Howard new leader at OJHS

Ozona Junior High principal Don Howard re-enters the world of students and teachers this fall after eight years as an education finance consultant for Corbett Services Inc. in Austin.

Howard served as superintendent at Stamford I.S.D. for eight years before joining Corbett Services. The educator was twice employed in both the Stamford and Pecos schools where he taught secondary classes in history and government. A distributive education program was established by Howard at Stamford in 1965.

"I'm anxious to get back into the arena I know best," Howard said of his return to education.

A 1960 graduate of McMurry College, he received a master of education degree from Hardin-Simmons University in 1967. His teaching certification was earned at Abilene Christian.

"I'm really impressed with the faculty that is in place here," said Howard of the OJHS staff.

The administrator believes bonding between home and school is a must if children are to develop their



full potential as students. He also has a strong belief in the application of common sense.

The school will add computer classes for seventh graders in conjunction with the eighth grade classes this fall. A computer science resource room with 14-15 machines is available for use by all students and staff.

Use of the facility will be coordinated as needed for work on class projects, Mr. Howard said.

Mrs. Howard, Jerry Ann, received

her teacher certification from Texas Christian. The Howards met when both were teaching at Pecos.

Howard is originally from Meadow near Brownfield. "My name is still on the water tower there," he commented. Mrs. Howard is a native of Stamford.

"The West Texas setting is something that really fits with us," said Howard. "I'm very familiar with the rugged individualism of West Texas and its people. I'm very comfortable in that setting."

The Howards have three children. Dub works in landscaping in Dallas. Chuck is a graduate assistant and works with the football program at Howard Payne University. He is completing his work for mathematics certification. Daughter Edie is a junior at Texas A&M where she studies accounting. Her plans are to become a certified public accountant.

"We're going to continue to build on the good things that have happened in the past," said Howard of his plans for OJHS this year. "We're going to have a good year filled with hard work and lots of fun."

Moore returns from African missionary trip

I have recently returned from a month long journey in Africa. "The Dark Continent," as it is called, has been in a turmoil this year as many nations struggle with internal problems. Many of the countries in Africa are trying to move from one-party or military type governments toward democracy, thus the confusion and conflict.

Africa is a place of great contrast. It has places of great beauty like Mount Kilimanjaro and Victoria Falls, but it also has desolate scenes like the Sahara and the dry fauna of interior nations. The sophistication and splendor of places like Johannesburg clash with the poverty and isolation of places like rural Zambia.

I flew the length of the continent from Egypt to South Africa. I entered the nations of Kenya, South Africa, Zimbabwe and Zambia. Most of my time was spent in Zambia, a landlocked nation surrounded by eight other nations.

Hopefully, the experience provided me with some insight that will help me in ministry. It certainly renewed

my appreciation for the blessings and the freedoms that we enjoy here. I have travelled in Europe, the Orient, Southeast Asia, and various other places - none compare with the opportunities we share in America.

Zambia is a paradox. It has chronic poverty, disease, and need - yet, it also has a happiness and contentment that evades the more affluent nations. It is almost that Zambia has nothing but everything and we have everything but nothing. Money, power, and things do not give happiness.

I travelled almost the length of Zambia from Livingstone in the South to Kasama in the North. The main road makes 163 look like a super highway. It was winter there, so most of the roads were passable. During the rainy season, many roads cannot be travelled.

I arrived in Zambia on June 23 crossing the Zambesi River from Victoria Falls, Zimbabwe into Livingstone, Zambia. Victoria Falls is one of the wonders of the world. Called "The smoke that thunders", it is a spectacular sight that visitors from all over the world visit each year.

Hospital budget remains unchanged.....

Care Center proposes \$13,000 budget increase

Members of Crockett County Hospital and Care Center Board met in regular session Aug. 9 with Armando Arredondo presiding. Other board members attending included Concha Zapata, Martha Gries and Fred Deaton.

Also attending were: Mena Carnes, Lupe Galvan, Martha Vickers, Zoe Green, Dr. Robert Owensby, Dr. Marcus Sims, Doris Hull and Bill Boswell.

Board members voted to submit to commissioners court for its consideration, a 1991 budget for the care center which would include an increase of \$13,000 in new tax revenues and a budget for the hospital which would not include any new tax revenue for 1991.

Hospital financial and statistical reports were discussed at length. This

discussion will be continued at a special called board meeting scheduled for Aug. 23 at 6 p.m. Any consideration to construct a building for the ambulances will also be continued at the special called meeting. The Crockett County Fire Department has voted not to house the ambulances at or near the fire station.

Action on adopting a revised ambulance fee schedule was tabled until

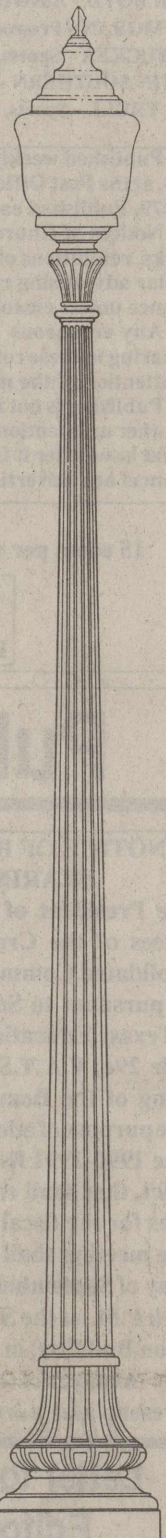

Bruce Beasley and Ricky Burger were conferred with the rank of Eagle Scout Aug. 15 in a court of honor held at the civic center. The 1990 graduates of Ozona High School were introduced by Ray Don Myers, Scoutmaster of Troop 153.

To achieve the rank of Eagle Scout, requirements must be fulfilled in areas of leadership, service and outdoor skills. As Scouts complete the requirements, they advance through

the different award levels - Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class, Star, Life and Eagle. Specific tests for advancement are organized into skill awards and merit badges.

Seven skill awards are required covering the outdoors, family life, and citizenship responsibilities.

Merit badges signify mastery of Scoutcraft skills as well as serving to increase skill in areas of personal interest.

Of the more than 120 merit badges available, 21 must be earned to qualify for Eagle. Eleven must be earned from a list including camping, citizenship in the community, citizenship in the nation, citizenship in the world, communications, emergency preparedness, environmental science, first aid, lifesaving, personal fitness, personal management, safety, sports and swimming.

Before becoming an Eagle Scout,

the candidate must also complete a school, religious or community service project which has been approved by the Scout Council.

Upon completion of all requirements, the Eagle candidate appears before a local board of review with a council member present. Then his records go before the council board of review and then the national council in Irving.

Bruce planned the placement of the

Letter to the Editor

In last weeks issue, it was reported that the Commissioners Court rejected the proposal concerning the creation of a county golf course, when actually they simply tabled the proposal until their next meeting on Monday, August 27, 1990.

The creation of a county golf course would, as a matter of public policy, have a two-fold public purpose reminiscent of the 1964 Civil Rights Act; initially, any man, woman, or child that desired to play golf could do so upon paying the appropriate fees and following the golf course rules. Secondly, and more fundamentally, it would directly confront the racist policy (ies) of the Ozona Country Club which heretofore has promoted and perpetuated segregation instead of integration, social divisiveness instead of social togetherness, and racial exclusivity instead of racial inclusivity. These policies reflect adversely and negatively on our community and certainly they do not promote the ideals and values of this country.

Therefore, the creation of a county golf course would have the added effect of an orderly promotion of Crockett County public policy and avoid unnecessary confrontation between those who don't believe in racism versus those who would perpetuate it.

If any of these points is worth pursuing, then you should contact your Commissioner and advise them that you want a small part of your taxpayer money go towards the creation of a public golf course. Presently, at least 1.2 million taxpayer dollars exists in a contingent general revenue fund, and adoption of this proposal would not only be a small portion of our taxpayer dollars, but it would foster better community relations and community involvement.

Livingstone is a town named after the famed Scottish missionary and explorer, David Livingstone, who opened the way for Christianity in 1841. There is complete freedom of worship in Zambia, so a variety of religions exist. Imet missionaries from different groups, and I was pleased to see that they work in a much more agreeable manner than we usually do here.

My first week in Zambia was spent working in the vicinity of Kasama in the Northern Province. We stayed in a remote village near Mungwi. Most of the villages are composed of thatched roof mud huts without electricity or water. The people are predominately involved in farming, using tools and methods that are primitive.

Maize is the important food crop providing the basic food staple. From maize a food called scheema is made, and it is eaten three times a day. A "sweet-beer", their national drink, is also made from maize. I tried to watch what I ate and drank while in the remote areas, but the sweet potatoes, greens, peanuts, and dried fish were not too bad. I still prefer our food.

Two experiences that I had during that week will remain in my memory for a long time. One day I was going

through a large open market where all types of vegetables, meat and fish were sold. A little boy saw me and ran screaming to his mother. He was terrified at the sight of a white man. No matter how much we tried to calm him, he was hysterical. I'm not that ugly, am I? The other experience was a funeral that I preached for a four year old boy who died of malaria. The influence of witchcraft is evident in the villages, and their superstitions are quite strange and different from our culture.

Medical facilities, even in urban areas, are poor, and, in remote areas, nonexistent. Zambia has one of the highest rates of AIDS in the world. I heard that they had to use needles over a hundred times in some places. They beg for medical supplies and personnel. I met five Cuban doctors and nurses who were working in the Northern Providence trying to help alleviate the poor conditions. Russia had just sent a large supply of needles. Malaria claims the lives of many, especially children, each year.

On June 29 we left the Kasama area and started on the 750 mile trip back to Kaloma in the Southern Province. There had been widespread rioting during the week, and Lusaka, the capital city, was under a 12 hour curfew at night. We had to spend the night in Lusaka because of the curfew. Early Saturday morning, June 30, there was an attempted coup. For several hours things were very hectic and unstable.

President Kenneth Kaunda has been in power for many years and some are attempting to establish a two party system of government. The government had more than doubled the price of basic food prices, thus the people, especially in the urban areas, were revolting. The coup attempt and the rioting were the result of economic instability and a general dissatisfaction with the people in control. Gunfire could be heard and helicopters were in the air near the place I was

staying. It reminded me of Vietnam, and those memories are not pleasant.

Our group, myself and another American missionary, along with three Zambians, was staying at a Baptist Guest House. During those hours, we spent some anxious moments together with some Baptist missionaries who were there too. We prayed and asked God for protection and for help in preaching Christ to the nation of Zambia. He answered the prayers.

We were finally able to leave Lusaka later that day without any more violence. I arrived at Namwianga Christian School late Saturday afternoon. I was to speak on a lectureship that was held there July 1-3. On Sunday morning there were 1,301 in attendance. People came from all parts of the nation to attend the three day program.

I spent the 4th of July with other American missionaries having a picnic and singing patriotic songs. I yearned to be here in Ozona to enjoy all the activities of that day. On the 5th

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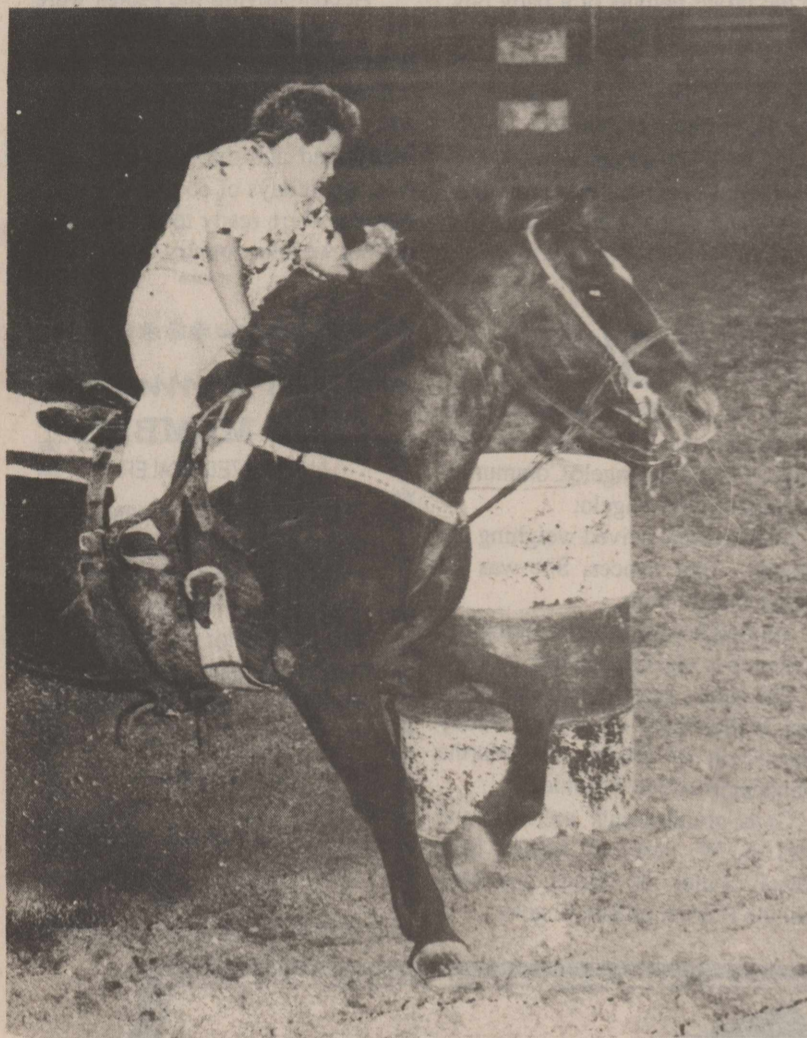

RADIATION RISK

CCPL subscribes to over 30 magazines for our patrons' use. One of these is the *Conde Nast Traveler*. In the August 1990 issue, there is a very interesting article called "Radiation Risk For Pregnant Fliers" by Aaron Sugarman. Mr. Sugarman emphasizes the risks of high radiation levels in the upper atmosphere from solar flares that fliers are exposed to and the danger to pregnant women. On Sept. 29, 1989, a particularly violent solar flare sent a massive wave of radioactive particles toward the Earth. The FAA has a system that tracks solar flares, but it did not alert the airlines, their passengers or crews to the danger. The FAA claims the level did not merit a warning. Radiation experts disagree.

The exposure to cosmic radiation is more than 100 times greater at 35,000 feet than on the ground. Women should be especially cautious during the 8 to 15 weeks after conception, when excessive radiation exposure carries a risk of mental retardation in unborn children. Current federal guidelines set a limit of 5 millisieverts - a unit indicating the quantity and intensity of a radiation exposure - for the entire term of pregnancy, with a maximum of 0.5 millisievert for each month of the term. In comparison, your body absorbs 0.1 millisievert from a chest X-ray. Dr. Edward Radford, who has studied survivors of the atomic blasts in Hiroshima says, "I know I wouldn't want a child of mine to get a 5-millisieverts dose."

In the next year, more solar flares than usual are expected. Now is a particularly good time to lower the alarm level for radiation limits. Currently, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration alerts the FAA whenever a flare increases the radiation dose to 1 millisievert per hour at 65,000 feet. The FAA then warns airlines, which can request permission to fly at lower altitudes, dramatically reducing the exposure level.

Given the intensity of cosmic radiation at high altitudes, frequent fliers and flight crews can build up significant radiation exposure even when solar flare activity is minimal. Executives flying corporate jets are even more vulnerable, because their aircraft often fly at higher altitudes than passenger planes. For every 100,000 travelers who receive a lifetime dose of 10 millisieverts, 112 additional cancer cases are expected, 70 of which would be fatal. (This dose is equal to 50 round-trip New York-Tokyo flights or 100 chest X-rays). "I'm not losing sleep over radiation exposures from my frequent flights. I'm sure something else will do me in first," says Dr. Edward Radford. "But is it okay if inflight radiation causes the additional cancer deaths? How about ten thousand? It's hard to draw the line."

receipt of a recommendation from the ambulance coordinator at the next regular board meeting.

Any discussion concerning changing the policy as it relates to Dr. Owensby's out-patients that he sees in the hospital, along with discussion concerning computer software was tabled until the next board meeting.

The board was informed that the Medicaid program is out of money and will not pay any physician or hospital Medicaid claims until at least Aug. 24, 1990. This will temporarily affect hospital and clinic collections.

The board discussed the possibility of hospital/care center board members serving more than one two-year term. The board agreed that this would enable board members to become better informed and would enable the hospital/care center to formulate long range plans.

The hospital/care center board agreed to request that the commissioners' court schedule as soon as possible, a countywide department head meeting to discuss the proposed

countywide personnel policy.

In other action, the board elected Martha Gries as new board secretary, voted to submit an application for participation in the commodities foods program and voted to make flu shots available to the citizens of Crockett County at a reduced cost of \$5.00.

After meeting in executive session, the board voted to recommend a pay increase for a care center employee who has completed her six month probationary period.

Emergency room visits during July totaled 470. Clinic visits for the year to date are 2,762 compared to 2,084 for the same period last year.

Laboratory procedures done to date are 2,436 with 2,026 for the same period the previous year.

X-ray procedures to date are 748 compared to 542 the previous year.

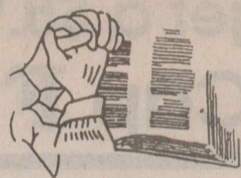

of July we went to Zimbabwe for a retreat. It was a couple of days of rest and encouragement to all missionaries who labor so hard in that area. It was also an opportunity to visit Hwange National Park, one of the best wildlife parks in Zimbabwe.

My third week in Zambia was spent at Namwianga Christian Schools where I taught a Bible course at George Benson College. During that week, I also taught and preached in several villages in the area. People will walk several miles to study the Bible, and they will remain for hours to hear God's Word. The people are extremely poor in material things (a teenager

working at the Dairy Queen here makes more in two weeks time than a teacher in a college there makes in several weeks), but their sense of spirituality goes far beyond what we have here. Without preaching, let me say that it was very refreshing to see people who are hungry for the Word of Christ and not tied to a rigid schedule. Think about that!

I departed Zambia on July 16 for Johannesburg, South Africa. On the 17th I started toward home. I travelled some 52 hours before I reached Midland. I was exhausted but very encouraged about the accomplishments of my trip.

I have a deep appreciation in my heart for so many here in Ozona. Some contributed financially to the effort, and I thank you. Thanks to all who were so kind to Nancy and Melissa while I was away. Special gratitude is expressed to all who prayed for my safety and well-being.

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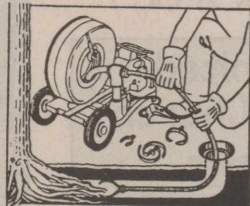

Living with schoolagers: What can one expect?

Parents and caregivers of school-age children often ask themselves, "Do all school-agers act this way? Is this child developing normally? Is this just another stage?"

Adults can be assured that it is considered normal for the 6-year-old to be eager to learn, restless, overactive, self-assertive and often aggressive. These youngsters are inept at activities using small muscles. They are keenly competitive and boastful and in need of encouragement ample praise, warmth and great patience from adults.

The typical 7-year-old will have better use of his small muscles, be sensitive to the feelings and attitudes of others, and be talkative and prone to exaggeration. Youngsters at this age enjoy songs, rhythms, fairy tales, myths, television and movies. They need the right combination of independence and encouragement from adults.

Attention spans of 8-year-olds increase, as does their concern and interest in other people. At this point the child is more enthusiastic than cautious, which leads to a higher accident rate. The child's understanding of basic concepts, like time and money, increase dramatically. Eight-year-olds need a best friend in addition to many experiences with peers, gentle reminders of their responsibilities, and lots of praise and encouragement.

Individual differences and abilities become obvious by the age of 9 to 10. The child is capable of prolonged involvement in an activity and plan and carry out activities and events on his own. Interest in his own community, country and people from other countries and cultures replaces interest in fantasy and fairy tales. The 9- or 10-year-old still needs active rough and tumble play, friends and membership in a group, definite responsibility, frank answers to questions concerning physiological changes, and reasonable explanations from loving adults.

Preadolescents, or children aged 10, 11 and 12, experience rapid, uneven growth of all parts of their bodies which may result in awkwardness, restlessness and laziness. Wide differences in maturity are common, with girls often maturing about two years earlier than boys. Although there are marked differences in interests between boys and girls, all typically enjoy team games, pets, television, radio and movies. Having a sense of belonging, or being accepted by one's

peers, is of great importance in the child's life. Preadolescents need opportunities for greater independence, responsibility without pressure, warm affection and a sense of humor from adults who avoid nagging, condemnation and talking down.

Understanding the way changes which school-age children experience physically, socially, emotionally and mentally can help parents and caregivers provide the experiences and opportunities needed for optimum growth and development. Understanding the normal developmental processes can also ensure wise guidance and appropriate limit-setting for growing children.

The deadline to sign up for lambs is September 15th. That's the day your little woolies will arrive at your home—we'll weigh and tag ewe lambs and hand out market lambs.

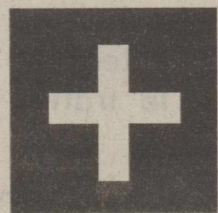

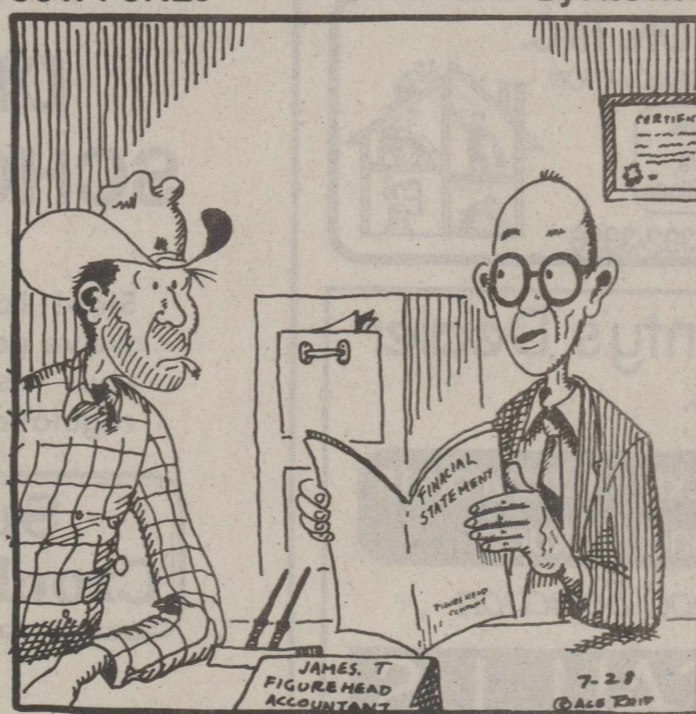

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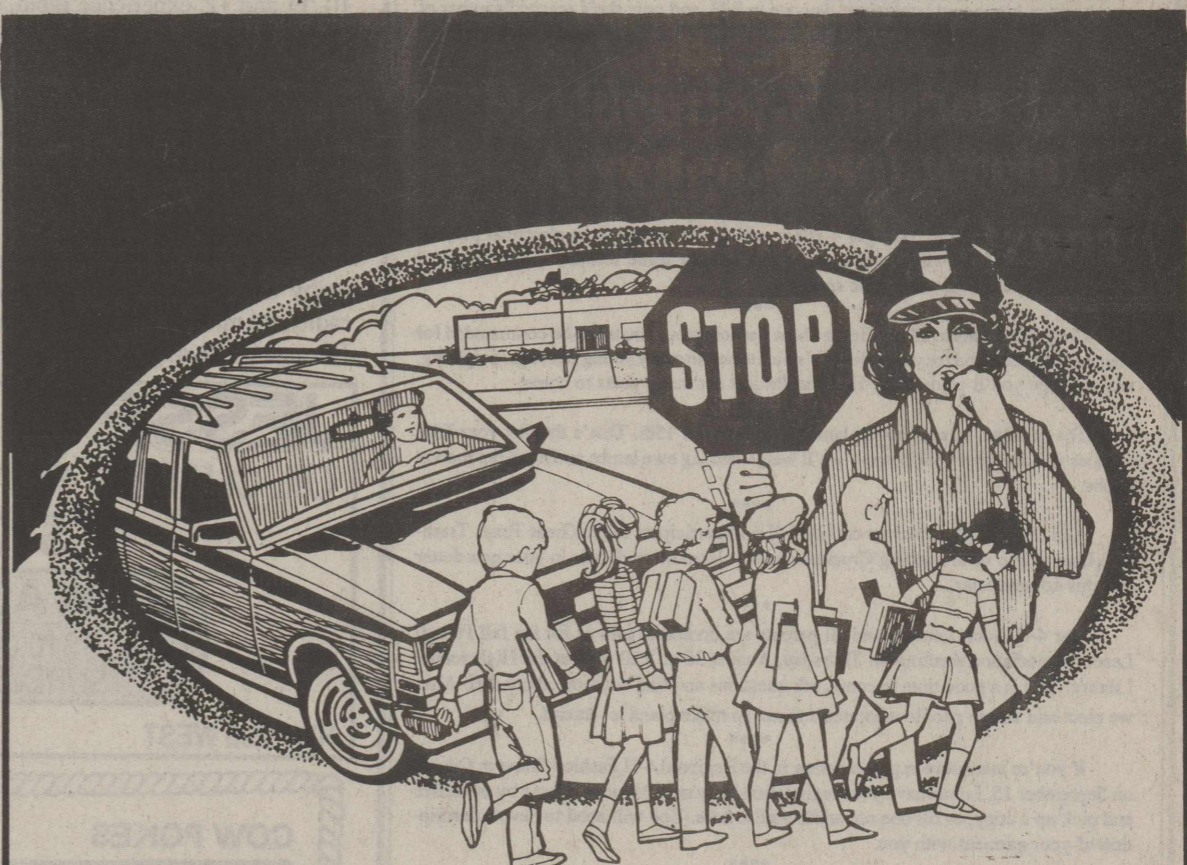
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
