## McCollum captures first ever OHS state golf medal

Ozona Lady Lion golfer Gina McCollum made Ozona High School history last weekend by becoming the first Ozona girls' golfer ever to win a medal at the state tournament. Although she lost a playoff for second, McCollum fired rounds of 86-83 (169) to take third.

On Thursday, McCollum was hot on the front nine, but cooled on the back. After a double-bogey at 1, Gina parred the next three holes in a row

### Commissioners meet in called session

Commissioners met in called session Monday evening with a short agenda which included executive session to discuss personnel.

Judge Kathryn Mayfield informed the court that equipment for swimming pool purification will be here no earlier than May 23. The new equipment is being installed as part of a state requirement to eliminate the use of chlorine in pools.

before bogeying at 5. However, at 6, she stormed back with a birdie on the 316 yard par 4. Standing at two over par with three holes left, McCollum closed out the front nine with bogeys at 7 and 8, and a double-bogey at 9 to card a 41.

On the back nine, the wheels began to come off, as Gina found herself five over after five holes... plus 10 for the day. Things came to a head at 16 when she took a double-bogey 7 before setting down and playing 17 and 18 in par and bogey to finish plus 9 for the back. With a 41 going out and a 45 coming in, McCollum's total of 86 put her in a tie for fifth place overall.

On Friday, McCollum knew she had to make up a whole lot of ground if she wanted a medal...and she did it.

During the entire round, Gina was a model of consistency. After

once more double-bogeying 1, she played her next eight holes in only plus 5.

Then, after posting a 42 on the front side, she slowly began to wear away the competition. After bogeys at 10, 13, 14, and 16, and a double at 12, she birdied 17 and parred the par 4 18th to fire 41 on the back and post an 83 on the day. However, the excitement wasn't over.

After finding out she had tied for second place, McCollum teed up again on 1 and parred right along with the competition until she found the sand on 3 and bogeyed; therefore falling into third. That fails to diminish the fact that she did take home the bronze medal.

It was a fitting end to the career of the 1989 Ozona High School Most Outstanding Girl Athlete's career.

## Circle Bar Racing gets win in San Antonio competition

In the 35 lap feature race, Kelly took fourth after running second through the first 25 laps. On the 26th circuit, though, Kelly's car hit the rear of another, causing both drivers to lose control.

Greg Davison of Pearland, the driver of the car hit, was in the lead at the time. He became irate after the incident, and drove right up behind Kelly, bumping him solidly as the field reformed. Davidson received a one-lap penalty.

"I really didn't mean to hit Greg," Kelly explained. "He kept pushing up towards the wall a little and I thought I could get under him. It was just racing. I'm sorry it happened."

Rick Rapp of Corpus Christi took advantage of the mishap and went on to win the race.

Kelly finished second to Davidson in the second heat of the series.

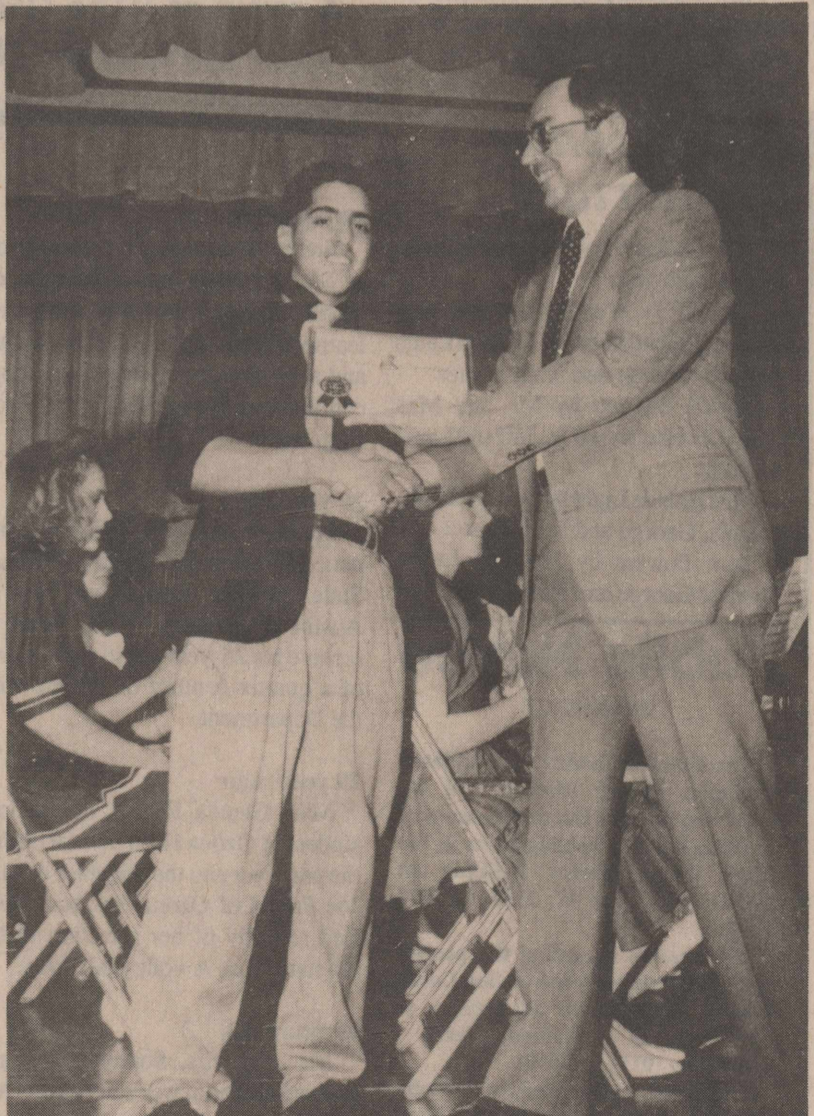

### Drug tracking radar balloon ahead of schedule

Congressman Lamar Smith announced Monday that a radar-surveillance balloon will arrive in West Texas approximately 30 days ahead of schedule bringing 24 new jobs to the area.

The acrostat balloon, equipped with 3,500 pounds of radar gear, will be able to track planes smuggling drugs across the U.S.-Mexico border. The system will arrive the 25th of May.

Originally scheduled to arrive May 24, the balloon will be inflated the

first week of June and will be flown to its full height of 10,000 feet in mid-July.

"The support of this project by the West Texas community has been the key to its success. I believe that to win the war on drugs we must first fight in our own back yards," Smith said. "These local victories are the basis for a national victory.

"This balloon is something I have been pushing for since arriving in Washington. I am confident in its ability to be successful in slowing the drug traffic to Midland, San Angelo

Jacinda Sue Marley was a member of the graduating group at Southwest Texas University's School of Liberal Arts in San Marcos May 13.

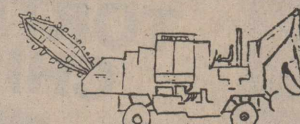

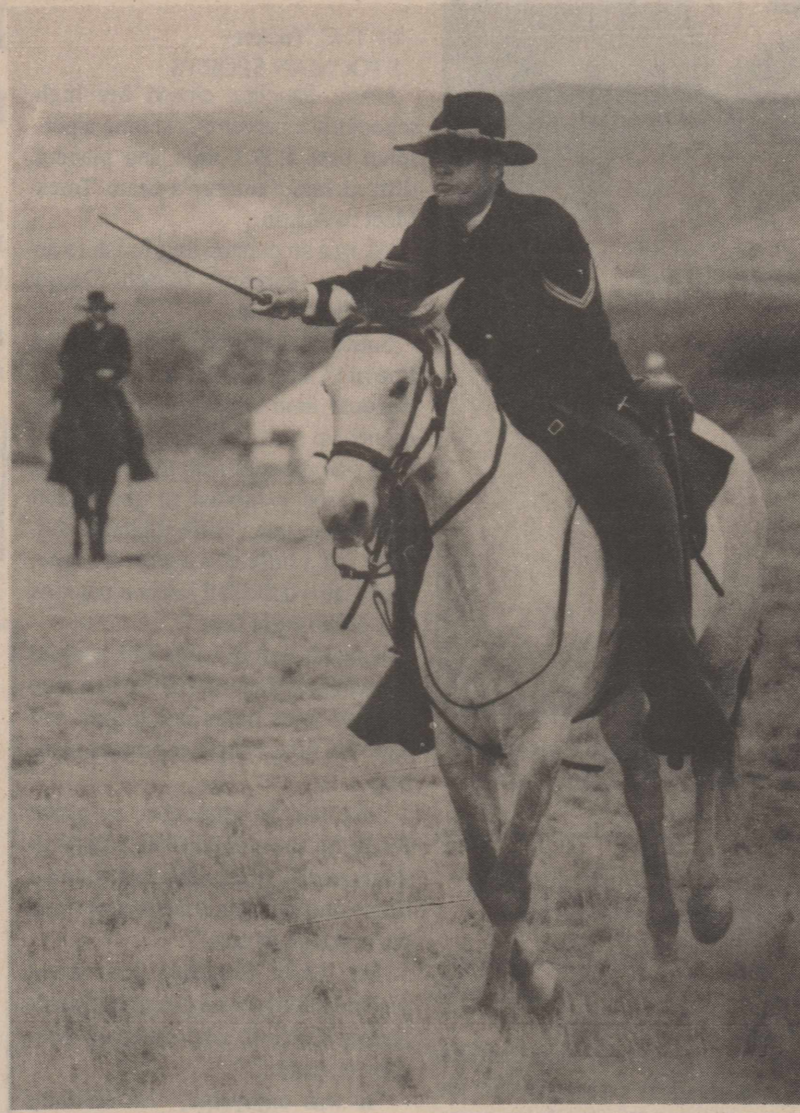

Echoes of past fill Fort Lancaster

Echoes of the past filled the parade ground at Fort Lancaster Historic Site Saturday. Authentically uniformed and equipped volunteers from the Fort Concho 16th U. S. Infantry and Lubbock's 4th Memorial Calvary were on hand to portray frontier soldiers of the late 1879's and early 1880's.

Members of the 4th Calvary group had recently completed a demonstration at Frontier Days in El Reno, Oklahoma. The group was privileged to send 16 men to the inaugural parade in January, said Donna Thomas who is a member of the Garrison Ladies, the auxiliary for the 4th Calvary.

Entirely self-funded, members provide their own uniforms and horses. The ladies' auxiliary has only recently been added to the 3.5 year-old calvary unit.

Riders performed drills throughout the day, while other members talked with visitors at a camp set up at one of the fort's ruins.

Infantry soldiers from the 4th Regiment of U. S. Calvary Memorial and the 16th Regiment of U. S. Infantry Memorial of San Angelo performed drill and firearms demonstrations, instructed children's army drill and had wagon demonstrations during the day.

Rivalry was heavy between infantry and calvary soldiers in the old west said Corporal Robert Broene of San Angelo. Although calvary units could outdistance the infantry initially, the need to graze horses held up the units once grain and hay carried by wagon was depleted.

Demonstrations by calvary and infantry units have become an annual event at the fort, drawing area residents, passing tourists and bus loads of school children.

"We had to remember everyone faced the same conditions," McWilliams said. "All the athletes kept their heads and refused to back down and we had a great race."

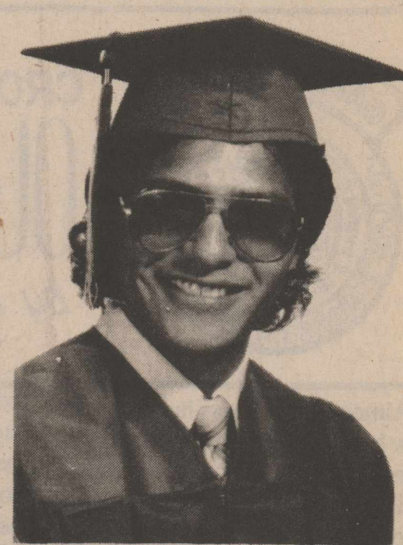
The 12:30 (Sunday) a.m. event yielded a third placing for Spearman's Krista Kirkland who defeated Sanchez at region.

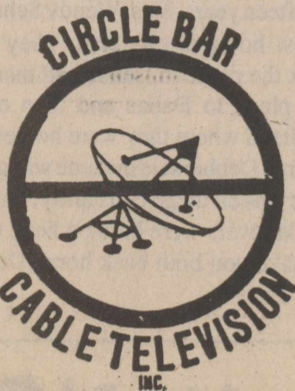

### Cancer Society says "don't get burned"

Skin cancer prevention will be the focus of an education/awareness project sponsored this May by the American Cancer Society and the Texas Dermatological Society. Their advice - Don't Get Burned.

Planned and implemented by American Cancer Society volunteers and the state's dermatologists, the project will involve a public awareness campaign throughout the summer as well as free skin cancer screenings in various locations statewide May 20.

The skin cancer awareness project will include public and professional education outreach programs, screening programs and a communications campaign centered on the theme "Don't Get Burned."

Billboards, print ads, and television public service announcements developed for the American Cancer Society as a public service by the Phillips Agency of Fort Worth will promote awareness of skin cancer prevention, risk factors, early detection and warning signals. Materials carry messages like: "Skin Cancer Can Make a Mountain Out of a Molehill," "Working on a Killer Tan?" "Red Necks Can Be Hazardous to Your Health" and "What the Sun Can Do to Your Child is Enough to Make You See Red."

"The goal of this project is to increase public awareness about skin cancer prevention and, as a result, motivate individuals to change their behavior in the interest of skin cancer prevention," said William Ramsdell, M.D., chairman of the American Cancer Society task force planning the project in Texas.

"Some 500,000 new cases of skin cancer will be diagnosed in the United States this year, and a fair share of those will be diagnosed in Texas," he said. "That incidence has been increasing at the rate of three to five percent each year."

"Most alarming, though, is the increased incidence of malignant melanoma," Ramsdell said.

According to the American Cancer Society and the Texas Dermatological Society, the increasing incidence of cancer could be altered if individuals follow a few simple guidelines for reducing their risk of skin cancer. For example, Texans should:

\*Use a sunscreen with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of at least 15 during all outdoor activities, and avoid sunburn altogether.

\*Avoid direct exposure to the sun

between the hours of 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. by staying inside or by wearing a hat and protective clothing.

\*Avoid tanning salons altogether because they provide intense exposure to harmful ultraviolet rays.

Public knowledge is an important factor in the prevention and in the early detection of skin cancer, according to Ramsdell. "Individuals can do a lot to decrease their own risk of ever developing skin cancer," he said. "And, like many other forms of cancer, should a skin cancer develop, it is more easily treated and highly curable if it is found and examined by a doctor at an early stage of its development."

"It is critically important for Texans to know that the consequences of a skin cancer can be quite serious, especially if the cancer is a melanoma, the deadliest form of skin cancer," Ramsdell said.

Texas State Association of Occupational Health Nurses will assist with the project by scheduling workplace skin cancer education programs. The American Cancer Society also is adapting curriculum materials promoting skin cancer prevention for school children. These materials will be derived from the "Slip, Slap, Slop" campaign originally used in Australia. In addition, the Society has developed a Skin Cancer Program training manual to use in teaching health professionals how to conduct educational programs for the public.

For information about free skin cancer screenings scheduled in your area, contact your local American Cancer Society or your local dermatological society.

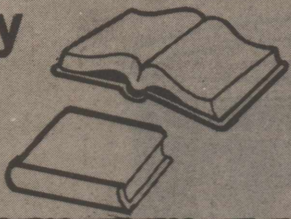

## Water District Bill awaits signature

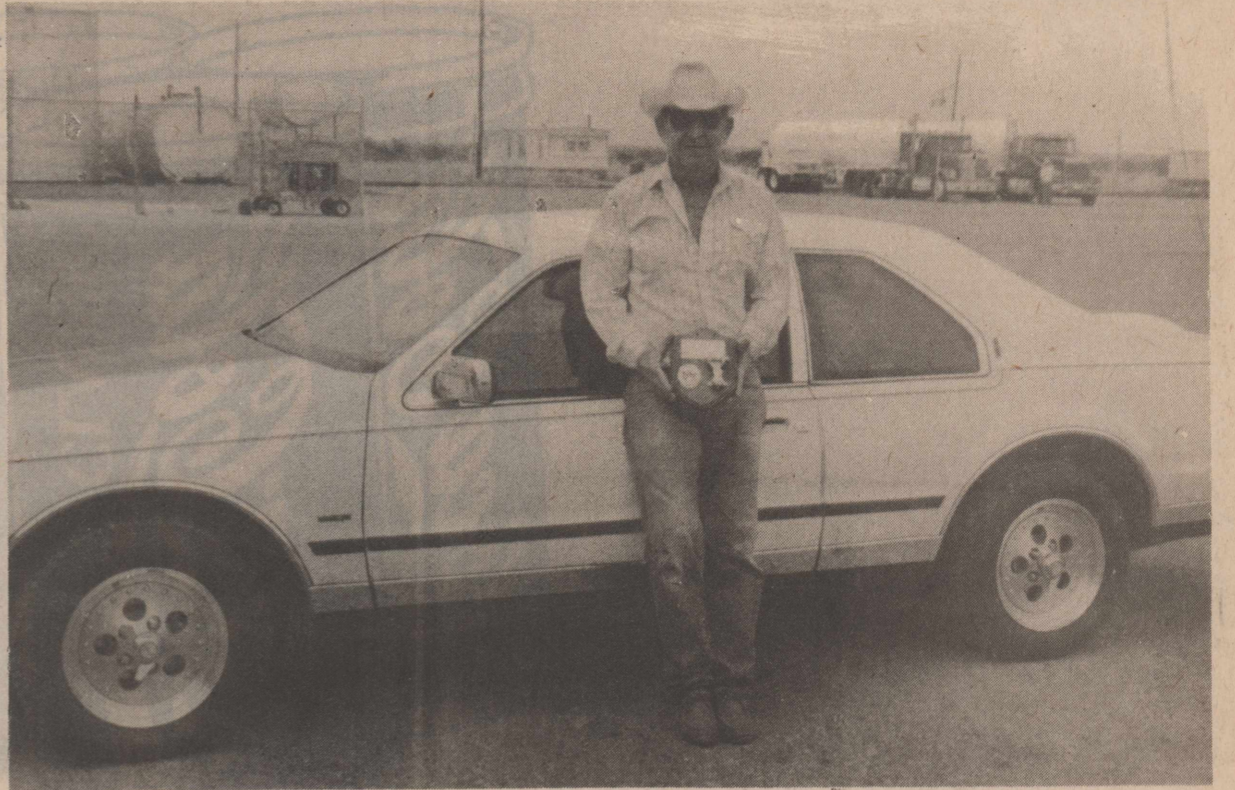
The bill approving creation of a county-wide underground water conservation district for Crockett County has cleared the House of Representatives, Pleas Childress III learned Monday.

Coach Tucker and the Netters expressed their gratitude toward Mr. Davis, who watched the Austin action; Coach John Curry, who supported the program throughout the year; and Tom and Corina Diehl, loyal community supporters of tennis for the past five years.

"Scotty (Burks) continued to do a fine job as alternate to Travis and Tommy," Tucker closed. "He felt the atmosphere and hopefully that will make him hungry."
