Program assists pre-schoolers with language skills

Ozona Public Schools announced June 14 that the district will conduct a special six-week summer experience program for students who will enter prekindergarten in the fall and who have been identified during the screening clinic that was held last April in children. The goal of the six-week program is to help children who are limited English proficient experience early success in school. Dwight Eisenhower came to San Angelo to look over the drought stricken area. The rains began the next year, and "I couldn't believe how beautiful it was," she said of the West Texas landscape.

A friend who taught in Ozona asked her to contact L.B.T. Sikes when a job became open in the local schools. After accepting the position and moving to Ozona, she soon met Jim Dudley. The county treasurer and the teacher married in December. He had become county treasurer in 1951 and

still holds that office today. In addition to operating his private tax business, established in 1948, he has written and published a book about area servicemen and World War II. He has also completed the first draft of a book about his own wartime experiences, Mrs. Dudley said.

Mrs. Dudley is a charter member of Women's League and is now a Woman's Forum member. She is also a member of Myrtle Post Garden Club and loves to "putter around" with flowers. The Dudleys are members of Ozona United Methodist Church.

A retirement party hosted by her class was a total surprise. She gave little thought to the students' repeated inquiries as to the time that Friday afternoon. New sales tax rate takes effect July 1

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said that Texas businesses will have very little time to prepare for the quarter percent sales tax increase

In a special meeting held on Friapproved the employment of Mr. Don Howard as principal of Ozona Junior High school. Mr. Howard comes to Ozona from Austin, where he served as an educational consultant for Corbett Services, Inc. Prior to going to Austin, he was superintendent of the Stamford Independent School District for eight years.

Mr. Howard is a 1960 graduate of McMurry College and received his Master of Education degree from Hardin-Simmons University in 1967. He and his wife, Jerry Ann, will move to Ozona in July.

The Howards are the parents of three children. Their eldest son, Dub, lives in Dallas. Chuck is a coach at Howard Payne University in Brownwood, and daughter Edie is a junior at Texas A&M.

"We will do everything possible to help businesses and merchants with this rate change," Bullock said. "This short amount of time puts a very heavy burden on the 467,000 businesses that collect sales tax from their custom-

The sales tax increase, signed by Governor Clements on Thursday, takes effect July 1. It raises the state sales tax from 6 percent to 6 1/4 percent. With local sales tax added, the new maximum rate will be 8 1/4 perday, June 15, the Ozona School Board cent. Ozona has no city sales tax, therefore the rate will be 6 1/4%.

Bullock is mailing a postcard notice to all sales tax permit holders Friday to notify them of the change. New 6 1/4 percent and 8 1/4 percent rate cards have been printed and will be available in all 33 Comptroller offices throughout the state next week. A new listing of the combined state and local sales tax rates for every city in the state will be available by June

"Unfortunately businesses will have to make this change almost overnight," Bullock said.

Bullock said that business owners and managers who have questions about the sales tax can call the Comptroller's Office toll free at 1-800-252-5555 or the local Comptroller office





The suit is styled "Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, Plaintiff, vs. MCI Telecommunications Corporation, A Member of the Class of Texas Intrastate WATS and 800 Service Customers Who Paid Overtime Charges From September 1976 Through February 1987, Defendant," and identified as Cause No. 471,460 in the 126th Judicial District Court of Travis County, Texas

Pursuant to the settlement, while not admitting liability, Southwestern Bell, the other local exchange telephone companies in Texas, and AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. have agreed to pay refunds to those WATS/800 customers who paid overtime charges attributable to the rounding practices for intrastate WATS/800 services at any time between September, 1976, and February, 1987. The refunds will be based upon either the actual or estimated amount of overtime charges attributable to such rounding practices. An exact refund will be determined for customers able to produce copies of their WATS/800 service bills. For customers who do not have copies of their WATS/800 service bills to establish actual overtime charges paid, an average refund of \$4.53 to \$5.95 per WATS/800 service line per month will be applied. All claims will be subject to verification. The refunds will also include interest at the rate of 7.80% per annum.

Those customers who think they may be entitled to a refund or who desire more information must call 1-800-782-3026, 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, or write to WATS Refund Pool Administrator, One Bell Plaza, Room 670, P. O. Box 650376, Dallas, Texas 75265-0376, to request a WATS Refund Information Package. The WATS Refund Information Package will contain further information regarding the lawsuit and eligibility for a refund, a description of documentation required to support a customer's claim for refund, and a refund claim form to be filled out and submitted requesting a refund. REQUESTING A WATS REFUND INFORMATION PACKAGE DOES NOT OBLIGATE YOU IN ANY WAY

All claims for a refund must be received by the Refund Pool Administrator by Friday, October 5, 1990, and all rejections of the settlement (that is, requests for exclusion from the class action lawsuit) must be received by the Court by Wednesday, September 5, 1990. Only those who respond by filing a claim or by filing a rejection of the settlement, as explained in the WATS Refund Information Package, will receive notice of future developments in this proceeding.

The trustees approved the employment of two new teachers during the meeting. Ted Myrick, a 1970 graduate of Hardin Simmons University, will be a teacher/coach in Ozona Junior High, and Mrs. Rosella Bilano, a 1980 graduate of Sul Ross State University, will teach prekindergarten in Ozona Primary School. Mr. Myrick will take the place of Craig Cooke, and Mrs. Bilano will replace Ms. Victoria Gonzales, who will teach kindergarten next year.

Assistant Superintendent Ted Cotton gave the members a report which compared Ozona's 1989-90 Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) test results to state results. In his report, Mr. Cotton said that 83% of Ozona's third grade students passed the mathematics section of TEAMS, 72% passed reading, 58% passed writing, and 47% of the students passed all three tests. Statewide results for the third grade were 91% math mastery, 85% reading mastery, 77% writing mastery and 74% mastery of all three tests.

Local fifth grade results were higher than the state average in mastery of mathematics (95% local - 90% state)

and in mastery of reading (89% local Texas Assessment of Academic Skills - 87% state), while Ozona's mastery of writing (70% local - 82% state) and mastery of all three tests (68% local -77% state) were lower than the statewide average.

Ozona Junior High's seventh grade students surpassed the state average in all four areas: mastery of math (100% local - 91% state); mastery of reading (92% local - 89% state); mastery of writing (92% local - 86% state); and, mastery of all three tests (89% local - 80% state). In the ninth grade, Ozona's students were below the statewide average in mastery of math (82% local - 86% state), mastery of writing (68% local - 70% state), and mastery of all three tests (61% local - 68% state). The ninth graders were above statewide results in mastery of reading (84% local - 82%

Students in Ozona High School's eleventh grade were above the state average in mastery of math (81% local - 80% state), mastery of English language arts (92% local - 90% state), and in percent passing both sections of the exit-level exam (81% local -

At the conclusion of his report, Mr. Cotton said that the present cycle of TEAMS testing has now come to an end, and a new program, called the

(TAAS), will replace the state's existing minimum skills testing program in grades 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11 and will be given for the first time in October.

Adoption of the program means that the Texas Education Agency will move from testing only minimumlevel skills in reading, writing and mathematics to testing more difficult content, including higher-order skills, such as critical thinking and problem solving. The new tests also will be broader in scope than the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) test in that they will measure more of the essential elements of the public school curricu-

As part of the expanded program, a written composition will be added to the exit-level or 11th grade test for high school juniors who take the examination for the first time in October. High School seniors who failed to pass both sections of the TEAMS exit-level examinations as juniors will be allowed to continue taking that test until they pass it and will not be required to take the exit-level TAAS.




