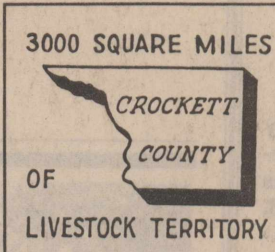

J.P. race goes to run-off

Justice of the Peace candidates Hector De La Garza Jr. and James M. (Jim) Hearne will be on the April 10 run-off election ballot in Crockett County. The two remain out of a field of five candidates wanting the nod for the November general election ballot.

De La Garza received 547 of the 1481 votes cast in the J.P. race. Hearne received 462 votes.

Incumbent Christine Davee got 256 votes followed by Roylan Sullivan with 140 and Mike Sadler with 76.

Absentee voting for the run-off election will be held at the courthouse April 2-6.

Fifty-five percent of the county's registered voters went to the polls in the Democratic Primary. Of the 1524 votes cast, 540 were absentee.

Incumbent commissioners Janet Hill, Pct. 2, and Jesus (Chuy) Castro, Pct. 4, were both unseated in their bids for re-election.

Mrs. Hill received 102 votes to Fred Deaton's 184. In the Pct. 4 race, Castro received 172 votes to 254 for Rudy R. Martinez.

In the race for district and county clerk, incumbent Debbi Puckett received 1091 ballots to 354 for challenger Wade Beasley.

County Judge Kathryn Mayfield received 871 votes.

Voters casting their ballots for County Treasurer Jim Dudley numbered 1082.

A. O. Fields received 984 votes for county Democratic Party chairman. District Judge Brock Jones received 1123 votes.

Resignations, effective at the end of this school year, were accepted from two teachers, Mr. H. O. Hoover and Mr. Cliff McMullan. Mr. Hoover will retire after 36 years of teaching, and Mr. McMullan, who has taught for seven years, will accept a business-related job offer.

The board approved the appointment of 21 Ozona residents who will serve on the school district's Long-Range Plan for Technology Planning Team. The purpose of this team will be to discuss and define the needs of the district in regard to the implementation of computer technology into the school curriculum. During the meeting, the trustees accepted the Ozona Textbook Committee's recommendations for new textbooks that will be used in the district next year, and they approved a budget amendment for the purchase of new band uniforms.

March 21 final day to file in district elections

The deadline for filing for a place on the ballot in the school or water district elections is March 21.

Anyone wishing to file for school board may do so at the office of Supt. Garland Davis.

Board members whose terms expire are Jeffrey Sutton and Gary Vannoy. Both are seeking re-election.

Those who have filed for water board director are Dan Davidson, Harold Shaw and Gene Perry. They are current members whose terms are expiring.

The water district office is the filing location and will also be the place for absentee balloting April 16-May 1.

Absentee voting in the school board election will be at the administration building during the same period.

Both elections will be held May 5 in the courthouse.

Bissett named conservation rancher

The Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District has chosen the 1989 winners for Outstanding Conservation Rancher and the conservation poster and essay contest for Crockett County.

Bob Bissett was chosen as the recipient of the outstanding conservation rancher award. Martha Mayfield, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Mayfield, was the first place winner in the essay contest, and Tara Wilkins, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Steve Wilkins, was the first place winner in the poster contest.

Awards were presented to these winners at the San Angelo Area Awards Banquet held at Angelo State University on March 13.

Bob Bissett operates approximately 27,000 acres in the northern portion of Crockett County. This land is comprised of two University of Texas leases. Bob has been operating this ranch since 1949.

As all good ranchers do, Bob has set goals to improve the overall ranching operation. Increasing the amount of desirable forage by maintaining safe stocking rates is one of his main objectives. Reducing the amount of undesirable brush species through the use of various control methods and sound grazing management practices

is also a high priority.

A combination of cattle and sheep are run on the ranch. With his experience as a stockman and range manager, Bob has initiated a year-long, light to moderate stocking rate. He feels this has given him the flexibility to combat the dry years which are frequent in this area and to better maintain livestock nutrition because of the increase of desirable forages. Bob has a thorough understanding of plant responses to livestock grazing. He practices the take half, leave half rule and closely monitors key grazing sites to assure proper grazing use on key plant species.

For several years now, Bob has carried out a selective deferment program on the entire ranch. Pastures usually receive a four month growing season rest one out of every three years. Bob found this type of operation has worked better than other planned systems he has used because it allows him to move stock to pastures which are in better condition due to more rainfall and to reduce the chance of livestock losses from consumption of bitterweed and pricklypear at critical times of the year.

Bob has carried out brush control practices on approximately 14,400 acres. Over 10,000 acres of mesquite

have been treated chemically. Bob was one of the first ranchers in the area to implement prescribe burning into a brush management program and has spent the last several years carrying out prescribed burns to control pricklypear and associated cactus species. He has initiated controlled burns on over 4500 acres.

Bob also realizes the importance of wildlife management to the ranching operation. By sustaining and improving wildlife habitat through proper harvesting, through proper application of brush control practices and through the initiation of good grazing management practices, wildlife populations will continue to thrive on the ranch.

Bob has worked closely with the Soil Conservation Service, the Texas A&M Extension Service and the Texas A&M Experiment Station. He has promoted range management by demonstrating his ability to apply sound grazing management practices on the ground. He has been recognized for his achievement by being selected as the outstanding conservation rancher in Crockett County for 1989 by the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District.

Martha Mayfield, a freshman, wrote the winning essay for the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District. The district awarded Martha a plaque and a \$50 check for her efforts.

Tara Wilkins, a sixth grader, was selected as the first place winner by the Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District and received a large Texas plaque for her poster on resource conservation. Other poster contest winners are as follows: Andrea Aldridge, second; Erica Moran, third; and Cody Landon, fourth.

The Crockett Soil and Water Conservation District would like to extend its appreciation to all of this past year's winners and encourage continued education and implementation of the wise use of our natural resources.

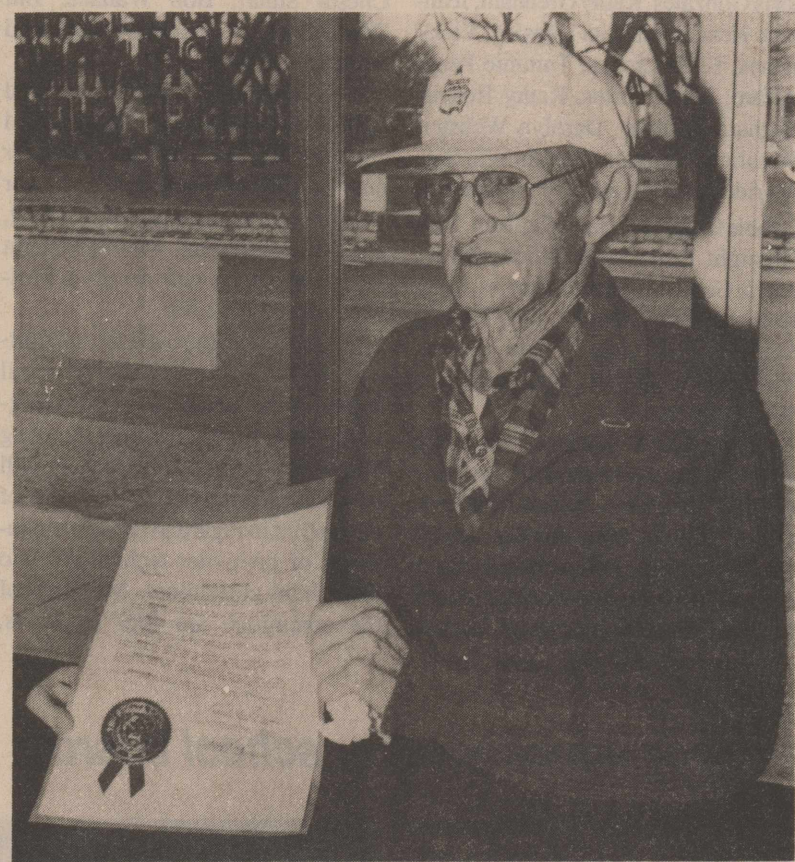

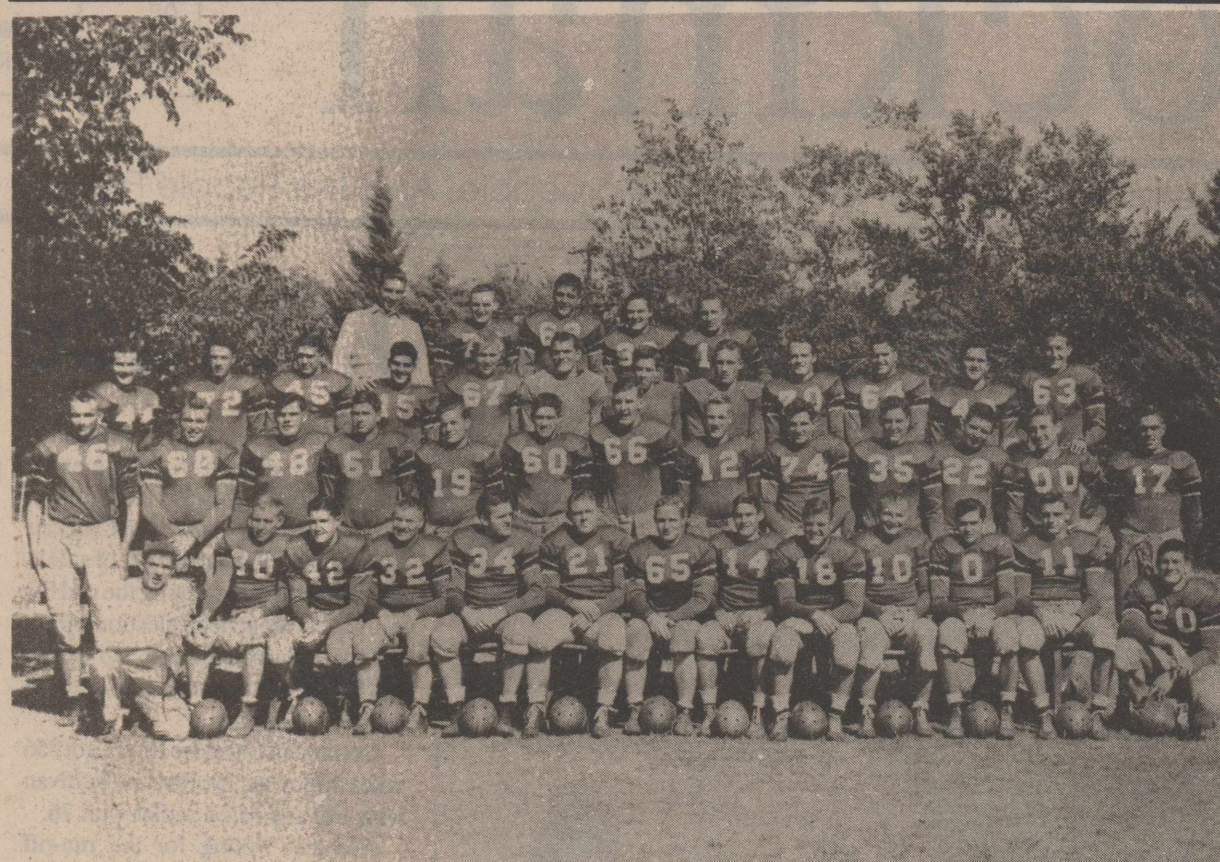

When human blood transfusions were first performed in the 1800's, the donor and the recipient were side by side. There was no typing, no testing, no interim procedure. Modern innovations in blood transfusion therapy have changed all that, according to Paula Kennemer, director of Community relations of United Blood Services in San Angelo. Today blood plays a vital role in the total health care picture of this community. Blood for human transfusions can come from only one source, healthy volunteer donors who give of themselves. There is no substitute for blood. No manufactured product can accomplish the many complicated and wonderful tasks that blood carries out. "Blood is essential to life. It is life itself to a patient in need," Kennemer said.

Currently, less than five percent of the U. S. population donates blood to supply the 12 million units needed each year. Meanwhile, the demand is rapidly increasing due to modern surgical techniques and new therapeutic uses for blood. "Additional volunteer donors are needed," Kennemer said.

The Ozona Chamber of Commerce has been sponsoring blood drives locally for many years, averaging 30 to 35 donors per drive. The Xi Sigma Omega chapter of Beta Sigma Phi is joining the chamber in its effort of publicizing the blood drives. "We are hoping there are many potential blood donors in Ozona who are just in need of more information concerning do-

nation itself," said Connie Jennings, chairman of the campaign to increase awareness. "With some work, we hope to see the average donations increase from 30 to 60 by the November blood drive," she went on to say.

"The blood donation process is easy," explains Mrs. Jennings. "It takes about 30 minutes, and most donors find it virtually painless and a true heart-warming experience. Donors will want to begin by eating a meal or snack before they arrive. The women of Xi Sigma Omega will conduct a brief interview concerning your medical history and current health. Next, your temperature, blood pressure, pulse and blood hemoglobin level are checked. Many donors consider this mini-physical an added bonus.

"The actual donation takes just 10 minutes. You'll relax in a comfortable chair while a technician from United Blood Services collects a unit of blood. Afterward, rest and enjoy homemade refreshments provided by the women of Xi Sigma Omega. You are then ready to resume your normal routine."

Ozona will sponsor a blood drive from 12 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. Wednesday, March 28, at the Ozona Chamber of Commerce Building. Anyone who has not been contacted and would like to donate should call Nancy Moore at 392-3066 or Connie Jennings at 392-5433.

"Take a few minutes to donate blood and invite a friend to join you," Mrs. Jennings urged. "You'll feel great!"

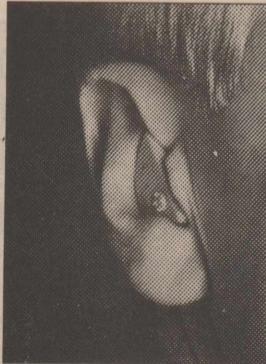

TOTSY'S OATMEAL COOKIES - Recipe from "Boots" Hill

| 2 sticks butter | 1 tsp. baking soda |
| 1 cup brown sugar | 2 tsp. vanilla |
| 1 cup white sugar | 3 cups oatmeal |
| 2 whole eggs | 1 cup chopped pecans |
| 1 1/2 cups sifted flour | 1 cup white raisins |
| 1 tsp. salt | |

Cream butter and sugar together. Add eggs and beat until fluffy. Sift together dry ingredients and slowly add to mixture. Add vanilla; fold in pecans, raisins and oatmeal.

Drop by heaping tbsp. onto cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 10 to 15 minutes or until lightly browned. Dough is easier to work with if chilled.

These make large cookies. They may be rolled into small cookie size balls and frozen on a cookie sheet until firm. Then store in a small container in the freezer to cook a few at a time. Makes about four dozen.

SWEET AND SOUR CHICKEN BREASTS - from Thomasue Hagelstein

Toss chicken in flour and salt. Brown in oil. Add broth. Cover and cook slowly 15 minutes. Drain pineapple, save syrup. Combine 1/4 c. syrup, curry, ginger and cornstarch. Blend in soy sauce, catsup, vinegar and honey. Pour over chicken and simmer uncovered 20 minutes longer or until tender. Add pineapple. Cook 5 minutes longer. Makes 6 servings.

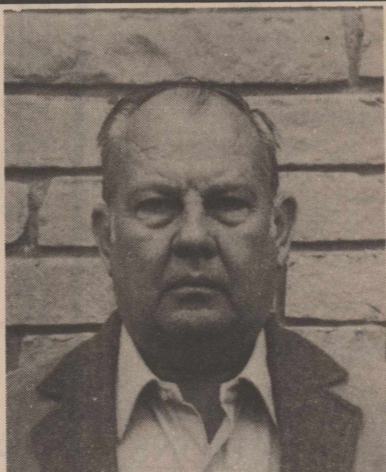

Miller ranch part of new wool grading program

Sheep shearing at the Eugene Miller Ranch south of Ozona has a new aspect this year with the addition of an on-site grading process. Conducted by Alan Crossley of Geelong, Victoria, Australia, the project is one of several going on in Texas this spring.

Crossley and five other Australians are in the United States to demonstrate the Australian method of grading and a wool packaging system used worldwide. The program resulted from a request by the American Sheep Industry for an overview of the industry in this country by Elders Pastoral P/L of Australia, the company where Crossley works.

In response to the Denver based ASI's decision to introduce the Australian method of grading here, 150 to 200 graders were interviewed for the program and only six chosen, Crossley said. He came to the United States Feb. 23 following a \$21,000,000 fine wool sale by his firm. The Elders Pastoral P/L center where Crossley is employed sells 400,000 bales of wool averaging 400 pounds or 160,000,000 pounds annually. The firm has six other centers in capital cities across Australia.

Crossley is working in Crockett County in association with Ozona Wool and Mohair. Warehouses in Sonora, Mertzon and Eden are also promoting the experimental grading program. The wool houses send men to help with the skirting and tagging, Miller explained at his shearing barn Saturday.

As rapidly as sheep can be sheared, fleeces are flipped out on a table for skirting and tagging. The fleeces then go to Crossley who grades on a scale of A for better wool, A-1 for wool which may be short or break easily, and A-2 which is good but coarser than the A wool.

Fleeces are piled in sorted stacks to await machine compression in specially constructed sacks. The bags hold an average of 380 pounds, approximately three times the standard wool sack and can be marketed worldwide.

"If I hadn't already had this set up (shearing pens and adjoining barn), I probably wouldn't have tried it," said Miller of the grading operation.

Miller, who believes "anything has room for improvement," has already seen what he terms good results from grading mohair at the ranch. His original commitment of 1,000 head of sheep for wool grading has been increased to approximately 3,400 since shearing began last week according to warehouseman Terry Criner.

Miller's son Pierce will also have livestock in the grading program.

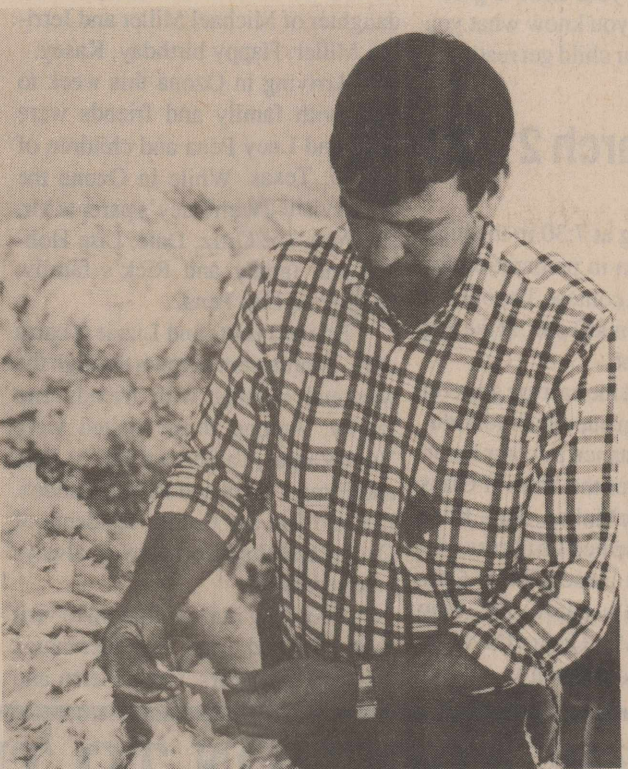
Small sample bags of wool from the Miller Ranch and cored samples from the large bags will be sent to

Denver for an ASI sale May 15. The cores will be compared to normal graded staple, Criner explained. Preparation costs will also be compared to see "if it will dollar out or not," Criner

said. In the end, buyers will determine whether or not the grading program being tried throughout the Western wool producing states is valid or not.



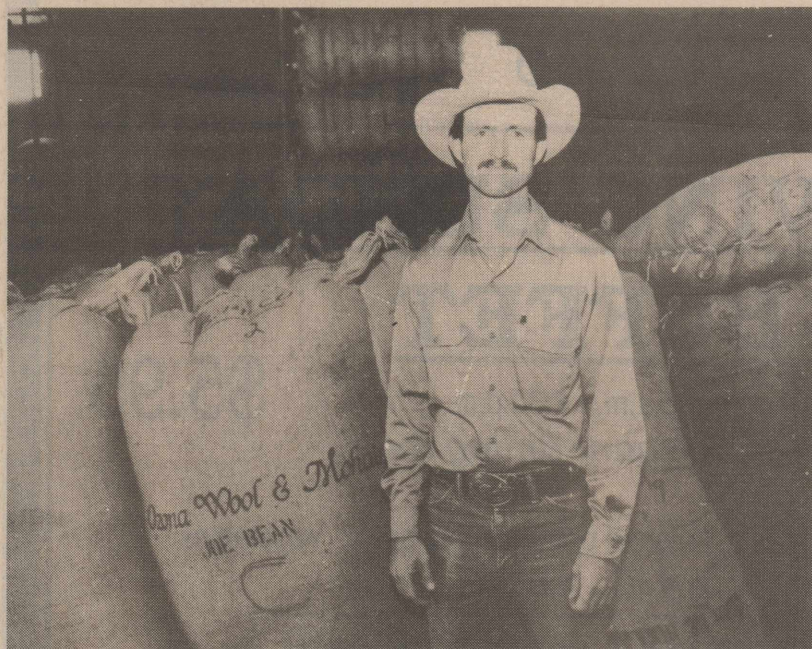
Eugene Miller and Allan Crossley examine a stack of graded wool.

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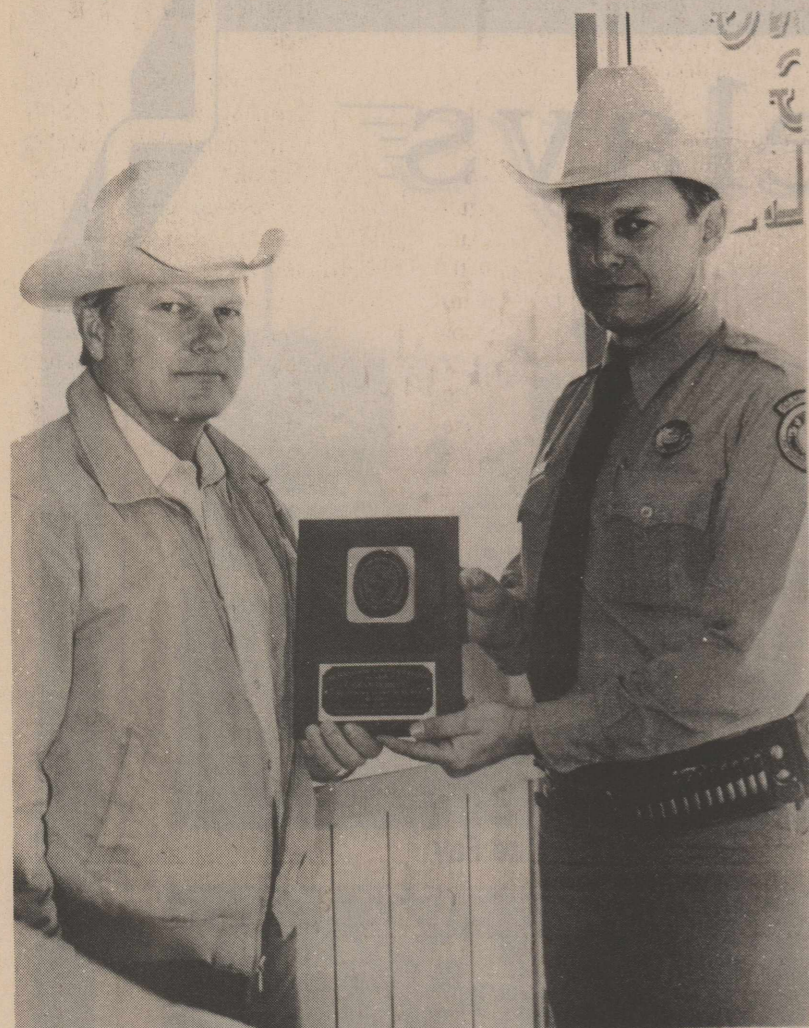
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Perry honored by Game Warden Assoc.

Emergency feed program ends

CROCKETT COUNTY ASCS OFFICE - The Emergency Feed Program (EFP) will end March 31, 1990. Producers who participated in this program have until April 30 to turn in feed receipts to the ASCS Office. Feed receipts brought in after that date cannot be used. Only feed purchases on or before March 31 are eligible. Any feed not fed by March 31 is not eligible for cost sharing under the 1989 Feed Program.

Begin making plans to end the 1989 feed program on March 31, 1990. "Feed on hand" at this time must be reported to the ASCS office. Any feed purchases or "feed on hand" after this date cannot be included in the 1989 feed program.

Emergency Feed Program regulations state that no cost-share assistance will be paid on sales documents submitted more than 30 days after the end of the feeding period. Or, when a subsequent feed application has been approved, no other sales documents from the previous feeding period may be accepted for assistance.

Therefore, as of April 30, 1990, or the date of your next application "if" there is a 1990 feed program in Crockett County (whichever comes first), feed tickets dated prior to March

31, 1990, will not be accepted and cannot be cost-shared. As of this printing, the ASCS office has not received any news concerning a feed program for 1990.

OFFICE HOURS

The Crockett County and Sutton County ASCS offices are served by one county director. Because of this, time is shared between offices. The County ASCS director, Herb Schwertner, normally will be available on the following days:

Monday, Tuesday and Friday in Ozona and Wednesday and Thursday in Sonora.

Schwertner plans to adhere to this weekly schedule as much as possible and invites Crockett County producers to visit the ASCS Office or schedule a meeting time with him.

Children and cholesterol: Should parents worry?

While American adults are becoming more aware of cholesterol and its relationship to coronary heart disease, there's another group at risk of developing heart disease later in life because of excess cholesterol—our nation's children.

According to the American Heart Association, "atherosclerosis, or narrowing of the arteries, may begin in childhood and progress throughout young adulthood."

So, the answer to the question is a resounding "Yes," parents should be concerned.

How do you know if your child is at risk for developing heart disease?

First, look at your family's history of heart disease. If you, your spouse or your child's grandparents have heart disease or high cholesterol, chances are your child will as well.

If your family has a history of heart disease, have your child's cholesterol level checked by a doctor. Remember, however, that routine screenings of all children are not recommended—just for those at risk because of a family history of heart disease. All American adults should have regular screenings for cholesterol levels and other risk factors beginning at age 20.

Children under the age of two should not be placed on a fat-restricted diet, says the American Heart Association,

but over that age, healthy eating habits recommended are:

—Maintain a diet consisting of a variety of foods, including more fruits and vegetables.

—Maintain desirable body weight

—Limit total fat intake to approximately 30 percent of calories

—Limit daily cholesterol intake to approximately 100 mgs. per 1,000 calories, not to exceed 300 mgs.

—Limiting sodium intake by cutting down on processed foods and condiments, and taking the salt shaker off the table

—not smoking cigarettes

—maintaining a regular exercise program

Developing good lifestyle habits now can help your child lead a healthier life—and it's a lot better to start good habits now than to try to change bad ones later!

Proposed changes in emergency feed program announced

WASHINGTON, March 6—Keith Bjerke, executive vice president of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation, has announced proposed changes in the administration of the Emergency Livestock Feed Program to make it easier to use by livestock owners and easier to administer by county offices of the USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

The proposed changes are: —feed needs for eligible livestock will be based on net energy requirements for weight class and type, instead of the present use of daily allowances for animal units.

—The extent of a livestock owner's eligibility for assistance will be expressed in dollars, rather than pounds of feed grain equivalent. Production losses and feed on hand will be converted to dollar values.

—A percentage of the assistance for which a producer is eligible will be made available as an advance payment to assist producers in making purchases of needed feed. The producer will then be entitled to receive one additional payment during the feeding period, plus a final settlement at the end of the feeding period.

This differs from the current program where the producer must furnish receipts for purchase of eligible feed before getting any cost-share payment.

Bjerke said there is no change in the basic requirements that a substantial loss in feed production must have occurred in an area to authorize implementing the program or that individual owners must have sufficient substantial loss of production to be eligible for assistance.

A proposed rule describing the changes will be published in the March 6 Federal Register.

Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

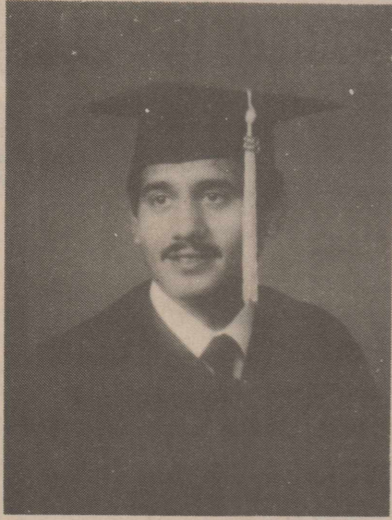
Garza to receive degree
