Twister touches ground west of town..... Early morning storm hits Ozona

A violent spring storm complete with small tornado raked Crockett County Thursday night leaving downed telephone poles, uprooted trees, washed out roads and running draws.

Crews from San Angelo and Del Rio labored until late Friday to restore service to approximately 30 GTE customers whose communications were disrupted by the storm. Five downed poles and a large amount of telephone wire had to be replaced along the interstate five miles west of Ozona, and another pole at the location had to be repaired.

"One pole was sucked out of the ground unhurt and set over to the side," said Jimmy Arrott, local GTE switching technician. "Twenty crossarm wires were twisted together as smoothly as if done by hand." Twisted, uprooted trees were left in the same area

Some 400-500 yards down the road, an additional three poles had to be reset because of wind damage.

Labor, man hours and trucks for the initial repairs cost approximately \$10,000, Arrott said. The company was still receiving calls about phones out on Monday. "We were unable to check on some customers because of Howard Draw," explained Arrott.

Howard Draw ran hill to hill, causing part of Pandale Road to be closed.

The storm was the "most intense rain and lightning display" ever seen by Winston Koerth, Texas Highway Department head in Ozona. Koerth, who was out checking roads at the height of the bad weather, said at times one mid-highway reflector was all he could see at a time. "Rains had



County makes emergency road repairs

Repairs on county roads seriously damaged by last week's storm led to a confrontation between Eddie Moore, road supervisor, and Orlando De Hoyos, county attorney, Monday, Moore said. The contraversy arose in the wake of a written opinion from DeHoyos which halted work on rural roads.

DeHoyos told commisisoners at their May 14 meeting that dedication of roads to the county is necessary before the roads may be worked under the law. Work on all rural roads other than those on the Shannon Ranch was stopped at that time.

Moore took to the roads Friday morning at 2 a.m. during a severe thunderstorm, and after assessing the situation, came to town for a work crew. "We had dangerous situations that needed to be taken care of, and I didn't have time for a consultation, so I took it upon myself to clear the roads so traffic could get through," Moore said

County employees worked until 9 p.m. Friday in the most hazardous areas. The major road damage was incurred in Pct. 3. A concrete slab at Live Oak crossing on the south side of I-10 was undermined to the point one side was down about six feet, Moore said. Further south on Live Oak, a concrete slab which had been there 30 years was moved downstream and is believe buried under sand and debris.


"I was called to the county attorney's office Monday and told that he would file a complaint against me for working the roads," Moore said during an interview Tuesday.


DeHoyos said Tuesday that after talking with Moore, he approves the measures taken and doesn't believe use of county employees and property would be a violation as the work was on an emergency basis and approved by Pct. 3 commissioner Jim House.

Although emergency safety measures were taken, no repairs will be made until the question of which roads may be worked is settled. Flashing warning lights will be up until the situation is resolved according to Commissioner House.

DeHoyos wants to get everything in writing granting property to the county so there will be no question as to which roads are private and which are to be county maintained. A stated measurement from landowners at the time they dedicate roadway would be acceptable and eliminate the need for a survey according to the attorney.

Commissioners will meet May 29 at 9 a.m. to hear further from De-Hoyos regarding county employees working on rural roads.





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
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
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

The High Cost Of Loving

Hope Lutheran Church, Sonora

"If you love Me, you will obey My commandments." - John 14:15

Have you noticed how high the cost of living is getting lately? And it seems to get a little higher each month. The things we want to eat, the clothes we want to wear, and the places we want to go cost plenty. It costs a lot to make house payments, car payments and insurance payments. Our nation enjoys a high standard of living, and if we would have our color TVs, our stereo music, our nice clothing and our place by the lake or in the mountains, we'll have to pay the high cost of living. Of course, we don't expect it to be "cheap", because we've learned that things of the best quality have the biggest prices. And that's not only true of the things that fill our homes, garages, and barns; but also of the love that fills our lives. Jesus makes that clear when He says to His followers on the last night of His earthly life: "No one has greater love than this, that a person lay down his life for his friends". Real love costs plenty. It caused Him to walk the way of the Cross, and die for us - so we can live forever. Real love costs the Son of God His very own life! And wherever men, women and children believe in the love of Jesus Christ, there is forgiveness, salvation and life. There's nothing "cheap" about the love of Christ for us, and there can be nothing "cheap" in our love for Him -for He says: "If you love Me, you will obey My commandments". Some people have the mistaken notion that they can show love by words alone, that talking about love is the same as loving - but that's not true. For example, I can talk about buying a new car - but that won't put me in the midst of that majestic splendor and beauty. So talk itself is cheap, whether it's about cars, vacations or love. Jesus is saying that if we only talk about love, while resisting God's will in His commandments - then we don't have real love. The high cost of loving is

what His commandments are all about, as He summarizes them in Matt. 22: "Love the LORD your God with all your heart with all your life, and with all your mind" - and "Love your neighbor like yourself". True love puts God first, others second and self last. That's the price of love that keeps the commandments.

Of course, paying that price can be drudgery: a long, frustrating battle for some people. Nobody who uses the commandments as a ticket to heaven will find that easy. They will always be a burden for those who plan to work their way into God's Kingdom. Keeping the commandments for that reason will never work, for St. Paul declares in Galatians 2: "A person cannot become righteous by doing what the Law says, but only by believing in

Resurrection Life! Jesus Christ still comes today, offering us the same resurrection life He brought those first disciples. And when people believe in Him, these words of His become true for them: "Because I live, you also will live". Who wouldn't "pay" to have this life? Who wouldn't give up all the treasures of this world for a guarantee of life after death?

Of course, we don't have to give up all the good things God graciously bestows on us - in order to have the eternal life Jesus Christ offers. That life comes as a free gift to those who place their trust in Him. Others may spend their lifetime and fortunes looking for ways to prolong life - but eventually they must die. That's not true for those who believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, for His Resurrection from the dead guarantees that we will pass through death into life - as He says in John 11: "I am the Resurrection and the Life. The person who believes in Me will live even if he dies. Yes, everyone who lives and believes in Me will never die". That encourages us to keep on loving Him. Then He says: "And if you love Me, My Father will love you, and I will love you and show Myself to you". Today we can rejoice that God pours His love into our lives. He doesn't dish it out by the spoonful, but dumps it in by the truckload! His love overflows into all that we do, blessing our work, our play, our joys, and even our sorrows. His love brings the Life of Jesus Christ into our lives an makes our hearts His home. He fills us with His Spirit, to comfort us with the forgiveness of sins, to keep us in the truth of His Word, to help us love God as the most important thing in our lives, and to love our neighbor like ourselves. So we have every reason for paying the high cost of loving - and it's what we want to do, because He's loved us with the greatest love of all!





Approximately 60 people learned through all the proper channels, Scot-

Anna Ramey, vice-president of the National Dyslexic Society, and a specialist in dyslexia at Scottish Rite and has been with Scottish Rite for 16 years.

During the three hour meeting, Mrs. spoke about modifications in classrooms for dyslexics, the difference between remedial and dyslexic students, showed a video that won the National Educational Filmmakers award and answered questions at length. The film "Come Into Our World", was made by dyslexics for dyslexics about what it is to be dyslexic. This and two other films on dyslexia are available at Crockett County Library.

Mrs. Ramey stressed the importance of repetion and continuity when working with these students. The dyslexic needs 500 to 1500 repeititons before recognition of words is automatic. A normal child needs the repition only 50 times, Mrs. Ramey explained.

Mrs. Paula Bailey, an advocate of the teaching process used by Scottish Ozona Woman's League. Rite for dyslexics, has actively sought acceptance of this program in the local schools through meetings with the board of trustees. "They promised to look at this in September and October and nothing has happened," said Mrs. Bailey Tuesday.

Teen sexuality everyone's concern

Last year, more than a million teens told themselves, "It can't happen to me.'

Unfortunately, it did. That's the number of young women who found themselves pregnant...and in most cases, the pregnancy was unexpected and unwanted.

Teenagers aren't emotionally, socially or economically ready for parenthood and its many responsibilities. Here are some facts which may startle you:

-The maternal death rate is 60 percent higher for teen mothers than for women in their 20's. This relates directly to the fact that most pregnant teens do not receive adequate prenatal care or do not receive it early enough if they receive any care at all).

-Of 10 girls who become pregnant at age 17 or younger, eight never finish high school. Teenage parents (both mothers and fathers) often change their other educational plans by forgoing college to earn money for their child's support.

-If paternity is established, the father is legally obligated to support his child until it is 18 years old or adopted by someone else. Boys as young as 14 have been successfully sued for the eventual support of their child.

-With limited education, jobs are limited also. Women also have an added burden of finding adequate, safe child care on a limited budget.

-Experts say nine percent of teen mothers attempt suicide - seven times the national average for teenagers. Eighty percent of teenage marriages end in divorce by the time the oldest child is in the first grade.
