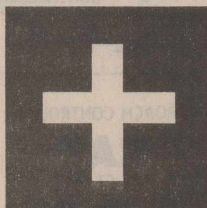

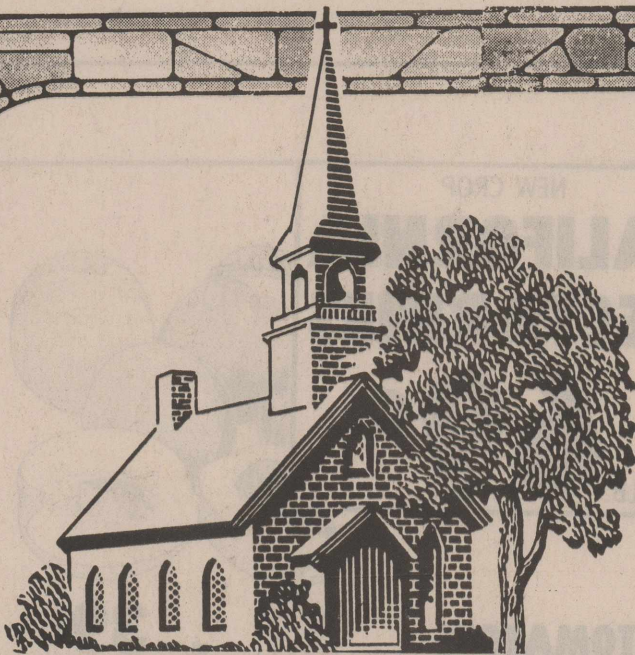

The trustees approved the employment of two new teachers during the meeting. Ted Myrick, a 1970 graduate of Hardin Simmons University, will be a teacher/coach in Ozona Junior High, and Mrs. Rosella Bilano, a 1980 graduate of Sul Ross State University, will teach prekindergarten in Ozona Primary School. Mr. Myrick will take the place of Craig Cooke, and Mrs. Bilano will replace Ms. Victoria Gonzales, who will teach kindergarten next year.

Assistant Superintendent Ted Cotton gave the members a report which compared Ozona's 1989-90 Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) test results to state results. In his report, Mr. Cotton said that 83% of Ozona's third grade students passed the mathematics section of TEAMS, 72% passed reading, 58% passed writing, and 47% of the students passed all three tests. Statewide results for the third grade were 91% math mastery, 85% reading mastery, 77% writing mastery and 74% mastery of all three tests.

Local fifth grade results were higher than the state average in mastery of mathematics (95% local - 90% state)

and in mastery of reading (89% local - 87% state), while Ozona's mastery of writing (70% local - 82% state) and mastery of all three tests (68% local - 77% state) were lower than the state-wide average.

Ozona Junior High's seventh grade students surpassed the state average in all four areas: mastery of math (100% local - 91% state); mastery of reading (92% local - 89% state); mastery of writing (92% local - 86% state); and, mastery of all three tests (89% local - 80% state). In the ninth grade, Ozona's students were below the statewide average in mastery of math (82% local - 86% state), mastery of writing (68% local - 70% state), and mastery of all three tests (61% local - 68% state). The ninth graders were above statewide results in mastery of reading (84% local - 82% state).

Students in Ozona High School's eleventh grade were above the state average in mastery of math (81% local - 80% state), mastery of English language arts (92% local - 90% state), and in percent passing both sections of the exit-level exam (81% local - 77% state).

At the conclusion of his report, Mr. Cotton said that the present cycle of TEAMS testing has now come to an end, and a new program, called the

Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS), will replace the state's existing minimum skills testing program in grades 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11 and will be given for the first time in October.

Adoption of the program means that the Texas Education Agency will move from testing only minimum-level skills in reading, writing and mathematics to testing more difficult content, including higher-order skills, such as critical thinking and problem solving. The new tests also will be broader in scope than the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) test in that they will measure more of the essential elements of the public school curriculum.

As part of the expanded program, a written composition will be added to the exit-level or 11th grade test for high school juniors who take the examination for the first time in October. High School seniors who failed to pass both sections of the TEAMS exit-level examinations as juniors will be allowed to continue taking that test until they pass it and will not be required to take the exit-level TAAS.
