

#### County burn ban amended

During a Regular Meeting of the Commissioners' Court of Bailey County, Texas, on Jan. 9, 2006, an Order Prohibiting Outdoor Burning was adopted.

Further, the court hereby amends the prohibitions and restrictions imposed under the Jan. 9, 2006, Order to provide as follows:

1. The use of combustible materials in an outdoor Youth program meeting set

environment by any person is prohibited. Combustible materials include, but are not limited to the use of all fireworks, discarded cigarettes and materials used outdoors in activities

in effect in **Bailey County** 

such as welding and any other activity that could result in

2. Notwithstanding No. 1 above, outdoor welding shall be allowed under the following circumstances:

A. The welder must notify the BAILEY County SheriffOs Department before any welding, cutting or grinding begins;

B. A perimeter around the welding area shall be a minimum of 25 feet and clear of vegetation, if possible, just wish to attend. and kept wet. The welding perimeter must be three times the height of the actual welding. Example: if the welding is occurring ten feet off the ground, a perimeter of thirty (30) feet must be protected.

C. If the perimeter cannot be cleared of vegetation, proper precautionary measures must be taken (Example: Protecting brush, etc, by utilizing fire resistant tarps.)

D. A spotter with water and a ready pressurized delivery system must be on hand before any welding, cutting or grinding begins and remain on hand until the activity is completed.

In accordance with the Local Government Code, a person who knowingly or intentionally violates this order commits a Class C Misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of up to \$500.

The purpose of this order is the mitigation of the public safety hazard posed by wildfires during the current drought and severe weather conditions by restricting use of combustible materials.



## Editorial

## Tough decisions ahead

It's a classic car, a 1965 Ford Mustang, "cherried out" with a spotless interior. Sure, it doesn't have an automatic transmission, or air conditioning, but it has class and a lot of memories tied to it... and it's paid off.

Unfortunately, the years have gone by, and while the Blake Fennell, Matthew paint is still bright with a new coat of paint, you know that over the years there have been a few mechanical repairs that are still needed. And there's also that space problem. Your family began growing a few years ago, and now trips with the entire family are limited to your second vehicle. This also means part of the family has to stay at home when the second car is in the shop.

It's a hard pill to swallow, but the time has come for your Mustang to head down the road with someone else behind the wheel. The problem is there is no way to replace the Mustang without considerable, long-term expense.

A similar feeling must have gripped the stomachs of many at Thursday's school board meeting with its architects and financial advisor. To say the meeting was disappointing is a vast understatement.

Looking at the school district's \$59 million dollar need, and trying to figure out how the district's bonding capacity of \$20 million — including available state funding — can meet that need was no doubt an enormous pill for the school board, the administration and community members in attendance to swallow.

According to school district records, the last construct bond approved by the residents of the district was in 1965 for DeShazo Elementary. The last bond issue presented to the public was a \$1 million bond for renovations to the high school. It failed.

Since that time, the MISD school board has accomplished a lot... paying for small projects out of its building fund rather than presenting the districts' needs to the people and allowing the voters to help decide this important portion of their children's education.

But the problem is that over the years the school district's buildings have started falling behind, loosing ground in their ability to meet the educational needs of the district's children.

At this time, we don't know what route the school district should take, but we do know that a comprehensive plan providing for the replacement of all the district's buildings over a period of time should have been in place a couple of decades ago.

When you consider that the \$20 million bond issue previously referred to would cost the owner of a \$50,000 home about \$100 more per year, it's hard to understand how it could be opposed... but no doubt many will oppose

Still, when you consider that for a family of four, you're talking about the equivalent of eating at home rather than eating out twice during the year and not taking the family to a movie twice, it becomes a matter of priorities. Which is more important... four evenings' entertainment, or the education of your children and grandchildren?



most radical options.

Bill remembers that as her family, including her mother and aunt, gathered around her, her aunt suddenly reached into her purse and pulled out an old and wellworn Army-issue, 1943, New Testament, with a brass cover on the front.

"Hold on to this," she said to her sister, "this kind of Bible has saved many lives."

Bill said that he wondered later what she meant. Was she thinking about the stories of soldiers who took a bullet in the chest but were saved because it was deflected by the brass-covered New Testament? Or was she thinking of a completely different kind of

"salvation"? He didn't know. But a few weeks later the young woman succumbed to the ravages of cancer, and her

husband, her children, and all of her family, including her church family, mourned their grievous loss. If the little brass-covered New Testament had been intended to be a talisman, a

good luck charm, it had failed. And yet, as Bill writes, that little book did indeed contain words of life pointing to a truth that for God's people never fails: "If we live, we live to the

Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord: so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's. For to this end Christ died and lived again, so that he might be the Lord of both the dead and the living" (Romans 14:8-9).

Dr. Love is right: "What God did in Christ to underwrite that promise does save our lives. Whether we live or die."

In life. In death. If we place our trust in God, we will find that all of our lives and the whole direction of our lives will be vindicated. We will be saved, redeemed, enfolded, accepted, and eternally secure in God's love.

Like you, I have many questions. But, in the end, two things are bedrock for me. When we're awash in pain and all we seem to have in abundance are hurt and anger and questions, two things stand: God is loving, and God is good.

In life. In death. Those two truths are the ultimate realities upon which we can stand.


Do you know that bears sleep during the winter? We hide away in a safe spot and go to sleep during the coldest time of the year when food is hard to find.
