatal accident on Interstate 10 about five miles west of Ozona Thursday evening.

Rudolph Jacques Biera, a San Angelo man employed by Strain Brothers Inc., was killed when the pickup truck he was driving skidded off the highway and turned over twice, according to a Texas Department of Public Safety official.

Biera apparently lost control of the pickup while traveling east on the highway about 9 p.m.

Biera, 56, was a superintendent for Strain Brothers for 25 years. Services were held in San Angelo Sunday.

Hospital O.K.s Owensby contract

The Crockett County Hospital Board in regular session approved the renewal of a contract with Dr. Robert Owensby Thursday, Dec. 8, 1988. This contract is subject to approval by the commissioner's court.

Owensby submitted a report to the board in which he showed that he has not cost the county money since he has had a contract. He also told the board that he and Dr. Marcus Sims worked well together.

"Since we have had this agreement it has not been necessary to call in another doctor," Owensby said.

The hospital board approved the county medical staff for next year. Dr. R. M. Owensby, Dr. M. L. Sims, Dr. S. M. Sessom, Dr. J. B. Logan and Dr. N. M. Jackson were accepted.

The board decided to keep funds from donations, garage sales, and memorials in a separate account.

Hospital consultant Bill Boswell brought up untaken vacation time of some staff members and asked the board to approve extra pay to employees who work through some of their vacation time instead of taking it.

"We are so short-handed we have people who haven't taken their vacations from last year or don't want to take all of it that I thought you might want to pay them for some of the time they don't take," Boswell said.

After some discussion during which it was noted that replacement workers would have to be paid anyway, the board approved extra pay to employees up to five days for vacation days worked.

Meeting in regular session, the board also voted to ask the Commissioner's Court to let bids for the site preparation of a newly acquired X-ray machine. The site preparation will include running a three-phase electrical line to the X-ray room.

Dr. Sims told the board that he would like to act as ambulance coordinator for a few months before appointing someone else. The board approved his request.

Boswell told the board that no acceptable collection agencies have been located. No action was taken on that.

Some discussion ensued regarding a faulty range hood. The hood is stainless steel and needs repair to a

crack. Board member Jean Read noted that the replacement cost for the hood was several thousand dollars so more effort should be made to repair the hood.

Board member Pete Maldonado agreed to try to repair the hood or find someone who can do so.

An intermittent rust problem in one of the hospital rooms which has been converted to care center use was discussed. A decision was made to contact a plumber for an assessment of the problem.

Meal cost to employees were reduced to \$1.50 from \$2.50.

The board went into executive session at 8:20 and emerged at 8:45 p.m.

The resignation of Peggy McWilliams as director of nurses was accepted with deep regret. She will continue as a staff nurse.

A contract with Jacquie King as consultant was approved. This contract will be subject to approval of the commissioner's court.

Lions capture second

The Lions overcame their six-game losing streak, beating Junction and Crane in the 58th Ozona Tournament before losing to Brownfield in the championship game.

Opening against Junction Thursday night, the Lions took three quarters to gain sound control of the lead but once they claimed it, they kept it.

A six-point lead shrank to four points by halftime. In the third quarter, though, Ozona scored 19 points to Junction's 11, establishing a winning margin of 61-45 by game's end.

Oscar Galindo led Lion scorers with 15 points. Chris Denman and Lalo Rodriguez followed with 12 as George Ybarra added 10.

Only Crane stood in the way of the Lions and their fourth straight finals appearance. The match-up proved a repeat of the previous year when the Lions came out on top.

And this time they did the same. Taking the lead in the second quarter, the Lions would hold on to it from there out.

With less than two minutes remaining, Ozona led 45-38. Thirty seconds to go and Crane had pulled within two and possessed the ball. But the Lions held their ground, taking the ball and the win, 45-43.

"We played with a lot of poise against a talented Crane team," Coach John Curry said. "We had our best team defensive effort in that game."

In the championship game, Ozona faced a powerful Brownfield team who had manhandled its two previous opponents. The Lions stayed with them for a quarter before the Cubs pulled out, eventually winning 78-46.

For their efforts, the Lions claimed the second place trophy and a spot

on the All-Tournament Team for Oscar Galindo.

"I was pleased. Overall, we had good effort and a good tournament," Coach Curry said.

The Lions next confrontation takes place this Friday when they travel to Crane for games there. They stay on the road when they head for Iraan next Tuesday.

Producers are also reminded that the second feeding period is now closed. If any tickets are turned in dated in that time period they will not be paid.

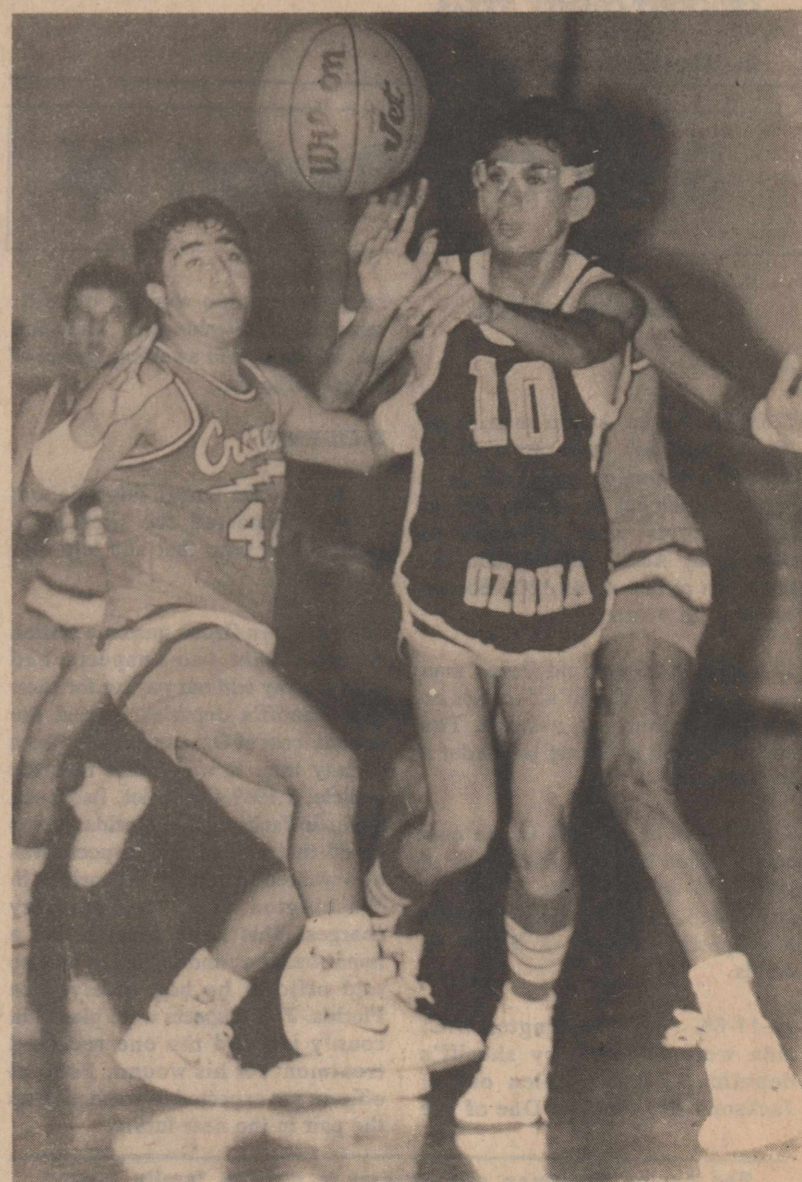
Anyone who was mailed material concerning partnerships, corporations, etc., must have the information back to the office by Dec. 16 in order to be paid in 1988.

ARRESTS

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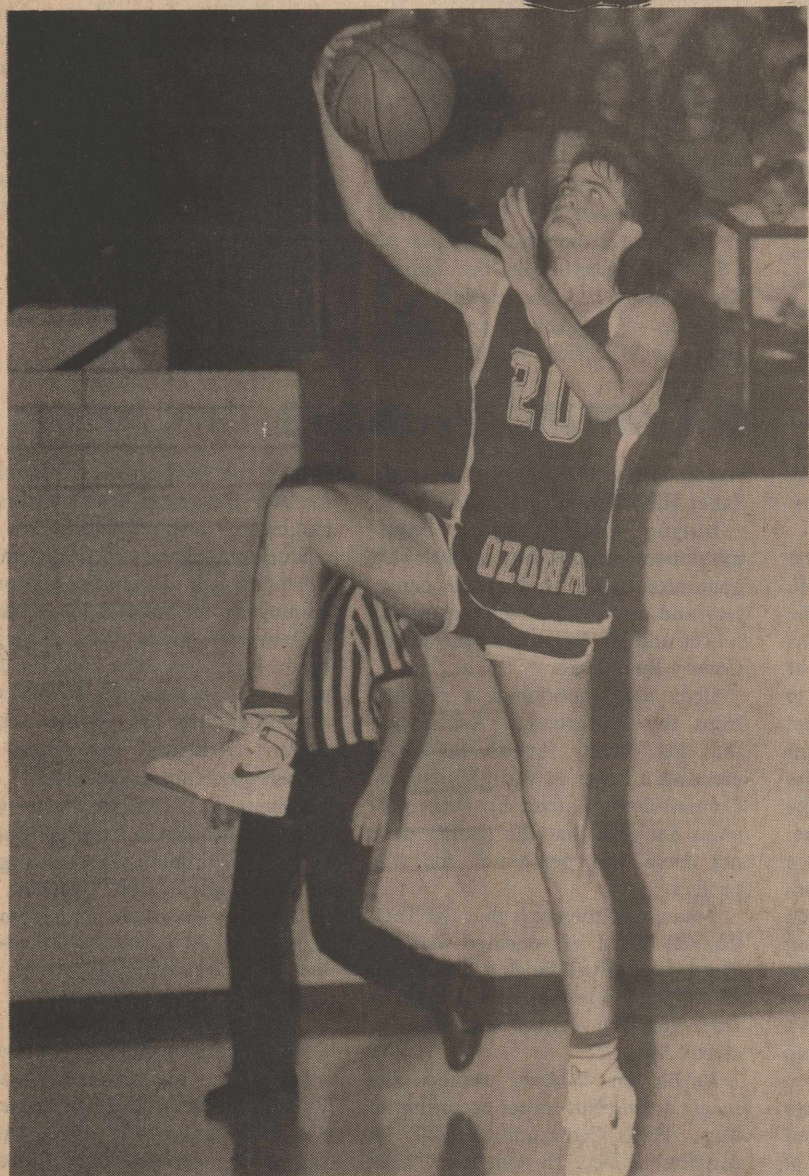
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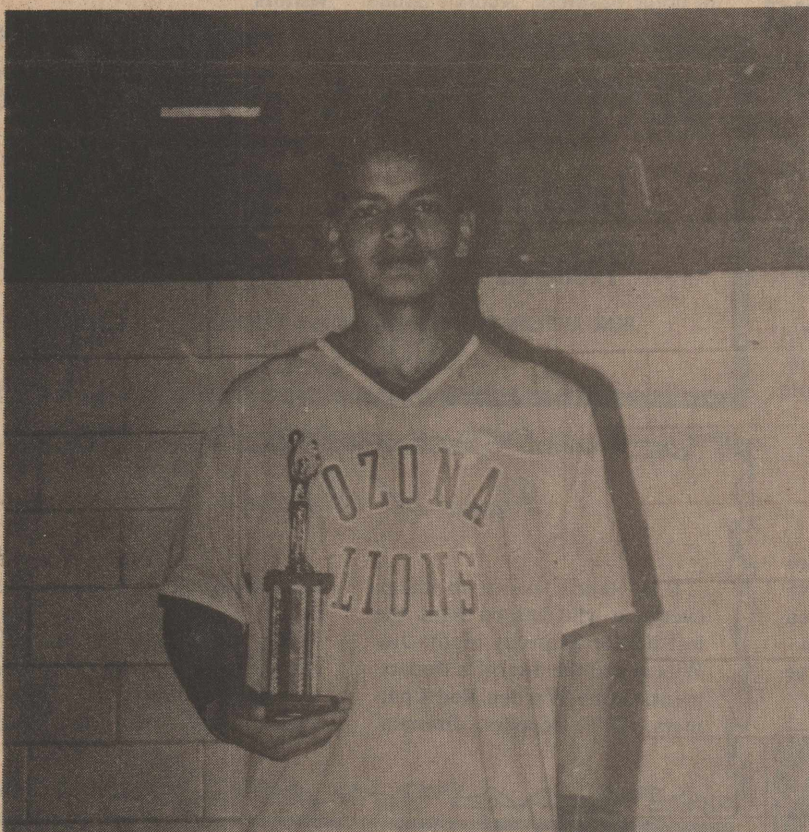

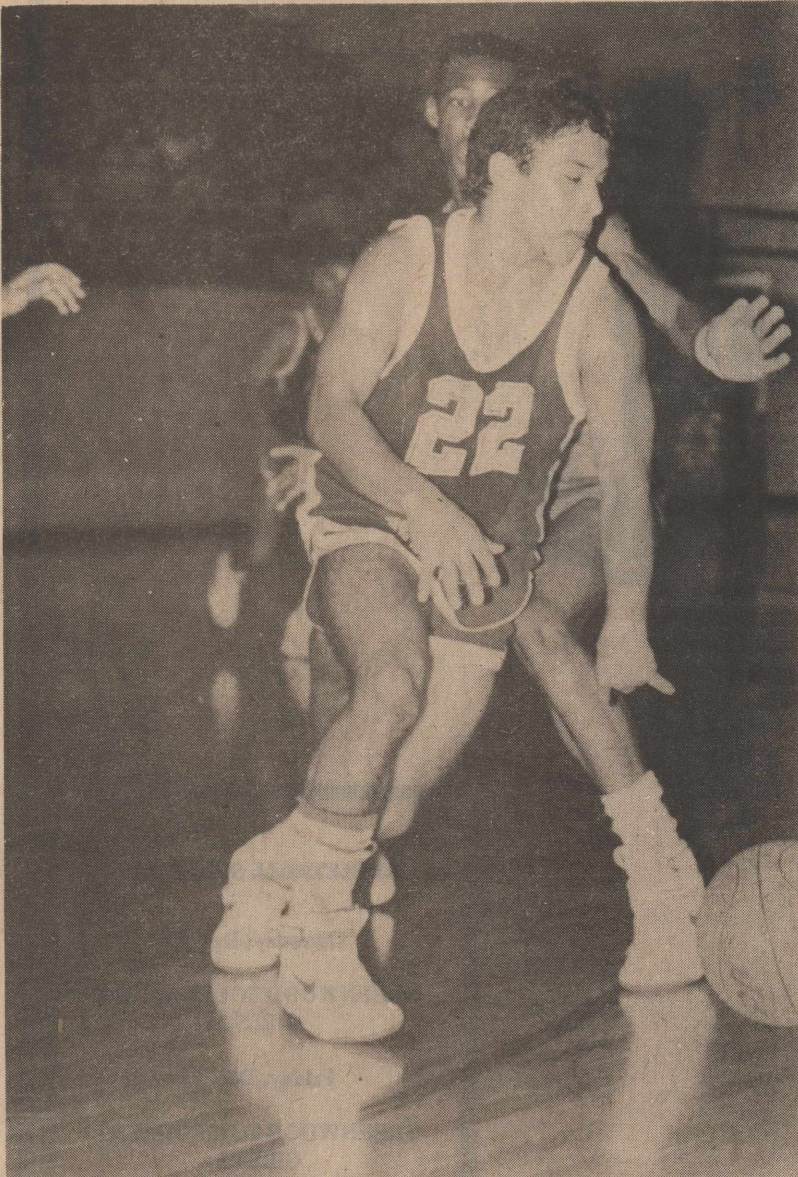

Letter to the Editor

To Whom It May Concern,

An article you published in your paper Aug. 17, 1988 was brought to my attention. It was in regards to a surgical procedure known as a "super selective posterior rhizotomy".

I am enclosing one of the many things published by Santa Rosa Children's Hospital when my son had it done last June 23, 1987 at the age of 18.

We are still under the assumption he was the first one done in Texas, by Dr. Arthur Marlin who trained under Dr. Marion Walker at Salt Lake City, Utah. Dr. Walker trained under Dr. Peacock in California. There is also a doctor in New York doing this procedure.

The actual cut off date on this procedure, age wise, is 12 for girls and 15 for boys. It is as much emotional as physical, the reasons for age requirement.

However, there was a boy 21 in Utah who had it done and a woman 24 in New York. The person's mental attitude is very important for this procedure to be of real benefit.

The younger the better before any set patterns of mobility have been instilled in the brain.

Richard spent 31 days in the hospital, three months in a wheelchair, three months on crutches. He now is walking unaided and started to college in Big Spring Sept. of '88. He still goes for therapy three times a week. His gait is slow, but all the spasticity is gone, and he has made such progress that he was chosen to go to California last June to be on the Children's Miracle Network Telethon hosted by the Osmond Foundation. He also has appeared three times on the ABC health show aired Sat. mornings, and George Strait, ABC News, plans a return visit to cover him starting to college.

Your article had so many things misrepresented I just couldn't let it go without a response.

I have been in direct contact with Dr. Peacock, Dr. Walker, and Dr. Marlin. I have countless articles

written on this procedure and Richard from TV, magazines, newspapers and hospitals.

It is a wonderful thing and has changed Richard's life drastically.

I have corresponded with several parents whose children have undergone this procedure. If I can be of any benefit in the future to anyone in your community, please don't hesitate to give them our name and address.

We have relatives and friends who live in Ozona, and this article of yours really caught their attention.

The article to which Mrs. Cypert refers outlined the super selective posterior rhizotomy when it was done on Brian Matthew Gillis of Sachse in August.

The following article about Richard's surgery is reprinted from a July 10 article, "Remarkable Surgery/Rehabilitation Program Helps Cerebral Palsy Patient" as it appeared in Santa Rosa Today.

Santa Rosa Children's Hospital (in San Antonio) is now offering a new micro-neurological surgical procedure that is only available in a handful of medical centers across the country.

The procedure, which is expected to reduce the muscle spasticity characteristic of Cerebral Palsy, was done for the first time at Santa Rosa on June 23 by Arthur Marlin, M.D., pediatric neurosurgeon, with assistance from Kay Wilkins, M.D., pediatric orthopedic surgeon.

The surgery, which lasted 6 hours, was performed on Richard Cypert, an 18-year-old patient from Garden City, Texas who suffers from Cerebral Palsy.

The revolutionary procedure, called "Super Selective Posterior

Rhizotomy", calls for an incision on the patient's lower back to expose the spinal cord. Spinal nerves are separated into fibers and each fiber is then stimulated electrically. If the stimulation produces an abnormal response, that nerve fiber is cut. If the nerve fiber produces a normal response, it is left intact.

"While the surgery is, of course, necessary, any improvements in the patient's functional ability will be made only through an intense regimen of physical and occupational therapy," said Dr. Marlin.

Physical therapists on staff in the Children's Hospital Rehabilitation Services began working with Cypert three days after surgery with gentle mobility exercises for 30 minutes twice daily. On the fifth day after surgery, 30 minutes of occupational therapy twice daily was added to the schedule. On the eighth day after surgery and until he goes home, Cypert will go through a rigorous routine of two hours each of physical and occupational therapy daily.

Therapy will continue on an outpatient basis for at least six months after he goes home to ensure the procedure's success. By the end of the year, it is hoped that he will be able to walk with greater ease and improved balance.

Richard was a good candidate for this type of surgery," said Dr. Marlin. "Unfortunately the procedure is not suitable for all persons with Cerebral Palsy."

All prospective candidates will be put through an extensive 3-hour screening process at the Cerebral Palsy Evaluation Center developed by the Children's Hospital Rehabilitation Services. This screening will determine whether the surgery and subsequent rehabilitation program would be appropriate treatment.

4-Hers enjoy special deer hunt

On the weekend of Dec. 4-5 some Crockett County youngsters earned an out-of-the-ordinary award for good work in a 4-H project...a deer hunt! The kids earned their award by excelling in the 1988 4-H Field & Stream program, which consisted of a hunter safety training camp, a fishing trip to the Devils River, and a firearms safety and proficiency clinic. The various activities taught the youths skills that they applied on the deer hunt, which was a first hunt for several of these 4-H'ers.

The hunt, conducted on the ranch of Gene and Betty Perry, began Saturday afternoon with a briefing of ranch and hunt rules by program coordinator W. D. Haire, followed by instruction on big game vital areas using slides of deer at various angles and hunting situations. The young deer hunters were assigned to hunting blinds, and each was accompanied by an adult partner—a dad, grandad, or uncle. The evening hunt was followed by one of Harvey Hill's fine venison suppers and a campfire session on game laws by State Game Warden Rod Chalmers. The boys and girls then retired to their respective bunkhouses for a short night's sleep. (What in the world do teenage girls find to giggle about till 1 a.m. in a deer camp?...

probably not deer!) Harvey's crew tried to top supper with a big breakfast, and the group went back to the blinds at daylight for one more hunt.

The purpose of the Field & Stream program is to teach 4-H youth to safely enjoy the outdoors, so the emphasis was placed on all the "extras" to be derived from a deer hunt (observing and learning about wildlife, etc.), rather than how much game they could put on the meat pole. The hunters were made aware of the hunters' role in deer management, and they helped in that respect with their harvest of some of the ranch's surplus antlerless deer. It was interesting to watch several of the youngsters donate their deer to needy families or the Ozona Chamber of Commerce's Deerfest, thereby reflecting the 4-H theme of charity, citizenship, and community service.

This activity concludes the 1988 F&S program, and hopefully we can have a similar hunt to terminate the '89 program, which will begin after the first of the year. The program is open to any youth enrolled in Crockett County 4-H, and all who have not yet signed up are encouraged to do so by contacting the county agent's office before the end of January.

Use care when choosing toys

Being the mother of a teenager isn't too exciting at Christmas time--the excitement comes when the bills arrive after Christmas!

Gone are the days of simple toys and games, and the thrill of unwrapping presents carried by Santa and his reindeer. Instead, we have a carefully mapped-out list of tapes by the Dead Milkmen and a stereo so complicated that Einstein would probably have been confused by it.

Let's face it--Christmas is for little kids.

Have you ever watched a child tear into his or her Christmas presents, hurriedly opening every box--and then playing with the wrapping paper, bows, ribbons and boxes? It's a real thrill when you've fought crowds and cold weather to find what the little critters have been begging for the last six weeks--only to find the packaging is the real Christmas treat.

Parents are often dismayed to find the expensive gifts they so carefully planned and purchased are seemingly ignored by their young children, but they can take heed for the next time!

Adults who spend time with small children soon learn their favorite playthings are frequently simple, homemade toys or raw materials with which the child can create or use in pretend play.

Remember the big refrigerator box you played in as a kid? It was, in turn, a spaceship, cave, house, truck and fort, right?

In choosing toys for children, look for items which can be used in a variety of ways and which can "grow" with the child. A good example is a set of bright-colored, large building blocks which may be

handled by an infant, stacked by a toddler, and used to create imaginary buildings by a preschooler.

Choose toys this year which are sturdy and durable, so they'll hold up to the rough handling a young child deals out. Also, be sure the toy is attractive and interesting to the child--it will be little value if it doesn't catch and hold the child's attention.

Besides choosing toys for their play and educational value, always keep safety in mind. Very small children should not receive toys with small parts that they can pull off and put in their mouths. Paints should be non-toxic, and dyes should be color-fast. Watch for sharp edges and points, also.

Finally, sit back and enjoy your child at Christmas. Don't get so caught up in rushing from place to place or preparing Christmas dinner that you can't spend a few quiet moments in storytelling, playing with the new toys, or simply talking with your child.

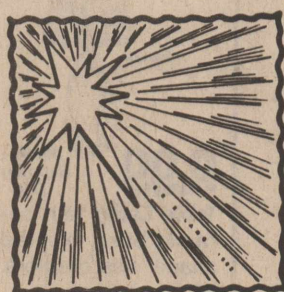

A Shocking Discovery

In June, 1889, Charles Steinmetz came to the United States from Germany as an immigrant. The theories he would later develop were to change dramatically the use of electricity in the world, for he was, at the height of his career, to be regarded as a genius in that field. General Electric was just getting started, and its officials wanted Steinmetz to come to work for them. When he refused to leave the company that had taken him in when he was a poor immigrant, General Electric bought the entire company in order to get Steinmetz into their organization.

In the early days of the electrical industry, lightning was one of the biggest problems. When it struck, it melted power lines and often damaged transformers and generators. Because it could not be studied in a lab, scientist knew little about it.

In the spring of 1920, it struck a summer home owned by Steinmetz and shattered a mirror in one of the bedrooms. Steinmetz put the mirror back together like a jigsaw puzzle, for he knew that on the silvered back of the mirror he would have a "picture" of a bolt of lightning. From the picture, he began to work to reproduce a bolt of lightning in his laboratory.

From an experiment of making lightning in a lab, Steinmetz was able to develop a lightning arrester, so that when a bolt of lightning struck a power system, the energy would jump harmlessly to the ground and not destroy the wires and generators.

Steinmetz, the genius with elec-

tricity, was not imposing to look at. He was a hunchback and almost a dwarf. Though quite short he was a giant of both mind and heart. He learned the secret of lightning so that he could create it in the laboratory and use it as a means of helping the human race.

The apostle Paul, it is supposed, was not an imposing figure physically, either, and he, too, discovered the secret of a great power. A great light packed with sufficient power to knock him to the ground on the Damascus Road, introduced him to the greater power of God. He learned to harness that power in his life, to let it flow through him, and then sought to introduce that power and that secret to others. He knew the world's wisdom and power were like firecrackers compared to the great power of God. That power was no longer hidden from him. God has spilled the secret through Christ.
