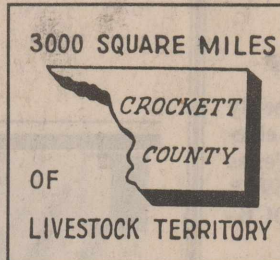

Court accepts insurance bid

Preliminary steps necessary in applying for economic development grants were outlined for commissioners at their meeting April 4. Tom Nance of Beeville, a representative of Cards Colina-Vargas AICP and Associates of Austin, made the presentation.

Nance currently is involved with development projects in Wink, Fort Stockton and Presidio in the West Texas area.

Crockett County became eligible for economic development assistance through its high unemployment rate. "The main goal of the Economic Development Administration is to create jobs," Nance told the court.

A court appointed committee made up of a cross section of the community is necessary to develop a plan, Nance said. Once a project is identified, grants are sought for a study; then technical grants are applied for. Business commitment is obtained, and other necessary grants applied for to begin a project.

Nance gave examples of development projects administered by his firm ranging from prisons to mushrooms. Completion of any project could take several years.

Commissioners authorized Judge Kathryn Mayfield to talk to Crockett County Fair Association members about the fairgrounds and invite them to the next meeting of court. Expenditures of county funds at the fairgrounds is no longer possible.

The county can be lessor by not lessee, County Attorney Orlando De Hoyos commented to the audience.

Commissioners discussed a request by District Attorney J. W. Johnson to rename an expenditure item investigator's salary and travel instead of investigator's travel. The court voted to approve the change.

Bids for liability insurance for public officials and law enforcement personnel were received from The Baggett Agency and the Texas Association of Counties. All commissioners voted to accept the TAC proposal for public officials. Commissioner House opposed acceptance of the TAC bid for the law enforcement policy.

Commissioners Janet Hill, Sostenes DeHoyos and Chuy Castro voted in favor of the TAC proposal.

Bids for a pickup for the Parks Department were rejected for the second time. The auditor was instructed to readvertise for bids to be opened in May.

A draft of a county-wide personnel plan, several months in the making, was accepted by a vote of court members. The plan goes to department heads for review prior to finalization.

During a financial report by Auditor Sandy Stokes, the court was told that the motel occupancy tax for the fourth quarter of 1989 was \$11,588. The funds are divided with 75 percent going to the chamber of commerce and 25 percent to the museum.

The court voted to accept a collection policy recommended by the hospital board with changes in the collection dates. Commissioner Castro opposed the motion.

In other hospital related business, commissioners approved the promotion of Connie Arredondo to Director of Radiology and voted to have county personnel mow the large areas at the hospital and care center.

Doris Hull, care center administrator, reported that she has 39 patients and one admission pending in the 42 bed facility.

Judge Mayfield commented that she had received complaints about the care center food. The center is required to have a dietary consultant, and menus are prepared by this San Angelo consultant, Mrs. Hull said.

Commissioners approved transporting a Road Department loader to San Antonio for engine repair.

The court voted to provide 2.6 miles right-of-way fencing in connection with a paving project on county road in the Shannon Estate.

Commissioners also voted to test a water well offered for use by the Shannon Estate for open hole and pump size.

Hiring of one new employee for the Parks Department was approved.

Advertising the sale of surplus courthouse and Road Department

equipment was tabled to allow time for other departments to offer items.

Commissioners voted to put \$400 in a predator bounty fund, appoint Manley Holmes to fill vacancy on Child Welfare Board created by Lu Ingram's resignation, place public library petty cash money in library memorial fund for 1990, and table advertising for bids for care center plumbing until further specification information could be obtained.

Monthly reports were received from Helping Hands for the Elderly, Sheriff Jim Wilson, Librarian Louise Ledoux, Garland Young of the civic and youth center and Bob Falkner of the fire department.

The Meals on Wheels program served 812 meals in March according to Janet Hill. Commodities were distributed to 79 families totaling 184 people.

Sheriff Jim Wilson presented a report indicating 42 persons were placed in county jail in March. The department received 341 calls for assistance and served 12 civil papers.

Mrs. Ledoux reported on a recently attended Texas Library Association Conference. She requested that the court vote on placement of the library petty cash money in the library memorial account rather than the county's general fund.

Teen Council members have chosen Beach Party as the theme for the all-night graduation party, Young's report said. Cash prizes are being considered for one member of each class who stays all night at the party.

Civic and youth center board members are considering an offering by the Ozona Chamber of Commerce and the Woman's League to aid in installation of speakers into the small meeting room and youth center.

The fire department report for March indicated two grass fires, one electric line down, one oil field fire, and three public service calls. The department has answered 29 calls this year.

During March, 29.29 truck hours were used along with 127.39 man hours and 8,055 gallons of water.

Hospital Board sets bad debt policy

Hospital board members discussed advertising for bids for care center plumbing, methods of yard maintenance and accepted a bad debt policy at their meeting April 5.

Revised bid specifications for the plumbing project were ready for presentation to commissioners and an inspector has been contacted, Bill Boswell told the board.

Purchase of a riding lawnmower was discussed and rejected. Board members agreed to see if the county will resume mowing of the hospital and care center grounds. Finishing work would continue to be done by the hospital employee.

Board members accepted a bad debt policy which will be used in conjunction with a collection agency to improve receipts at the hospital.

Finalization of a program to provide financial assistance for medical students was postponed until written recommendations are available for board review.

During a care center report by Doris Hull, she reported the Medicaid program has notified her of an increase in daily payments to the center. Although the start date has not been specified, payments will be retroactive to Jan. 1.

Medicaid payments normally run 90 days late, Mrs. Hull said.

Board members voted to allow Mrs. Hull to write and sign vouchers up to and including \$100 to pay for items purchased with cash for the care center and for items such as C.O.D. deliveries.

The hospital and care center were encouraged to participate in the May 10 Health Fair.

Financial statements for the hospital and care center were not available for board review. The information will be mailed to members this week.

Following a meeting in executive session, the board voted to promote Connie Arredondo to the position of Director of Radiology.

The meeting was conducted by

board president Armando Arredondo. Other members present were: Beth Smith, John Daniels, Concha Zapata and Cecil Buckner. Also attending were: Kathryn Mayfield, Dr. Robert

Owensby, Jim House, Martha Vickers, Zoe Green, Connie Arredondo, Margaret Coates, Mena Carnes and Linda Moore.

Hearne elected J.P.

Jim Hearne won a primary runoff election for the office of justice of the peace Tuesday with 790 votes.

Hecto De La Garza Jr. received 660 votes for the J.P. office.

Results by precinct were: Hearne, Pct. 1 - 78, Pct. 2-112, Pct. 3 - 162, Pct. 4 - 40, Box 36 - 10, Absentee - 388; DeLaGarza, Pct. 1-126, Pct. 2-19, Pct. 3-43, Pct. 4-147, Box 36 - 1, Absentee-324.

A total of 1453 of the county's

2742 registered voters, 53 percent, went to the polls in this runoff election.

Archaeological program brought by J. A. Jacquier

Mrs. P. L. Childress, president, welcomed 23 persons to a meeting of the Crockett County Historical Society and Commission in the Crockett Room of Ozona National Bank Monday, April 9, at 7 p.m.

Rick Bachman introduced J. A. Jacquier, professional archaeologist, from San Angelo. Mr. Jacquier has participated in numerous archaeological investigations, most recently at Stacy Dam, Fort Concho and Menard. "Our mental pictures of the American Indian," Mr. Jacquier said, "cover only the last 800 years of their thousands of years' history."

At the time the Indians roamed this area, the climate was much wetter and warmer. "Mega animals" such as the mastodon, the woolly mammoth, the saber-toothed tiger, elephants and long-nosed bear were common.

The so-called savages were intelligent, creative and innovative. Mr. Jacquier demonstrated a number of their artifacts and weapons which were capable of killing the huge animals. Types of spears, arrows and knives were explained.

The children of these small bands

of roving Indians, usually numbering 25 or 30 people, went to school every day learning from their parents the skills of survival. There were times when a number of the bands would gather for social reasons, such as "boy meet girl", Mr. Jacquier said.

The huge animals began to disappear about 12000 years ago, and by 6000 B.C., all had disappeared due to the climate becoming much warmer and drier.

Monday afternoon Mr. Jacquier spoke to students of Ozona High School, and several came to the evening meeting of the society.

The speaker urged and stressed the importance of protecting sites in our area, carefully noting in writing all details of any find. Such information should be put on a special form and sent to Austin where its strict confidentiality is preserved. "We are losing thousands of sites every year," he said.

Refreshments were served. A centerpiece prepared of native flowers and materials by Mrs. James Childress was noted and enjoyed by all.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station's (TAES) Texas Range Station will host a range field day at the Barnhart facility April 19 beginning at 9:30 a.m.

The station is located 10 miles south of Barnhart on Highway 163. The field day sponsors are the TAES, Texas Agricultural Extension Service (TAEX), the University Texas Lands-Surface Interests, and the Texas Section of the Society for Range Management.

The day will open with registration and coffee from 9:30 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. At the close of registration, the formal morning session will begin with a welcome by Dr. Carl Menzies, San Angelo based Director of Research with the TAES. Steve Hartmann, Manager of University Lands with the University of Texas System, is then scheduled to offer his comments concerning the direction the University Lands is taking.

Other morning speakers and their topics will include: Dr. Millard Calhoun, Research on Prevention of Bitterweed Losses in Sheep; Dr. Chris Lupton, Improving the Economics of Wool Harvesting and Dr. Allan McGinty, Mesquite Control Update. Calhoun and Lupton are TAES Researchers based at San Angelo and McGinty is the TAEX Range Specialist at Fort Stockton.

Coffee: with or without caffeine?

Pharmacologists classify caffeine as a mild stimulant to the central nervous system and consider it one of the world's most widely used drugs. Caffeine, classified in a group of chemicals generally recognized as safe (GRAS), was reviewed in 1978 and the safety of caffeine for human consumption was reaffirmed.

Today, however, public concern continues over the safety of caffeine and its possible negative effects. Extensive research on the relationship between caffeine and human disease indicates these results:

—Coffee, both regular and decaffeinated, has been shown to stimulate the gastric mucosa and increase secretions of stomach acid, exacerbating existing ulcers.

—The 1978 review of caffeine based on available data from long-term animal studies revealed no evidence that caffeine was carcinogenic.

—The data on the relationship between caffeine and fibrocystic breast disease is inconclusive, with some studies suggesting a minor relationship between caffeine consumption and palpable breast findings and others suggesting no relationship at all.

—There is no evidence to prove that moderate caffeine consumption by pregnant women causes birth defects.

Recently, Dutch researchers concluded that the consumption of boiled coffee raised serum cholesterol levels by 10 percent. On the other hand, drinking filtered coffee did not affect serum lipid levels.

This is actually good news since 75 percent of all American coffee drinkers drink their coffee drip-filtered. The researchers speculate that the differences may exist because the boiled coffee is in contact with the grounds longer and at a higher temperature than drip-filtered coffee.

Decaffeinated coffee has also been tested. Dr. Robert Superko of Stanford University found that men who switched to decaffeinated coffee showed a 7 percent increase in their LDL cholesterol, which could increase the risk of heart attack by an estimated 12 percent. Superko suggests that his is true because stronger, more robust beans are used for decaffeinated coffees.

More research is needed to determine which of the 500 chemical components in the beans might be responsible.

It is important to remember that caffeine has a long history of safe use by humans. So far, scientific studies do not indicate that people will suffer any harm from drinking available caffeine-containing beverages in moderation.

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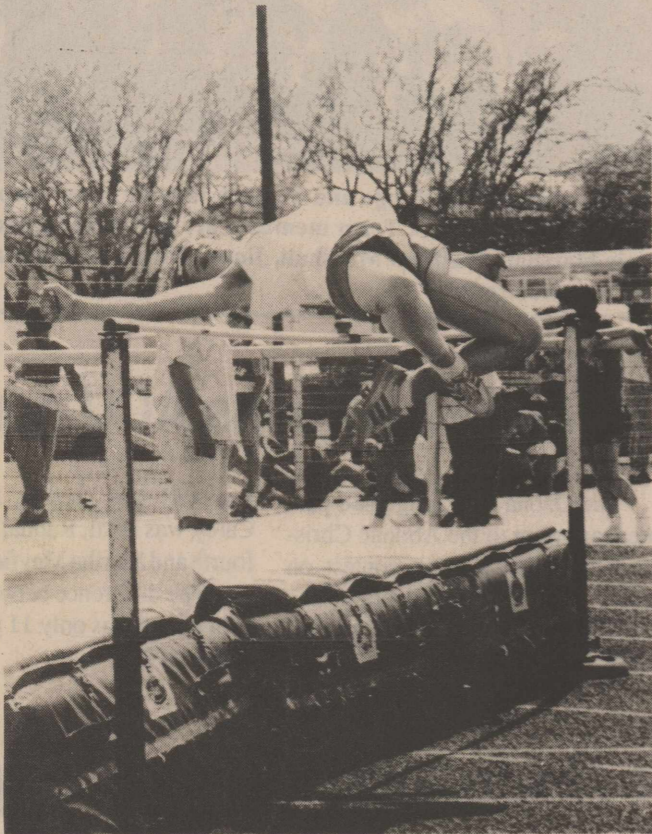

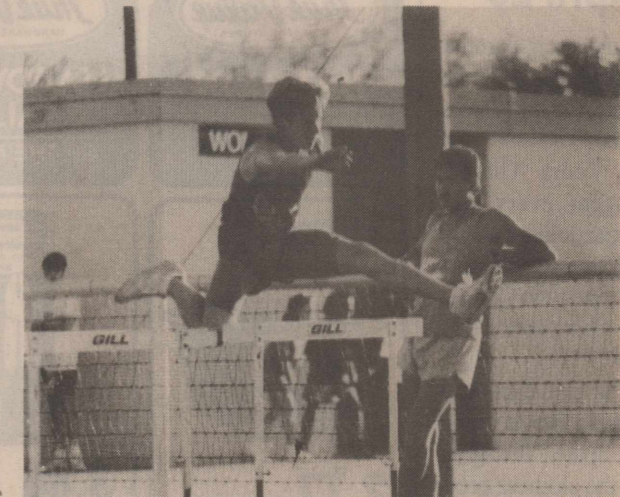

Katie Sellers split sets and lost in the third set of girls' singles.

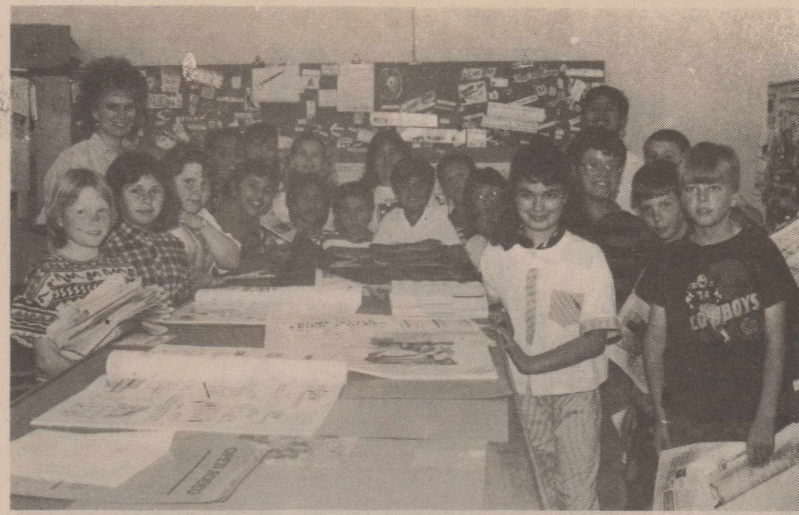
In doubles, Jennifer Colin and Ami Sewell also placed third.

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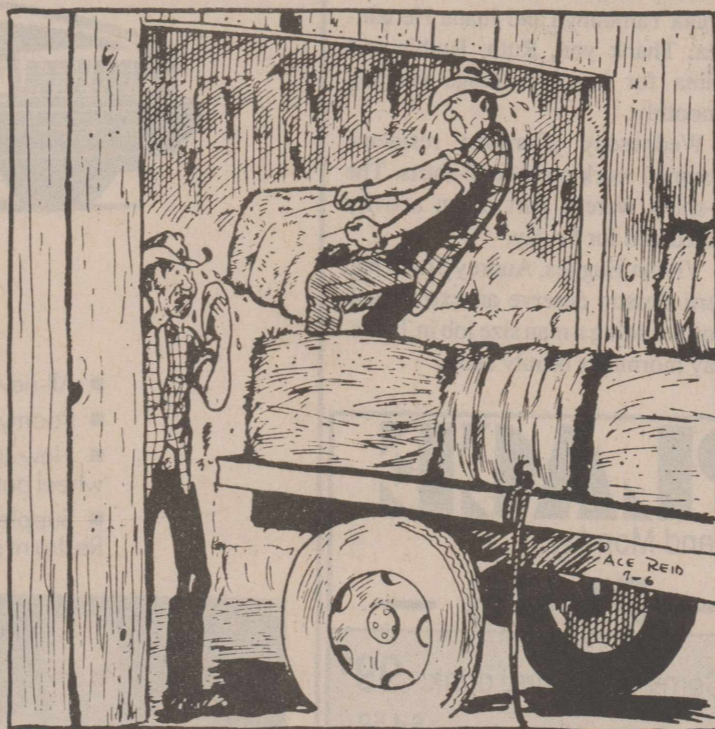

Observe caution on I-10 during military operations

People travelling on the roads between Fort Hood and Fort Stockton will have to plan for extra time and use extra caution from April 16-18 and again from April 29-May 1.

More than 600 military vehicles will be on the roads during that time, moving to Fort Stockton from Fort Hood for the Sabers West III exercise. Almost 300 vehicles will be on the road on April 16 and 29th. About 150 vehicles will be on the road April 17 and 30. And on April 18 and May 1 there will be about 200 vehicles on the roads.

These vehicles will be of all sizes, ranging from car size to five-ton trucks. They will be travelling in convoys of 20-25 vehicles and will be moving at a maximum speed of 45 mph. Except for before dawn on the 16th, the convoys should only be travelling during daylight hours. The route used from Fort Hood will be Highway 190 west through Brady to Menard. Then Highway 190 to Highway 854 through Fort McKavett to Sonora. From Sonora, Interstate 10 to Fort Stockton. Drivers are asked to exercise caution, patience and take extra time when travelling.

Pilots flying in the exercise area

on April 19 and 29 are also asked to use extra caution. On both these days approximately 100 helicopters will be flying to and from the Fort Stockton airport. Notices to Airmen (NOTAM's) will be published at all the local airports announcing the increased air traffic.

During the exercise days, April 23-26, most of the flying will be at night and will end by approximately 1 a.m. Residents of the exercise area are asked to leave their outside lights on during the exercise period so that helicopter pilots can see where residences and buildings are located.
