## More than 300 attend Reception honors Billy Mills

A reception honoring Billy Mills, former sheriff of Crockett County, drew more than 300 well-wishers from 28 towns and four states Jan. 21.

Law enforcement personnel from city police departments, sheriffs' departments, the Department of Public Safety, F.B.I., Liquor Control Board, Texas Rangers, U. S. Border Patrol, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and special investigators joined Mills' family and other friends in celebrating his retirement after 32 years in office.

"I'm just glad I lived long enough to retire," Mills told the crowd as his wife Juanita stood by his side.

The evening of visiting in the Civic Center was marked by a brief ceremony in which County Judge

Kathryn Mayfield presented Mills with a plaque and gold watch on behalf of the commissioners court. Both gifts were engraved with his dates of service from 1957 through 1988.

The flavor of a giant family reunion prevailed as guests viewed photographs chronicling Mills' life from infancy to the present.

A small red rocking chair with little cap and boots, his high chair and a hand-sewn blanket made by Mills' mother, the late Mrs. Frank Mills, before his birth were part of the display.

A scrapbook of contrabulatory messages compiled by tax office personnel, coordinators of the reception, was also on display.

Mills' hat, handcuffs, pistol,

holster and gunbelt were placed on a table near the guest registry.

The silver-plated pistol and handcuffs, previous gifts from Mills' sister, Jackie Ginsberg, were engraved by James Compton of Fort Worth.

A Compton engraved silver sheriff's badge was a retirement gift to Mills from sisters Jackie and Charylene Griffin of San Angelo.

Guests attended from Abilene, Austin, Big Lake, Burkett, Coleman, Crane, Dallas, Eldorado, Fort Worth, Goldthwaite, Houston, Menard, Mertzon, Midland, Naples, Ozona, Pandale, San Angelo, San Antonio, Sanderson, Santa Anna, Sheffield, Sonora, Tahoka, Toya, Essex, Iowa, Sheffield Village, Ohio, and Texhoma, Oklahoma.

## Court, DeHoyos reach accord

Commissioners and County Attorney Orlando De Hoyos came to a meeting of the minds Monday in a called session which must have set a record for number of votes taken.

First item on the agenda, a repeat consideration of De Hoyos' request for a salary for a full-time secretary, required 11 votes to settle, including two that rescinded orders on the secretary's salary from a Jan. 9 meeting.

After De Hoyos' previous request for a full-time secretary at a starting salary of \$14,400 was again vetoed, he began lowering the request amount by \$100 after each no vote of the court.

After the first motion by Sostenes De Hoyos failed, Commissioner Chuy Castro put forth motions on the requests with seconds by Commissioner De Hoyos only to have them fail 3-2. Commissioners Janet Hill and Jim House voted against the requests, and Judge Kathryn Mayfield broke the ties with her no vote.

Orlando De Hoyos had asked the court to consider only his request, eliminating compromise proposals.

An eventual request for a part-time secretary at a starting salary of \$10,000 dwindled to \$9,000 before the reverse auction ended when De Hoyos announced that he had "seen the light". His final request for a part-time secretary at a salary of \$6,390, the figure budgeted for the office last summer, was unanimously approved by commissioners and Judge Mayfield.

Commissioners approved a resolution to participate in a state rental assistance plan after questioning Tom Calhoun of Calhoun Property Management who proposed the move at the Jan. 9 meeting.

The motion also authorized Judge Mayfield to enter a contract to obtain assistance for renters.

As explained by Calhoun, the program obtains payment vouchers from the state for qualified renters to use in paying for housing meeting certain safety and health standards. The program must operate through local government under the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

Too much paperwork was the reason given by Castro and De Hoyos for rejection of similar programs in the past.

Saying that he did not want the project stopped for that reason, County Auditor Sandy Stokes offered his office to administer the program.

In other business, commissioners voted to re-appoint Geniece Childress to the Historical Commission, set Jan. 30 as the date for a meeting with detention center representatives, and accepted a bid from Mark White of White and Zesch for Blue Cross health, life and dental insurance.

At a called meeting Monday, commissioners set Jan. 30 at 5:30 p.m. to meet with representatives of Crockett Detention Center Inc. The session will be a workshop to discuss the property east of Ozona.

## No sale for KYXX-FM

The sale reported earlier this year of radio stations KYXX-FM in Ozona and KHOS-AM in Sonora is all washed up with the possibility of the prospective buyer heading off to jail after his March 28 sentencing.

Clyde A. Murchison of Marietta, GA, faces a maximum penalty of five years in jail and a \$250,000 fine for each of three charges of wire fraud. Murchison pleaded guilty to the charges before U. S. District Judge Jack T. Camp.

The charges grew from Murchison's misrepresentation of his net worth with forged letters of credit and a false financial statement, indicating a net worth of more than \$15 million.

The Ozona and Sonora stations are owned by Foster Communications Co., Inc. and Foster Broad-

casters Inc., both of San Angelo. The stations were among 11 in Texas and Georgia which Murchison attempted to purchase.

Murchison enhanced his financial position by claiming to be distantly related to a wealthy Texas family of the same name.

Walt Foster, a San Angelo businessman, said Murchison and an investment group called Radio-activity Broadcast Group Inc. failed to fund the \$150,000 escrow letter needed for the purchase of the Foster owned stations. The group had filed a fraudulent letter of escrow with the broker.

Foster Communications and Foster Broadcasters filed suit for breach of contract against Murchison and others Nov. 18.

That suit is still pending.

## Board renews Davis' contract

Much discussion and little controversy characterized the January 27 meeting of the local school board when members renewed the contract of school superintendent Garland Davis.

In other action the board of the Crockett County Common Consolidated School District recognized three teachers and junior high principal H. H. "Buddy" Hooper for outstanding gains made by seventh graders on TEAMS last year.

Board President Jeffrey Sutton and Davis presented a certificate from the State Board of Education recognizing exceptional gains of more than 30 percent over previous scores of seventh graders in Ozona schools.

Three seventh grade teachers were recognized with Hooper for their efforts in raising scores: Bettye Hoover, English and literature teacher, math teacher Brenda Pool and reading teacher Lynda Falkner. Hooper said substitute teacher Janie Chandler should also be recognized for her efforts substituting during Mrs. Hoover's absence.

"These three teachers were singled out because they were the ones to attend TEAMS meetings," Hooper said. "We accept on behalf of the junior high teachers and especially the students."

The board considered participation in a "Small Schools Academic Competition" being organized and sponsored by Coleman schools.

This competition will be limited to 3-A and smaller schools. Each participating school will be entitled to enter three teams of three students each in competition.

Each team will consist of an "A", "B", and "C" student.

The competition will be in several academic areas as math, literature and social studies.

After lengthy discussion the board unanimously agreed that Davis and high school principal Jim Payne should proceed with plans to participate and make whatever executive

decisions may be necessary regarding this competition.

"I think it would be money well spent," board member Dan Pullen said.

Money from entry fees, beyond the cost of running the contest, would be awarded to the top three teams and to the top participating individual as college scholarships.

"It would be a good investment," Sutton said.

Assistant superintendent Ted Cotton presented the fourth annual performance report since House Bill 72 was enacted. The report contains three sections with the first stating a district overview, trends in student performance and curriculum, statements concerning faculty adequacy and staff quality and financial condition of the district.

The second section is a statistical performance summary of the district and campus-level information.

The third section contains achievement test results, school dropout rates and school disciplinary activities.

Multi-year contracts for administrators and coaches came under the scrutiny of the board with considerable discussion before tabling until the February meeting.

"I am in favor of continuing multi-year contracts," Davis said. "But, the board does not have to extend these contracts every year. That is at the discretion of the board. You can wait until the last year of a multi-year contract to consider renewal."

Pullen proposed a new program in which classroom teachers would be considered for renewal on a year by year basis until successfully completing five years. At that time teachers could be considered for two-year contracts.

"I'm thinking of the poor, old classroom teacher," Pullen said. "We renew them every year."

Ted Cotton was asked by the board to research extended contracts for

classroom teachers and to discover what options may be available.

The new gifted/talented program was explained by Cotton. Selections of children for the program will be based on five criteria which include parent, teacher nominations, achievement tests, IQ tests and tests of higher level thinking skills in children.

Five to seven percent of the students are expected to be identified as gifted or talented. Students participating in the program will spend two and a half hours per week out of their regular classrooms working on special projects designed to develop their abilities.

In other action the board accepted bids for two old buses and recommended investing the permanent school fund in two year term bonds when they reach maturity dates late this month and in June.

Carol Yeager has been hired as a secretary for the Intermediate School.

"She is a good candidate and her references were good," Davis said.

Classrooms at the Heritage Building will be used for the English classes taught as part of the amnesty program. Thomas DeHoyos and Alicia Leal will be teachers for the classes.

Salaries for teachers and materials will be supplied by the Adult Basic Education Cooperative in San Angelo.

The board went into executive session to consider renewal of Davis' contract.

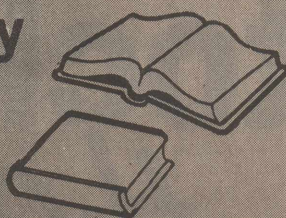

### Ballinger restores old library

The January issue of Texas Highways magazine has a wonderful story about the restoration of beautiful Carnegie Public Library. The library was built in 1909 with money donated by Andrew Carnegie, the wealthy steelmaker who was so instrumental in furthering free public libraries. He financed over 2,500 libraries, with 34 being in Texas. Only three of these are still functioning as full-time public libraries.

Ballinger's Carnegie Library is a beautiful example of the Classic Revival style of the early 1900s. It has a steeply gabled facade with four Ionic columns supporting a triangular pediment proudly proclaiming "Carnegie 1909", all of native limestone.

The building glows inside with richly polished hardwood floors and paneling, and is complete with a full kitchen, meeting room, and a ballroom/auditorium with stage upstairs named after its biggest supporter,

Mrs. Mary Sykes. She chaired the committee that raised \$551,235 to completely restore the delapidated building that had been used as everything from a Red Cross and Army-Navy Club in World War I, to a WPA center during the Depression, to a Texas National Guard armory, to finally reduced to being used as a site for Halloween carnivals since it resembled a haunted, run-down castle.

You certainly couldn't tell it now. It is completely restored from the beautiful replated original hardware, flawless press-metal ceilings, recast and rebuilt mortices and windows, to the reconstructed brick walls and the reshingled wood roof.

Don't miss the glowing pictures that accompany the story of this historic Ballinger landmark, and certainly don't miss a visit to this beautiful public library next time you go through Ballinger. It's well worth a special trip!

The 7th grade Cubs led by one in the first quarter of their game, but by half, Big Lake had the lead by four points.

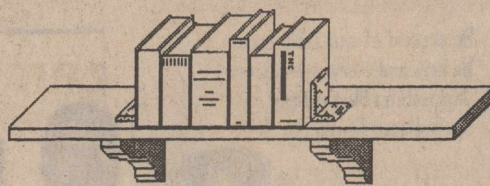
In the third quarter, the Cubs pulled within one, then rallied in the fourth to win 28-22.

## FROM THE BOOKSHELF

I have good and bad news pertaining to Len Deighton's *Spy Hook*, and of course we must save the best for last, so first the bad. *Spy Hook* does not end; instead, it leaves the reader hanging over nothing like the coyote in the Road Runner cartoons. The good news is that the reader will have something to do on the way down as *Hook* leads to *Line* and *Sinker*, the second and third parts of the promised trilogy.

Bernard Samson, the hero of Deighton's early 80's trilogy *Berlin Game*, *Mexico Set* and *London Match*, returns in the latest espionage thriller wifeless, a bit older and half-heartedly curious about a large sum of money missing from the British Secret Service Department. His curiosity takes on a serious tone as an ex-service agent is gunned down just hours after Samson has visited him.

Though muddled at first, the pace quickens as Samson jumps from London to Berlin and back again, then to California, poking old, dried sources and friends for new information while being warned by all to quit prying.

Several times he resolves to do

just that, but sparked by a revealing incident, he returns to the hunt again, slowly realizing the entire Department's senior staff may be involved in the money scam. As Samson moves up the ladder, each warning grows more threatening until finally an arrest warrant sends him running into deep-cover Berlin, both East and West, and sets up big-selling encores for the next two installments.

What makes *Spy Hook* most intriguing perhaps is the reality it displays. Contained within the pages are no James Bonds or sinister KGB villains with dumb-brute sidekicks; instead, Samson completes tedious paperwork that higher officials pass down the line. He must come home from a boring day at the office and deal with family problems in the form of motherless children and a new girlfriend half his age.

Not to be misunderstood that this book is boring; far from that. Deighton expertly wraps the ordinary with the missing funds plot, creating a story you never want to end, and in this case as mentioned, it is content to wait and carry a mass of readers deeper into *Line* and finally resolve (hopefully?) in *Sinker*.

### How to talk to teens about sex

Last week in this column, we discussed teen pregnancy, its implications and some reasons teens give for engaging in sexual activity. Before a parent can have an impact on his or her child's behavior, that parent must establish a caring, loving relationship. A "buddy" relationship isn't what we're talking about here—the parent must clearly be a parent and authority figure, but the adolescent must be shown that lines of communication are open and that they are loved for themselves—not for what they do or don't do.

A parent, first of all, must be open to questions from their child. It's a good idea to get up-to-date information on sexuality and be ready to answer questions before they come up. However, if you don't know the answer, be honest and say you'll try to find out.

That's a good way to open lines of trust and communication—go together to the library or other source of information and find out the answers to their questions together. Make sure appropriate sources are consulted (not "girlie" magazines like many adolescents get information from). Your pastor may be able to recommend some resources approved by your church.

It's especially important to respect your child's curiosity and need to know, and to express your gratitude at their asking for your help. That way, they'll know where to come the next time they have a question.

"No strings attached." That seems to be a pretty good system for answering questions and starting a dialogue. Answers should be brief, honest and unemotional. Teens are impatient and looking for brief, relevant answers, and they're more likely to respond to a detached approach than one that relies on

moral questions and tries to instill guilt.

Dr. Carol Gilligan, of the Center for Moral Education at Harvard University, found there was a very important factor in the relationship between sexually active young people affected by pregnancy and their parents. In the majority of cases, the doctor found the family had been unwilling to deal with the adolescent's sexuality, and the adolescents might even find themselves engaging in that activity but not really acknowledging it, even to themselves.

Gilligan concluded that parents must find ways to "communicate to their children that they recognize their sexual maturity and the implications of that maturity." They must help their children decide how to deal with the realities of their maturity.

Not talking about sexuality in the family seems to encourage adolescents to not think about it in terms of the possible consequences—it just happens to them and they're swept away by their feelings. They absolve themselves from responsibility because their parents have taught them that thinking about these situations beforehand is not "proper."

In the final analysis, it is up to the parents to communicate with their children and provide the background the children need to understand and deal with their sexuality. No teenager need be faced with the tragedy of an unwanted pregnancy—but until parents and teens work together, the cycle will continue.

## Extension service organizes rural information center

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has opened a Rural Information Center to assist local officials, citizen groups and others in obtaining information on a wide range of topics aimed at maintaining the vitality of rural areas.

The center will provide a direct line to a vast amount of resources available at the state and national levels, said Billy Reager, Crockett County Extension agent.

The center will be part of the Extension Service's Community Development Program based at Texas A&M University. It is a cooperative effort of the national Extension Service and the National Agricultural Library, both units of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Doug Steele, an Extension associate in community development, will serve as state coordinator of the Rural Information Center. He can be contacted in Room 12 of the Agriculture Building, Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843-2124, or by calling 409-845-8914 from 8 a.m. to noon.

According to Steele, the center provides quick access to timely information for local decision making. It serves as a clearinghouse for information requests by bringing together state and national resources.

Through computer linkages with the National Agricultural Library and other databases, a vast array of information sources can be accessed to deal with local and state problems and concerns, Steele said. For example, such issues as rural health care, water quality and waste disposal are of major concern in many areas.

Interested parties can contact the center to obtain information for specific inquiries, including assistance in economic revitalization and local government planning projects, funding sources, community change and research studies designed to maintain the quality of rural life.

Specific inquiries can be directed to the County Extension Office or to the Rural Information Center, Reager said.

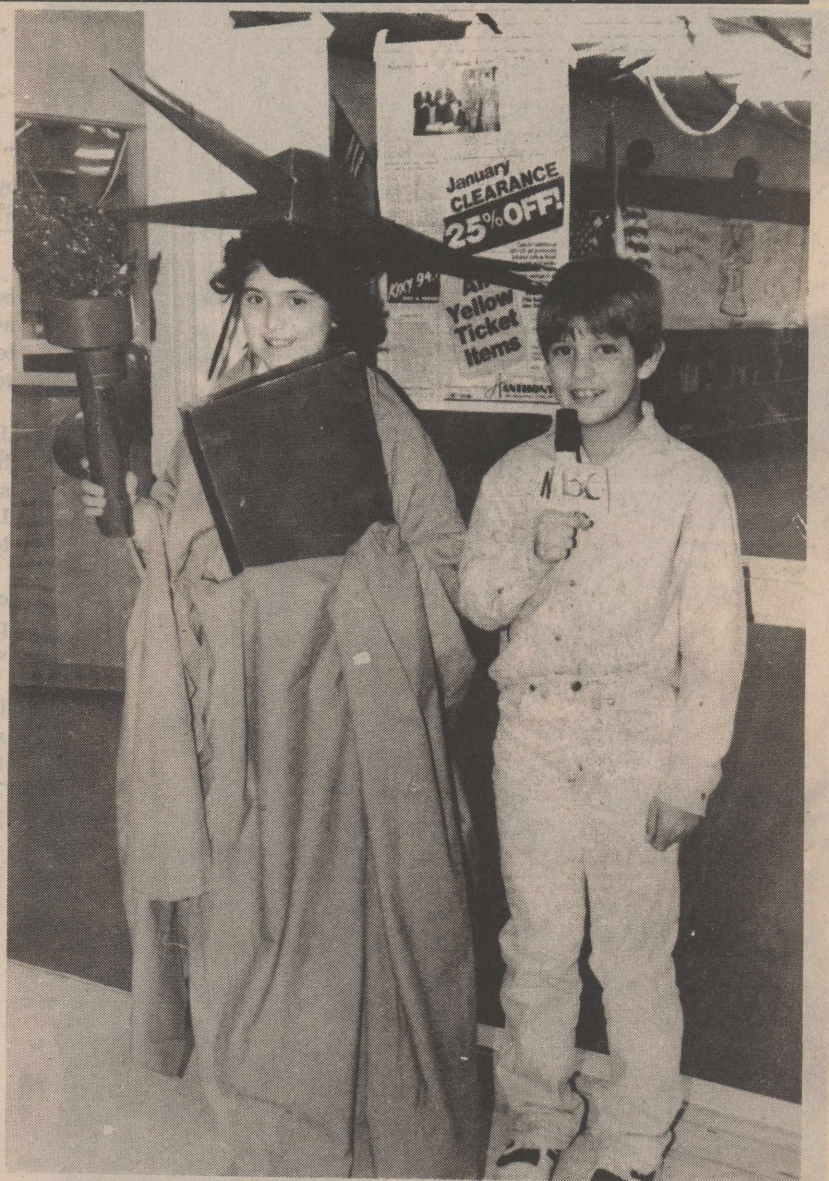

For the third game in a row, Kim Coy led all scorers with 12, while Misty Fowler came through with 10. Behind her was Ofie Rios with six.

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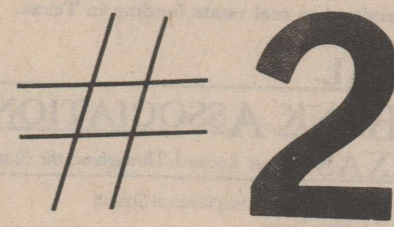
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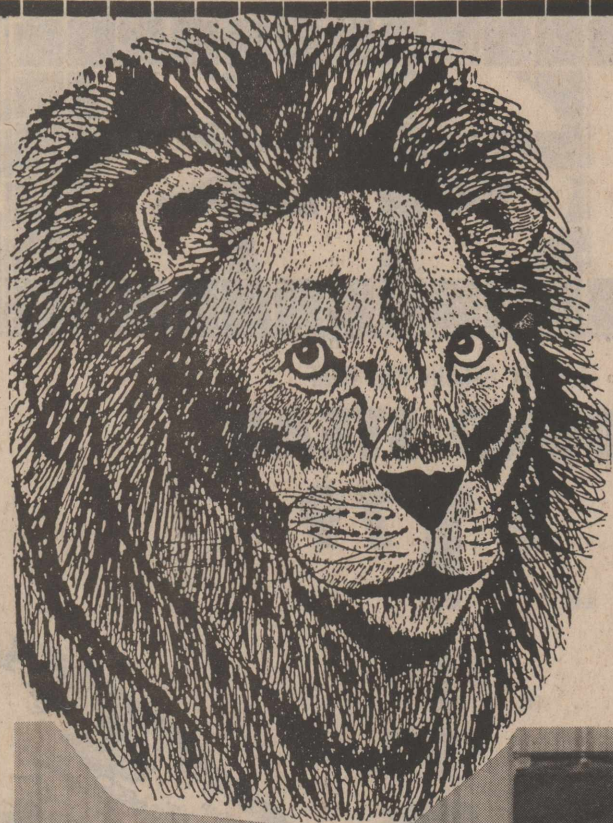

HIGHLIGHTS

**AUSTIN**—The eyes of Texas looked north to Washington, D.C. last week where the state's political leadership gathered to help President George Bush change the White House guard.

While there, Gov. Bill Clements attended the signing of final documents naming Waxahachie the site of the world's biggest atom smasher, the superconducting supercollider.

Meanwhile, in Austin, legislators conducted committee work and House Speaker Gib Lewis said he hopes to pass the budget bill early in the session, a break from 11-hour practice.

Lewis is touted as a shoo-in for a fifth term as speaker in 1991, since he already has enough pledges to overcome the standard 30-member turnover rate.

Barring some unforeseen political upheaval, Lewis may well retain that gavel unless Republicans create enough turnover to elect a speaker from their own party. They have 57 members now, and need 76, if votes fall down party lines.

**Hightower Irks Farm Bureau**  
Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower, struggling to escape the wound inflicted when the leader of the state's largest farm group called for his resignation, says he's talking to Europe's Common Market officials about a separate trade pact for Texas beef.

Recently, Europe banned U.S. beef imports fed with growth hormones. When President Reagan retaliated with U.S. tariffs, Hightower ripped the president as insensitive to health issues.

In turn, Texas Farm Bureau president S. M. True called for Hightower to resign, saying he'd done immeasurable damage to the Texas beef market.

Bad Headlines?

Other cattle group leaders were more restrained, but worried that Hightower's desire for headlines could cause the world to think American beef is unsafe.

They also expressed skepticism about Hightower's beef trade overtures to Europe even while the U.S. prepares for what might be a trade war.

True's tongue-lashing stung, coming one week after Hightower reluctantly gave up his planned run for the U.S. Senate, and added to Capitol perception that the party-popular populist is losing ground.

Could Feed Europe

But Hightower countered, saying Texas alone might have enough hormone-free beef to supply U.S. trade quotas to Europe.

Hightower and the Farm Bureau have long been enemies, anyway. His top deputy, Mike Moeller, is a former president of the arch rival Texas Farmers Union, and there are quite a few farmers who would prefer Moeller over Hightower.

Insurance Collapse Seen

Attorney General Jim Mattox found himself at odds with the State Board of Insurance board after he criticized their ineptness in face of what he painted as a potential collapse of the insurance industry, similar to what he said occurred in the lending industry.

Board members promptly responded by saying Mattox didn't know what he was talking about. Interest in the conflict soon faded when new campaign reports showed Treasurer Ann Richards, his probable opponent in the 1990 governor's race, raised more money than Mattox in the past six

months, \$1.89 million to \$1.16 million.

Mattox, the reports show, still has more money in the bank, by about \$3.25 million to \$1 million.

The Mattox camp quickly questioned whether all of Richard's funds were legal, contending that some donations were made to her after the cut-off date imposed by law.

Sen. Montford Critical

Meanwhile, Sen. John Montford, D-Lubbock, said the insurance board suffers from "dangerous mismanagement." But chairman Jack Smith said the senator's investigation smacked of a "witch hunt."

Montford, in releasing an 11-page report of an investigation his office began in December, accused the board of being "misinformed or uninformed of the waste, inefficiency, cronyism and patronage which apparently permeates the agency."

In a letter to Gov. Clements, Montford suggested the governor seek the resignations of all three board members.

Chair Stripped of Power

Former legislator Bob Aikin of Commerce, whose father once championed education causes in the state senate, said abuses by past chairmen, not political politics, was the reason the Democrat-controlled State Board of Education stripped its new Republican chairman of much of his power.

Others commented it was the rawest display of partisan politics since Mark White pulled down 103 last-hour appointments made by his nemesis, Bill Clements.

Budget Termed Bleak

The chairman of the Senate Finance Committee described the proposed \$43.7 billion state budget as a bleak blueprint for spending over the next two years.

"It's not a bright prospect," said Sen. Kent Caperton, D-Bryan, who heads the committee. It's pretty sobering, to say the least."
