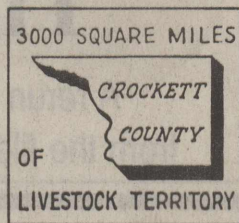

Commissioners consider tax increase

Commissioners voted Monday to consider raising taxes above 3.5 cents for the coming year. The change from 58 cents per \$100 valuation to 61.5 cents amounts to an increase of seven percent.

A public hearing on the increase has been set for 6 p.m. Monday, Aug. 27.

Court members spent much of the day reviewing items in a budget for the coming year. If everyone "got their fondest wish" from the many department requests, there would be a revenue shortfall of \$600,000 next year according to Sandy Stokes, auditor.

A proposal submitted by Crockett County Attorney Orlando DeHoyos

for a county golf course was one of the items rejected by the court.

The proposal requested \$50,000 for purchase of approximately 25 acres and start-up costs. Included in the proposal were income and expense figures from courses in Junction and Sonora.

Bill Boswell, hospital administrator, reported that the board voted to submit a 1991 budget for the care center which would include an increase of \$13,000 in new tax revenues and a budget for the hospital which would not include any new tax revenue.

Board members also voted to submit an application for participation in the commodities foods program,

Boswell said.

Commissioners voted to advertise for fuel bids to be opened on Aug. 27, authorized an easement for a drainage ditch on Southwest Electric Cooperative property, voted to investigate self-insured workman's compensation, agreed to pay half the cost of installation of new lights and put in cement bases for lights in the downtown park, and voted for a new pay scale for clerical employees.

Ozona Chamber of Commerce president Diane Myers and Nancy Moore, secretary, met with the court to discuss park lighting and request \$5,000 for playground equipment for the park near Emerald House.

Crockett County Fair Association will donate \$5,000 in matching funds.

Judge Kathryn Mayfield explained that the money could not be allocated because there is still no lease between the county and fair association on the fairgrounds. Taxpayer money can not be used to improve private property, she reaffirmed.

Meals for the Helping Hands program will not be obtained through the hospital reported Janet Hill. Recent information on possible foundations and grants shows that as much as 90 percent financing for the program could be obtained elsewhere, Commissioner Hill said.

Mrs. Hill has been appointed to the Concho Valley Council of Governments Council for the Elderly.

No action was taken on the agenda item to consider passing on the rising costs of medical insurance to employees.

Following a meeting in executive session, commissioners voted to approve a pay increase for a care center employee who has completed her six month probationary period.

Ozona Community Center to begin classes Aug. 27

The Ozona Community Center will begin classes Aug. 27 from 7:30 a.m. until 6:00 p.m. with preschool classes in the morning 8:00-11:00. Holidays will be the same as the public schools. The fee for morning classes is \$50 a month.

Parents are required to accompany their children into and from the center. This policy is adopted for the safety and security of the children. Morning and afternoon snacks and milk for lunch will be provided. Each child should bring a balanced nutritious lunch.

A painting shirt will be needed and can be made from an adult's old shirt. It would be helpful if the top button was removed and replaced with velcro.

If your child would like to bring school supplies, the center suggests the following: a school box, a small box of crayons, a pair of quality scissors and one or two glue sticks. Glue sticks are easier for small children to use and control than the traditional white glue.

Grant money from the Massey Foundation is being put to good use with the purchase of playground equipment which will arrive in September. Classroom manipulatives will arrive in time for opening day.

The staff is looking forward to an exciting and productive year.

Charles Schneider ended his career in the U. S. Postal Service June 1, 1990, three days short of 39 years. He began work in the Ozona post office June 4 of 1954 under the late Eddie Bower.

In 1954 there were approximately 1200 postal patrons, Charles recalls. New box sections were added during the oil boom to take care of the waiting list of customers.

"There were 1500 boxes rented when I left," Charles said.

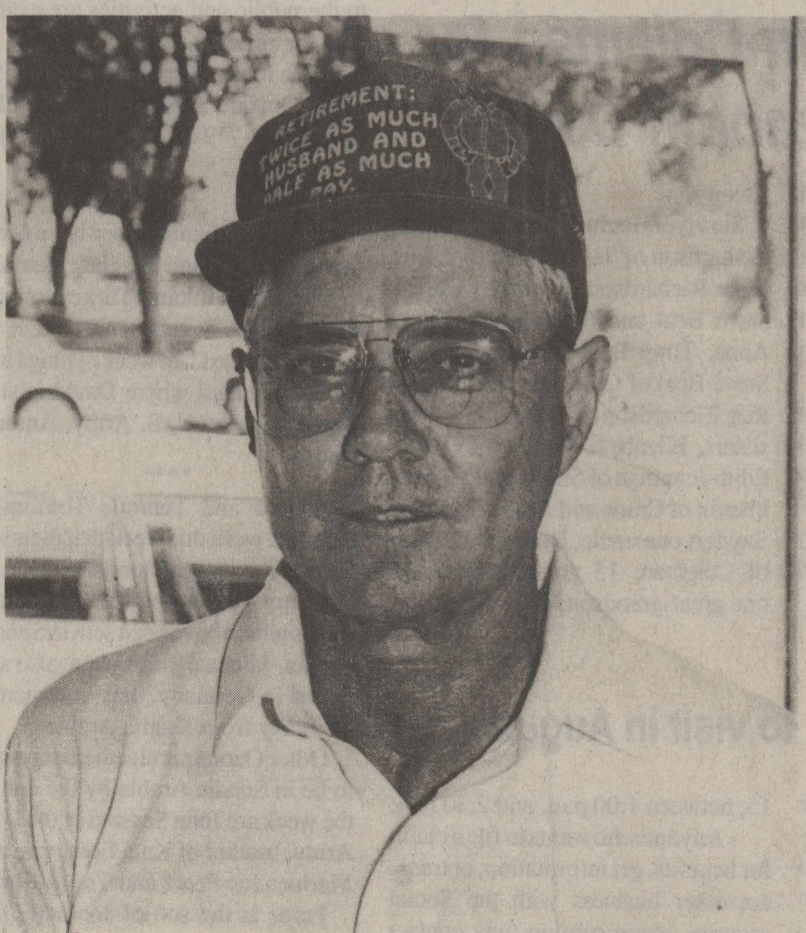
Since retirement, Charles has started playing golf. He plans to "just take it easy", and proclaims his new status with a cap whose messages says "Retirement: twice as much husband, half as much pay".

Gussie Schneider sold her business some time back and is free to travel with Charles to Wyoming for visits with their son Mike and his family. Mike, a Church of Christ preacher in Laramie, and his wife have two daughters, Monica and Jessica.

The girls and their mother recently visited in Ozona with the Schneiders.

Another son, Ronnie, and his wife live in San Angelo. Ronnie is a coach at Lakeview High School and teaches in the classroom at Lincoln Junior High. Mrs. Schneider teaches at Day Elementary.

Since retiring, Charles finds that he misses seeing everyone. After 39 years, he could hear someone cough in the lobby and know who it was without seeing a face.



"I miss all the old timers who have passed on," Charles continued. "Seems like they were more colorful than many of us today."

Anyone who deals with the public knows how stressful that can be.

"We're human like anyone else," said Schneider of postal workers. "We can't keep from making a few mistakes."

"I made one request when I left the post office - that they not mail my check to me," he quipped.

The legendary frontiersman whose statue centers the south end of the square was born in Hawkins County, TN in 1786. He first made a name for himself fighting in the Creek War from 1813 to 1815.

Crockett was elected to the Tennessee legislature in 1821 and served for two terms. He then was elected to the U. S. Congress in 1827 and served two consecutive terms. He lost the election in 1831 but was elected to serve a final term in 1833.

Crockett is perhaps best known for his last contribution to his country. He was part of the American forces that perished on March 6, 1836 defending the Alamo.

A Crockett descendant, Frances Kerr John of Houston, hopes to attend

the Ozona celebration. Artists have been invited to display and sell their work on the square during the afternoon.

A sidewalk art contest will begin at 4 o'clock. Children with an adult are encouraged to participate. There will be a category especially for children accompanied by their grandparents.

Chalk will be provided by the chamber of the contest.

Wagon Train and Trail Ride to kick-off events.... Sutton Co. Centennial celebration activities begin Aug. 21

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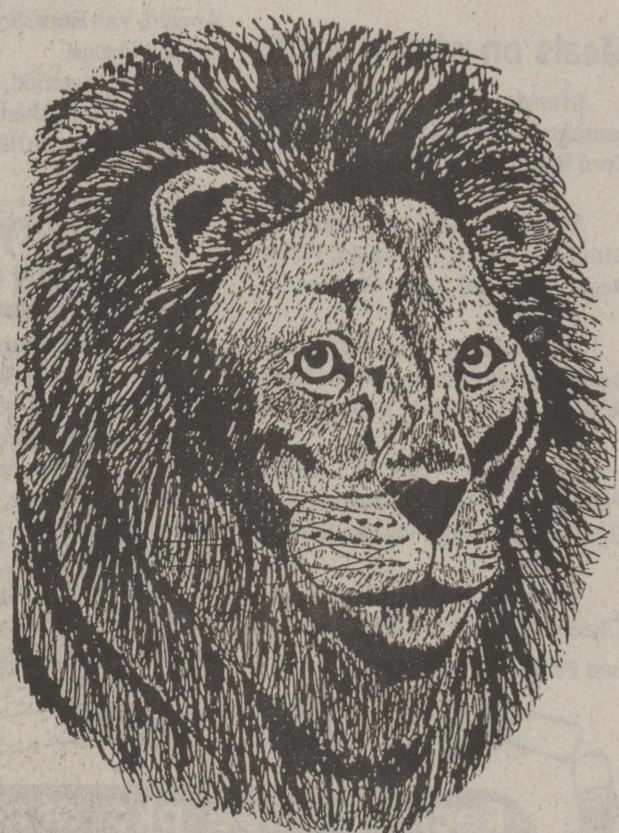
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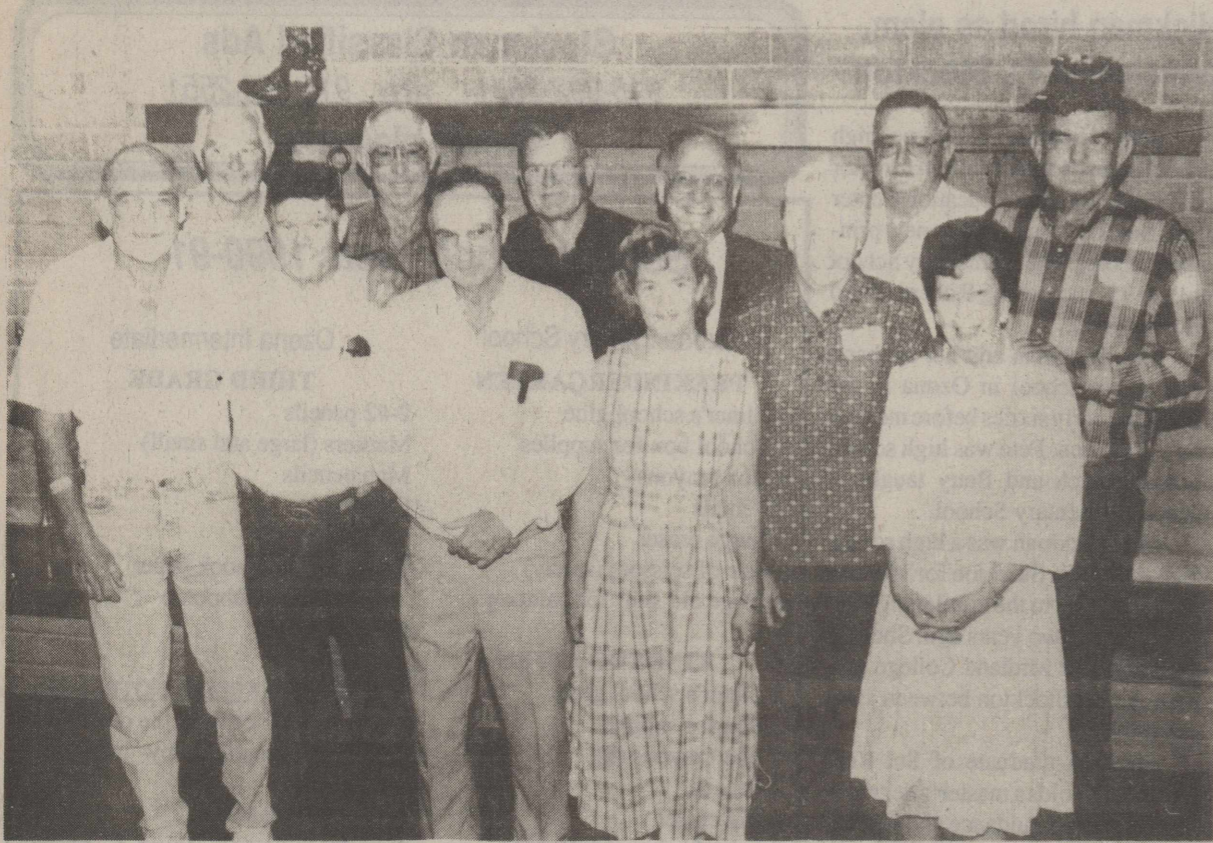

State bus safety rules protect children

As the new school year begins this month, more than one million public school students in Texas will travel some 1.2 million miles per day aboard 25,100 school buses.

To ensure their safety, the state has established various traffic laws for bus drivers and other motorists.

Texas law requires that all vehicles stop when meeting or passing a school bus with flashing red lights when the bus is either loading or unloading students. Violation of the law can not only result in a fine of up to \$200, but can also result in tragedy.

Vehicles may proceed only when

the bus begins moving or when signaled by the school bus driver to proceed or when the red lights are no longer flashing.

In addition, all school buses carrying children are required to stop not less than 15 feet from any railroad crossing. Bus drivers must listen and look in both directions for approaching trains before crossing the railroad tracks.

Bus drivers and their young passengers traverse more than 21,000 bus routes across the state.

School bus drivers must meet several state requirements before they

are allowed to transport schoolchildren. Local district requirements may be more stringent.

According to State Board of Education rules, the primary concern of any school bus driver is the safety and welfare of the children that ride his or her bus. In addition to driving the bus, the driver must be able to control the bus passengers effectively and deal with any emergency or other situation that may arise.

Students riding buses should be seated at all times when the bus is in motion and should pay attention to the bus driver's instructions.

Betty Hickman, longtime high school counselor and current director of Butz Continuing Education Center in Ft. Stockton was hired as new principal of Comanche Elementary School on July 25, succeeding Robert Alfaro who resigned.

Mrs. Hickman and her husband Pete taught school in Ozona in the fifties and early sixties before moving to Ft. Stockton. Pete was high school football coach and Betty taught in Ozona Elementary School.

Mrs. Hickman was a high school counselor in Ft. Stockton for 16 years before moving to the continuing education center two years ago. She was director of the Midland College program in Fort Stockton between 1974 and 1982.

She is a graduate of Sul Ross University, holds a master's degree in counseling and guidance and is certified in school administration. She also taught at the elementary level for 10 years.

Tammy Davee left Aug. 6 for Phoenix, AZ where she will study design and production art at the Phoenix Institute of Technology.

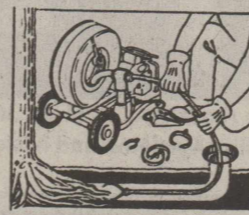

Norwegian visitor part of 4-H exchange program

The 22-year-old florist was eligible to participate in IFYE through her eight years as a 4-H Club member. The 4-H program in Norway is much like that here, explained Anne, except that club members work on only one project a year. There are no exhibits such as the livestock, clothing and food shows presented by U. S. 4-H'ers.

Anne spent 3 1/2 weeks at the 4-H Center in Brownwood. While there, she and another IFYE from Scandinavia gave talks and showed slides from their countries.

In Norway, public school students begin at age 7 and complete their schooling at 16. Most take three years



of advanced education after high school and then go on to attend a university. Following high school, Anne studied and became a florist.

Americans use more silk flowers and fewer pot plants than Norwegians, Anne observed. While cut flower selections are much the same, American arrangements have a wider color range in bouquets, she said.

During her Ozona visit, Anne spent a morning preparing an arrangement of fresh and dried plants with Mrs. Joe Bean.

A trip to the L. P. Bloodworth Ranch in Sutton County to see the centennial wagon and mules was a treat for farm raised Anne. Buildings on her family's summer dairy farm date from the 1600s.

Anne also toured Fort Lancaster, Fort Concho, Caverns of Sonora and the Crockett County Museum.

The Crockett County Extension Office each year receives a list of IFYEs coming to Texas. Anyone interested in hosting one of the visitors for two weeks should contact the office.

"I certainly recommend the experience," said Mrs. Ulmer. Anne is the Ulmers' second International Youth Foreign Exchange guest.

Preparing you child for the first day of school

Ever notice how small children just can't wait to go to school? They talk about it for months beforehand. They "play school" with their friends. Their books become "schoolbooks." Isn't it a shame the feeling often doesn't last?

The first day of school does leave a lasting impression—pleasant for most of us, but traumatic for some.

Children need some preparation before entering the world of school—even kindergarten. Do you remember how you felt on your first day of school?

Older brothers and sisters may give younger children the idea that school is where big kids go and everyone else already reads and writes. Children without older siblings may have a fuzzy or distorted mental image of what school is like, sometimes acquired from television shows or children's books.

It's important for parents and children to plan their parting experience and share their feelings about this time. Parents and young children should make several trips to the school playground and visit the classroom if possible. Meeting the teacher can also help ease fears.

For some children it may be necessary to sit in the classroom until they become comfortable with their new environment; although this could mean time off from work, it's well worth it to get your child's education off to a good, secure start.

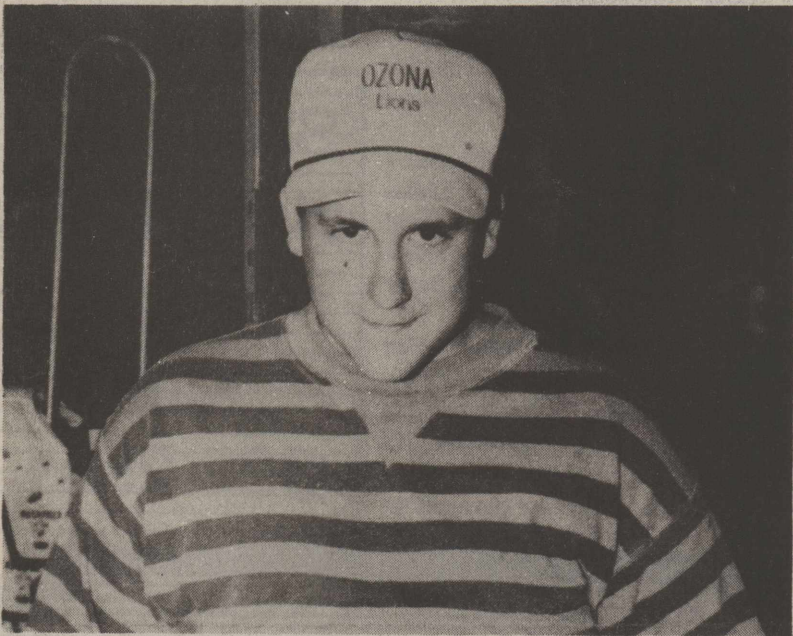

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Bingo tax reported

State Comptroller Bob Bullock on
Aug. 3 sent checks totaling \$2.3 mil-
lion to counties and cities in Texas
that have legalized charity bingo and
levy the two-percent local tax on the
games' gross receipts.

Bullock said that the checks reflect
the amount collected by 56 counties
and 111 cities during the second quar-
ter of 1990.

Harris County received the state's
largest payment of \$224,419. Dallas
County received the state's second
largest payment of \$199,040. Tarrant
County received \$167,322 and Bexar
County received \$88,670.

The City of Dallas' check totaled
\$118,447 which was the largest pay-
ment to Texas cities that collect the
tax. Houston's check was for \$105,612
while Fort Worth received a check for
\$91,913. San Antonio's payment to-
taled \$61,050. San Angelo received

\$10,268.30.

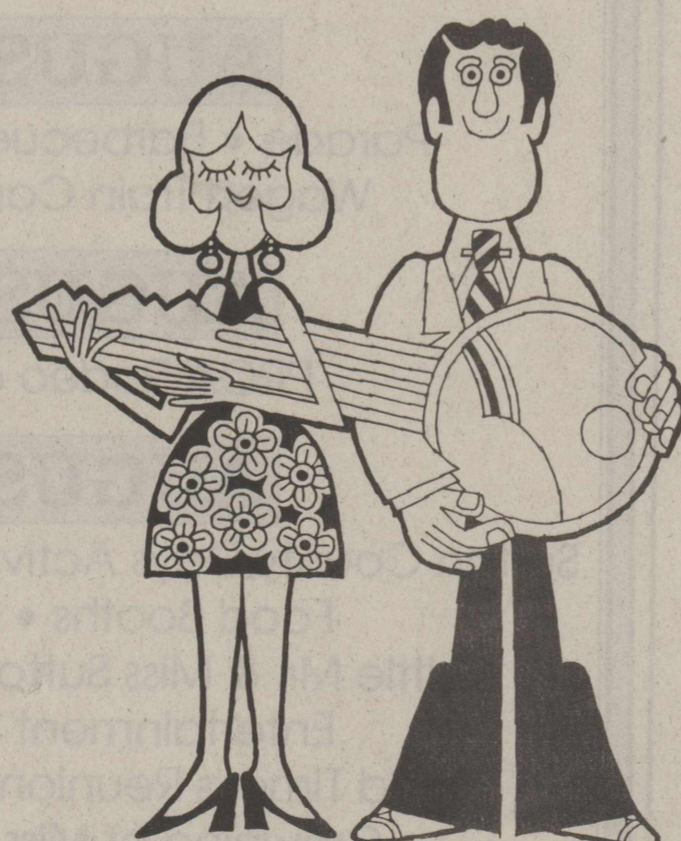
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
