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56 receive diplomas

Ozona High School's Class of 1989 met as a group for the last time May 26 when the 56 seniors took their places in Lion Stadium to the strains of Pomp and Circumstance.

Friends and family of the graduates listened as salutatorian Tommy Tucker urged his classmates forward into a time of change in a world filled with challenges.

Tucker offered fellow students the tools of hope and faith as they go forth into their new lives. "Hope leads to faith, and we must have faith in order to hope." With the combined forces of hope and faith, "mountains may be scaled," Tucker said.

A positive and never-quitting attitude was graduate Shannon Curry's exhortation to the Class of 1989. In the journey into a "future wide open with possibilities," the ability to dream will play an important role, Curry advised.

"The magnitude of our accomplishments never ceases to amaze me," said graduate Dottie Gonzales of the seniors' abilities to persevere despite the many distractions surrounding them.

"There's more in this world than second best; please have the courage to get up and look for it," she said.

Valedictorian Travis Burks looked ahead even while bidding farewell to high school days. "Open your eyes to the world and to the landscape of life," Burks told his classmates.

Julie Carson and Mike Tomlinson teamed up to sing "Thanks Again" to his guitar accompaniment, expressing gratitude to parents for their part in getting the seniors to this point in their lives.

Miss Carson announced that a purple and gold wreath placed near the speaker's platform was in memory of Connie Camarillo, a classmate who died of leukemia in childhood.

Awards earned by members of the Class of 1989 were announced by Principal Jim Payne.

Receiving the Presidential Academic Fitness award this year are: Travis Burks, Shannon Curry, Copie Davis and Tommy Tucker. Davis has received a Carr Scholarship at Angelo State University. Tucker was recognized as a recipient of the WalMart scholarship and an award of commendation for outstanding accomplishment on a 1987 qualifying test.

UIL scholarships go to Burks, Davis, Curry, Idalia Fierro, Dottie Gonzales, Tucker and Adrienne Wilson.

Mr. Payne also took opportunity to introduce magna cum laude graduates Travis Burks and Tommy Tucker and cum laude graduates Robby Tambunga, Julie Carson, Oscar Galindo, Rita Rios, Stacie Winkley, Gina McCollum, Idalia Fierro, Adrienne Wilson and Dottie Gonzales.

Graduates received 14 scholarships awarded by local clubs and institutions.

1989 emergency feed program established in Crockett County

A 1989 feed program has been established for Crockett County producers affected by dry conditions. Basics of the program are the same as before. Additionally, program modifications include the following:

1. Adequate documentation for "entities" such as corporations, partnerships, joint ventures, estates, or trusts.
2. Entities or individuals exceeding \$2.5 million in annual qualifying gross revenues are not eligible for Emergency Feed Program benefits.
3. A producer must be actively engaged in the ranching/farming operation and obtain at least 10% gross annual income from the production of grain or livestock.
4. Eligibility Certifications (CCC-640) are to be completed by ALL producers wishing to receive or retain benefits of the Emergency Feed Program. PARTICIPATION and SPOT CHECKS MAY INVOLVE CERTIFICATION OF "GROSS INCOME"

FROM 1988.

5. The feed program begins April 1, 1989.

6. Qualifying producers may be eligible for up to \$50,000. The total INCLUDES any benefits received from the 1988 program that were paid in 1989.

Eligibility is determined on those operations that have conditions at 40% below normal or worse as a result of the dry conditions. Low rainfall has caused the current range conditions to be below normal for the western portion of Crockett County. Producers that are feeding in excess of normal due to dry conditions may sign up for cost share assistance. A producer's eligible feeding period begins the day an application is filed.

Information needed to sign up for the program:

1. If there is "feed on hand" when the application is made, a receipt for the feed purchase must be turned in at sign-up.

2. Land acres you have owned or operated for the last six months.

3. Number and class of livestock you have owned for six months.

4. Feed on hand that has not been fed up prior to application. THIS

WILL NOT INCLUDE FEED FROM THE 1988 PROGRAM.

5. Dated feed invoices for eligible feed showing kind, amount, and value

Commissioners hold called meeting Wed.

Commissioners held their second called meeting of the month May 24.

The 5:30 p.m. session was brought to order by Judge Kathryn Mayfield to discuss road gravel, the road superintendent position and personnel.

Court members talked about specifications for road gravel and agreed that the rock should be inspected at the crush site to assure that the material doesn't vary beyond a set amount.

Judge Mayfield was in possession of a letter of resignation from Eddie Moore, road superintendent. When asked if he would like to read the letter to the court, Moore requested that the

matter be taken up in executive session.

Upon returning to open meeting, Judge Mayfield said the letter of resignation had been withdrawn without being presented to the court.

Commissioners voted to support the fire and ambulance services and to endorse county employee participation in those services on a motion by Janet Hill seconded by Jim House.

The court voted, on a motion by Hill seconded by Chuy Castro, that the road supervisor be permitted to take his county vehicle home and that it be used for county business only.

'Keep laughing because crying doesn't help,' says Katharine Russell after 33 years of teaching

One of the highlights of 33 years in the teaching field came last year for Katharine Russell when 17 of her former kindergarten students graduated from high school.

"Some of my students still see me in

the post office and recognize me," said Mrs. Russell who began teaching music in Ozona Primary School 31 years ago.

The Eldorado native started her teaching career in Sonora at the age of

19. After two years in the 6th and 7th grade classrooms, she came to Ozona to continue her life's work.

"It's been a good profession for me in my circumstances," said Mrs. Russell. Her children were 6, 8 and 10 when their father, Buddy Russell, was killed in a car accident. The teaching profession allowed the young mother the opportunity to be free from work during the hours her children were home. "I'm thankful I got the education I did so I could be at home with them," she said.

A love of music led the spirited Katharine into education. "I had a wonderful piano teacher growing up...I felt that's where my talent was."

Ten years of piano lessons and experience singing in the church choir directed her choice of fields. A bachelor of music degree from North Texas University at Denton was followed by a master's in music education from Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos. She later earned a kindergarten endorsement.

Although many never learn to play a musical instrument, Mrs. Russell works on the philosophy that the voice can be a person's natural music instrument and they can always enjoy singing. "I've enjoyed using my music in the classroom; it can help vocabulary and understanding."

Mrs. Russell moved from the music

class to teaching kindergarten on a part-time basis in 1961. The change-over was complete in 1975 when she was assigned totally to the kindergarten class.

"I've been pretty hard on them through the years because I wanted them to be good students." Mrs. Russell learned early that you can ease up if you start out too firm, but starting a classroom out too easy is almost always impossible for a teacher to overcome.

When teachers first started being graded, "I was graded down - told I didn't have a sense of humor. I do have a sense of humor, but I didn't want to be the one responsible for letting them goof off."

Daughter Susie Childress followed in her mother's footsteps. The two have taught kindergarten side-by-side at Ozona Primary for three years. Expressing pleasure in Susie's choice of a career, Mrs. Russell believes both classrooms have benefitted from the close working relationship maintained by the two women.

Numerous changes have occurred in the field of education over a span of 33 years, Mrs. Russell said. She believes that the children of 20 years ago were just as smart as children today. "We're just throwing out things faster than we did then," she said while wondering if some will experience

burn out in a few years.

Family life not being kept together has affected education. "We have a lot of that to contend with," said the caring teacher.

Mrs. Russell emphasizes that reading to young children is important and encourages parents to spend at least 15 minutes a day reading to their youngsters.

Television programs such as Mr. Rogers and Sesame Street teach children, but exercise and play are important, too, she said.

Teachers experience much more pressure today because of state mandates, said Mrs. Russell. A teacher's day doesn't end when the school bell rings. The need for planning and never ending concern for the children's learning opportunities go home with the educator.

"Teachers are building the leaders of tomorrow. They need all the help and understanding they can get," said Mrs. Russell who feels she has never worked under anyone who was not behind her 100 percent.

"Teachers are the ones doing the work, not the administration. I don't want to see labor unions come into Texas, but I think teachers have a right to be heard. They need an ave-

nue of communication."

Admitting that she couldn't help but be a little teary-eyed her last day in the classroom, Mrs. Russell left the building advising her co-workers to "keep laughing, because crying doesn't help. As long as you keep your sense of humor, it will take you a long way."

Along with her teaching career, Mrs. Russell has given up her position as choir director at Ozona United Methodist Church. She will continue as a member of the group she has led for 20 years.

Future plans include catching up on the housework and getting back into sewing. Becoming involved in volunteer work and taking a trip this fall are also on her list of things to do.

More immediate will be a trip to see grandsons Josh and William Cross play ball. The boys are the sons of Kathy and Bill Cross of Von Ormy.

Susie and Johnny Childress and their children Courtney and John Clayton are close by in Ozona, and son Les makes his home in Austin.

There will be few dull moments ahead for 1988 Chamber of Commerce Teacher of the Year Katharine Russell as she imparts her own special enthusiasm for life to all those around her.

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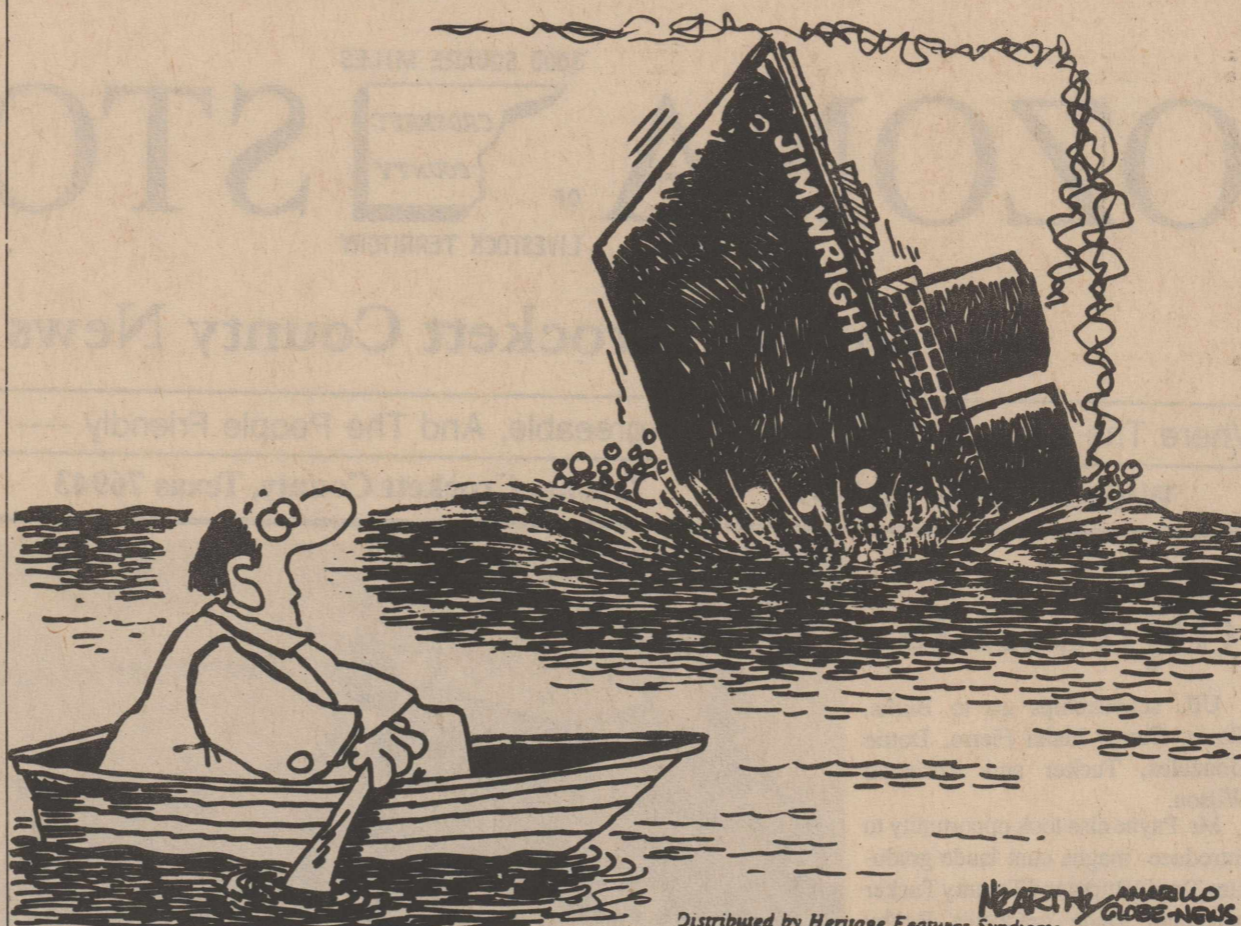

ton and Chet Brooks. House members told the senators to take it or leave it.

Basically, the House version:
 • Sets up state programs for AIDS testing, counseling and treatment.
 • Eliminates AIDS counseling grants to community groups, which some legislators feared was a ploy to give tax money to gay and lesbian groups.
 • Mandates that warnings about AIDS infection, written for different age groups, be printed on state materials and that sexual abstinence be taught at all public schools.

• Creates a criminal offense for intentionally infecting someone with the AIDS virus.
 By eliminating many of the Senate provisions, the House saved many millions which will doubtless be steered to public education financing.

Inflamed Voters
 House members voted to require the Public Utility Commission to give utilities shareholders the value of tax savings realized by those companies, a move which angered consumer advocates and alienated the original Senate sponsor.

Consumer advocates said the House bill will add \$1 billion next year to telephone and electric bills across the state.
 House sponsor, Nolan Robnett, R-Lubbock, called it a "ratepayer-friendly bill," but Rep. Ralph Wallace, D-Houston, warned that

it would inflame voters by next election.
 Sen. Bob Glasgow said he wouldn't carry the bill, and the three PUC commissioners are split 2-1 for it on party lines. Utilities favor the bill.
 Current law upheld by the Texas Supreme Court holds ratepayers must be given the tax savings, which lower their rates. The PUC would set rates using a hypothetical tax rate.

Other Highlights
 • Republican Charlie Hartland narrowly won a special election to fill the vacancy in a traditionally Democratic House seat in the North Houston-Aldine area, making two seats the GOP has picked up in special elections this year.

• Gov. Bill Clements gave final approval to a sunset bill continuing the Texas Department of Agriculture for 12 years and retaining the elected post of Commissioner Jim Hightower.

• The Senate unanimously approved a bill which lawmakers predict will ease the rural health-care crisis by reopening some abandoned small hospitals.

• The Senate tentatively approved a major campaign finance bill that will make it easier to identify special-interest groups and large contributors, which are backing candidates.

• The Texas Racing Commission approved a greyhound track licence for Valley Racing Association, which plans a track south of Harlingen.

Something's Different
 Maybe its the preponderance of new House members, because Schlueter is certainly not out of character in the post, but something is different.

Maybe liberals don't fear his long memory, and perhaps that's a clue that the House is continuing to align along party lines, as it has this decade.

After all, with the three new seats recently won by the GOP, Republicans are within striking distance of electing their first speaker in 1991.

So are liberal Democrats, which puts conservatives like Schlueter and current Speaker Gib Lewis in the philosophical middle.

Lewis is in his fourth term as speaker, a feat matched only by Billy Clayton, and the odds of his winning an unprecedented fifth term in '91 are slim. Already, several House members are quietly grousing they want a different speaker next time.

Republicans now are about 15 votes short of a majority. If they can convert some Democrats, defeat a couple more and get some conservatives to cross with their floor votes, they can elect a GOP speaker in '91.

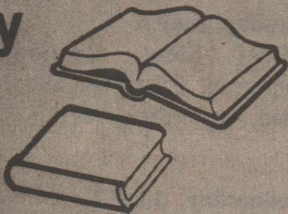
Lifesaving classes begin Monday, June 5

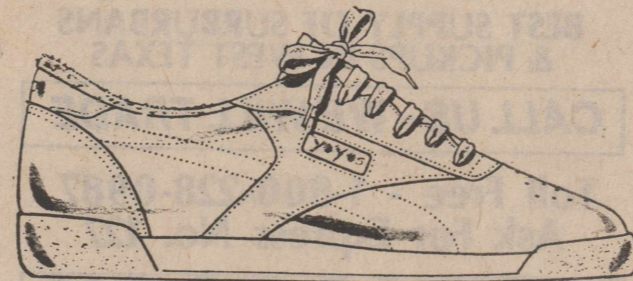

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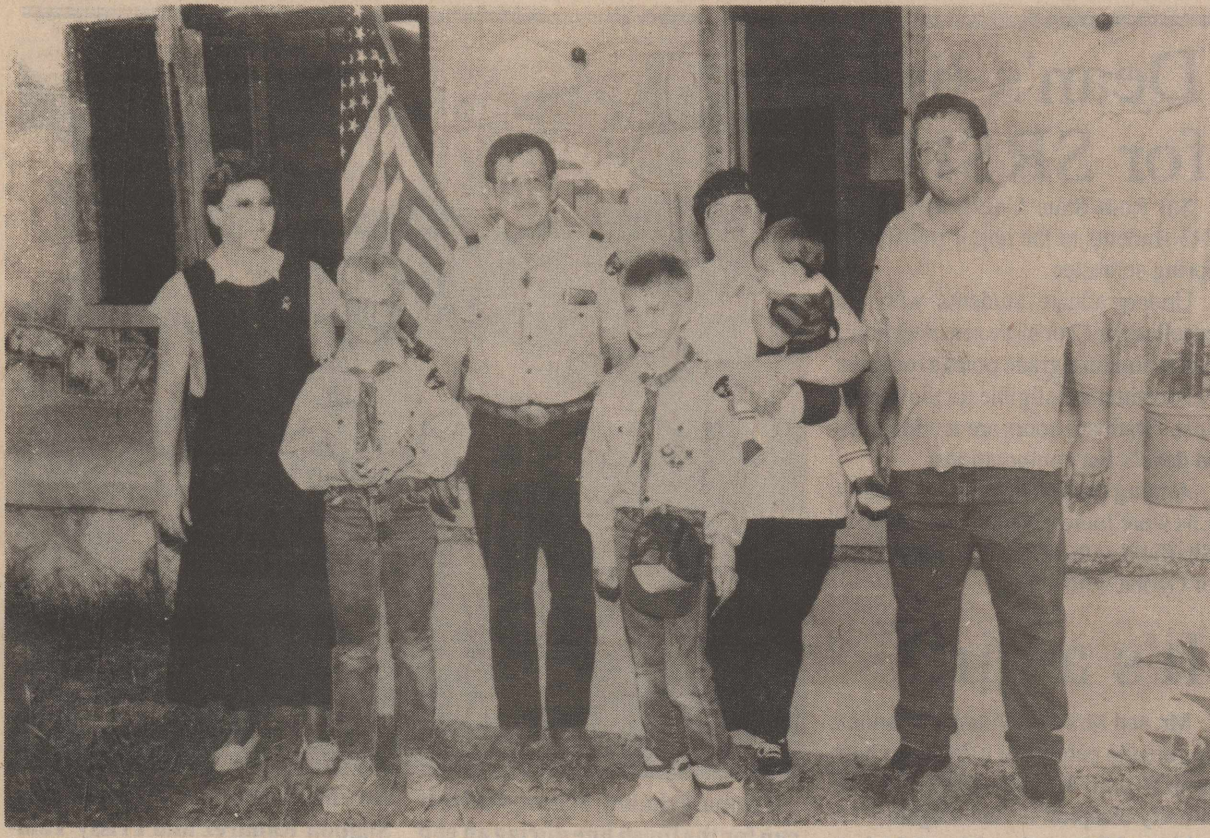

Childhood may be the best time of life, but it is certainly not without stress. Stress in childhood is as inevitable as scraped knees and outgrown clothes. Every child will face stress, but you can help by being aware of and helping your child cope with predictable stressors. Birthday parties, school, loss and failure, family vacations, getting lost, and holidays are all stressors which are predictable. Summer may be a time when children undergo more stress than usual—being cooped up in the family car or in a motel room while on vacation, being around their siblings all day long, being "bored" because of a lack of structured activities during the summer—and all this can lead to family conflict. Remember that children experience stress physically just as adults do; but intellectually, children can't handle stressors in the same way as adults. Stomachaches, headaches, nervous mannerisms, tears, being "out of control," moodiness, and bickering with siblings are all signs of tension in children. Whereas adults can put things into perspective, though, children cannot. For children, everything is so catastrophic, so now, so forever. Help your children weather the stressful periods and emerge as tougher, stronger individuals by keeping routines as consistent as possible, especially during high stress times such as holidays and vacations. You can also help by forewarning or talking with the child in advance so he'll have a better idea of what to expect in a new situation. It may be necessary for you to probe deeply to get to the root of the problem, so your active listening skills may be put to the test. Walking in the child's shoes or viewing the situation from his or her perspective will help you help your child. Spider mites are tiny, but they can cause big problems in home gardens. These pests prefer tomatoes, beans, and peas, but will attack many other crops. They do most of their damage in hot, dry weather, said Billy Reagor, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Spider mites, also called red spiders, are only 1/60-inch in length and vary in color from white to green to red. The tiny pests can build up quickly and completely engulf plants, the agent said. Eggs laid on the underside of leaves hatch in four to five days. A complete life cycle takes three weeks, and as many as 20 overlapping generations can occur in a single year. Mites spin a thin web which often can be seen on heavily infested plants. They feed by inserting their mouth parts into plant tissue and sucking juices. While feeding, they inject toxic

substances into the plant. Infestations of spider mites can be identified by tiny white spots on plant leaves. Heavy infestations cause bleaching or yellowing, first along the main leaf veins and then throughout the plant. Heavy infestations cause plants to shed buds and small fruit. Spider mites can completely defoliate a plant if not controlled. Control of spider mites is often difficult and requires two to four applications of insecticide at five to seven day intervals. Check plants frequently for spider mites since the pests can build up rapidly. Insecticides registered for controlling spider mites in gardens are diazinon, kelthane, malathion, and sulfur. However, do not use sulfur on cucurbits (cucumbers, squash, or melons) as severe plant change could occur. As always, read and follow label directions on all insecticides.

Staff and board members were recognized by Cathy Carson, and Susie Harrison, director of the center, was assisted in the program by Del Perez.

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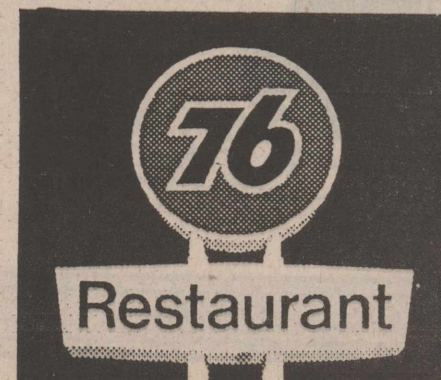

While in Washington, participants will spend a full day visiting Capitol Hill. There each delegate will be given an opportunity to meet their respective legislators.

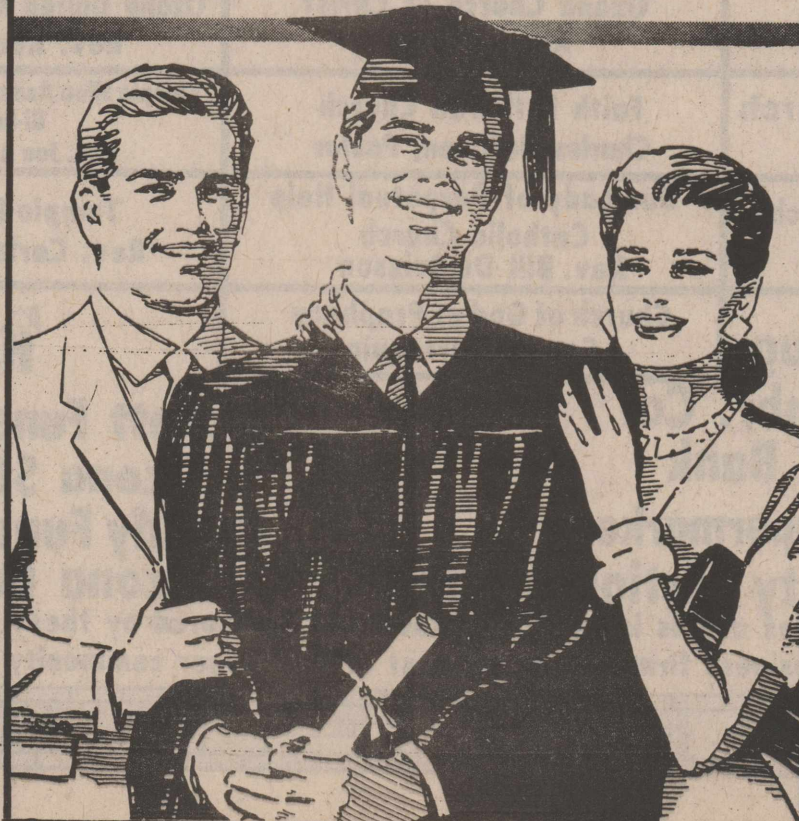

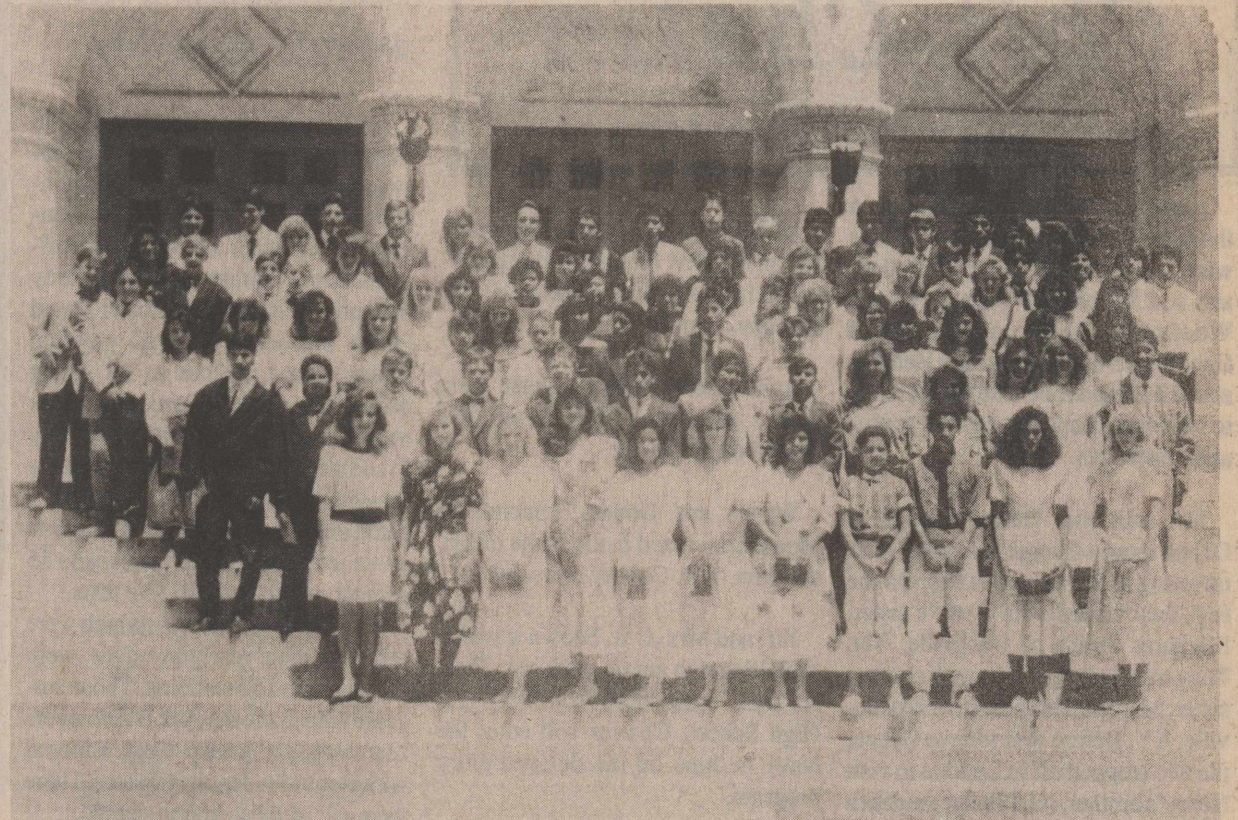

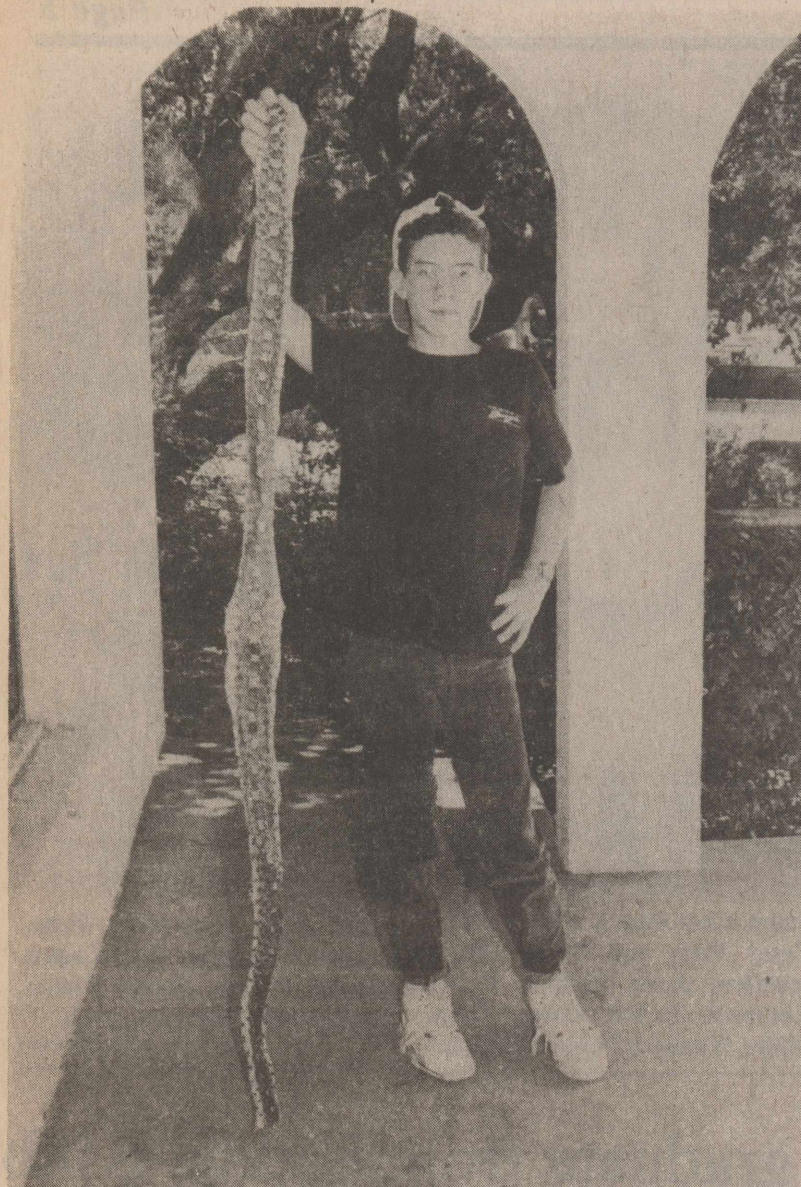

After days of alternately soaking and drying the skin in lime water, salt, alum and Neet's Foot Oil, it was worked across a board until finished.

"You must stay with the process or you can lose the skin," said Mrs. Lott.

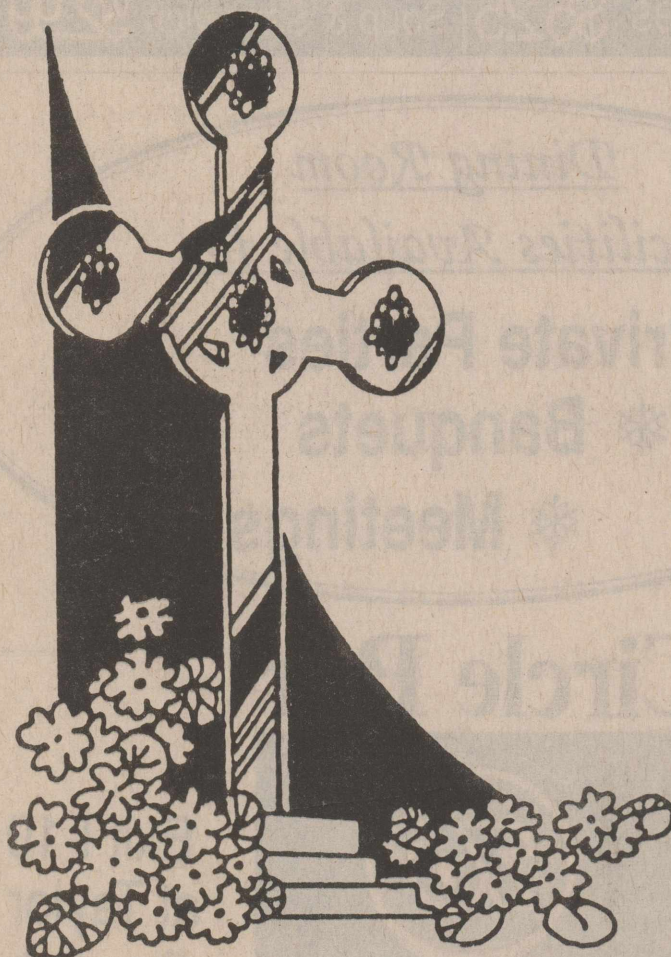

Story Time is great fun for all. Anyone wanting to volunteer time can get more information at the library or from Mrs. Wagoner at 392-2637 or 392-5814.

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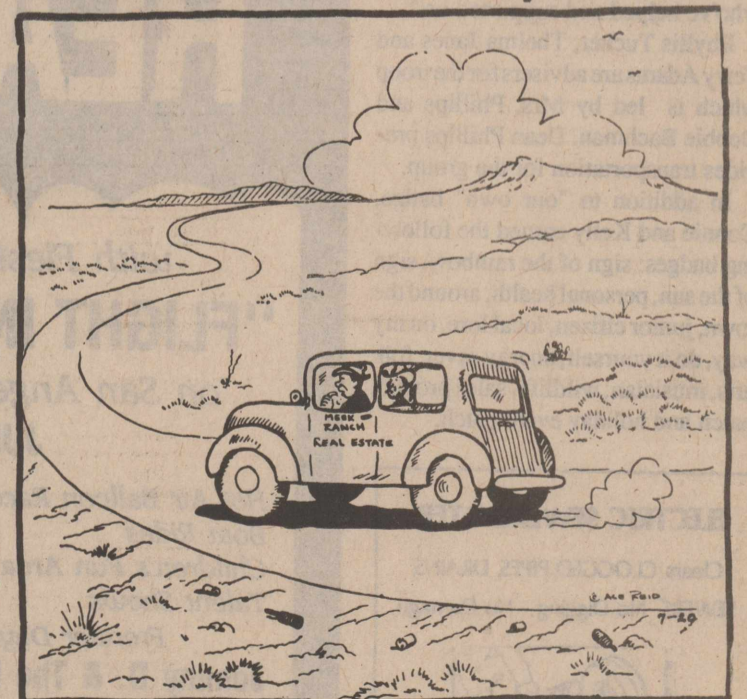
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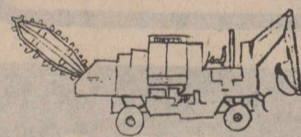
