

Research league looks at school budgets

AUSTIN - Last year trustees in the 1,052 Texas school districts adopted budgets totaling \$14 1/4 billion and increased local property taxes by another half a billion dollars. School budgets were 2 1/2 times as much in 1990 as the \$5.7 billion at the beginning of the decade, and school property taxes were three times as much.

The figures come from the latest issue of Bench Marks 1989-90 School District Budgets in Texas, an annual publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

An average of \$3,542 per student Road was reported running full as for current operations was budgeted last year plus \$302 for repayment of debt and \$461 per student for capital

Crockett County Common Consolidated Independent School District's budget provided \$4,988.81 per student for current operations, \$578.12 for debt service, and \$190.14 per student for capital outlay based on the 922 students enrolled in the fall semester of 1989.

The average salary for administrators was \$39,746 and \$31,031 for other professional support employees president of Veribest Cattle Feeders, (librarians, counselors, nurses, supervisors, etc.).

Four dollars in five were spent for salaries. Statewide payroll expense averaged \$2,895 per student, as compared to \$3,854.09 in Ozona schools. Payroll expense is a combination of

salary levels and staffing patterns. Taxpayers provided one teacher for 11.7 students in local schools while the statewide pupil-teacher ratio was 16.6 to one. Because of the existence of small classes, especially at the highschool level, and abbreviated teaching schedules, many other classes have more than the average number of

To fund higher school budgets with a declining tax base, school trustees in most districts have raised tax rates. The average school district imposed a property tax at the rate of \$1.01 per \$100 of appraised value, which value averaged 97.6 percent of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was 98.6 cents (\$1.01 times 97.62 percent) statewide. Locally, the school district imposed a rate of \$.960 while property was appraised at 93.6 percent of its market value making the true rate \$.899 per \$100 of market value (selling price).

The report points out that the calculation of a true tax rate based on market value rather than on appraised value enables a valid comparison of tax levels with other schools. In 1989, the true tax rate exceeded \$1 in half of the school districts in Texas.

for \$80,000 in the local school district would have been \$476. If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$332, and if owned by a person 65 years or older, the tax on an \$80,000 house in this district would have averaged \$236, or less if subject to a tax freeze. That compares with statewide average tax bills of \$806, \$712 and \$543 respectively for an \$80,000

Last year, the school district's revenue from the property tax increased by 10.4 percent for 1989-90 as compared to a 9.1 percent increase state-

Local property taxes plus state aid was \$5,568 per student in Ozona schools as compared to \$3,386 statewide. The primary purpose of state aid is to equalize state and local tax resources among schools. The 153 districts with 10 percent of the students in Texas and a large tax base had 44 percent more tax funds to spend on each student than 75 property-poor districts also with 10 percent of the

State jobless rate increases while more **Texans work in June**

A record number of Texans were working this year in June, but the state's unemployment rate still increased according to Mary Scott Nabers, commissioner of the Texas **Employment Commission.**

The June unemployment rate was 6.3 percent up from 6.2 percent in

It was noted last month that although the number of people working is on the increase, the number of people seeking jobs in the Texas job market is increasing faster. That is what is causing the rate to climb.

Job growth was seen in trade, services, and construction. Government declined as schools and colleges released workers for the summer months.

Crockett County's unemployment rate for June was 5.9. Of the 1,801 person civilian labor force, 1,694 were employed.

In Reagan County, the unemployment rate was 3.0 with 1,855 of 1,944 possible workers employed.

Schleicher County had 1,263 members of its 1,334 work force employed, resulting in a 5.3 unemployment rate.

An unemployment rate of 4.7 percent was recorded in Sutton County. The labor force of 1,905 had 1,816 employed. Terrell and Upton Counties each

had a 4.5 unemployment rate with 43 unemployed in Terrell and 87 in Upton

Val Verde County's unemployement rate of 11.4 percent resulted from 1,568 persons of the 13,775 person labor force being without jobs.

The 6.3 unemployment rate in Tom Green County was established with 2,801 of the 44,814 labor force unem-

During the summer months each year we get quite a few invitations through the mail, and before we open them we usually wonder WHO they are from and WHAT the big occasion is. If we were to receive an invitation with the return address of the White House - or Buckingham Palace, it would cause a lot of excitement around our house, wouldn't it? Yet in the Bible reading above, a far more important invitation comes to you to me. It is truly a ROYAL INVITATION, for it comes from Him who calls the Almighty and Eternal Creator of heaven and earth "My Father". May you and I together, as Christians, renew our acceptance of Christ's ROYAL IN-VITATION today; acknowledging by faith that He is our Lord and Savior, pull together with Him in bringing the Gospel to those around us, that we may finally greet one another in that eternal place of "Rest" which He's prepared for us.
