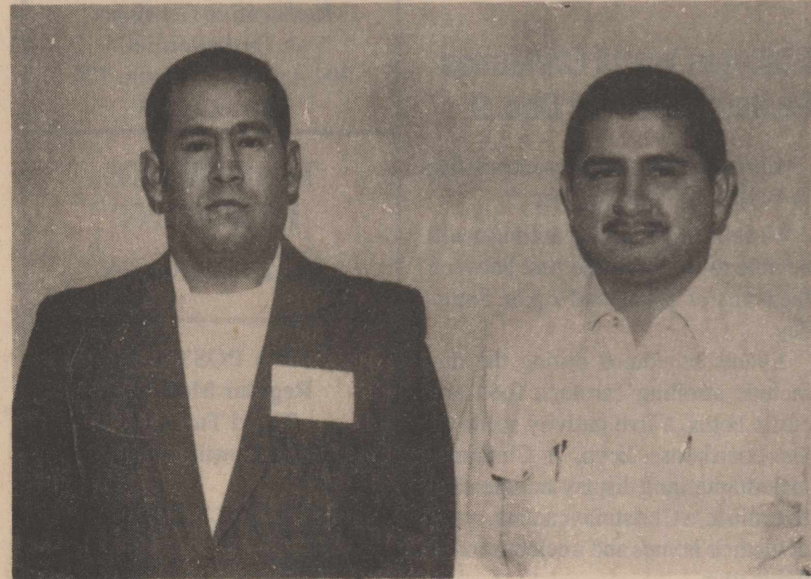
The workshop was co-sponsored by the Texas Association of Counties and the V.G. Young Institute of County Government of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Both the state and federal government are mandating more and more rules and regulations without providing any funds for implementing or conforming to them. This is what is happening with the Environmental Protection Agency and landfills, more red tape for hospitals, and now community correction facilities. I respectfully solicit your continued support in the Democratic March Primary.

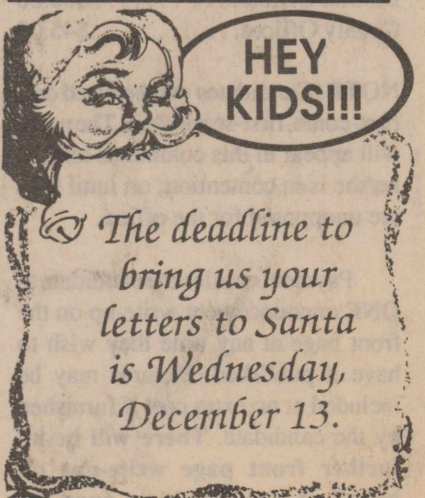

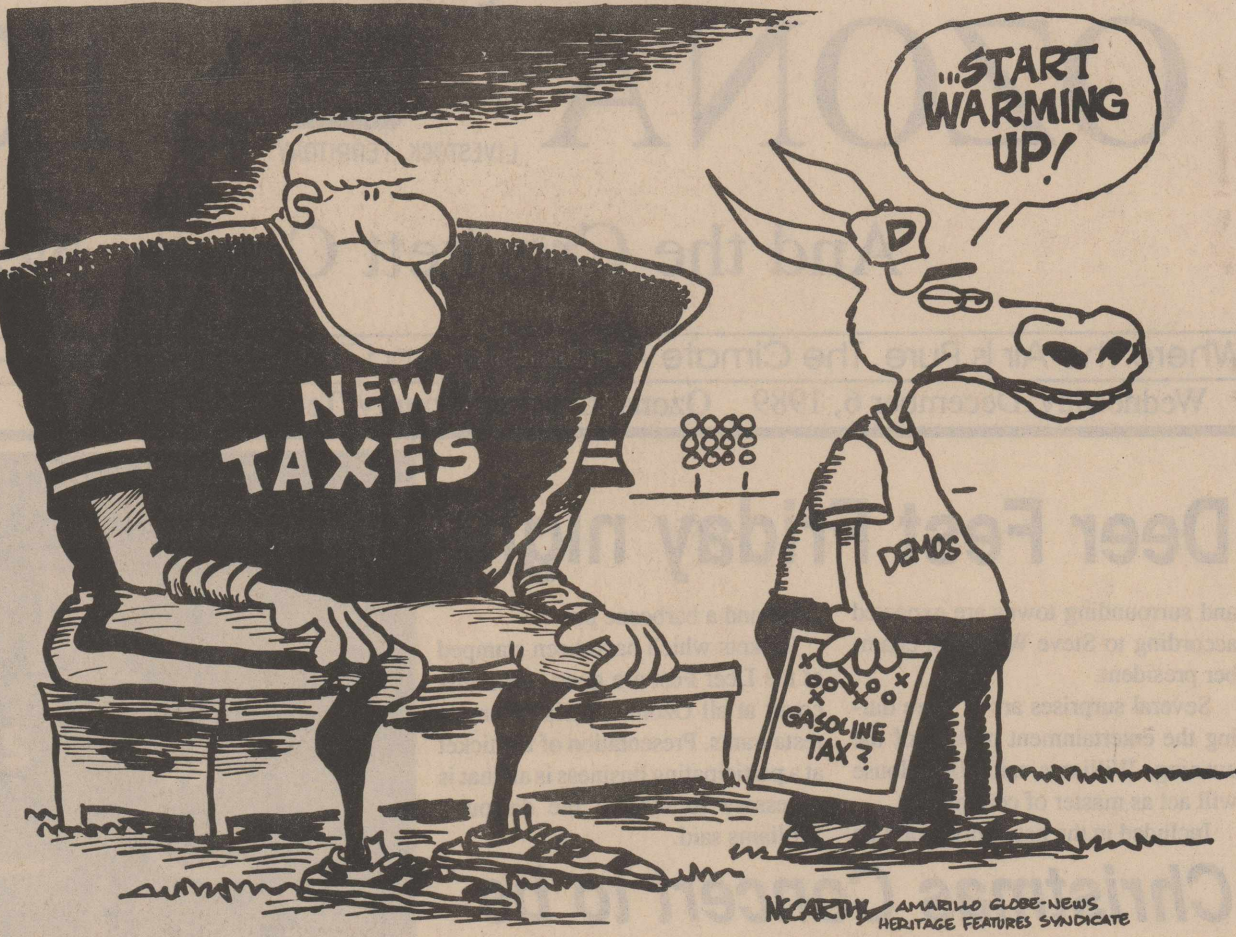

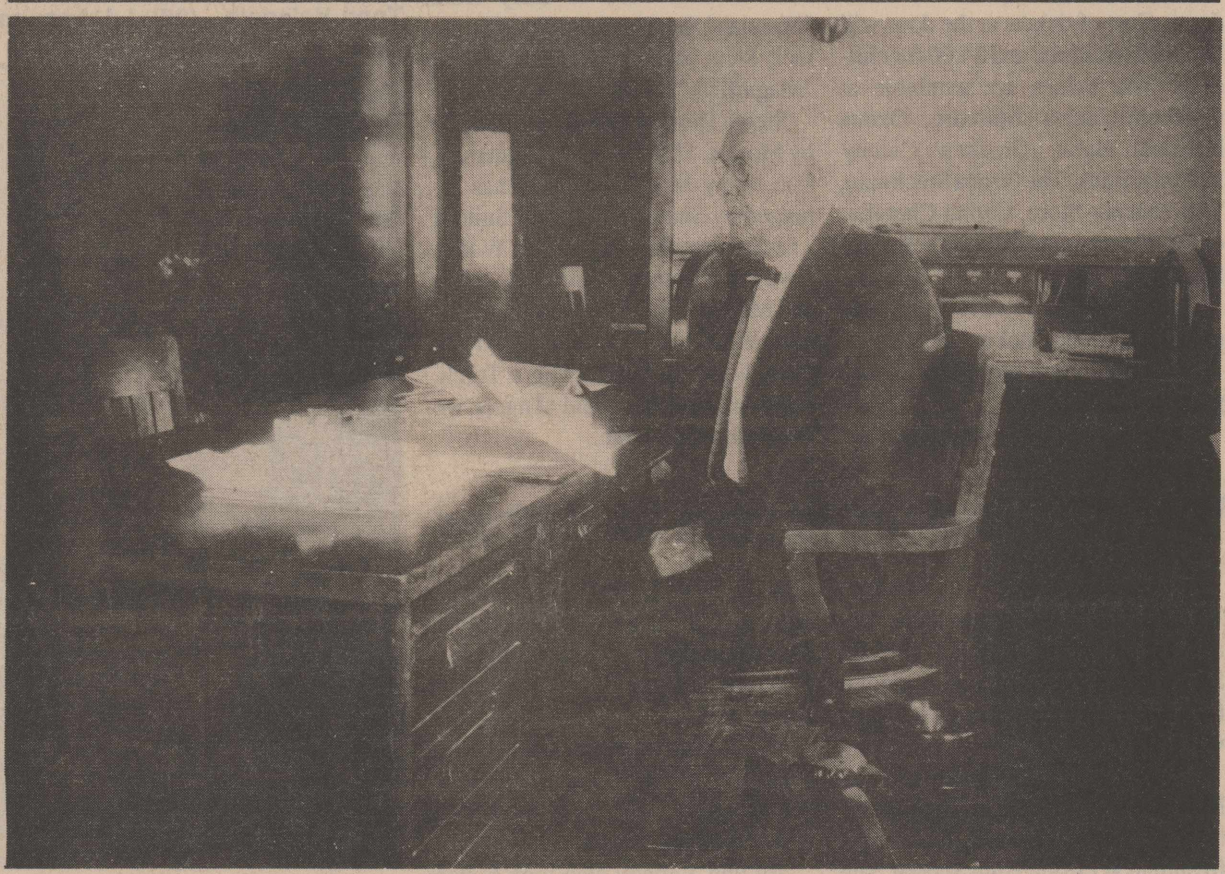

Construction of new Dairy Queen to begin

Work began this week to clear a site for construction of a Dairy Queen in Ozona.

Expected to be completed in early March, the business will seat more than 100 people, said Jane and Wade Richardson. Located on the I-10 north access road between Avenues C and D, the store will have the potential to draw travelers into Ozona, the Richardsons believe.

The grounds include parking space for 50 vehicles and a large playground area. A jungle gym, suspension bridge, three slides, merry-go-round, teeter totters and two picnic tables will fill the playground.

The large trees on the lots will not be removed, Richardson said.

A standard Dairy Queen menu of ice cream products, steak fingers, chicken strips, burgers, tacos, taco salads, fish and chicken sandwiches

will be offered.

At a separate counter, Blizzard lovers will be able to choose from a large selection of additions to the treat. A new product for the weight-conscious, a Breeze, will be similar to the Blizzard but made of frozen yogurt.

Fresh ground coffee will also be featured at the Ozona Dairy Queen.

The Richardsons anticipate hiring 20-30 employees, but no applications will be accepted until about Jan. 1. Key personnel will be trained for one week in a Dairy Queen and will also receive a week of local training before the opening of the shop.

Mrs. Richardson recently completed a two-week management training course at Minneapolis-based International Dairy Queen.

During the course, she and 28 other store operators from the U.S. and Canada received instruction on pro-

duct preparation, sanitation procedures, employee management and financial management.

With more than 5,100 Dairy Queen stores in all 50 states, Canada and 14 other countries, International Dairy Queen is one of the world's largest retailers of fast food and frozen dessert products.

"I was real pleased how well the tournament was managed," said Coach Pool, adding "I would like to thank all those who helped with the tournament and the tremendous support we received from the fans."


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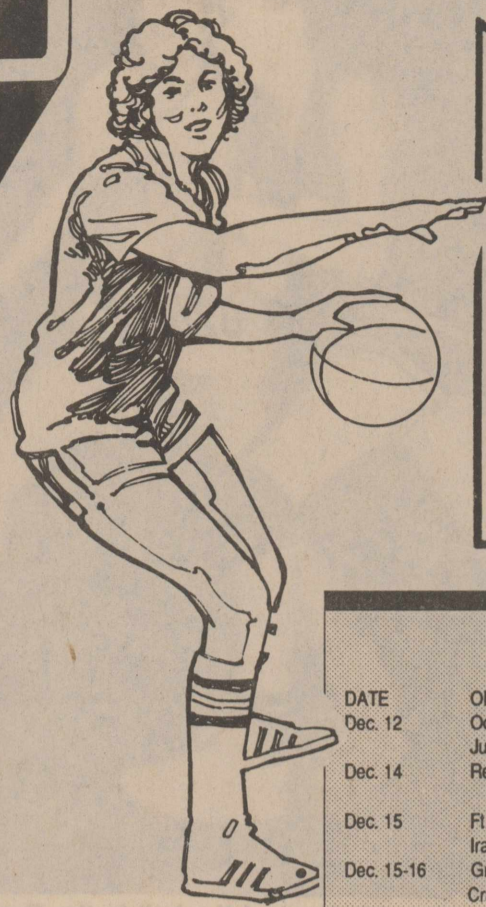
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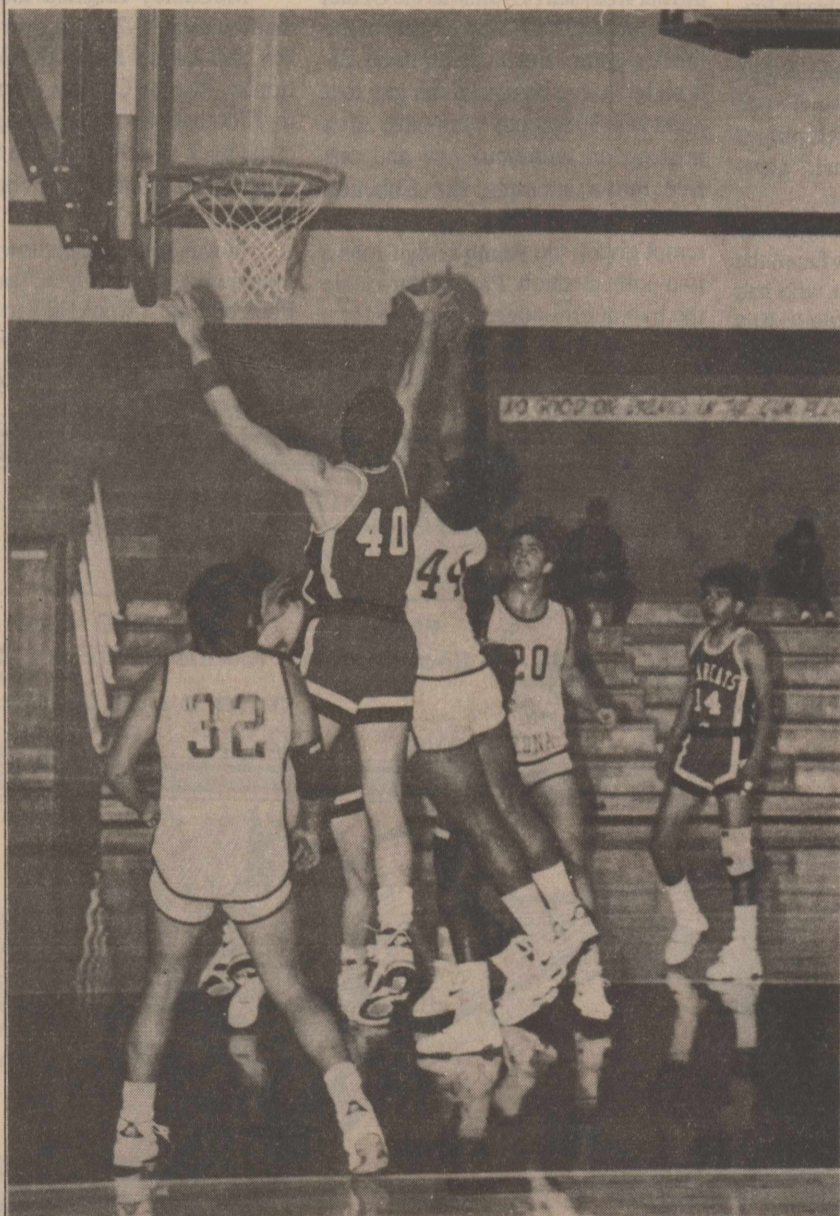
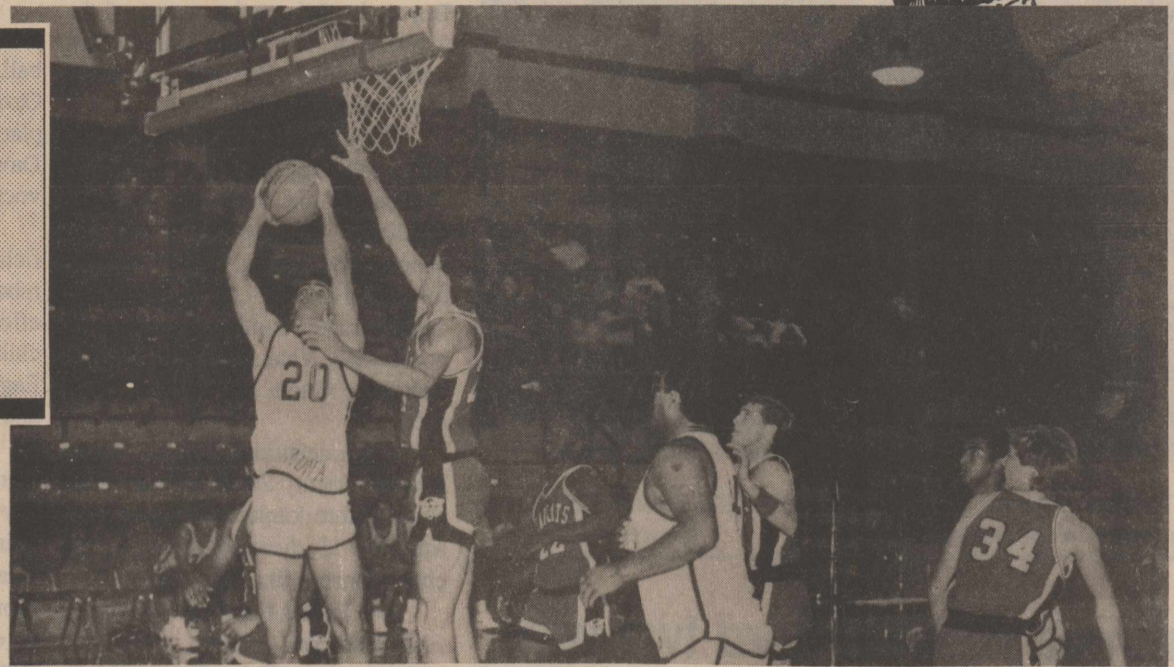

SWTSU ag scholarships offered

Southwest Texas State University established the Department of agriculture in 1947. Since that time, the department has grown substantially and now has about 350 young people enrolled in quality programs in several areas such as agriculture business, agricultural education, agricultural mechanics, horticulture, plant and soil science, animal science, production and management, agricultural journalism, and range management.

Scholarships made possible through the generosity of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and the San Antonio Livestock Exposition are available for qualified students who major in agriculture. The agriculture faculty is interested in students with good records of academic performance who need financial help to continue their education. Other criteria considered by the selection committee include rank in high school graduating class, SAT/ACT scores and

evidence of interest in agriculture as a career.

The number of scholarships awarded each year depends on available financing. Currently the scholarships are awarded in amounts up to \$1500. per year and are paid on a semester basis. Requirements for entering freshmen are a minimum of 18/800 on ACT/SAT and/or in the upper 25% of the class, and three letters of recommendation. Spring funding for returning students requires at least a 2.5 gpa for work attempted for a full time student in the fall semester. The scholarships are awarded for one academic year, and new competition for each new year.

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
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
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Cubs stay undefeated Cubettes win first game

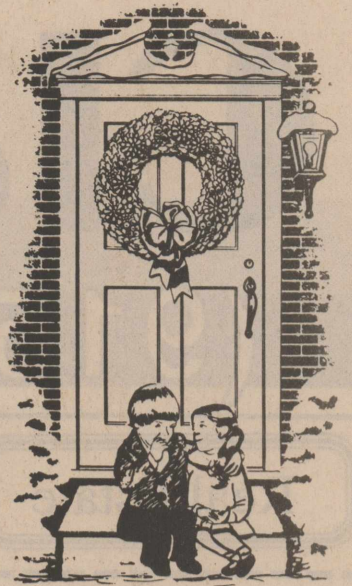

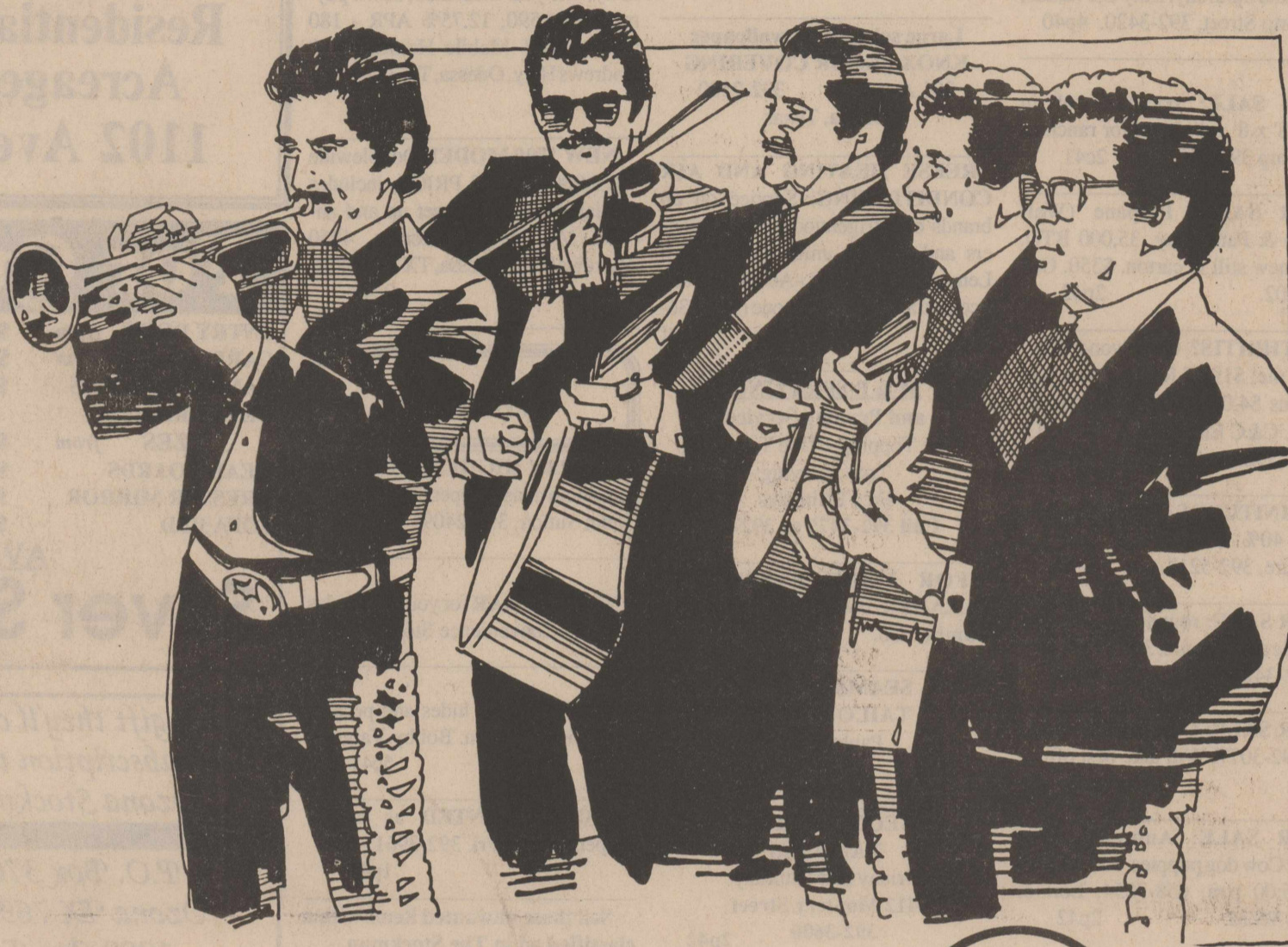

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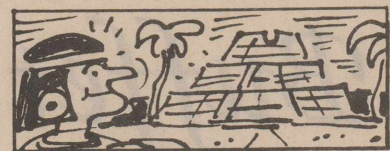
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
