Finally, they returned to the monarch with the magic words; words fill all situations, words to ease the heart and mind in all circumstances. The words that were engraved on the monarch's ring were these, "This, too, shall pass away."
All of our circumstances will pass away, the good and the bad, the joy-
ous and the sad. If we depend upon the circumstances of our lives to sustain us we will surely find ourselves living desperately. We are unable to sustain
ourcircumstances, even the very good
ones. But God will sustain us in our ircumstances, even the very worst ones.

Skin cancer prevention will be the focus of aneducation/awareness thoj ect sponsored this May by the Ameri can Cancer Society and the Texas Dermatological Society. Their advice Don't Get Burned.
Planned and implemented by American Cancer Society volunteers and the state's dermatologists, the project will involve a public aware-
ness campaign throughout the summer as well as free Skin cancer screenings in various locations statewide May 20.
The skin cancer awareness project will include public and professional education outreach programs, screening programs and a communications "Don't Get Bumed."
Billboards, print ads, and television public service announcements developed for the American Cancer Society as a public service by the Phillips Agency of Fort Worth will promote awareness of skin cance revention, risk factors, early detecarry messages like: "Skin Cancer Can Make a Mountain Out of a Molehill," "Working on a KillerTan?" "Red Necks Can Be Hazardous to Your Health" and "What the Sun Can Do to Your Child is Enough to Make You ee Red."
"The goal of this project is to incancer prevention and, as a result motivate individuals to change their behavior in the interest of skin cancer prevention," said William Ramsdell, M.D., chairman of the American Cancer Society task force planning the project in Texas.
Some 500,000 new cases of skin States this year, and a fair share of hose will be diagnosed in Texas," he said. "That incidence has been increasing at the rate of three to five percent each year.
"Most alarming, though, is the melanoma," Ramsdell said.
