vears of experiment. If dusting or spraying is done before there is sufficient hatch of bollworms in the cotton field, it is possible that all helpful insects will be killed and leave the field open to infestation of lice, leafworm and bollworm

from now until frost. When control measures are required, it might be well to remember that 3-5-40 and 2-10-40 has met with favor in this area as a dust at 10 to 15 pounds per acre repeat at 5 day intervals when needed. The spray fits all weather conditions better than does a dust and when weather is unfavorable a spray of 2-1 at 3 pounds per acre or the 3-5 mixture containing BHC and DDT are among sprays recommended


