traffic stop when his car was struck

The Crockett County officer was the sixth Texas law enforcement officer to die in the line of duty this year and the 66th DPS officer to die in the line of duty since

finish high school. Teenage parents (both mothers and fathers) often change their other educational plansby forgoing college to earn money for their child's support.
-If paternity is established, the
father is legally obligated to support his child until it is 18 years old or adopted by someone else. Boys as young as 14 have been successfully sued for the eventual support of their child.
-With limited education, jobs are -With limited education, jobs are
limited also. Women also have an safe child care on a limited budget. -Experts say nine percent of teen mothers attempt suicide - seven times the national average for teenagers. Eighty percent of teenage marriages end in divorce by the time the oldest child is in the first grade. "Well, it's not a problem in Crockett County, and it doesn't affect me any-
way."
Wrong. Whether or not we're parents, we're taxpayers, and the burden teen pregnancies puts on the welfare system is enormous. Acording to ETR Associates, a organization in California, the public could save $\$ 5,560$ per birth if all teenage birns were delayed until the
mother
20 aggregate $\$ 2.06$ billion for all births postponed.
But dollars aside, the real cost is in the human potential lost and the agonizing decisions these children must
face.
And these are OUR children. Last
fall, during our "Making the Grade" effort, we formed a teen pregnancy task force, because teen sexuality was identified as a major problem in our community.
In April, in conjunction with the "Just Say No" club's drug use survey,
we conducted a teen sexuality survey with 226 of our high school students. While the results weren't really surprising in light of statistics from other communities and states, they do point to a definite need for intervention and programming. This week and next week, I'd like to share some of the results and let you know how you can be involved in helping to deal
with this critical issue.
