Livestock show Jan. 11-13

The 43rd Annual Crockett County 4-H Livestock Show and Sale will be held Jan. 11-13 at the county show barn. Some 90 4-H members will exhibit some 275 lambs, 60 commercial ewe lambs, 35 angora doe kids, 16 steers and 45 rabbits.

Lambs will be brought into the barn on Wednesday afternoon, Jan. 10, with shearing beginning at 8 a.m. Jan. 11. Commercial ewe lambs and angora goats will move into the barn on Thursday.

Judging begins Thursday evening at 7 p.m. with the steer show. On Friday at 6 p.m. the commercial ewe lambs will be judged followed by the angora doe kids, first year feeders' crossbred lambs and the rabbit show.

Activities on Saturday, Jan. 13, will begin at 8 a.m. with the regular market lamb show. A barbecue lunch will be served at noon by the 4-H Parents and Leaders Association. This group will also have a concession stand on Thursday and Friday afternoons and Saturday. The presentation of awards will be at 1:30 followed by the premium sale at 2 p.m.

Dr. Frank Craddock, Extension sheep and goat specialist from Uvalde, will judge market lambs, commercial

ewe lambs and goats. Dr. Rick Machen, Extension livestock specialist from Fort Stockton, will be the steer judge, and Donnie Laughlin from Ingram will judge lamb showmanship. Brenda Collins from San Angelo will judge the rabbit show.

Man jailed and charged with auto theft, burglary

A California resident was arrested in Crockett County Dec. 27 on charges of auto theft and burglary in California.

Paul George McCool, age 23, was arrested after sheriff's deputies became suspicious of his vehicle.

Found during the arrest was more than \$9,000 in cash, some of which is believed to be counterfeit. The United States Secret Service is assisting with the investigation of the money.

Ramon Lucero Aleman, age 27, of El Paso, was arrested by THP Dec. 26 on charges of driving while intoxicated and possession of marijuana. He is still in county jail unable to make bond.

On Dec. 28 Jesus Sinfuentes Borrego, age 44, of Ozona was arrested by sheriff's deputies on charges of public intoxication. Mr. Borrego was released Dec. 30 after paying his fine.

Adam Salazar Alba, age 58, of Ozona was arrested Dec. 28 by THP on charges of public intoxication. He was released the next day after paying his fine.

Arkansas resident George Henry Moran Jr., age 25, was arrested Dec. 30 by sheriff's deputies and THP on

charges of driving while intoxicated and possession of a controlled substance. He is still in county jail in lieu of bond. The drug case will be referred to a Crockett County grand jury.

Juan Pena Borrego, age 35, of Ozona was arrested by sheriff's deputies on charges of public intoxication and reckless conduct. Mr. Borrego was charged after he was seen shooting his pistol in front of the Parish Hall as a New Year's dance was breaking up. The case will be referred to the county attorney for prosecution.

Crockett County Sheriff's Department received a theft report Dec. 29 from Strickland & Knight, Inc. The Big Spring construction company reported the theft of lumber from a construction site on Hwy. 349 in the northwestern part of Crockett County.

Sheriff's deputies investigated the report of a broken window at the Miller residence on Ave. C Dec. 30. There was no sign that the house had been entered.

I-10 accident injures three



Crosswinds were a major factor in a motor vehicle accident in Crockett County Jan. 1 according to DPS Trooper Dale Burger.

Burger was the officer investigating a 12:10 p.m. accident 13 miles west of Ozona on Interstate 10.

Ki Jeong Seok Chi was the driver of a westbound 1989 Hyundai which veered across the median, the east-bound lanes and bar ditch before striking a rock embankment.

Mrs. Chi, 27, was injured, and her husband, Heon Cheol Chi, 31, reportedly received serious injuries in the accident. Their infant child, Chang, had possible injuries.

The family was treated at Crockett County Hospital before being transferred to a San Angelo hospital.

Three reports of the accident, all at different mile markers, were received by the DPS.

Two occupants of a 1987 Ford pickup were relatively uninjured, but the truck received heavy damage in a Dec. 29 accident in Crockett County.

Edward Eugene Meuth of Boling was driver of the vehicle involved in the 5:35 p.m. accident 30 miles west of Ozona. An accident report filed by DPS Trooper Richard Barton indicated that the driver looked into the floorboard, drifted into the median and went into a broadside slide after overcorrecting, causing the pickup to overturn 1 1/2 times.

The driver and a passenger, Sonia Choate of Fort Ord, CA were taken by

EMS ambulance to Crockett County Hospital for treatment.

Lost during the accident was a small dog which was thrown from the pickup. Anyone with knowledge of

Roylan Sullivan announces her candidacy for justice of the peace subject to the March 13, 1990, Democratic Primary.

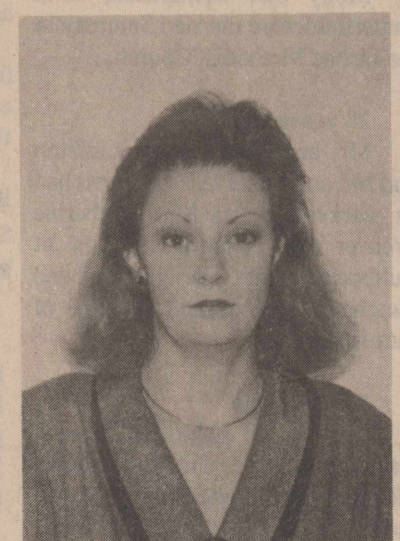
Sullivan, a nine-year resident of Crockett County, lives in Ozona with her husband, Jason, and two children, Shelly, age 11, and Brad, age 9.

Guest speaker for the 26th annual awards banquet is humorist Frank Minton of Crockett in East Texas.

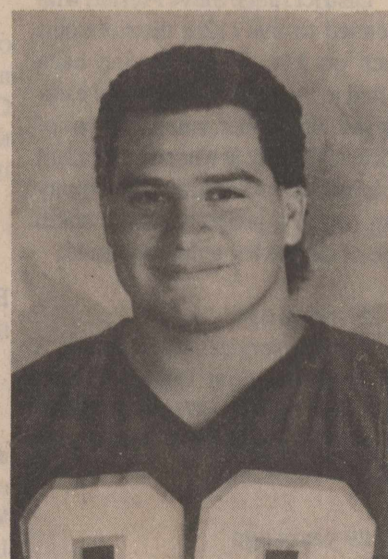
Minton is a professional speaker who has worn many hats. As coach,

Three Lions selected for daily paper All-West Texas Team



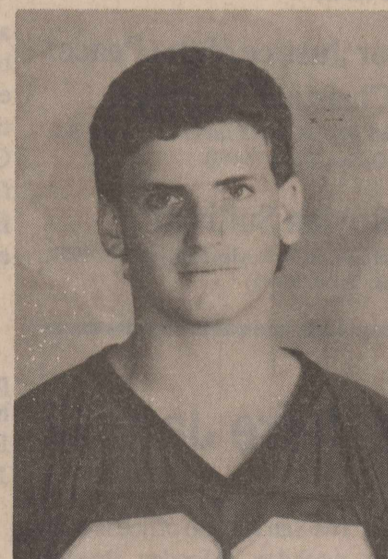

Pete Ramirez was a key offensive player during the 1989 football

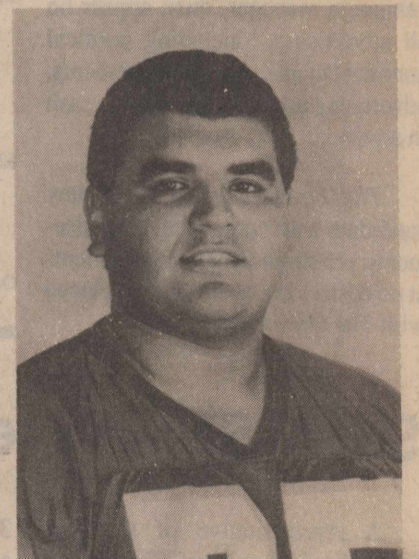

this year. He earned his 1989 All-West Texas selection with over 75 tackles and three recovered fumbles.

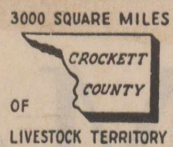

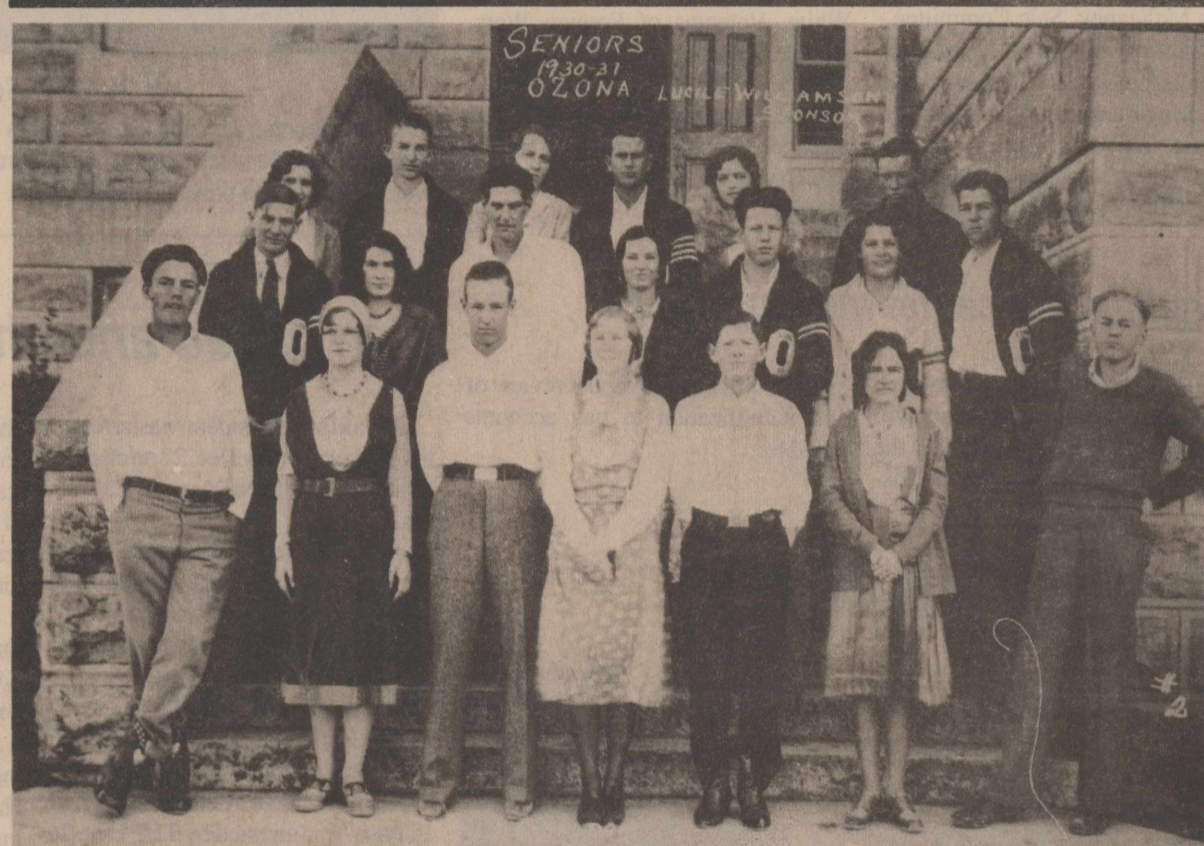

The mobile breast cancer detec-
tion unit of Odessa which services
Ozona has received the certification
of the American College of Radiol-
ogy Mammography Accreditation
Program.

Mammography is an x-ray exami-
nation of the breast, which the
American Cancer Society and other
medical experts see as the best means
for the early detection of breast can-
cer.

The program is voluntary and is
designed to ensure that women re-
ceive optimum quality mammogra-
phy examinations. The process is done
through a peer review evaluation of
the facility's staff qualifications,
equipment, quality control and qual-
ity assurance programs, image qual-
ity and breast dose. The accreditation
must be renewed every three years.

The accreditation program was
instituted because of the concerns of
radiologists, other national medical
organizations, and the public that
qualified personnel perform and inter-
pret mammograms and that dedicated
mammographic equipment be used.
The American College of Radiology
received an American Cancer Society
Control Grant which was used to pilot

test the Accreditation Program.

Breast cancer will strike one in
10 American women. The American
Cancer Society predicts that about
41,000 women will die of breast can-
cer this year. As there is no way to
prevent the disease, early detection
and treatment offer the greatest hope
for survival.

The American Cancer Society
recommends that women do monthly
breast self-exams and have regular
physical breast exams by a doctor. It
further recommends mammography
on the following schedule;

A baseline mammogram for ref-
erence between age 35 and 39.

A mammogram every one or two
years between age 40 and 49.

An annual mammogram from age

50.

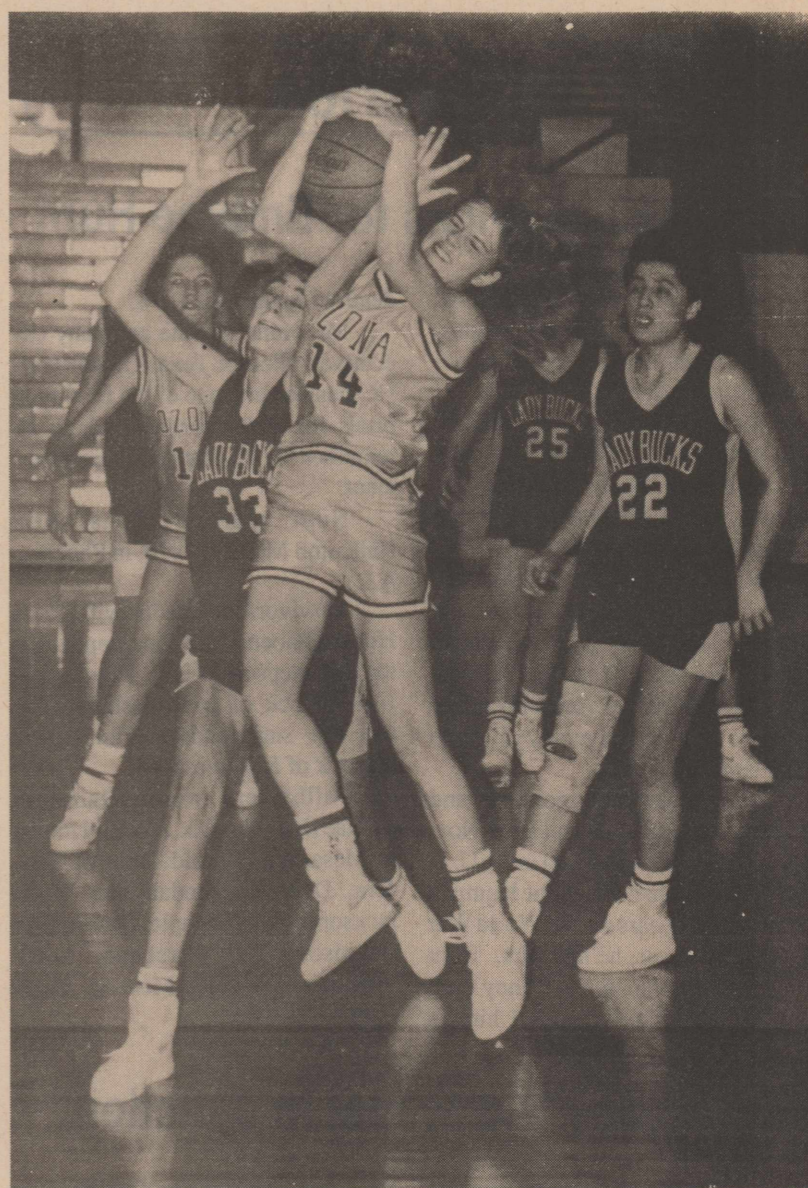
In the third period, the young Lions racked up 14 points and held their opponents to four. In the last period the Lions scored 16 more points while Coahoma scored six.

Cold viruses fought successfully with home remedies

In these days of high-tech medicine, home remedies may remain the best way to treat viral colds and sore throat infections, says the Texas Medical Association.

No medicines can kill the more than 200 cold-causing viruses, and people who plead with their doctors for antibiotics may be doing themselves more harm than good, says Dr. Earl B. Matthew, director of medical services and education for the Central Texas Medical Foundation in Austin and Texas Medical Association member.

"The throat is an ecosystem - like a forest with plants, animals, insects, and other things," he said. "When you destroy one thing, you upset the balance."

Antibiotics can disrupt that balance. A typical sign of a body's imbalance is diarrhea. If taken too frequently, antibiotics can lead to resistant strains of bacteria, leaving the patient open to more infections and complications, including pneumonia.

To combat colds and sore throats, Dr. Matthew advises sufferers to use over-the-counter decongestants and cough remedies to gain relief from symptoms and to rely on home remedies, such as gargling with salt water and eating chicken soup.

If a cold or sore throat persists after five to seven days, the patient may have a secondary infection and needs medical attention, he said. Additional symptoms may include a greenish-yellow or blood-streaked nasal discharge, ear pain, fever, or labored breathing.

Prevention, short of quarantine, is impossible because colds are spread through the air and contact with people. However, people who catch several colds during a season and parents with small children should take special precautions.

Frequent hand washing is important because recent research has shown that certain viruses can live up to three hours on the skin and on surfaces such as plastic and metal. Touching a contaminated surface and then rubbing one's eyes or nose can lead to an infection.

Staying away from smokers is another important, often overlooked,

precaution. "Smoking paralyzes the natural cleansing mechanisms of the sinuses," Dr. Matthew said.

Studies have shown that children of smokers are more prone to develop colds, bronchitis, and pneumonia (especially during the first two years of life), chronic coughs, ear infections and reduced lung function, in addition to lung cancer.

The Texas Medical Association is a professional organization of more than 29,000 physician and medical student members. It is based in Austin and has 116 component medical societies in the state. The Association represents 80 percent of the state's physicians, and its goal is to improve the health of Texans through the professional and personal development of members.

AUSTIN - Promising a patriotic, upbeat campaign that should "capture the attention of Texans," secretary of State George S. Bayoud Jr. has announced the kick-off of Vote '90 - the state's 1990 election year voter registration/education drive.

"We hope this campaign will make Texans stand up, take notice and feel proud about their state," said Bayoud, Texas' chief elections officer.

"Our aim is to remind every one how important it is to participate in the democratic process by voting," Bayoud said. "We are directing our message at those people who for too long have been standing on the sidelines watching."

In a major, related announcement, Bayoud said, the award-winning, nationally recognized advertising agency, GSD&M of Austin, has agreed to donate its creative talent to help in the Vote '90 effort.

GSD&M has helped develop the campaign's slogan and theme, "Vote 90. Every One Matters," Bayoud said.

The main goals of Vote '90, Bayoud said, are to register new voters and increase turnout. Of the state's eligible voters, about 8.2 million or 66 percent are registered. Nationally, about 68 percent of eligible voters are registered.

Texas voters in 1990 will elect a U.S. senator, governor, lieutenant governor and hundreds of other statewide and local officeholders. The Democratic and Republican party primary elections are March 13, while the general election is Nov. 6.

Historically in Texas, voter registration and turnout rates in gubernatorial election years drop from the previous presidential election year.

In 1986 - the last time Texans elected a governor - only 47 percent of those who were registered turned out at the polls in the general election. In Texas' 1986 primary elections, a 21 percent turnout rate was recorded. Of the state's 11.8 million eligible voters in 1986, about 7.3 million, or 62 percent, were registered.

The 1986 numbers were down from the 1984 presidential election year. In 1984, 68 percent of those Texans who were registered turned out at the polls in the general election. In the 1984 primaries, the turnout rate was 26 percent. Of the state's 11.4 million eligible voters in 1984, 7.9 million, or 69 percent, were registered.

In 1988, a 36 percent turnout rate was recorded in the primaries with a 66 percent turnout in the general election. Sixty-seven percent, or 8.2 million, of the state's 12.2 million eligible voters were registered in 1988.

In August of even-numbered years, usually about 10 percent of the total number of Texas' registered voters are purged, or removed, from the registration rolls because they have moved and failed to notify their local voter registrar of their new address.

"My goal is to try and keep place with the 1988 presidential election year numbers," Bayoud said. "I want to put a halt to the historical trend of fewer registered voters and smaller turnouts in gubernatorial election years. I think we can do much, much better in 1990."

Bayoud said the Vote '90 campaign initially will promote voter registration for the March 13 primary elections. The deadline for Texans to register to vote in that election is Feb. 11. To obtain a voter registration application, call the tax office or the Secretary of State's office at 1-800-252-VOTE (8683).

Prescribed burning - a tool for managing rangelands

Prescribed burning has become a very important management tool for many ranchers. Unlike wildfires, prescribed burns are carried out under controlled conditions just prior to the growing season. When properly carried out, these controlled burns can accomplish many objectives. Increased forage yields and utilization of coarse grasses such as tobosa, increased forage availability, removal of dead woody material, improvement of wildlife habitat and control of pricklypear and other cactus species are some of the benefits obtained from prescribed burns.

Pricklypear can be effectively controlled by a prescribed burn during the winter if an adequate amount of dry fuel exists in order to maintain a good hot fire. By following the burn with 1/8 lb/ac of picloram along in April, 80-100% control may be expected.

In order to properly carry out a burn, several factors need to be considered. The air temperature should be 50-70 degrees, relative humidity 30-50% and wind speed at 8-15 mph. Prescribed burns should not be conducted when the temperature is above 80 degrees, wind speed is greater than 20 mph or relative humidity is less than 20 percent.

Prior to carrying out a burn, a management plan should be developed. Firebreaks and fireguards should be installed in proper locations. At least 2000 lbs of uniform dry forage is needed to carry the fire and achieve good results. Experienced personnel should always be present to provide assistance and insure that the burn is carried out properly.

Following a burn, adequate rest is needed to allow the grass to recover. The length of rest period varies depending upon the plant species

present in the pastures.

With increased cost of conventional management practices and concern about environmental quality, the use of prescribed burning has increased. It is a low cost tool ranchers can utilize to accomplish many objectives. Proper planning is the most essential item to consider when carrying out a prescribed burn.

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Baker Jewelers closes doors

The final days of 1989 brought with them the end of an Ozona tradition, Baker Jewelers. The store closed Saturday, ending a two-month, \$400,000 going out of business sale.

Formerly Carruthers Jewelry, the store was purchased by M.S. "Smitty" Baker in 1960 from the late Louise Carruthers. Baker, now retired and living in Mertzson, began a chain of jewelry stores with the purchase of a shop in Marfa in 1947 after obtaining a business administration degree at the University of Texas in Austin. While there he met Nancy Rawls, a member of a pioneer Presidio County ranching family who was to become his wife.

After establishing the Marfa store, Baker later bought a store in Eagle Pass. This store was sold in recent years following the retirement of the manager.

Addition of Ozona to Baker's chain necessitated finding a manager, and the jeweler had just the man in his Marfa store, Milton E. "Nick" Nicholas and his family moved to Ozona April 1, 1960, where he became Baker Jewelers to the majority of the store's patrons.

Nicholas, employed in the Marfa store since 1952 as watchmaker-jeweler, received his training in Dallas on the G. I. Bill during the years of 1948-51.

"It was almost inevitable that he would become a jeweler," said Nick's wife Joan. "As a child he was always tinkering with the family's clocks."

The Lincoln, NB native joined the National Guard after high school. Within a year he was called to active service with the 134th Infantry Regiment, 35th Division.

Pearl Harbor came a year later. Nicholas saw service in five European theaters of war.

He met his wife, Joan Donkin, on the south coast of England in 1944, and they were married in Shrewsbury in June of 1945. After his discharge in October of 1945, he was advised to move to a warm climate. Nicholas chose Dallas where his wife joined him in 1946.

The Nicholases have two daughters, Ruthella Jane born in Dallas and Jennifer Ann born in Marfa. They have three grandsons, Nick Dacy, presently attending Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls, Douglas and Bryce Newton, ages six and two respectively, living with their parents, Jennifer and Rick Newton in Brownwood. Another grandchild, Carrie Ann, died in Eldorado in 1976 at age 5.

Ruthella and her husband, Kenneth Minatra live at Rough Canyon on Lake Amistad.

Baker Jewelers has had two Ozona locations. Until 1965, the store was situated south of Highway 290 next to what was the U. S. Post Office. In 1965, Mr. Baker purchased the former Aikman Drug Building where the store has been located since.

Nick, who was unable to be at the

store on its final day due to a bout with pneumonia, speaks highly of present and former employees.

"No one could be luckier or more fortunate than I have been in having such excellent and loyal employees over the years." Some of the long-term associates about whom he cannot say enough are Eva Hernandez, the late Mildred Goodson, Eloise Ramos, Betty Allen, and current employees Carmen Ramos and Elena Ybarra. During the two-month sale he was also ably assisted by temporary help who have been invaluable.

"And I had the best boss in the world," said Nicholas of store owner Smitty Baker.

"The people of Ozona have been very supportive, and we have seen countless happy brides make their selections. We are most appreciative of our long and happy association and friendship with the people of this county. Of course, the down-turn in the economy hurt us as it did everyone."

During the past weeks Nick has been asked many times whether he will still be available to do jewelry work. The answer is "yes" and "no". He does plan to do jewelry, clock repair (no watches), refinishing of old clock cases, and will have his machine to engrave plaques. It will be a few months before he begins to do any of this. He just wants to rest, get his health back together, and take care of some "honey-do's" at the house first. He hopes people will respect his wishes. He will let it be known when he is ready to begin.

Ag census shows farm decline

The 1987 Census of Agriculture, in a report released last month, shows that the United States had 2,087,759 farms in 1987, a decline of seven percent from 1982. The number with sales of \$10,000 or more totaled 1,059,573, or 51 percent of the farms. Between the 1982 and 1987 censuses, the number of farms with sales of \$10,000 or more also declined seven percent. The Census Bureau defines a farm as any place which sold or normally would have sold \$1,000 or more of agricultural products during the census year.

The 1987 census shows that the U. S. agricultural sales totaled \$136 billion. Farms with sales of \$10,000 or more accounted for \$132.6 billion of the sales. Livestock, poultry, and their products accounted for \$77 billion or 57 percent of 1987 sales. Crops, including nursery and greenhouse products, accounted for \$59 billion or 43 percent.

Some 295,721 farms (14 percent) had sales of \$100,000 or more, ac-

counting for 76 percent of total agricultural sales. About 10 percent had sales of \$50,000 to \$99,999, while 11 percent had sales of \$25,000 to \$49,999, 16 percent had sales of \$10,000 to \$24,999, and 49 percent had sales of less than \$10,000.

Production expenditures for the country's agricultural operations came to \$108 billion. Agricultural operators spent 13 percent less for commercial fertilizers, 10 percent more for agricultural chemicals, and 29 percent more for hired farm labor than they did in 1982. They spent three percent more for livestock and poultry feed.

Rainfall decline continues

Rainfall records kept by Crockett County Water Control Improvement District No. 1 show a continued decrease in precipitation during 1989. Total rainfall for the period was 13.42 inches compared to 17.17 in 1988.

The 1988 amount was down markedly from 23.76 inches in 1987 and 27.75 in 1986.

Annual precipitation average for the county over many years is about 18 inches.

February was the month of greatest rainfall in 1989 with 3.64 inches recorded.

April, July and December recorded only .10 each followed by June with a .49 inch total. Rainfall in Nov. amounted to .58 while January re-

corded .60 inches.

The amount of precipitation in August was .92. March recorded 1.26 inches, with 1.45 in May and 1.66 in September.

The 1988 totals were: Jan. .00; Feb. .13; March .00; April .29; May 1.94; June 2.45; July 3.69, Aug. .62; Sept. 6.15; Oct. .00; Nov. .00; Dec. .70.

Totals for 1987 were: Jan. .60; Feb. 2.25; March 1.37; April 1.77; May 4.81; June 2.71; July .25; Aug. 5.72; Sept. 2.20; Oct. .41; Nov. .27; and Dec. 1.40.

In 1986, totals were: Jan. .00; Feb. .50; March .47; April .59; May 2.75; June 3.41; July .31; Aug. 5.29; Sept. .38; Oct. 6.91; Nov. 3.70 and Dec. 2.62.
