County 4-H Stockshow draws 87 exhibitors

The 43rd Annual Crockett County 4-H Livestock Show and Sale was held last week at the County Show Barn with 87 members of the 4-H Club exhibiting 262 lambs, 52 commercial ewe lambs, 50 Angora doe kids, 15 steers and 34 rabbits.

A large crowd was on hand for the show, barbecue and sale. The number of youth participating and number of animals was up significantly over last year. Much of the gain was due to the addition of the 4-H rabbit program which Janet Wilson coordinates.

Leigh Chandler exhibited both the champion finewool and reserve champion finewool lambs. The lambs were bred by Chandler Brothers. Leigh received \$1,000 for her champion from Ozona National Bank and a buckle from Ozona Wool and Mohair Co. and House Fuel Co. She also won reserve champion Junior High Showman and received a buckle from Federal Land Bank.

The champion finewool cross lamb and the champion Angora doe kid were exhibited by JoLynn Vannoy. The lamb was bred by Wade Richardson, and the doe kid was bred by Childress and Vannoy. JoLynn received \$1,000 from the Crockett County National Bank and a buckle from Ozona National Bank for her lamb. She also received a buckle from Bob Childress for her doe kid.

The Third Annual Ozona High School Invitational Literary Meet is to be held on Saturday, Jan. 20, at the Ozona High School. Registration of schools will begin at 8 a.m. with events beginning at 9 a.m.

The 29 schools expected to attend are: Alpine, Ballinger, Brady, Coahoma, Colorado City, Crane, Del Rio, Eden, Eldorado, Fort Stockton, Iraan, Irion County, Junction, McCamey, Miles, Pecos, Presidio, Rankin, Reagan County, Robert Lee, Rocksprings, Sanderson, Sonora, Star, Van Horn, Stanton, Wall, Water Valley and Nueces Canyon.

Events scheduled include: prose and poetry reading, informative and persuasive speaking, LD debate, CX debate, ready writing, number sense, news, feature, editorial and headline writing, science, calculator, typewriting, spelling, accounting and literary criticism.

Ozona students will be competing in all events except speaking events, which they will help run. Speaking event judges for debate, extemporaneous speaking, prose and poetry are still needed, as are timekeepers. There will be a hospitality room for sponsors and a concession stand in cooperation with home economics.

Lisa Herring exhibited the reserve champion doe kid. She received a buckle from Ozona VFW. Her goats were bred by Bob Childress.

Stefny Sutton won the goat showmanship and champion junior high showmanship. She received buckles from Crystelle Childress and Wade and Jane Richardson.

In the elementary showmanship division, Tres Bailey won champion and received a buckle from Shawn and Gary Buck Mitchell. Justin Glasscock won reserve showman and received a buckle from Pon Seahorn.

Melissa Emery won the first year feeder award and received a buckle from Wool Growers Central Storage.

In the commercial ewe lamb show, Michael Mitchell exhibited the first place pair of ewe lambs in the fleece. His lambs were bred by Gary Buck

Mitchell, and he received a trophy from Nathan's Jewelers. The ewe lamb competition will be completed on Monday, July 22, when they will be shorn, and the fleeces and ewe lambs will be judged and scored. At this time there will be an educational meeting from youth and producers.

The rabbit show was a big success. This was the first year to include it into the livestock show. The trophies were all donated by Nathan's Jewelers.

Matthew Marshall exhibited the champion commercial rabbit and won the champion rabbit showmanship. His rabbit was a New Zealand. Slate Williams won reserve champion with a New Zealand, also.

In the Fancy Division, Martha Mayfield exhibited the champion, and Jason Hignight exhibited the reserve champion. Both of these rabbits were Mini Lops.

Brent Morris won the reserve rabbit showmanship trophy.

The premium sale and Chinese auction went well. A complete list of buyers and donors will appear in a later issue.

Dr. Frank Craddock, Extension sheep and goat specialist from Uvalde, judged market lambs, commercial ewe lambs and Angora doe kids. Dr. Rick Machen, Extension livestock specialist from Fort Stockton, judged the market steers. Brenda Collins from San Angelo judged the rabbits. Donnie Laughlin from Ingram judged lamb showmanship and was the auctioneer.

Fire Department releases annual report

Ozona Volunteer Fire Department members responded to a total of 117 incidents during 1989 ranging from 22 structure fires to one call to an aircraft.

A report prepared by Fire Chief Bob Falkner listed 16 in-town grass fires and 36 grass fires in the county. The department gave mutual aid to other counties 10 times and responded to eight vehicle fires.

Two calls were received for fires which were not located. The department had four oil field related calls, and responded to one hazardous materials call. Five motor vehicle accidents and six public service runs completed the list.

Hours on the equipment used during the year were 448.30. Man hours amounted to 1,895.38, and 57,505 gallons of water were used.

Inter department training and training received by attending the Texas A&M Fire School and San Angelo Fire Conference amounted to 298 hours for department members.

Additional students needed for free English classes

Ozona residents and other individuals who live in the vicinity of Ozona are reminded that the local school district is sponsoring a free English-as-a-Second Language (ESL/Amnesty) class for adults who need help in learning to speak, read, or understand English or who need to obtain their permanent residence through participation in the federal amnesty program.

The ESL/amnesty class is funded through the San Angelo Adult Basic Education Cooperative, of which the local school system is a member. The class is being held each Monday and Tuesday evenings from 6 p.m. until 8:30 p.m. in Room 215 in the Ozona Heritage Building and is taught by Mr. Thomas DeHoyos.

In order to continue to operate and be eligible for federal funding, the class needs to have an average attendance of 10 individuals each evening, and at this time, attendance has declined to such an extent that it is in danger of closing unless additional participants are found.

Board votes to purchase band uniforms

Members of the Ozona School Board, meeting in its regular monthly session on Wednesday, January 10, approved the employment of Shelia Rice Hemphill as computer science teacher in Ozona High School. Mrs. Hemphill received her Bachelor of Science degree in computer science, physics, and physical science from Angelo State University in 1984 and has been employed by A.S.U. as an assistant instructor in computer science for the past four years. She will take the place of Lane Scott, who resigned recently to accept a computer technology position with the Texas Education Agency in Austin.

Mr. Kelly Glaze, Ozona High School band director, and Mr. Dick Jacks, representative for Sol Frank Uniform Company, met with the trustees to discuss and display new band uniforms for board review and consideration. During this meeting, Mr. Glaze told the members that the band's present uniforms were 10 years old and were beginning to deteriorate to such a degree that replacement was rapidly becoming a necessity, and with a projected increase of approximately 35 additional students in the band next year, new uniforms to supplement the old uniforms would, at a minimum, have to be purchased for these students.

Mr. Jacks displayed a sample of a new traditional West Point-style uniform which many high school bands presently use, and Glaze presented a purple and gold design which could be used on the new uniforms.

Following board discussion concerning the uniform issue, the members voted to receive bids for new band uniforms at its February meeting.

The remainder of the meeting was spent reviewing 1990-91 school calendar options which will be finalized during the February meeting and electing school district representatives to the Crockett County Tax Appraisal Board. Board members David Bean and Gary Buck Mitchell and Crockett County Tax Assessor-Collector Tommy Stokes were selected as the school district representatives.

"I am truly interested in the youth and their activities as well as the welfare and advancement of all the citizens of Ozona and Crockett County.

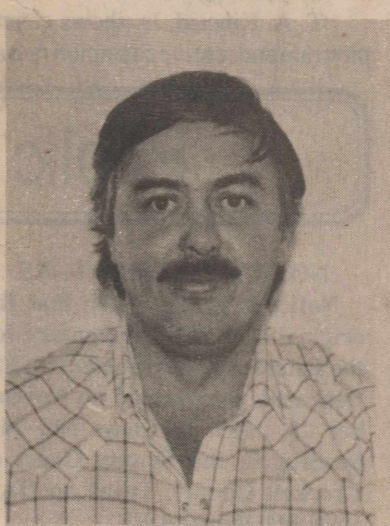
"I am 39 years old and reside at 402 Terrace with my wife Chris and my son Toby whom I love very much.

Thank God for people like these three gentlemen. It restored faith in me that there's good people left in this world.

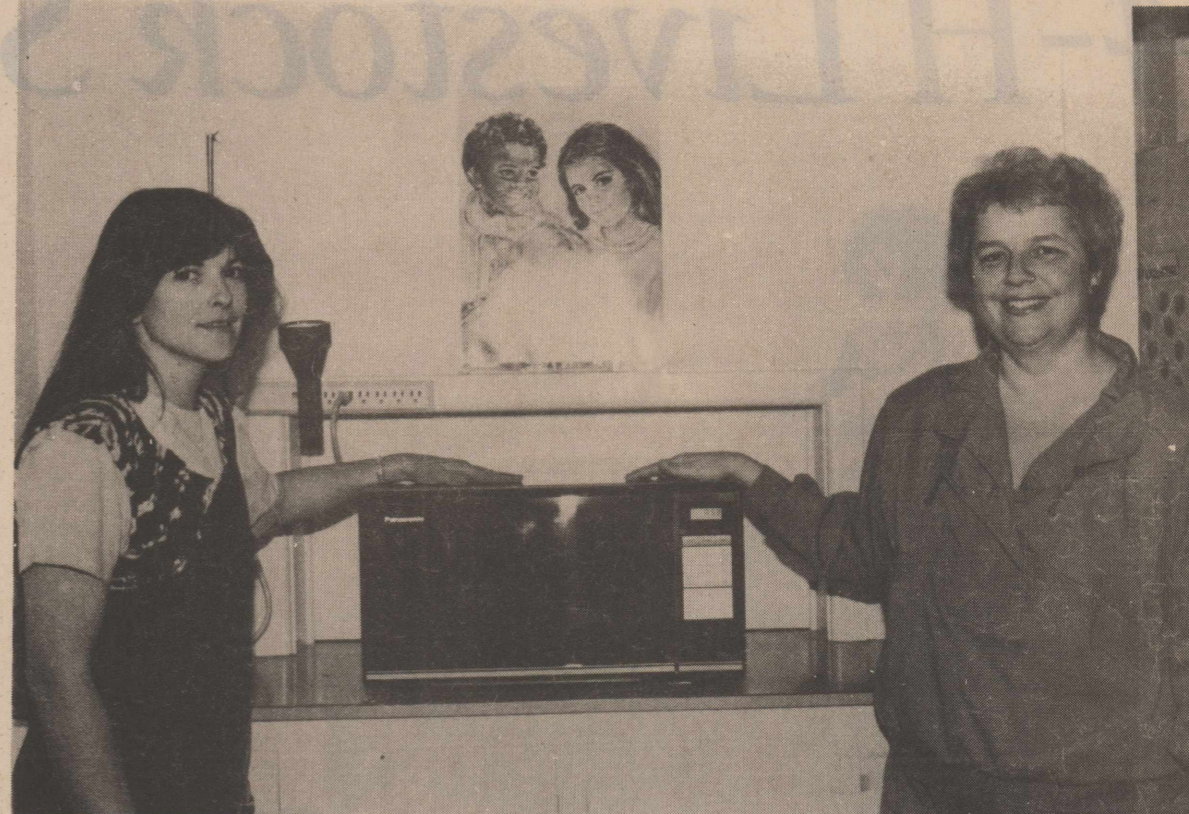

Stern Daughter

It was the English poet William Wordsworth who called Duty the "stern daughter of the voice of God" (Ode to Duty, Stanza 1), and there is a firmness in the voice of Jesus when He speaks to His disciples on the theme of Duty. He told them that it was no great thing for them to do what they were supposed to do. Servants aren't to be thanked for doing what is commanded of them, Jesus said, and, likewise, disciples do what is commanded of them and then say, "We are unworthy servants; we have only done what was our duty." (Luke 17:10).

Duty is not a glamour word. It has a hang-dog sound of drudgery and dullness. At first glance, it doesn't seem to come off much better in the

seemingly harsh words Jesus had for His disciples in His rather provocative parable on duty found in Luke 17:7-10. A servant comes in after working in the field all day. No one asks him if he is tired or if he would like to sit down and relax for a while. He isn't offered a cold drink and something to eat. No, this poor servant can't relax for a moment, because he must first cook and serve his master's supper. Only afterward may he fix himself something. And does he get any thanks for his service? Absolutely not! Nor, does he expect any. "That's my job," he might say, and he considers himself neither abused nor deserving of commendation. Jesus told the disciples that it should be the same with them. He said, "when you have done all you are bidden, say, 'We are but servants; we have only done our

duty" (Moffatt).

Jesus doesn't call people to become drones or doormats. What He is saying is that there is no letup in the service of God. Just unremitting struggle with evil, ignorance, illiteracy, selfishness, cupidity, fear, and all other forces that are counter to God's purposes in the world.

Do you expect appreciation for duty? The stern daughter of the voice of God will give you none. Do you insist upon a little recognition? Again, you're out of luck. Do you want praise? There will be none. Do you wish someone would spell you for a while; give you some time off, a furlough? There is no time off, no union contract, no retirement.

Why do it, then? Why give yourself to such a servile life? Here's why! It's the best life there is. With the

proper attitude, the right motivation, you will be working for Christ, whose yoke is easy and whose burden is light. You will be in the center of God's will, and you will reside in the kingdom of heaven. It is the greatest life there is, the most fulfilling, the most rewarding, the most satisfying. Do it right; do it faithfully, and eventually the pay-off will come: the voice of God will speak words of everlasting satisfaction, "Well done, good and faithful servant;...enter into the joy of your master" (Matthew 25:21).

Duty recognizes our dependence upon God for life and all that supports it and makes it worth living. We recognize that we can never pay back our debt to God for what has been done for us, and for what is constantly being done for us. We honor God by doing our Duty in His service.

Squirrel disrupts power service Wednesday

As many people are no doubt aware, Ozona suffered a power failure last Wednesday at 10:19 a.m. which lasted up to an hour for some residents. The incident was not due, as some might have suspected, to an exploding transformer, or any other such spectacular phenomenon. The culprit was actually much more mundane - a meddlesome squirrel which made an unwise move at the top of a WTU transformer. The spark which resulted brought down a power line (and killed the squirrel, of course).

The squirrel's fried remains, along with the downed line, were found in the 400 block of Third Street. Approximately half of Ozona was out of power for 10 minutes while West Texas Utilities men operated safety equipment allowing them to isolate the problem. The area nearest the problem remained out of power for close to an hour while the line was being repaired. The men worked on the line until 11:20, when power was restored to the affected area.

According to Stephen Williams, local manager of West Texas Utilities, squirrels are not an unusual problem for electric utilities, especially in this

area. "It's a common problem where you have a lot of trees - particularly pecan trees. Ozona is blessed with pecan trees and cursed with squirrels." The squirrels, above all other animals, seem to present special problems because of their dexterity. "We have guards on transformers to protect from animals," Steve points out, "but somehow squirrels seem to be able to get past these."

The trouble seems to be worst in early spring or fall, Williams notes, but "any time we have warm weather in the middle of winter it is not uncommon for active squirrels to inter-

fere with our equipment."

As might be expected, West Texas Utilities received numerous calls on Wednesday from concerned customers. The company doesn't mind this at all. In fact, as Williams points out, calls are a necessary part of the process of returning power to the customer. "We encourage people to call when they or their neighbors lose their power. It's also really important to call whenever you hear unusual noises such as bangs or pops. It saves us a lot of time in finding and isolating the problem."

Hispanics, obese at risk of developing diabetes

Many of us, either through heredity or lifestyle, are at risk of developing diabetes. According to the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation International and the Diabetes Research Foundation, nearly one in every 20 North Americans has diabetes. Out of six million diagnosed with diabetes, one million are Type I (insulin-dependent or juvenile diabetes) and five million are Type II (non-insulin-dependent or adult-onset).

What's really important, however, is that they estimate another five million persons are Type II but have not yet been diagnosed!

That's why if you're in a group that's considered to be high-risk, you need to find out more about this disease and to be screened at least once a year.

Who is at risk? First, people with diabetic relatives. There is a definite genetic link between Type II diabetes and people with close relatives who have diabetes.

People who are overweight are at risk. The chance of developing Type II diabetes doubles with every 20 percent excess weight. It is believed that excess body fat prevents insulin from working properly.

Older people are at risk. Once you're over 40, you are more likely to develop Type II diabetes.

Several studies have pinpointed Hispanics as a high-risk population. In Crockett County, a high proportion of diagnosed diabetics are Hispanic. There is probably a combination of factors that causes this, but if you are Hispanic, you owe it to yourself to learn all you can about diabetes.

Some symptoms are the same for both types of diabetes. For Type I diabetes, these symptoms may occur suddenly:

- frequent urination, in large quantities.
- excessive thirst
- extreme hunger all the time
- sudden weight loss, for no apparent reason
- weakness, drowsiness or exhaustion
- sudden vision changes or blurred vision
- nausea and vomiting

For Type II diabetes, these symptoms usually occur gradually:

- any of the symptoms listed for Type I.
- recurring or hard-to-heal skin, gum or urinary tract infections

- drowsiness
- tingling or numbness in hands or feet
- itching of the skin and genitals

Control of diabetes means keeping the level of sugar (glucose) in the blood as close to normal as possible. Diet, exercise and insulin all play a part in the "control" of this disease.

And although we can control diabetes, it's not a disease to be taken lightly. It affects the blood vessels and heart, increasing the risk of heart disease, stroke and other problems caused by poor circulation, such as gangrene.

Diabetes is the leading cause of adult blindness in North America. Kidney disease is also a major complication of diabetes, and the incidence of stroke is two-to-six times higher in people with diabetes.

While much progress has been made in predicting who will develop diabetes, and in the treatment of this disease with new techniques, diet and exercise still play a major role.

To help you understand what diabetes is and how you can minimize your chances of either developing it or of developing complications from diabetes, the Progressive Extension Homemakers Club is sponsoring a special program, "Dealing with the Diabetic Diet".

The program is scheduled for Thursday, Jan. 18, at noon at the civic center. Dr. Marcus Sims will be on hand to answer your questions about diabetes and to give a short talk on this important health problem.

Following Dr. Sims' portion of the program, I'll be giving a few diet tips and recipe ideas you can use when cooking for family, friends or yourself. We will also see if there is enough interest for future programs or a diabetic support group in the community.

The program is free, and we encourage you to bring a friend. Many folks also come during their lunch hour and bring a sack lunch, so feel free to do just that. We'll conclude before 1 p.m. so you can be back at work.

For further information, call the Crockett County Extension Office at 392-2721. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, national origin or handicap.
