Commissioners meet, discuss doctor contracts

A planning grant for Crockett County Airport has been approved according to Commissioner Jim House. House told commissioners Monday night he was notified by Mark Orbeck of West Texas Consultants of the grant's approval by the Texas Aviation Commission.

Written notification of the grant will be forthcoming.

The grant money will be used in preparation of a master plan for airport improvement. The plan will then be submitted as part of an application for federal funds to be used in making the improvements.

No action was taken by commissioners following a joint executive session with hospital board members to discuss personnel contracts.

Earlier in the meeting commissioners met in executive session with

California woman commits suicide on Interstate

An Ontario, California woman died last weekend of a self-inflicted gunshot wound received Saturday in Crockett County. The 18-year-old was airlifted from Ozona to a Lubbock hospital where she died early Sunday morning of a head wound.

The victim was traveling in an 18-wheeler with a Florida man, a companion of about a year, when she took a pistol from the truck's sleeper according to Sheriff Jim Wilson. The driver stopped and attempted to obtain the gun, but the woman ran from the truck along the fence line before the 12:08 p.m. shooting.

A Florida couple in another 18-wheeler traveling across country from the Beaumont area with the pair also stopped at the scene where Hwy. 290 ends west of Ozona.

Two suicide notes and a third note to the man were found, Wilson said. An autopsy report from forensic pa-

thologist Dr. Erdman of Amarillo confirmed Monday that the shooting was a suicide, "which is consistent with our investigation here," Wilson said.

A scanner conversation before officers arrived at the location indicating that the shooting might be a hunting accident stemmed from a report that the woman was covered with hunter's coveralls, Wilson said. Passersby, Mr. and Mrs. Chip McClure, parents of little Jessica McClure of Midland, stopped and used their coveralls to try and keep the victim warm, Wilson reported. The McClures remained to assist until officers and EMS personnel arrived.

Pecos County officials also received a report on the incident from a motorist who had seen the woman being chased when the man attempted to retrieve the gun.

Unemployment rate drops

"We haven't had an October unemployment rate this good since 1984," Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers said. Newly released statistics from the Texas Employment Commission placed the state's jobless rate at 6.0 percent. "And making the economic picture even brighter is the fact that we had the largest gain in the number of non-farm salaried jobs thus far in 1989. Things are definitely looking up," Nabers said.

As proof that the economy is improving, Commissioner Nabers pointed to the decline from 7.2 percent in August to 6.3 percent in September and then down again to 6.0 percent in October. Compared to October 1988 when the rate was 6.8 percent, this current month's 6.0 percent is a welcome sight, but not all the news was good.

"Even though statewide we are seeing relief," Nabers said, "we have some areas of the state which continue to suffer from double digit unemployment rates and there are over 500,000 Texans still trying to find jobs."

There were 7,792,500 people in the state's labor force in October. That number is up by 47,900 from the previous month. Although the majority of the jobs added in October were due to completion of staffing at private and public schools and colleges, most other major industries also recorded moderate increases. Only the trade and mining category (oil and gas extraction) exhibited decreases between September and October.

Crockett County's percent of unemployment for October dropped to 5.7 percent from 6.3 percent reported

by the Texas Employment Commission for September. The labor force for October was totaled at 1,723 with 1,625 employed and 98 unemployed. The September statistics indicated that the labor force was 1,739 with 1,630 employed and 109 unemployed.

Figures for area counties show 5.7 percent unemployment for Reagan County compared to 3.6 the previous month. The current work force is estimated at 1,900 with 109 unemployed. Schleicher County's labor force was 1,275 for October with 68 unemployed for 5.3 percent compared to 6.3 percent in September.

The Sutton County unemployment figures for October are 4.9 percent compared to 5.6 percent the previous month. One hundred of the county's 2,038 labor force members are unemployed.

Terrell County's unemployment rate had dropped from 2.0 in September to 1.2 with only 11 persons of the 915 labor force unemployed.

The Val Verde County unemployment rate increased slightly from 10.7 percent to 10.9 percent in October. The civilian labor force of 12,664 had 1,383 unemployed.

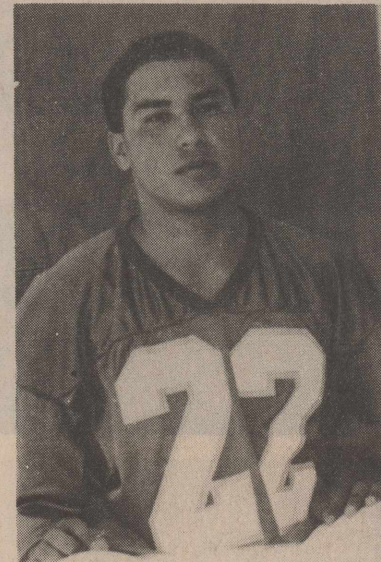
EMT classes set for January

Classes for Emergency Medical Technicians start in Ozona in January, announces Doug Meador. A minimum of 10 students are needed, and more are welcome.

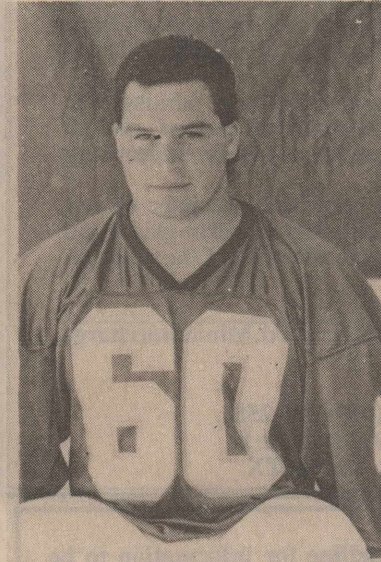

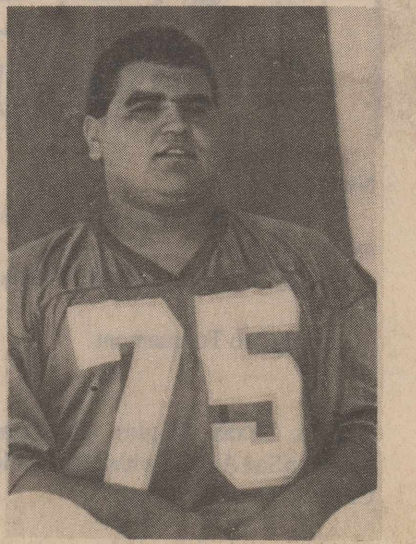
Ramirez was also named to the all-district defensive team as tackle and Ybarra as safety.

Lions end successful season

A successful season of football comes to a close for the Ozona Lions with Friday night's loss to Albany. The Lions finish the season as bi-district champions - something Ozona hasn't done since 1982.

On Monday Coach Don Payne commented favorably on the Lions' 1989 season: "We had lots of good games this year. Our guys gave their best effort every time they got on the field. I was real proud."

The highlight of the season, according to Coach Payne, was Ozona's victory over the Reagan County Owls in Big Lake. The long-time rivals were beaten on their home turf. This was the first win over Big Lake in seven years.

The Ozona Lions were helped along tremendously this year by their fans - who often filled out-of-town visitor stands almost to the breaking point. Coach Payne expressed his gratitude for this on Monday: "I'm real proud of our fans this year for following us. It makes me feel good to know that the town is behind us."

Turnovers were to play a major role in Friday night's game. The first of these took place midway through the first quarter, giving Albany possession on the Ozona 27.

Albany followed with a touchdown, making the score 6-0 with 3:58 in the quarter. Ozona blocked the extra-point attempt.

A long drive begun late in the first quarter took Albany into field goal range. The kick was good, making the score 9-0 Albany, with 8:29 in the second quarter.

Albany intercepted a pass on the Ozona 48-yard line with 7:10 left in the second quarter. The Ozona defense was extremely efficient, however, forcing Albany to punt after losing one yard in four downs.

Ozona's second lost fumble of the night led to another Albany touchdown. With the extra-point, the Al-

bany Lions led 16-0 with 4:46 left in the half.

Ozona showed considerable spirit early in the second half, with a spectacular 63-yard drive. The drive stalled out, however, and Albany gained possession on their own 18-yard line. There were no further scores in the third quarter.

Early in the fourth quarter the Albany Lions scored again with a touchdown. The extra-point gave them a score of 23-0 with 11:08 left in the game.

Ozona was not ready to lay down and die, however. With an impressive 49-yard drive, Chris Denman com-

pleted three passes to Domingo Perez, putting the Ozona Lions on the Albany 9-yard line. From there, a pitch to George Ybarra gave Ozona the touchdown with 9:01 left in the game. Denman passed to Borrego successfully for a 2-point conversion, making the score 23-8.

With 4:12 left in the game, Ozona began another promising drive. Two long tosses to Sotero Fuentes, and a 15-yard penalty against Albany took the Ozona Lions as far as the Albany 25 before a pass was picked off at the end zone. The Albany Lions managed to run out the final minutes of the game, leaving a score of 23-8 at the finish.

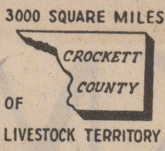

Concert brings Christmas to Ozona Visiting

Ozona residents will have a rare opportunity to experience the music of the Midland-Odesa Symphony & Chorale when the group performs a Christmas pops concert here Dec. 15.

Brought to Ozona through the Crockett County Historical Society, the symphony and chorale will appear in the high school auditorium at 7 p.m. Dec. 15.

Tickets are available at Crockett County Museum, Ozona National Bank, Crockett County National Bank, The Ozona Stockman, The Teacher Store, Ozona Chamber of Commerce and Margie's Beauty Shop.

Pre-concert tickets are \$5.00 for adults and \$3.50 for students. When purchased at the door, the tickets will be \$6.00 for adults and \$4.00 for children.

Conductor Don Th. Jaeger assumed leadership of the Midland-Odesa Symphony and Chorale with the opening of the 1989-90 concert season. He enjoys a diverse and stimulating career in professional music both as a conductor and oboist, having performed on three continents and in major concert halls both at home and abroad.

Mr. Jaeger began his conducting activities while a faculty member of the Interlochen Arts Academy where he also served as administrative director. During a 20 year tenure at Interlochen he conducted virtually every orchestra, band and ensemble. From 1969-81 he served as music director/conductor of the Midland (Michigan) Symphony Orchestra, and for seven years concurrently, conductor of the Northwestern Michigan Symphony (now Traverse Symphony). With the Midland Symphony

he toured Europe in 1976 and presented a Kennedy Center concert in Washington D.C., all to critical acclaim.

In 1979 he founded the Northwood Orchestra under the auspices of Northwood Institute and continues today to plan and present its annual summer festival in Harbor Springs and Charlevoix, Michigan. With this orchestra Mr. Jaeger conducted two New York performances, in Avery Fisher Hall (with Canadian Brass) in 1981, and a Carnegie Hall concert honoring Van Cliburn in 1983 with Leontyne Price as guest artist. Both performances garnered high praise from New York critics. In addition, he has conducted

the Northwood Orchestra on tour in Texas, Oklahoma, Arizona, Florida and California.

An oboist of international reputation, Mr. Jaeger was a bronze medalist of the Prague Spring International Competition in Czechoslovakia and recipient of a Fulbright Scholarship for graduate study in Amsterdam, The Netherlands. He also served as principal oboist at the Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria and as soloist at the Alaska Festival of Music in Anchorage. He is a former member of the Dallas Symphony, the Oklahoma City Symphony, The Wichita Symphony, Amarillo Symphony, Kansas City Philharmonic, and the Chicago Little

Symphony with which he was soloist in over 140 concerts throughout the United States.

Guest conducting appearances include the Detroit Symphony, Aspen Festival Orchestra, Chattanooga Symphony, Philharmonic Orchestra of Lisbon and Oporto Symphony (Portugal), Antwerp Philharmonic (Belgium), and the State Orchestra of Thessaloniki (Greece). In 1981 Mr. Jaeger was invited to the People's Republic of China where he conducted and held master classes in Tianjin and Beijing.

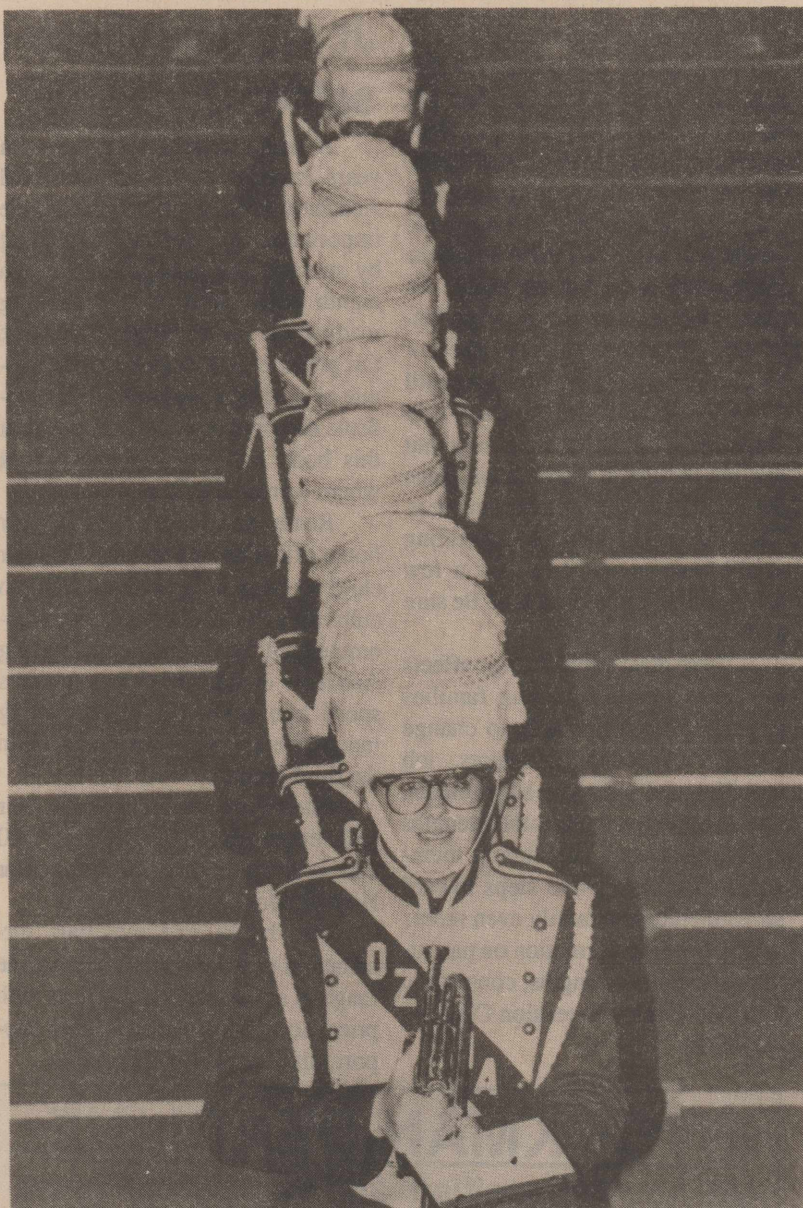

"Uniqueness of family should be recognized"

The "uniqueness" of your family sets it apart from other families. While each family has many things in common with other families, the special abilities and relationships within your family make it unique.

During the holidays, many of us tend to reflect on the special times we've shared with family members—good memories and happy times. But do we take time out to look at what makes our family special and strong?

Texas has almost two million family units with children under 18 years of age. The next century will continue present trends, with continuing variation in family forms. By the year 2000, three kinds of families will dominate the personal lives of most Texans—families of first marriages, single-parent families and families of remarriage.

Even with all these changes, scientists still find the family to be a remarkably durable and resilient institution. The important factors in a strong family—whatever its makeup—are still the commitment of individual members to the family unit and the desire to work within its limits and toward its possibilities.

By discovering and improving the unknown, unused strengths in your family, you are better able to deal with the challenges you and your loved ones face. Young parents who plan and carry out efforts to build strong

family relationships are establishing a firm foundation for years to come.

How to begin? One way is to simply inventory what the family has going for it. Family members need to set aside one or more short periods for discussing together the "specialness" of their family.

For example, a family with young children might want to "draw" their family. To begin, assemble the family members around a table with paper and crayons or pencils. Start the discussion by asking each person to give examples of how family members help each other. Then ask each person to draw their own picture of the family. When everyone is finished, start with the youngest child and ask each person to tell about his or her picture.

A family banner is a visible picture of the family. To make one, use a large sheet of paper, an old bed sheet or a two-to-three foot piece of shelf paper or brown wrapping paper. Crayons or felt-tip markers can be used for decorating the banner.

Each person draws pictures on the banner of those things that have a special meaning for them as a member of the family. Be spontaneous with the drawing, not worrying about what goes where. When the banner is complete, hang it in a prominent place and ask each person to talk about the pictures he or she drew. Keep the banner for several days so family

members can see and refer to it.

How about a "special family" list? Get everyone together and ask each to contribute to a "listing of characteristics" that makes the family special. A parent can begin by explaining the activity and asking the children to name one thing about the family that is special for them. An older child can be the official "listener" and write the ideas on a sheet of paper. Continue with the list until everyone has shared their ideas—talk about the strengths of the family unit and put the list in a prominent place for a few days so everyone can see it. This list might also be something you'll want to put away for a few years and then pull out again. Be sure and date it!

These days, rapid change affects all Texas families. Young families are especially vulnerable to change because of economic factors, job mobility and lifestyle adjustments. Once a family recognizes the strengths and uniqueness it has, family members can take positive steps toward strengthening the family even more.

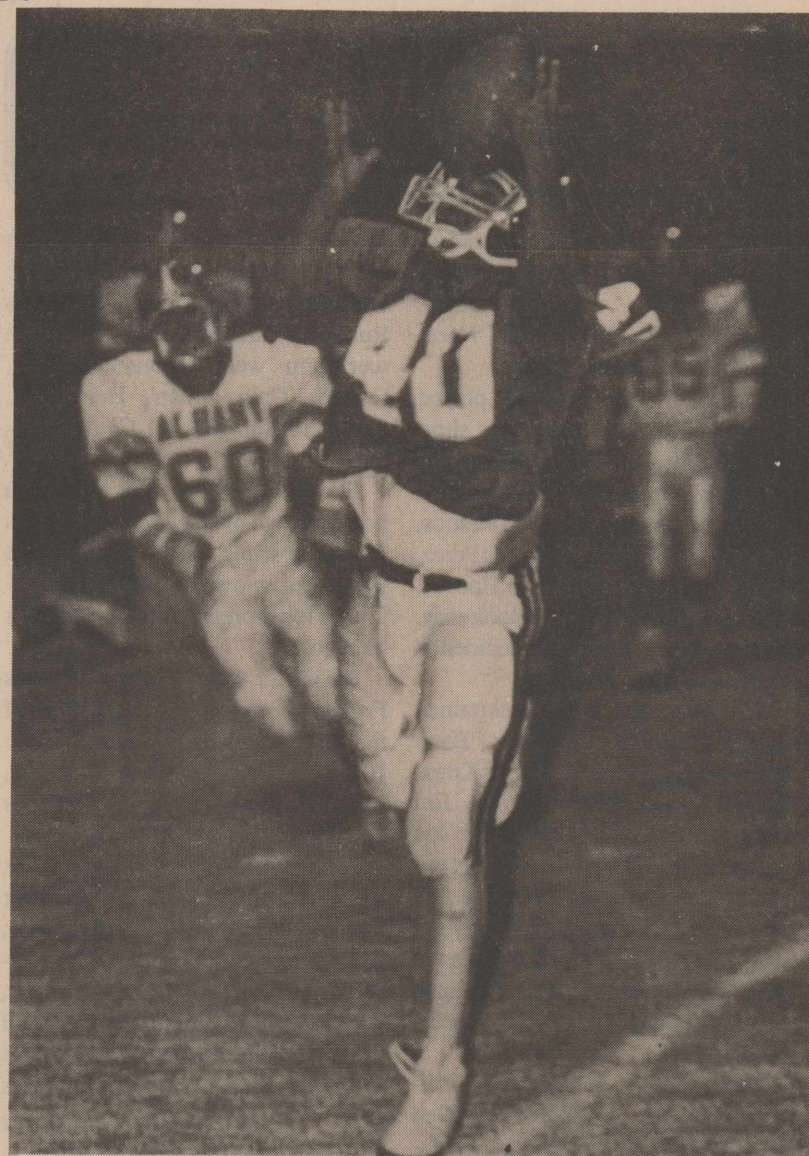
Jr. High book fair set for Dec. 4 - 8

Dry weather prompts drought seminar

MENARD—Area livestock producers are invited to a Drought Management Seminar November 30 at 2:00 p.m. in Menard's Club Victoria. The seminar is being sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dry range conditions continue to plague a large part of the state forcing area ranchers to make key decisions concerning the welfare of their operations. The Drought Seminar is designed to help producers make these timely management decisions by offering a number of proven options.

County Extension Agents from the four counties hosting the program will give current estimates of their drought conditions. The counties and their agents are: Concho, Rex Stultz; Menard, Sam Kuykendall; Schleicher, Jerry Swift; and Tom Green, Rex Jones.

Next, San Angelo based Extension Range Specialist, Dr. Jake Landers will give his views on what to expect from affected range areas if dry conditions continue and what the probabilities are for winter rainfall. Landers continually conducts extensive forage quality tests in several of the driest counties. He will give the current results of this work to demonstrate the value of forage testing to establish proper livestock nutritional needs.

The program will then delve into actual reduction of livestock numbers. Dr. Jerry Cowley, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist at Uvalde will give important points to consider in trimming animal numbers.

Ranchers wishing to maintain livestock levels under current conditions must prepare for heavy supplemental feeding this winter. Speaking on drought nutrition and alternative

feeds will be Dr. Dennis Herd, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist at College Station and Dr. George Ahlschwede, San Angelo based Extension Sheep and Goat Specialist.

Richie Cravens, an Irion County rancher and accountant is scheduled as the day's final speaker. Cravens will speak on drought financial planning. His talk will include tax strategies necessary if large numbers of

livestock must be sold due to drought. 76859 or (915)396-4787.

The afternoon will conclude with a dutch treat supper.

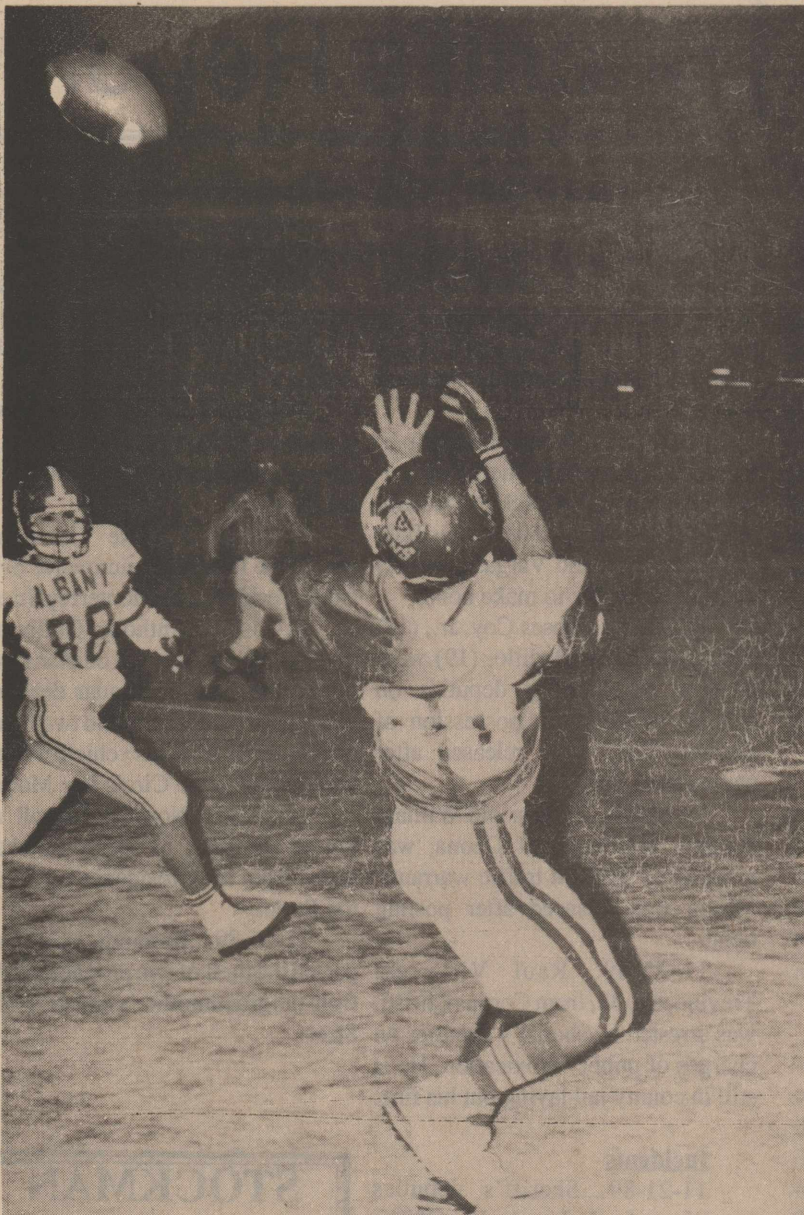

"The girls are still working hard and improving every week," commented Coach Kathy Aldridge.

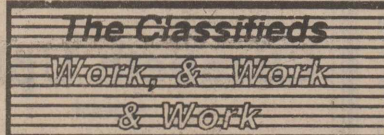
The seventh grade Cubettes took an enormous lead in the first quarter. They managed to hold Eldorado to zero points while they were able to score eight. In the second quarter the

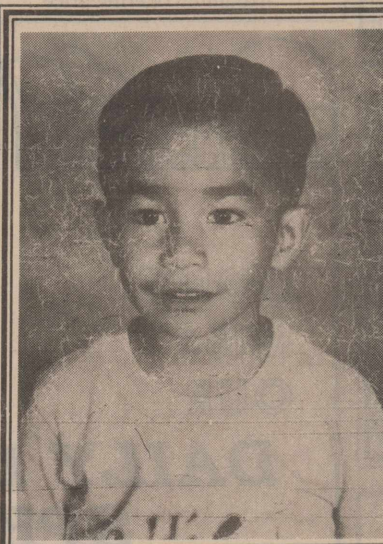




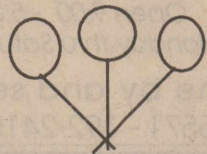

Board adopts state student attendance rules

As a result of the passage of Senate Bill 1112 and Senate Bill 417 by the 71st Texas Legislature, the State Board of Education during its October meeting adopted on emergency basis new rules regarding student attendance. The rules were adopted on an emergency basis in order to allow school boards to adopt their own board rules and to establish procedures for monitoring student attendance earlier in the school year.

The new legislation repealed the five-day unexcused absence rule which said that a student could not receive credit for a class if he/she had more than five days of unexcused absences during a semester and replaced it with the requirement that students must be in attendance at least 80 days during a semester to receive credit for a class; however, credit for a class shall be given if excess absences which cause a student to fall below the 80 day rule are determined to be a result of extenuating circumstances (excused absences) and the student satisfactorily makes up missed classwork.

The new statute directs school districts to: (1) establish guidelines for determining extenuating circumstances; (2) appoint one or more attendance committees to hear petitions for class credit from students with fewer than 80 days of attendance; and (3) adopt policies establishing alternative ways for students to make up work or regain credit lost because of absences due to extenuating circumstances.

To implement this new requirement, the Ozona School Board this month approved new student attendance rules which will be in effect for all students in the local school system this year. These rules are as follows:

CROCKETT COUNTY CONSOLIDATED COMMON SCHOOL DISTRICT STUDENT ATTENDANCE RULES

To receive credit in a class, students must be in attendance for at least 80 days during a semester. Students in attendance for fewer than 80 days in a semester shall not be given credit for the class unless the excess absences are the result of extenuating circumstances.

In grades kindergarten through eight, days of attendance in both semesters shall be combined for credit purposes so that a student shall not be subject to loss of credit for the course or grade level unless he/she has fewer than 160 days of attendance in the school year.

The district shall accept the following, when adequately confirmed, as extenuating circumstances: personal sickness, sickness or death in the immediate family, quarantine, weather or road conditions making travel dangerous, partici-

pation in approved school-sanctioned extracurricular activities, religious holidays, medical or dental appointments, family emergencies or unforeseen or unavoidable instances requiring immediate attention, participation in a substance-abuse rehabilitation program, required appearances in court or in legal proceedings, absences related to being a migrant student, days of suspension (provided that requirements are satisfactorily completed), absences due to being a runaway under Family Code 51.03(3), and approved college visitations.

When returning to school after an absence, a student must bring a note signed by a parent or other person standing in parental relation to the student which describes the reason for the absence. A note signed by the student is not acceptable. The campus principal will determine whether the absence is excused due to extenuating circumstances or unexcused.

The student shall be permitted to make up assignments and/or tests after an excused absence due to extenuating circumstances or an unexcused absence for which make-up work has been approved by the principal prior to the absence. Teachers shall inform their students of the time allotted for completing make-up work after an excused absence due to extenuating circumstances or an unexcused absence for which make-up work has been approved by the principal; however, the student shall be responsible for finding out about the assignments and/or tests and making up the work within the allotted time. Absences that are not excused by law or that are not for approved extracurricular activities shall be designated as unexcused, even if the student has parental permission to be absent. Absence because of suspension shall be unexcused if the student does not make up missed assignments or tests within the allotted time.

A student and his/her parent(s) shall be given written notice by the student's principal when a student's attendance in any class is in danger of falling below 80 days in a semester or 160 days in a school year (grades kindergarten through eight). In the high school, this notice will be given after a student has five absences during a semester. In grades kindergarten through eight, this notice will be given after a student has a total of ten absences in the school year. Another notice will be given when attendance falls below requirements. A student who is in grades kindergarten through five may petition the elementary attendance committee in writing for award of credit at any time attendance drops below attendance requirements. A student who is in grades six

through twelve may petition the secondary attendance committee in writing for award of credit at any time attendance drops below attendance requirements.

The attendance committee shall review the student's attendance record and the reasons for absences and shall determine whether or not to award credit. Absences for which the student has shown extenuating circumstances and has completed satisfactory make-up work shall be considered as fulfilling the required days of attendance; however, if the student has both excused absences and unexcused absences and fewer than the required days of attendance, or if the student has a questionable pattern of excused absences and fewer than the required days of attendance, the committee may require the student to complete additional assignments as specified by the committee, satisfy time-on-task requirements before/after school, attend tutorial sessions, maintain attendance standards for the rest of the semester or year, or fulfill other responsibilities similar to the above as a condition for granting extenuating circumstances credit. In all cases, the student must also earn a passing grade in order to receive credit.

When a student's absence for personal illness exceeds five consecutive days, the student may be required to present a statement from a physician or health clinic verifying the illness or other condition that required the student's extended absence from school. If the student has established a suspicious pattern of absences, the attendance committee may also require a physician's or clinic's statement of illness as a means of determining extenuating circumstances.

The attendance committee's decision to deny credit may be appealed to the Board by submitting a written request to the superintendent that includes the basis for the disagreement with the committee's decision. The Board shall hear appeals as provided at Level Three of policies FNG and FNG(L).

Students with excessive tardies shall be referred to the principal for disciplinary action.

Parents or students who need more information concerning these new rules are urged to contact the campus principals as soon as possible.

Heavy damage resulted to a 1988 Ford Mustang 16 miles west of Ozona Nov. 22 when it overturned at 8:05 a.m.

According to the report of investigating officer Trooper Dale Taylor, driven Misti Lynn Mathews of DeLand, Florida was westbound on I-10 when she fell asleep. The vehicle ran off the road to the left and overturned after the driver awoke and overcorrected. The vehicle came to rest on Hwy. 290.

Although the car was heavily damaged, Mathews wearing a seat belt and was uninjured.

Elizabeth Harrell, a student at Wooster College in Wooster, Ohio, was a holiday guest in the home of her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Harrell.

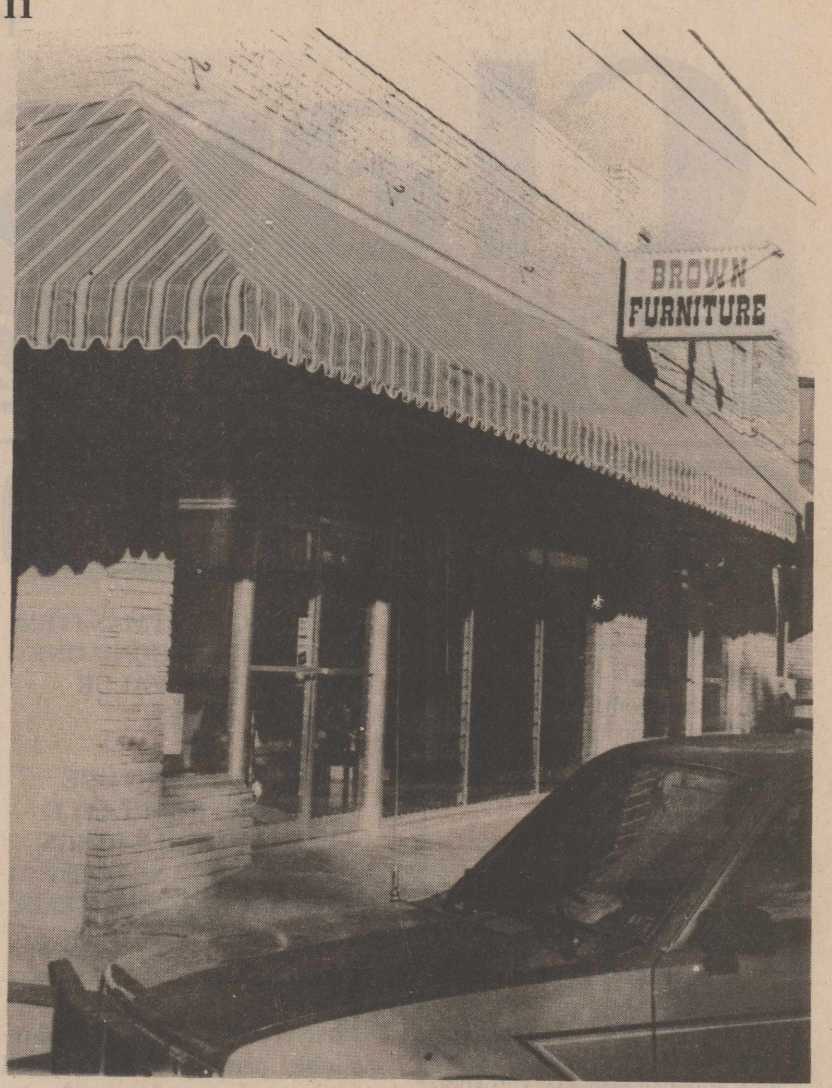
