# Lions busy removing Owl feathers from game uniforms

After an intense struggle which was decided only in the final 27 seconds, the Ozona Lions triumphed over the Reagan County Owls on Friday night. Ozona is now in first place in district 6-2A, with a 4-0 district record and an

In a Monday interview, Lions coach Don Payne credited the hard-won victory to a strong overall team effort with "a strong defense and great blocking

Coach Payne also credited several key players who helped make the win possible. Mark Fierro led the defense with 14 tackles. Michael Ybarra and Cody Morris also made important defensive plays. On the offense, Coach Payne commended George Ybarra and Lalo Rodriquez for their key runs, and Ruben Borrego for his important pass reception.

Reagan County scored early in the game. An Ozona pass was intercepted and carried to the 22-yard line. The Owls followed up with a successful pass play which netted the first touchdown of the game. The extra point attempt was fumbled, however, because of a bad snap from the Owl center. With 4:39 left in the first quarter, the Owls led the Lions 6-0.

The second quarter was marked by numerous turnovers, with neither team able to overcome the defensive skill of the other. Ozona and Reagan County traded fumble recoveries early on in the quarter. The Owls then managed a drive from the Ozona 46 to the Ozona 3-yard line, only to lose another fumble to the Lions. Ozona also began a promising drive, but the ball was intercepted on the Reagan County 16-yard line.

In the third quarter, the Lions surged ahead on an 8-play, 41-yard drive with George Ybarra sprinting across from the 11-yard line for a touchdown. The kick by Borrego was good, and Ozona was in the lead 7-6, with 2:54 left in the third quarter. The two teams again traded possessions, and a pass interception left the Owls on the Ozona 39-yard line at the close of the third

### still further, moving the line of scrimmage to the 46-yard line. A remarkable 11-play drive gave the Lions their final score. Ozona quarterback Chris Denman completed a 13-yard, fourth-and-three pass to Ruben Borrego and put the Lions on the 3-yard line.

Two plays into the fourth quarter, the Owls came within 11 yards of the

goal line with a 21-yard run. However, Michael Ybarra intercepted a pass and

returned the ball to the 31-yard line. A penalty improved the Lions' position

George Ybarra made the final 3 yards for the score. Borrego's kick was good, giving the Lions a 14-6 lead with 5:18 left in the game.

The Owls came back stubbornly with a 6-play, 60-yard drive. After a series of successful running plays, the Reagan County team scored its second touchdown. The two-point conversion attempt was unsuccessful.

The Owls showed they were still in the game after taking back possession with 1:45 left. They managed to carry the ball to the Ozona 6-yard line and it was fourth-and-five with only 27 seconds left.

Decisively, defensive lineman Cody Morris blocked the Owls' field goal attempt to clinch the victory for the Lions.

Ozona's victory over Reagan County was no small accomplishment. According to Coach Payne, this was the first win over Big Lake since 1982. "Big Lake has a great team," said Coach Payne on Monday. "That's what made this win so nice. Beating them at home is even better."

The Lions are now concentrating on their bid for the district championship against Wall. The Wall football team is second in district, and should prove to be quite a challenge for the Lions. The Ozona team will need support from the town this Friday. Coach Payne and the Ozona Lions would like to see a big crowd of town folks in Wall on Friday evening.

Running in chilly weather, the boys' team made it a three team race with defending state champs Boys Ranch, Coleman and Ozona.

The team performance was led by Ozona's sophomore Mark Ramirez and senior Luis Rico. Mark finished 7th overall, qualifying him as an individual to the state cross country meet

in Georgetown. The Ozona team qualified as a team with their third place finish overall. Boys Ranch won with 15 points followed by Coleman with 78 and

Ozona with 84. Team member finishes were: 7 Mark Ramirez, 13 Luis Rico, 16 Martin Urbina, 23 Pep Talamantez, 25 Marcos Quiroz, 33 Ruben Borrego, and J. J. Coy 50th out of 72



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

One of the best known and most beautiful passages of scripture has come to be known as the Beatitudes. You will find the passage in the gospel according to Matthew, in chapter 5, verses 1 through 12. The Beatitudes is one of those pieces of scripture which offer encouragement to those of us who sometimes try to live life against the grain, as though we are not like other folk with problems, emotions, hopes and dreams, and loyal-

Those who enjoy woodworking have discoverd that every piece of timber has a distinctive grain. When you clamp it in a vise for planing, you need to recognize this. If you work against the grain, you will never get the wood smooth. If you work with the grain, nature will work with you. Oppose the grain and you are inviting trouble.

The Beatitudes are a set of principles that go with the grain of life. Jesus simply distilled the sum total of human wisdom and laid it down in

concise principles. He was stating that this is the way the grain runs in life and we are wise to work with it, not against it.

The Adventures of Robinson Crusoe is not only a classic adventure story, but it is also a classic story of how one's attitudes can make the difference between hope and despair. It illustrates what the Beatitudes con-

Robinson Crusoe was the son of amiddle class English family. Though his father wanted his son to go into the family business, Robinson wanted a life at sea. He ran away from home and joined the crew of a ship. After the ship was caught in a storm at sea, he was so frightened that he swore he would never leave land again.

But, his yearning for the sea was not satisfied, so he took several other voyages. The greatest adventure of his life began when a ship on which he was sailing broke apart off the coast

of Brazil. Robinson was the sole survivor of that wreck. When waves washed him ashore, the island on which he took refuge seemed to have no inhabitants. Since he had no idea how long it might be until he was rescued, he made a raft and brought from the broken ship food, water, ammunition, clothing, tools, sailcloth, and lumber.

He explored the island and found that he was truly alone except for some wild goats. Having found some ink, a pen and paper among the things he had salvaged from the shipwreck, he began to keep a journal. Each morning and evening, he had a devotional time in which he read from the Bible and thanked God that he had been delivered from the sea.

The central feature of this adventure story is the change which takes place in the attitude of Robinson Crusoe. When he first landed on the island, he was in deep despair. He was "poor in spirit." He mourned his aloneness. He felt misfortuned, destitute and oppressed. As he read the Bible, he came to understand that he was not alone. He was converted to a new point of view, and this act of faith allowed him to rebuild his entire attitude toward life.

Essentially, this is what the Beatitudes can do. They offer to those of us trying to live against the grain a new set of attitudes. In spite of a person's circumstances in the world, depicted in Robinson Crusoe's life as a deserted island, one can surmount difficulties through the conversion of attitude. One's spirit can be transported above and away from the earthly circumstance. The poor in spirit can be transported to the kingdom of heaven. They that mourn shall be comforted. The meek shall inherit the earth. Robinson Crusoe was eventually rescued to live his last days back in England, but he was "rescued" much earlier when he was converted to a new attitude, enabling him to rise above even the bleakest of circumstances.



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

Chesta Stuart was elected president and conducted the meeting where ideas and goals were discussed.



### Homemakers learn to manage conflict
